#### ARMISTICE DAY TO BE OBSERVED HERE IN UNION SERVICE

Next Sunday, November 11th, at 11:00 o'clock, a. m., Armistice day will be observed in Littlefield with appropriate union services held at the local school house. An out-of-town ex-service man will be secured later as the speaker of the day, a choir of 150 voices is in training this week to furnish the music, and everybody is cordially invited to attend and participate in the service of the day.

There will be about 30 of the local ex service boys who will be in uniform and will march in a body to the place of service. All ex-soldiers of the Spanish-American War and also of the Civil War will be accorded seats of honor in the assembly.

We could not if we would, forget the living and the dead, who five years ago brought peace to the war-torn world. To them all nonor is due. ## THE ROMANCE OF WORDS

"BEDLAM"

"B"DLAM," the word by a hubbub, an excited crown or an uproar, has been derived not from "Babel," as might be expected, but from "Bethlehem," the name of an insane asylum in London and formerly one of the most abominable torture-houses of the British capital.

"Rethlehem" itself dates back to 1247, when S'mon Fitz Mary, a sheriff of London, founded a priory dedicated to St. Mary of Bethlehem. Everyone connected with this institution was compelled to wear a black robe, with a single star on the breast, in memory of the star which guided the Magi to the stable at Bethlehem. Some three centuries later a London tallor named Stephen Gennings offered to start a fund to purchase the House of Bethlehem and turn it into a hospital for the insone, but it was not until Henry VII made a gift of the house to the city of London

that it became an insane asylum. Owing to the fact that functics were considered at that time to he possessed by devils, Bethlehem was made a place of chains. manacles and stocks, while all manner of hideous tortures were devised to rout the evil spirits which haunted the bodies of the llving. During the Sixteenth century the place became so filthy and loathsome that no one would enter it and it fell into decay, to be renovated in 1675, when a stone image of madness, curved in the likeness of one of Cromwell's doorkeepers. was placed on the outer wall. In the literature of the day we find that the name of the asylum is shortened, first to "Bethlem." then to "Bedlem" and finally changed to "Bedlam," in which form it re-

## What's in a Name i By MILDRED MARSHALL

#### FLORENCE

FLORENCE, signifying flourishing. can scarcely be separated from its quaint diminutive riors, meaning flowers. Flora in mythological legend was the goddess of the flowers, and the festivals of Flora or Floralia were celebrated in the first burst of spring. In later times, the name of Florus was formed from that of the goddess. and is memorable as that of the procurator whose harshness drove the Jews to their last rebellion. It is believed that the feminine Flora came from this.

There is a church at Florence of Saints Flore and Lucilla, but otherwise the first instance of the name is in Roman-Gothic Spain, where the unhappy daughter of Count Julian was called by the Spanish diminutive Florinda, and thus caused the name to be so much detested that, while Spanish bullads call her La Cava the wicked, her Christian name was only bestowed on dogs. A Spanish maiden martyred by the

Moors brought Flora into better repute. It became Flore in France, where it was adopted as a romantic epithet. and from there it found its way to Scotland. In the Gnelic, it is pelled Florie, as the island heroine of the '45 wrote herself. Florentia to "go." was a natural product, and named a eminine saint martyred in Diocletian's reign in Gaul.

The prevalence of the name Florence, in England, seems to have been due to so many English girls being born in the Italian city of that name. Deeper and dearer honor has been given to it by Florence Nightingale. Many fictitional heroines have borne the name and its derivatives. Blanchefleur, meaning white flower, is one of its forms, and was bestowed on Sir Trystan's mother. Versions, particularly romantic, are found with Ariosto's two heroines, Flordespina (thorn flower) and Flordilizi (fleur de lys).

Florence or Flora, used by the Irish easantry, become Finguan or Fincen. Florrie and Flossie and perhaps even Lora, are purely American diminutives.

The carnellan is Florence's talls manie gem. Its warm, bright color is said to dispel timidity and give courage, vitality and animation. It likewise brings good luck to the bearer of the name. rank or walk in life. To begin with, always greet your friends' servants, if you have visited the house often enough to know them. A simple word of greeting is sufficient, That is, if you are a week-end guest in a house, and the maid brings a letter to your door before brenkfast, say "Good morning, Jane." And always thank them, simply, for services rendered. If you call frequently at a house, and the same servant always answers the door, remember a simple word of greeting then.

Never ask favors of your friends' servants, either when you are visiting n their homes or when you might be able to make a convenience of them at some other time.






