County SWCD with headquarters in Friona, is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district, and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

The board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state, and federal agencies and other organizations, and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

As one of five individuals serving on the district board of directors, Christian will be responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas soil and conservation district

In other areas of leadership, Christian is active in the High Plains Underground Water District and the Texas Farm

He has been recognized as the Conservation Farmer of the Year for Parmer County. Troy and his wife, Lillie, have three children, Vick who

In Texas there are 201 soil and water conservation districts. Each is a legal subdivision of state government organized by local agricultural Purpose of the Parmer landowners with the assistance of the Texas Soil and Water

Conservation Board. Unlike most other legal subdivisions of state government, SWCDs do not have the powers of taxation or eminent domain.

All conservation programs managed by the districts are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.

Record Turnout - -

Parmer, Curry Voters Out Of Step With Rest

Voters in Parmer County, 6; Lorette, 0. Texas and Curry County, New Mexico did not go along with the rest of the voters across their respective states in their choice of candidates in Tuesday's general election.

Although all the votes are Governor: Irick and McMillnot tabulated, the projected state winners are not the ones chosen by the local voters.

A record voter turnout is 5714; Bingaman, 3905. evidenced in both Texas and New Mexico, as well in the local counties. Parmer County had 57 percent of the registered voters go to the polls, and Curry County had 691/2 percent to vote. In Texico, over 65% of the registered voters went to the polls.

At the Tribune's press time, the projected winners in Texas were Mark White for the Governor's seat, Bill Hobby for Lieutenant Governor, and Lloyd Bentsen for U.S. Senator.

In New Mexico, the projected winners at press time were Toney Anaya and Mike Runnels for Governor and Lieutenant Governor, Jeff Bingaman for U.S. Senator, and Joe Skeen for U.S. Representative. In Parmer County, the voting was as follows:







Washington, October 19—Interest rates for loan programs of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Farmers Home Administration, which were lowered last month, will dropagain effective November 1. Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block announced today.

Interest rates for single family housing loans will drop from 13.125 to 11.5 percent except for those who can afford the rates charged by the Department of Housing and Urban Development. Their rates will drop a full point from 13.5 to 12.5.

Loans for multi-family housing will be reduced from 13.125 to 11.5 percent.

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Last year the Farwell Math-A-Thon raised \$1756, and Mrs. Inman said, "It would really be nice if we could go over the \$3,000 mark this year."

The Math-A-Thon works this way: Each participating student will work a "Funbook" which has been especially designed for his grade level containing 200 math problems.

Each student will ask sponsors to pledge a certain amount of money, one cent, two cents, a nickel, etc., per problem he has worked corways to eliminate cancer and rectly. Sponsors will then give other diseases that destroy the money to the students

when the booklet has been completed. The booklets are provided by the Research Center, Mrs. Inman said.

Money will be brought to school and it will all be sent in at the same time, Mrs. Inman said, adding that St. Jude had requested that the participants work it this way so that better records can be kept.

Prizes this year for students completing the most problems and collecting the most money include \$25 donors, t-shirts; \$100 donors, barrel tote bags. Every participant will receive a Math Magician Honor award, and all prizes are awarded by St. Jude's.

If the school should send in \$3,000-\$4,999, the school would receive 15 calculators to be used in the classroom. If the school raised over \$5,000, the school would receive a computer.


New virus may control crop-destroying insects

COLLEGE STATION -Texas A&M University researchers have discovered a new family of viruses carried by wasps that may provide the key to controlling crop-destroying insects without chemicals.

The discovery also could be important in understanding how insects carry and transmit other viruses and in inhibiting the spread of diseases by insects, the scientists said.

"The virus-like particles live harmlessly in the ovaries of parasitic wasps and are deposited along with eggs into the bodies of caterpillars that destroy crops," said Dr. Brad Vinson. "Somehow, the virus protects the eggs from being destroyed by the caterpillar's immune system."

Vinson, an entomologist, and Dr. Max Summers, a virologist, both of Texas A&M's College of Agriculture, say the virus creates an optimum environment for eggs, which develop and hatch inside the caterpillars. The virus would eventually kill the caterpillars, but the larvae that hatch out of the eggs and feed on the pests do the job

When our Lord had finished His familiar discourse on "the mysteries of the Kingdom of Heaven," He said: THEREFORE, EVERY SCRIBE WHICH IS INSTRUCTED UNTO THE KINGDOM OF HEAVEN IS LIKE A MAN THAT IS A HOUSE-HOLDER, WHO BRINGS FORTH

OUT OF HIS TREASURE THINGS NEW AND OLD" (Matt. 13:52). A new era had just dawned in the world's history. A new message was being proclaimed. John the Baptist had begun to cry: "Repent ye: for the Kingdom of Heaven is at hand!" and the Lord Jesus and the twelve had taken up the same

Some listened eagerly. others turned away-among them many of the scribes, the Bible teachers of the day. They did not welcome any new teaching. 


