





### State Asks That Swift Charter Be Cancelled

AUSTIN, Jan. 11 (AP) — The state asked today that the charter of Swift and Co. be cancelled and the concern be enjoined from doing further business of any nature in Texas.

Judge J. D. Moore of 98th District Court set Feb. 7 for hearing the suit, in which the attorney general charges that Swift's permit to do business is limited to packinghouse activities and does not authorize the concern to engage in the coteensed oil mill business.

Among other things, the state claims that Swift & Co. in 1938 caused the Consumers Oil Co. to be created to acquire title to gins and oil mills at Brady, Brownwood, Coleman, Fort Worth, Houston, San Antonio, Harlingen, Waco and West.

### Vega Brothers Vie For Mex. Net Crown

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 11 (AP) — Armando Vega remains Mexico's No. 1 tennis player, according to official rankings announced last night. His brother, Rolando, moved up from fifth to second place.

Behind the Vegas, in order, are Francisco Guerrero Arcocha, Ignacio Eugenio Tapia, Daniel Hernandez, de La Borbolla, Jr., and Angel Roldan.

Among women players Aurora Legorreta remains No. 1, while Sofia Contreras moves up from fifth to second.

AUSTIN, Jan. 11 (AP) — Roy Fry of Burnet was re-elected chairman of the board of directors of lower Colorado river authority at a meeting yesterday when City Kuykendall of San Saba was elected vice-chairman and Raymond Brooks of Austin was re-elected secretary.

### Colorado Banks Reelect Heads

COLORADO CITY, Jan. 11 — Officers of the City National bank in Colorado City were unanimously re-elected at a meeting of directors here Wednesday. Charles C. Thompson was again named president, Joe H. Smoot, executive vice-president, and G. B. Slaton, vice-president. P. K. Mackey is chairman of the board of directors.

J. W. Pritchett was re-elected cashier, Charles Mooser, Gus Chesney, and H. E. Grantland, assistant cashiers. Chesney is on leave of absence while on military service.

At an earlier meeting of bank stockholders this week all directors of the institution were retained. In addition to Chairman Mackey they are G. B. Slaton, Lay Powell, W. S. Rhode, Charles C. Thompson, and Joe H. Smoot.

Reports were made at the stockholders January meet, showing the bank to be in a strong financial condition. From the 2,000 shares held by stockholders, 1927 and two thirds shares were represented.

### Short Crops Seen For Texas Penal Farm Systems

HUNTSVILLE, Jan. 11 (AP) — Agricultural activities on Texas prison farms in 1944 won't be as great as last year because the number of inmates has declined, asserts D. W. Stakes, general manager of the prison system.

In a year-end report filed with the prison board, Stakes said the total inmate population on Dec. 24 was 3,672 and of this number only approximately two-thirds can be used in agricultural work.

Stakes' report:

All prison industries are being operated. Half the state's order for 3,500,000 1944 automobile license plate tags has been filled. Only one-half as much cotton was raised in 1943 as in 1942, and of the 1943 crop, 250 bales remain to be sold.

Stock cattle are in good condition but the condition of dairy cattle is poor. The 1943 pig crop totaled 3,500 pigs from some 600 brood sows. Work stock is in good condition.

Prison packing plant sales increased by \$57,000 over 1942, and canning plant sales increased \$10,000. License tag plant sales declined \$100,000 because of the manufacture of small tabs rather than the standard-size plates.

A \$20,000 decline in sales of prison-made goods was noted the last two months of the year but for the entire year, sales, exclusive of cotton, were \$200,000

## War Board News

### Dairy Production Records Important

Production records are more important to dairymen than to most farming enterprises in the opinion of O. W. Thompson, dairy husbandman for the A. and M. College extension service. He urges farmers who do not keep records to begin that practice with the new year as a means of doing a better job of feeding, culling and breeding and, perhaps, finding and stopping the leaks which may be taking the profits from their operations.

The simplest way for the average dairyman to obtain accurate knowledge of the production and cost of operating his herd is to become a member of a dairy herd improvement association. Thompson explains that the association's field man, or cow tester, does the work of recording monthly the milk and butterfat production, and feed cost and consump-

tion for each cow in his herd. From these permanent records the dairyman readily can calculate his net revenue. The records have the further value of guiding the dairyman to intelligent culling of his herd and in carrying out a constructive breeding program.

In the event it is not possible for him to have membership in a herd improvement association, a farmer may set up a useful record system of his own, Thompson says. This may be done by weighing the milk produced and feed consumed at least once a month by each cow in the herd. From this basis he can calculate production and overhead, and feed accordingly. This home record also is a good guide in weeding out unprofitable cows.

With an increasing number of farmers being required to make federal income tax returns, records are invaluable in keeping an accurate check on deductible expenses as well as income.

Without a complete and systematic record, Thompson points out, a dairyman probably shows all income items in his tax return because they come at regular intervals. On the other hand, many deductible items of expense, which come oftener and are more irregular, are forgotten unless listed promptly.

### Advice Given On Meat Preparation

1. Learn the right way to cook each kind and cut of meat:

(a) Dry heat methods, as roasting, broiling and pan-broiling, are usually best for tender cuts.

(b) Moist heat methods, as braising and cooking in water, are needed to make less-tender cuts tender.

(c) Exceptions to these rules are:

### Jellied Chili Sauce Molds



To MAKE your next meat dinner a really gala occasion, serve individual Jellied Chili Sauce molds. They're equally good with steak (when you have it), pork chops, hamburgers, fish or with cold cuts, as shown above. A cup and a half of bottled chili sauce is the basis of this simple-to-make garnish. To make 8 small molds:

1 1/2 cups bottled chili sauce      2 tablespoons cold water  
1 1/4 tablespoons gelatin

Soften gelatin in cold water. Heat chili sauce to boiling point. Add softened gelatin and stir until dissolved. Cool and then pour into tiny fluted paper cups or individual molds. Or use a small pan from which the jellied chili sauce may be sliced or cut in attractive shapes when firm. Chill thoroughly.

Pork chops, pork liver and veal cooking all meats, regardless of the method. This is important in rather than broiled or pan-broiled, conserving meat, since there is less shrinkage and more meat to

serve when it is cooked slowly. The meat is also more uniformly cooked, more tender and juicier, and it takes less fuel to cook it.

3. Before cooking T-bone or porterhouse steaks, the "tail" parts may be cut off to be ground for meat balls or to go into a meat sauce for another meal. If there is any extra fat, it too may be cut off and saved for rendering.

4. Save and use every bit of meat. Bones, trimmings, drippings, and even very small amounts of left-over meat or gravy should be treasured for the added flavor and food value they extend to other foods.

### AAA Programs For 1944 Are Outlined

There will be AAA payments in 1944 to enable farmers to maintain and conserve the soil and to improve their pastures. There will not be any crop control or payments for limiting the acreage to certain crops as heretofore except in the case of tobacco.

The following is a brief outline of practices for which payments will be made. They will be explained in detail at community meetings soon.

There is set up for each farm an allowance of 75 cents per acre for all cropland and six cents per acre for pasture. This applies alike to both farms and ranches. However, there are certain practices that will be paid for in full in addition to this farm or ranch allowance. The practices for which there is payment in full, limited only by the needs of the farm or ranch include—building terraces, one farm pond for stock water and the elimination of undesirable brush and weeds from pastures.

The following practices are included in the farm allowance and a total payment for them cannot exceed the farm allowance of 75 cents per acre of pasture.

Contour listing and contour farming cropland;  
Planting small grain on the contour;  
Strip cropping;  
Growing peas and other legumes for soil improvement;  
Drilling wells for stock water;  
Killing out prairie dogs;  
Seeding permanent pasture grasses;  
Contour furrows on pasture land.

There are others but these are the practices that are usually carried out in Howard county.

CAUTION: Do not begin any terracing, or work on earthen tanks or the elimination of brush or undesirable plants from pasture

### Martin-Howard Soil Conservation District News

Shroyer Bros. are trying to buy some pasture grass seed to reseed some of their pasture. They are also constructing contour furrows where the brush is not too thick. Reese Adams, who farms near Ackery, is about to finish his terracing program. In the three years

that he has been working on it he has terraced 2135 acres in Howard county and 487 acres in Dawson county. Mr. Adams is convinced his conservation program has increased his production of both feed and cotton.

A flood of applications for district assistance in planning a conservation program is being received, according to Dudley Mann. The supervisors of the district approved 12 completed farm and ranch plans at their last regular meeting. "Assistance in planning," said Mann, "includes laying out plans for management of crop residue to increase moisture absorption and reduce wind and water erosion. Range plans include vegetative surveys and condition class maps to determine the most profitable use of the range and still conserve soil and moisture. These plans are all based on the soil and the measures required to maintain the soil."

### Stories Of Heroism Are Told About Texans At The Salerno Invasion

WASHINGTON, Jan. 13 (AP)—Soldiers of the Fifth army displayed daring, courage and initiative in the Salerno landing, Colonel William R. Blakely of Laurens, S. C., reported to the war department upon his return after spending six months as a front line observer for ground forces in the Mediterranean theater.

Landing on Salerno beach with the 36th division on the first day of the invasion, Col. Blakely remained ten days with the assault troops.

The evening before the landing, the infantry officer related the ship's radio carried the news the Italians had surrendered. Many soldiers were from Texas and the men jokingly remarked that the Italians heard the Texans were coming and "folded up." But the officers warned the report was false and a bitter fight could be expected.

Col. Blakely told stories of individual heroism.

A German 88 in the sand dunes was keeping up a stream of fire on assault boats as they landed. Sergeant Manuel Gonzales of Fort Davis, Tex., crawled around the position under machine gun fire so close to the ground it set fire to the pack on his back. Hand grenades were thrown at him, but he reached a favorable position without harm and threw several hand grenades into the emplacement, killing the crew and blowing up the ammunition.

Fifty men from various companies which had become disorganized, had no leader. Private J. C. Jones of Sanger, Tex., took charge and advanced under heavy fire, putting several enemy gun positions out of action. They reached their objective.

Private Burrell B. Roitch of Coppas Cove, Tex., a kitchen crew member, was assigned to assist in carrying ammunition. He and five comrades were cut off from their company by counter-attacking Germans. Roitch organized the five into a defensive unit on a small knoll and repulsed three rushes by the Germans who sought to take the knoll for a machine gun position.

A squad of U. S. soldiers commanded by Sergeant Galtier W. Vaughan of Coleman, Tex., was attempting to cross a canal when they were fired upon from a group of buildings. Directing his men to fire on the buildings, Vaughan advanced alone. He surprised three Germans, capturing them and their motorcycles. Then, using hand grenades, Vaughan knocked out a machine gun and killed the crew.

### Sub-Standard Milk Denounced

AUSTIN, Jan. 13 (AP)—Production and sale of a sub-standard milk classified as army type III was frowned on today by the state department of health, which notified local health officers that responsibility for permitting its sale without notice of its sanitary quality was strictly upon them.

Dr. George W. Cox, state health officer, said the department was withdrawing its previously announced recommendation to local health officers that they recognize this type of milk for pasteurization because "this program has been stretched, abused, and has gotten out of hand."

The milk was described as being below grade A quality in bacterial count and also as to sanitary standards in production. Dr. Cox explained that it was supposed to be fit to drink, but that conditions had arisen which made it necessary for him to withdraw his approval.

In 1942, the department of health recommend to local authorities that they sanction use of

the milk in an effort to relieve shortages brought on by war conditions.

His letter to local officers said in part:

"In the interest of public health, I am now compelled to withdraw my recommendations for the sale of such milk as army type III milk. This action is necessary because of the varied and conflicting interpretations, of army type III specifications.

"As a result of these conflicting interpretations, large amounts of milk being shipped into the state in army type III specifications, which I cannot approve as meeting the requirements of the future to give approval to any source of milk as meeting the above-mentioned specifications. The responsibility and consequences for permitting the sale of such milk to civilians in Texas without notice of its sanitary quality by requiring it to be labeled ungraded as provided for in the Texas milk law and the U. S. public health service milk code will be the sole responsibility of local health authorities.
