INVESTIGATION OF THE ATHLETIC SHORTAGE

That the Littlefield school athletic fund sustains a shortage of approximately \$300 was the fact developed at the meeting of the local school board last Monday evening.

Just where all the money went the Board is unable to determine it being apparant that Athletic Director H. S. Sheppard has failed to make complete returns of all funds collected for athletic purposes during the school year of 1922 23.

According to the Secretary, the Board has been unable to secure a satisfactory statement of receipts and disbursements from Mr. Sheppard, tho he has offered to assume payment of \$49.50 of the shortage, thus leaving a balance of \$197.37 still unprovided for.






