More Balance Needed On West Texas Farms

Howard county agriculture has come far in the last 10 years. Production figures have been stepped up in the face of an adverse weather cycle, trench silos have been added, scores and scores of surface tanks have been built, livestock feeding has been improved, homes and water supplies have been improved, and equipment, particularly tractors has increased in quality and number.

Right now is a good time to start building up on those points in order to maintain a more balanced system, which means a surer income. The chicken season is just getting underway, and no phase of farming requires such little capital for such potential returns as baby chicks.

The hog market has been erratic one in recent years, but there is this much about raising pigs on the place: Any farmer can lay by a good meat supply to last him nearly all year. He won't have to be buying bacon, ham, jowls and salt pork until late summer.

British Take Biggest Gamble In Sending Troops To Greece

By ALSOP AND KINTNER

WASHINGTON, April 2.—It can now be stated, on high authority, that one of the important reasons for the British military investment in Greece was a confident prediction of Yugoslav resistance to Germany, given by Colonel William J. Donovan to the British commander in the Mediterranean, General Sir Archibald Wavell.

Donovan bet his reputation as an observer on the Yugoslavs' courage in a long talk with Wavell in Egypt immediately following his tour of the Balkans. And independent sources here believe Donovan's report was a big factor in the ultimate decision on Balkan policy made by Wavell, British Foreign Minister Anthony Eden, and General Sir John Dill.

HOLLYWOOD—Now that Nancy Kelly and Edmond O'Brien are cast together in "Parachute Battalion," the spirit of romantic inquiry prompts an investigation of the circumstances that cast them together in life.

It all began, as they say in the forewords, one day in New York when Ed was in his agent's office and Nancy happened to telephone her agent, the same guy.

Of the picture which remain to be drawn in, however. The first of these is the fact that besides using the Balkans as their breadbasket, the Germans are also heavily dependent on Yugoslavia for three vital war materials—copper, lead and bauxite. The large copper mines at Bor, in western Serbia, were seized by the Germans from their French owners after the French collapse, and paid for, incidentally, in the worthless paper printed by the Vichy government to meet the costs of the German occupation.

Copper, the essential metal in shell manufacture, was the one heavy war material of which the Germans were short when the war started, and besides the mines at Bor their only other source of copper is believed to be in Spain. Like the lead mines at Trepcas, the Bor copper deposits are in the easily defended part of Yugoslavia.

Although the Germans will hardly let fascism collapse for good in Italy, they are likely to have to strain themselves seriously by sending large additional forces into the Italian peninsula. Furthermore, they will no longer be able to depend on the Italians even for the feeble sort of war effort they have made to date.

Nicolett, defeating Graham P. Stewart. E. R. Marchman was elected a new member of the city commission. Mineral Wells returned Mayor John C. Miller without opposition. Mayor A. C. McCaughan's administration returned to office at Corpus Christi and Vio E. Stampfil, J. W. Fitzpatrick and J. M. Williams were re-elected aldermen at Wichita Falls without opposition. Grady Yates and Hubert T. Johnson were elected city commissioners at Waco without opposition, succeeding Mayor T. L. Murray and Dr. S. A. Braly, who are retiring from office. The voters rejected a 25-year franchise for the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, which included a two per cent gross receipts tax. Only 87 votes were cast at Sweetwater in re-electing three commissioners.

SAN ANTONIO, April 2 (AP)—Kelly Field officials began an investigation today of plane crashes that cost the lives of three fliers. Captain David N. Crickette of Byron, Ill., and Technical Sergeant Beril L.
