## Area Churches Schedule Christmas Celebrations

In celebration of the Christmas season and the birth of Christ, area churches have scheduled special Christmas services for their congregations.

Texico First Baptist Church has announced that the drama group will present a Christmas play during the worship service on Sunday morning, Dec. 19. A special Christmas musical service will be presented by the adult choir during the regular Sunday evening service, Dec. 19, beginning at 6:30 p.m. MST. The congregation will go Christmas caroling on Wednesday night, Dec. 22.

On Sunday night, Dec. 19, beginning at 6:30 p.m. MST, Pleasant Hill Baptist Church will present a skit of a family observing Christmas and welcoming a stranger into their home. There will be singing of Christmas carols and the children will receive treats around the annual Christmas tree.

The Pleasant Hill church has also scheduled a New Year's Eve Watch Service on Friday night, Dec. 31, in the Richard Kelley home. There will be a talent show, chalk talk, and a kitchen band.

Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church has scheduled a Christmas cantata entitled "Sing and Rejoice" to be presented by the Chancel Choir on Sunday night, Dec. 19, at 7 p.m. CST. Nelle Craig is the choir director, and the organist is Margaret Aycock.

Also, the Hamlin Memorial church congregation will take part in Christmas Eve communion on December 24 at 5 p.m. CST.

"O Come Let Us Adore Him" will be presented by the adult choir of Farwell First Baptist Church on Sunday night, Dec. 19, beginning at 7 p.m. CST. The musical will be directed by John Lowry, music director for the church.

According to Rev. Herman Scheller of St. John Lutheran Church in Lariat, there will be a Christmas Eve children's program, with congregational singing on Friday, Dec. 24, at 6 p.m. CST.

Also, St. John's will conduct Christmas Day services at 10:30 a.m. on Saturday, Dec. 25.

church will take part in communion services on New Year's Eve, Dec. 31, at 7:30 p.m. CST.

New Light Baptist Church of Farwell has slated a special Christmas program on Sunday, Dec. 19, at 1 p.m. CST. The birth of Jesus will be told in song by the adult choir as the children dramatize the story.

Father Jerry Mueller of the San Jose Catholic Church in Texico said that the church will observe Midnight Mass at 11 p.m. MST on Christmas

Eve.

Lazbuddie Baptist Church adult choir, accompanied by the high school instrumental ensemble, will perform "Reason for the Season," Saturday night, Dec. 18, at the meeting of the Full Gospel Business Men International in Hereford at 8 p.m. This same program will be performed by the group at the Lazbuddie Baptist Church on Sunday night, Dec. 19, at 6 p.m.

## Traffic Survey Results Revealed At Council Meet

W.C. Powell of Lubbock, state highway department representative of the Traffic Survey and Engineering Division, met with the Farwell City Council on Monday, Dec. 13, in response to a letter the council had submitted to the highway department concerning the intersection of Farm-to-Market Loop 292 and U.S. Highway 70-84 (near Dairy Queen and Capitol Foods in east Farwell).

The council had asked for assistance in solving the problems of the accident-prone intersection, and had suggested installation of a traffic signal light there. There have been 12 accidents at that intersection in the last 12 months; however, Powell stated that his survey results revealed the fact that there was not enough traffic at said intersection to warrant a blinking light. He

further suggested that one possibility could be a continuous left turn lane starting at 7th Street and continuing east to the city limits, and elimination of the median on Farm-to-Market Road 292 when the necessary funds were available. Funds for such a project would probably not be available for at least a year. Powell is to give the existing problem further study and report back to the council in 30-60 days.

Also appearing before the council was Don Williams, President of the Farwell Chamber of Commerce. A recommendation was made to the council to rejoin the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission. The council took the recommendation under advisement and will seek detailed information on rejoining the

PRPC. A request was also made by Williams for the council to place signs stating the location of the Farwell Clinic, which is staffed by a medical doctor and a dentist, be placed on Highway 60 as well as Highway 70-84. The council was in agreement to this request and will obtain information on the cost of the project and order the necessary supplies.

Christmas bonuses will be received by the city's five full-time employees with the monies to be taken out of the Water Department Funds.

Those in attendance included Mayor Walter Kaltwasser, Councilmen Fred Chandler and Jerry Monk; city employee Dee Hammit; and guests W.C. Powell and Don Williams.

## Icy Winter Storm Unfolds Across Twin Cities Area

Is it ice, rain, or snow? That was the question asked by many residents of the Farwell-Texico area as they were slipping, sliding, and skidding along the streets and highways last week.

The cold, arctic weather drama began to unfold early last Wednesday morning when a very light snow turned into an ice storm as everyone began their daily schedules.

Those happy about the few days of moisture were wheat farmers and school kids, as the

added moisture will certainly be beneficial to the wheat crop, and students were allowed to skip a day or two of schooling.

Texico schools closed Wednesday and Thursday, and Farwell school was closed Thursday.

The temperature remained below the freezing mark for several days, contributing to hazardous driving and playing havoc with scheduled events. Anyone who had to travel even a short distance couldn't have been very happy about the icy coverings on the roadways.

By Friday, the sun had peeped out for a few hours melting the ice. Some damage occurred as tree limbs fell to the ground, giving way to the heavy coating of ice. Many area residents were without electricity Friday when power lines broke as the thaw began.

According to Lonnie McFarland, manager of Sherley-Anderson Elevator in Lariat, about one-half inch of moisture was received in that area.

In the Twin Cities, up to three-tenths inch of moisture was reported.



### Ice Storm Coats Trees

Ice-coated trees draped over the Twin Cities streets as the sun barely peeped through the clouds on Friday morning.

Scenes of this nature were a common sight as the cold, arctic weather drama began to unfold last Wednesday. Streets

were also heavily ice-covered, making area traveling hazardous.



### Broken Limbs, Broken Lines

Broken tree limbs were in mass over the Twin Cities area as the heavy accumulation of ice caused too much pressure

for the limbs to remain intact. Some areas also reported broken electric lines causing loss of electrical power for

several hours. The thaw began Friday, and by Monday, the skies were clear while the sun shone brightly.

Two weeks ago we noted that this rump congress had an unprecedented chance to pass legislation for the good of the country. It almost beggars belief that at this writing the only thing that looks like it will accomplish will be to raise the salary of its members.

Here is the Social Security pot rapidly going broke, and the only peep out of the gilded poobahs of Congress is a hint that they might raise the Social Security tax. Such dereliction of duty almost demands the resignation of the whole overpaid and underbrained bunch.

Oh yes, we will qualify one of our opening statements - there is another "Goodie" apt to be foisted off on the unsuspecting public. With the aid and counsel of the floundering Reagan administration and the support of the gold plated big spenders headed by Tip O'Neill, they will undoubtedly pass the legislation raising the federal tax on gasoline by 125 percent per gallon.

This at the same time that the International Monetary Fund is asking for only a few billion bucks to bail the major world banks out of the hole which they dug for themselves with ill-considered loans to countries that probably wouldn't repay even if they could. In today's news also is the frantic effort to give away millions of pounds of cheese that shouldn't have ever been amassed in the first place.

And speaking of holes, they are still trying to wheedle billions to dig holes in Wyoming to give the Russians a concentrated target.

This Christmas season we need the parsimoniousness of a Scrooge rather than the profligacy of a King Farouk directing the fiscal destinies of the country.

In spite of our lack of enthusiasm for the gas tax hike bill, there is a section still in the proposal that could be of great benefit to this area. In the version passed by the House and not yet stricken by the Senate committee is a provision for giving gasohol an exemption from the proposed additional nickel a gallon additional tax. Gasohol currently enjoys exemption from the present four cents federal bite, and with the proposed additional five cents it would give gasohol fuels a total of nine cents federal advantage. With the diverse states taxes added to this edge, it would put that fuel at from 14 cents to 18 cents more competitive in the market place. Contrary to most public perception, gasohol is not gone nor forgotten. It is currently being marketed as premium unleaded with ethanol added.

While a rose by any other name may smell as sweet, it is a proven fact that a fancy and confusing name in the market place will sell a product where it hadn't sold before. In this case, add a significant price break to a new name and the product could well sell in huge volumes. By this time next year, the added demand for grain for alcohol production coupled with stringent acreage reductions could well revive the grain market and save the floundering farm picture.

We realize that the petroleum industry claims that the energy expended in grain production equals or exceeds the energy obtained from distillation. This could well be true, but we believe that this source of energy using home grown grain beats the thunder out of shipping it overseas to countries that either can't or won't pay for it at the same time we are shipping billions of our bucks to Arab Sheiks and other assorted OPEC highbinders.

Chambers of Commerce, banks, savings and loans, and business people all say "trade at home" and keep the money circulating locally. We believe this to be as true for the country as the community.

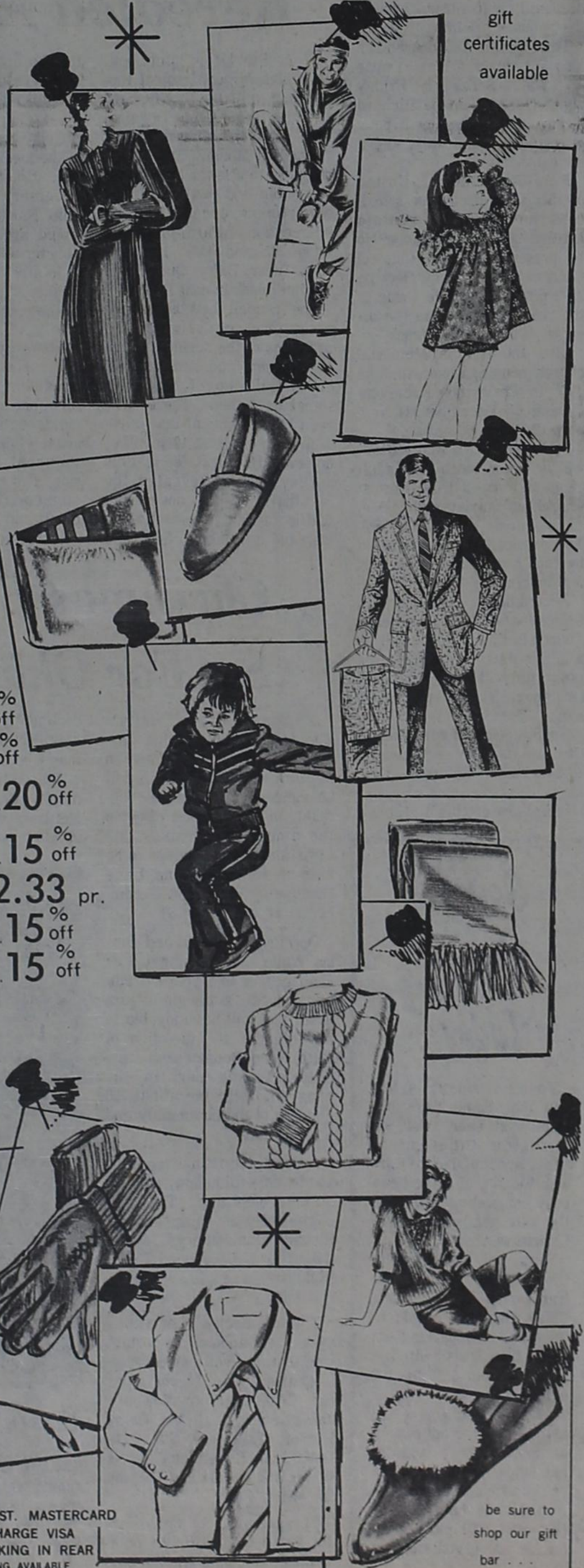

# Coach, Three Steers On Avalanche-Journal Team

Steer head football coach Bruce Dollar has received the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal's Class 2A South Plains Coach of the Year award, and three members of the 1982 Steer football squad were named to the A-J's All-South Plains team. They were Robby Armstrong, Alan Eubank, and Steve Schilling. Schilling was named as offensive guard while Armstrong and Eubank were named to the dream team's defensive unit.

In addition, Steer junior Manuel Cantu was named to the Amarillo Globe-News Panhandle Super Team as a defensive halfback. This team is composed of members from all classes of high school football teams throughout the Panhandle area, from Class 5A on down.

Dollar, in his second year as the Steers' head mentor, hasn't enjoyed a "bed of roses" career at his high school alma mater, as his first year produced a lot of thorns. With a 3-6-1 record in his debut as a head coach, along with remembrances of back-to-back 72-0 and 35-0 losses, the pain was still keen this year.

Memories of last year's record and this year's 1-4 start, caused Dollar to fall back and regroup his troops and reassess his year's game plans.

And at mid-season the Steers changed their offense from the I formation to the veer.

This must have been the answer for Dollar's junior-dominated crew as they stampeded to a turn-around, winning their last five games, all of them District 5-2A encounters, and brought home the district crown for the first time since

1969. While racking up the impressive win record, the Blue Bunch also racked up impressive stats, including an average of 323.4 yards rushing per game.

Leading the Steers' powerful ground attack, the most productive in the area, was All-South Plains guard Schilling, a 5' 11", 160-pound senior.

Armstrong, a 5'9" defensive lineman, and Eubank, 5'9" 145-pound quarterback-pass defender, were among five juniors named to the Class 2A All-South Plains team.

Lorenzo Monreal, senior from Springlake-Earth, and Lester Young, Kress senior, were the only other District 5-2A players making the team.

This cantata tells the familiar story of Christmas in word and song. It features some beautiful new arrangements of traditional Christmas music, as well as some contemporary Christmas music.

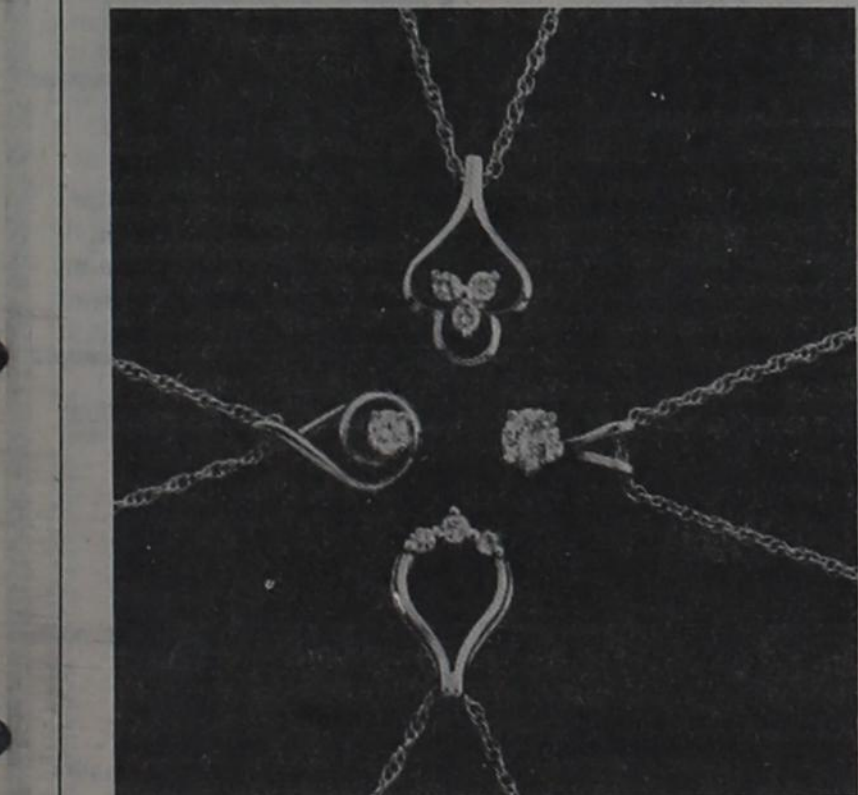

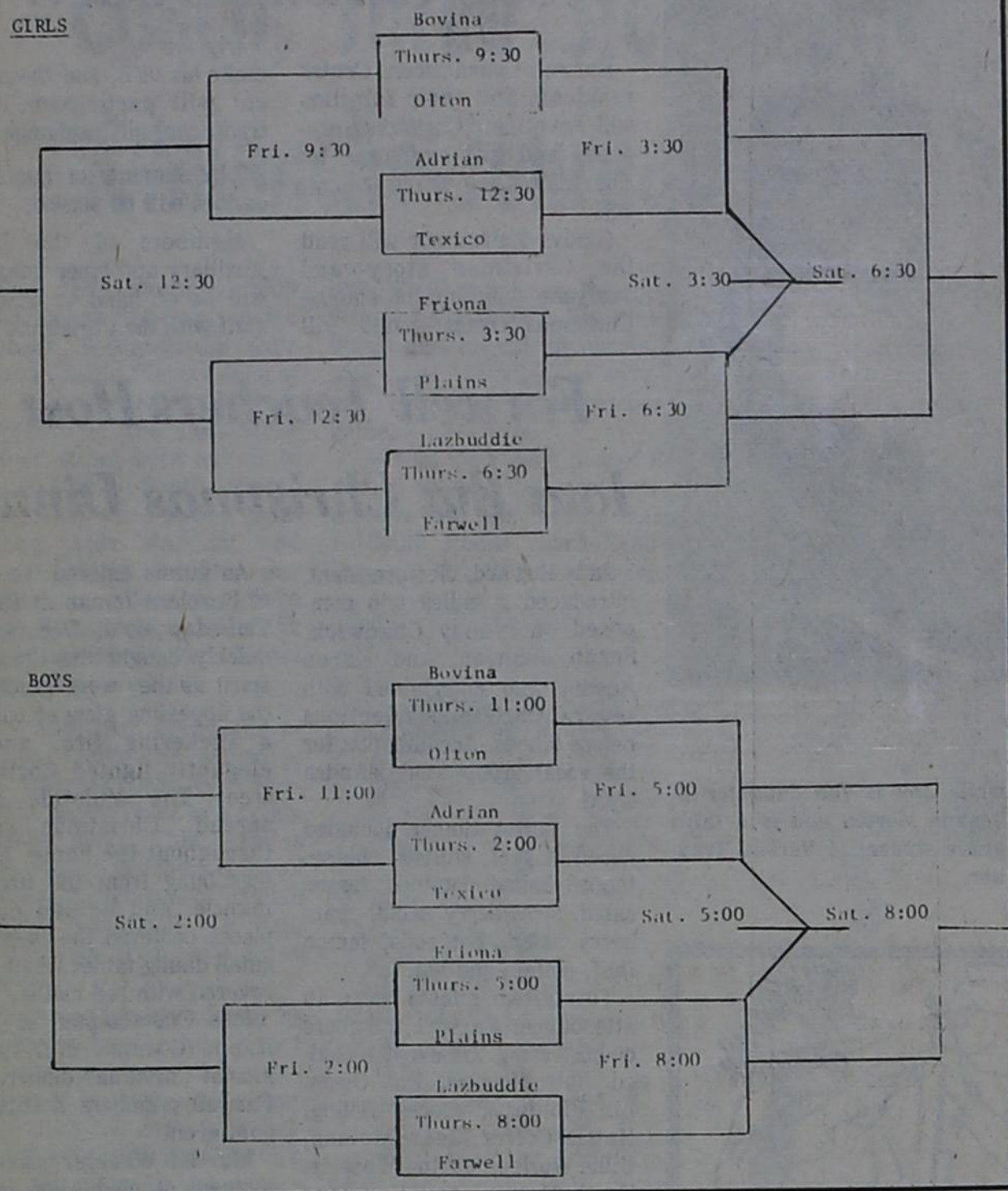

## Potato Growers To Vote On Research, Promotion Plan

Potato producers in the 48 contiguous states will vote December 13-27 in a U. S. Department of Agriculture mail referendum on whether to amend the Potato Research and Promotion Plan.

Donald Kuryloski, a marketing official with USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service, said ballots and voting instructions are being mailed to all known growers of five or more

acres of Irish potatoes. Any area grower who has not received a ballot may request one from Parmer County Extension Agent Seth Ralston.

The Potato Research and Promotion Plan, authorized by Congress in the Potato Research and Promotion Act, is financed by an assessment on potatoes handled. Producers who do not wish to contribute are reimbursed upon written

request. The proposal would authorize an increase in the maximum rate of assessment from one cent per hundredweight to one-half of one percent of the past 10-year average price received by growers, as reported by USDA. Kuryloski said the increase is intended to counteract inflation, which has curtailed program activities in recent years.

The amendment would provide for a public member on the National Potato Promotion Board, which works with USDA in administering the program. Reimbursement of referendum and administrative costs incurred by USDA would be provided. These changes are consistent with USDA's policy on research and promotion programs, Kuryloski said.

To become effective, the amendment must be approved by at least two-thirds of the voting growers, either by number or by volume of production accounted for by the producer.

### WHEN THE LORD ASKED WHY

There are two occasions when the Lord asked "Why?" which stand out from all the rest.

Once it was to God He cried it, and once to Saul of Tarsus. Once to the Holy One and once to the chief of sinners. Once He cried it from the shameful cross and once from His glory in heaven. In each case the name was repeated.

In Matthew 27:46 we find the first anguished "Why?" as He cried "My God, My God, why hast Thou forsaken Me?" The other is found in Acts 9:4, where He called from His exile in heaven: "Saul, Saul, why persecutest thou Me?"

These two questions represent the greatest riddles of history and yet, strangely, one of them is the simple solution to the other! Why did God forsake His Son? You will find the answer when you ask why mankind, represented by Saul, forsook and even persecuted God's Son. God's action, in giving up Christ to die, was the antidote to man's. Christ's death was the

remedy—the only possible remedy—for man's sin. It was because of the utter unreasonableness of man's sin that God, to save him, had to be more than reasonable.

Saul had led his nation and the world in rebellion against Christ, but this is just why, in infinite love, God chose him to become the great Apostle of Grace, telling the world that "Christ died for our sins."

Hear him tell how he had been "a blasphemer, and a persecutor, and injurious" (1 Tim. 1:13,14). Hear him say:

"Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners, of whom I am chief. Howbeit for this cause I obtained mercy, that in me first Jesus Christ might show forth all long suffering for a pattern to them which should hereafter believe on Him to life everlasting" (Verses 15,16).

Since the "chief of sinners" is now in heaven, there is hope for us all if we but trust in the Christ who died for us.

## Lady Wolverines Win Floyd Tournament

The final game for the Green and White was Saturday night when they defeated the Ft. Sumner Vixens 35-24. The Vixens played a close game the first half although they were unable to take the lead away from the Lady Wolverines. Texico held onto a close 19-14 lead at the close of the first half. The second half scenario saw Coach Roy King's team heat up and outscore the Vixens 16-10, bringing the final tally to 35-24 as the buzzer sounded.

Ruth Scott was up to her last year's form as she led the scoring effort with 18. Valda Cavallero found the basket for 8 points; while Tammy Powell, Kathy Harrison, and Helen Jo Boorman had 2 apiece; Cheryl Scott, Chary Jesko, and Dana Morris each added 1.

Valda Cavallero seemed to have a smell for the ball as she came up with 11 rebounds, assisted by Cheryl Scott, 8; Ruth Scott, 7; Karen Snodgrass, 3; Dana Morris, 2; and 1 each for Chary Jesko and Kathy Harrison.

The Lady Wolverines ripped the cords for 11 of 19 for a 57.9 percent from the free throw line, and from the floor they hit 12 of 39 for a 30.8 percent average.

Coach King said, "We have played Ft. Sumner twice, and in each game we shot around 30.0 percent. They did a good job of denying the ball inside and we weren't hitting the outside shots." He went on to say that Valda Cavallero played her second outstanding game of the tourney.

The Wolverine girls got to the tournament finals by beating Jal, 49-40, and Logan, 57-36.

In the Jal game, Texico led the first quarter, scoring 17-10, only to be overpowered in the second period by Jal's deadly shooting, closing the first half with a tie score of 22-22. The third quarter saw each team chip in 10 points, making the 4th quarter of the game the deciding factor. King's Lady Wolverines managed to pull away from Jal to post the 49-40 victory.

Cheryl Scott paced the scoring with 18, followed closely by Ruth Scott's 16. Tammy Powell popped the net with 8, and Valda Cavallero had 7.

Ruth Scott grabbed 16 rebounds and Valda Cavallero came up with 10. Cheryl Scott had 7; Tammy Powell and Kathy Harrison had 4 each. Field goal percentage was 38.2 as the Wolverines found the hoop for 21 out of 55. The charity strip shooting posted 7 of 13 for 53.9 percent.

In talking about the game, Coach King said, "I thought we played as well as we could at this early date. Jal was defending Class 2A champs and most of their team was back. Ruth Scott didn't shoot the ball but 2 times the first half, but

everyone else took up the slack." He recognized Cheryl Scott as playing an outstanding game as well as Valda Cavallero, Tammy Powell, and Kathy Harrison.

In the semifinals against Logan, the Wolverines came up with a 24-16 lead on the scoreboard at halftime, pulling further ahead the second half by a final score of 57-36. The scoring was led by Ruth Scott with 18; Tammy Powell, 15; Cheryl Scott, 14; Kathy Harrison, 4; and 2 each for Valda Cavallero, Helen Jo Boorman, and Lucia Jesko.

Cheryl Scott hung onto 13 rebounds off the boards; Ruth Scott, 7; Karen Snodgrass, 4; Tammy Powell and Dana Morris, 3; Valda Cavallero, 2; Helen Jo Boorman and Chary Jesko, 1 apiece.

Coach King felt the Lady Wolverines did not play as well as they did in the Jal game, as playing 2 games in 5 hours was hard on the girls. He said, "I don't think we were as mentally ready to play. One good thing about the game was that everyone got to play and everyone made a contribution to the victory."

In summing up the tournament, Coach King felt the girls played pretty good. "We still have to work on a few things, as our passing and ball handling has to improve before we get into district play. I

think we have about 9 players right now we can rely on. Ruth and Cheryl Scott have been playing great inside. Tammy Powell has been a tremendous asset to us with her ball handling and scoring. Kathy Harrison is getting better each game at point guard. But, probably the most pleasant surprise has been the playing of Valda Cavallero. She has done a great job of scoring and rebounding for us.

"Karen Snodgrass, Chary Jesko, Helen Jo Boorman, and Dana Morris have come off the bench and done a good job," he added.

Tournament statistics show Ruth Scott averaged 17.3 points per game with 10 rebounds per game. During the tournament she hit on 48.7 percent of her field goals and 16-20 free throws for 80 percent.

Cheryl Scott averaged 11 points per game with 9.3 rebounds. She hit on 53.6 percent from the field and 50 percent from the line.

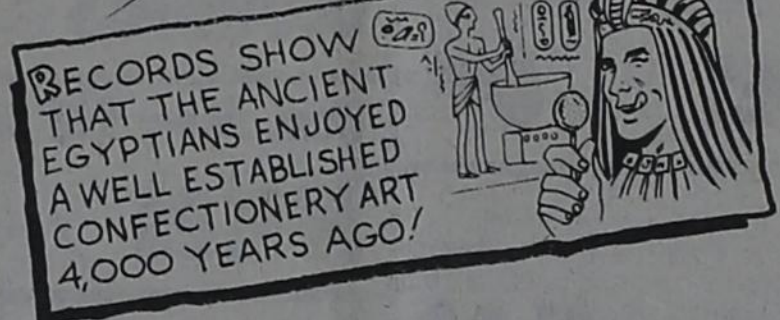
Valda Cavallero averaged 5.7 points per game and 8 rebounds. She hit on 35 percent from the field, and also averaged 4 assists per game.

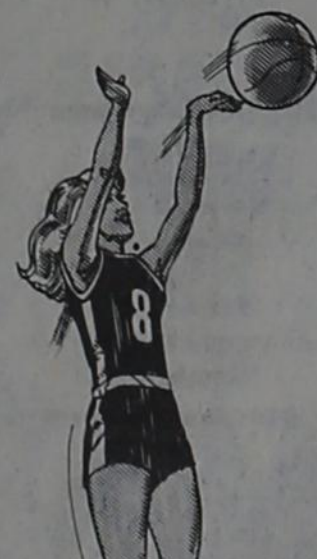
