Members of the Board of Trustees of the Muleshoe Independent School District will meet in regular session at 7 p.m. in the school business office on West Avenue G.

After the meeting opens, board members will hear informational reports on enrollment and attendance report; review plans for expanding administration building and presentation of materials to Muleshoe ISD from the American Heart Association.

Financial reports will be given on the annual audit; presentation of report by Sudduth & Field and approval of 1985-86 audit; bank balances; fund balances and consider approval of payment of current bills.

Under business items are consider accepting the bid proposals for a roof at Dillman and a new all-weather track facility; consider a resolution to appoint new member to Bailey County Appraisal District; consider appointing Textbook Committee for 1986-87 school year; consider appointing Career Ladder Selection Committee for 1986-87 school year; and a tax collection report.

Infantryman Still Working At Age 91

So you think you have aches and pains, and can barely drag out of bed in the morning to go to work! And, all that at or around your mid-40's. Consider this -- Muleshoe's oldest military veteran still gets up every morning and goes to work -- and he's twice that age.

Joe Weaks is 91 years of age, although his action, looks and alert mind deny that the calendar has rolled around that many years.

When he was called late Thursday afternoon for an interview he said, "You better do it tonight, because I have to go to work in the morning. I'm still making my living -- and that he is."

Weaks is selling sweet potatoes, peanuts, peanut butter and pecans from the back of his pickup, and expects to add apples to his line. He said he is presently setting up at Sudan each day and last month, had his produce pickup set up at Clay's Corner.

The veteran of World War I said he is still making his own living, after having farmed and ranched for many years, with many of those years being in Bailey County in the west and southwestern areas of the county.

After living in Bailey County for 31 years, he is still enthusiastic about this part of the country, and the future of this county.

Joe Weaks said he was born near Granbury in the Fort Worth area, but traveled by covered wagon with his family in 1897. At the time, the family consisted of his father and mother, and three boys. On the trip by covered wagon from Granbury to Childress, where he was raised, the family slept at night in the covered wagon, and considered it to be quite an interesting trip.

Later, four more sons were born to the family, as well as two daughters, bringing the number of children to nine. After moving to Childress, Weaks said his father later filed on land north of Childress in Oklahoma.

MEASURING SERVICE

Noble said, "We hope that we have completed all measurement services. If, for some reason, you signed up for this service and have not received your notice, please contact this office."

COMMUNITY COMMITTEE ELECTION

Ballots will be mailed to eligible voters on November 21, 1986. The last day to return ballots is December 1, 1986. Please vote for the farmer of your choice and return it to the ASC office.

WOOL AND MOHAIR

January 31, 1987 is the final date for filing your 1986 wool application for the wool incentive program.

DISASTER PROGRAM

When anything is learned about this program that would be to your benefit, Noble said you will be immediately notified.

LOAN DEFICIENCY PAYMENT

Cotton Loan deficiency payments are available for those interested in not placing their cotton in the loan. Those interested in receiving a deficiency payment (20% of the value of the bale in the loan) must make application for this payment prior to the title of cotton transferring. The ASC office will need your class cards and warehouse receipts. You must make a choice between applying for the loan deficiency payment or the regular loan as you can not do both on the same farm.

1987 FARM PROGRAMS

1. The signup period for wheat began October 1, 1986 and feed grains and cotton will begin November 17, 1986. The signup will end March 30, 1987.

2. Advance payments are authorized for deficiency and diversion. The advance payment shall be 50 percent cash and 50 percent CCC-6.

3. Maximum limitation is \$50,000 per entity.

4. Liquidated damages will apply for noncompliance with program revisions.

They pulled it off! Friday night, the Muleshoe Mules ended up their football season, winding up with a 5-5 season record. With the Dimmitt Bobcats on the field, the Mules fended off a last ditch effort that ended on the one yard line and held the Bobcats out of the end Zone, defeating them by a score of 14-9.

Despite two lost fumbles, and three interceptions, the Mules managed to ward off the Bobcats, who were also waging a desperation attempt to end the season on a positive note.

In the first quarter, the Bobcats intercepted the Mules' quarterback's first pass of the game, but with 5:18 left on the clock in the first, Johnny Garcia connected with Jerry Mendoza on a 22 yard pass to the end zone, putting the Mules ahead by 6-0. This was followed by a PAT attempt by Greg Young, which was good.

After the Bobcats went on a three play and punt series, the first quarter ended 7-0 for the Mules.

In the first play of the second quarter, Lance King intercepted a Bobcat pass and returned it 25 yards for a touchdown. However, the touchdown was called back on a clipping penalty against the Mules.

With 3:20 left in the second, Todd Durham booted a 38 yard field goal, and at halftime, the score had narrowed to 7-3.

With mistakes on both sides, it was a back and forth effort in the third quarter, which ended at the same 7-3 score.

Coming back in the fourth, the Mules widened out the score on a six yard TD pass from Garcia to Shawn Bussey, at 10:24 of the fourth, four plays into the quarter. Greg Young again booted the extra point,

widening the score (temporarily) to 14-3.

Not to be outdone, Ruben Martinez, a Dimmitt Bobcat, outraced Mule defenders with 3:11 left in the game after a razzle-dazzle pass-run play to boost the Bobcat's score. However, an attempt at two points failed when Jerry Mendoza intercepted a pass in the end Zone, ending a two point try.

Following the TD, the Bobcats tried an on-side kick that sent the ball to the Mules, who promptly fumbled it away on their own four yard line.

But, they really showed their mettle, when in a goal line stance, they held the Bobcats at bay for four downs, keeping them out of the end Zone with 1:14 left in the game.

When the final buzzer sounded, the score was Muleshoe 14 and Dimmitt 9 to end the game, and end the football season for both teams.

During the game, the Mules held the Bobcats to 49 yards rushing and 42 yards passing, while accumulating 152 yards on the ground and 97 through the

End In Sentences,

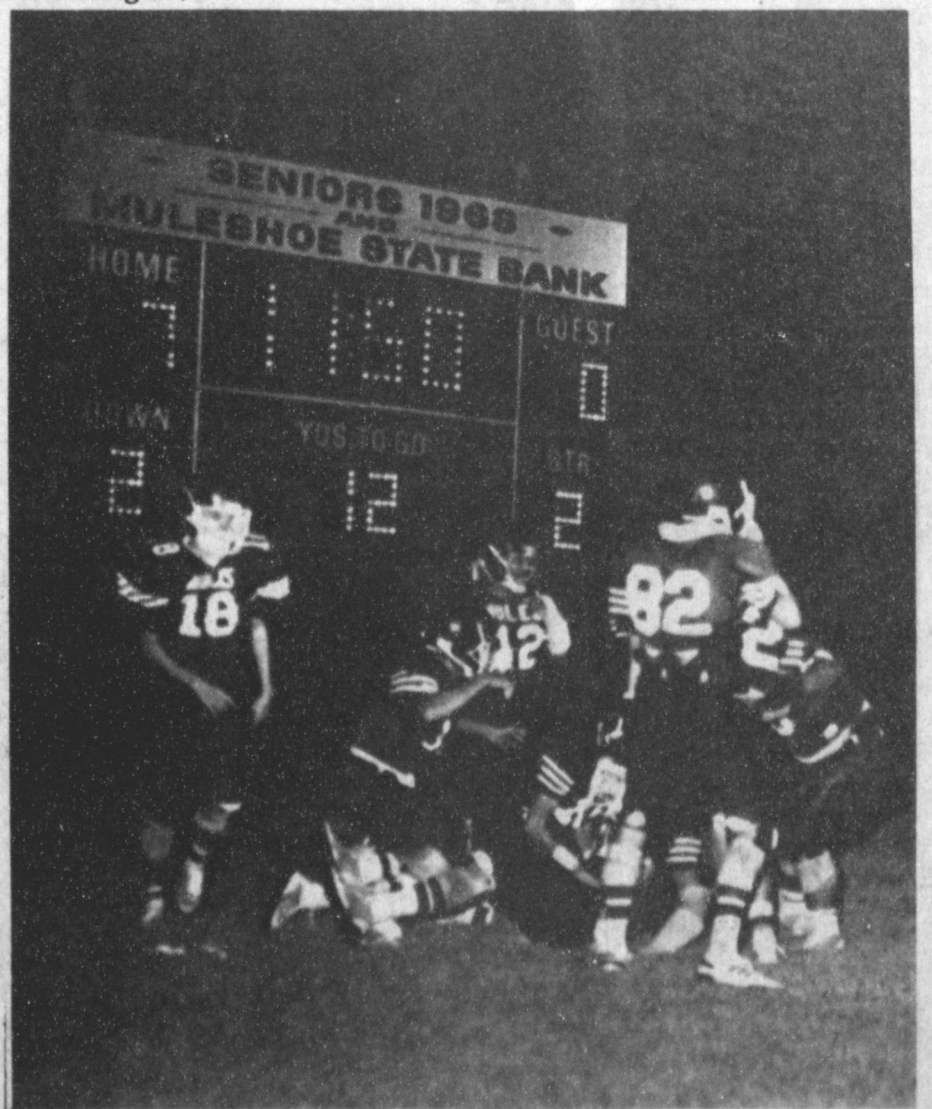
Fines, Probation

Texas Oil Production Down In '86

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday said that Texas oil wells have produced 51.1 million barrels less this past year than the year before.

This shows the low prices of oil isn't the only culprit working against the Texas economy and the Texas oil industry, he said.

"The drop in production was worth \$772.1 million at current market prices," Bullock said. So much attention on declining oil prices may have masked the fact that production in Texas has slipped by more than 140,000 barrels a day."

He said tax records show that Texas wells were producing about 2.3 million taxable barrels of oil a day in mid-1985.

Production had dropped to slightly more than 2 million taxable barrels a day by August of this year.

Bullock said the downturn in production alone cost the state about \$35.5 million in severance taxes during the one-year period based on the Comptroller's estimated average oil price per barrel.

Further, Bullock said, active rotary rigs operating in Texas fell by about 60 percent and drilling permits were down by more than 50 percent, he said.

Weeks was raised as a farmer, but when World War I erupted he joined the Army. He said he was given a rifle, a bayonet and three bandoliers of ammunition. He said he did not remember how many rounds of ammunition were in each bandolier but, "It sure was heavy." He was given basic training near Fort Worth, and in June, 1917, was shipped to France.

"In the infantry," Weeks commented, "We walked across France, including the Argonne Forest where we had to straighten out a horseshoe bend that was giving the soldiers a lot of trouble." He said they slept in rain, mud and snow. And, when it snowed, he said he had an overcoat that would freeze and stand alone.

He also remembered taking a hillside at Chateau Thierry, France, and said he was in Metz, France when the announcement came that the war was over. Following that, he was with the occupational forces in Germany for awhile returning to the United States as a sergeant.

Although he gets around quite well, he recently had to quit driving for awhile, but he assured that as soon as he undergoes eye surgery in the near future, he will be driving again.

Weeks says he misses his wife, Ila, who "has been a very good woman. She broke her hip about a month ago, and is now in the nursing home at Farwell. She will be 86 in the near future."

He also said his wife of nearly 70 years had outlived all the rest of her family.

An accident in the White Sands area of New Mexico killed one brother, who was a 27 year military man when he was killed. Weeks also has a sister, the baby sister, who lives in Lubbock, and visits periodically; and two brothers, one at Slaton, and another who has a "small ranch" in four county corners, including Crosby, Dickens, Garza and King.

He has one child, a daughter, Mrs Darrell (Billie) Mason, who lives west of Clay's Corner, and is justifiably proud of three grandsons, Shane, Shawn and Sheldon Mason, who are very active in the Lazzbuddie School.

Joe Meaks believes that he will be able to continue to make his own living until he is at least 100 years old, another nine years from now.

**De-Regulation Asked
By AT&T For Texas**

AT&T Thursday called the proposed staff rules of the Public Utility Commission(PUC) a dangerous deception that could ultimately cost Texas its place in the information age.

Pres Sheppard, AT&T Communications vice president for external affairs in Texas, said, "the PUC's new rules represent the same old regulatory double talk that for the past three years has penalized the citizens of this state."

Sheppard was referring to the numerous prolonged regulatory hearings before the state PUC which have discouraged the introduction of new services and delayed lower telecommunication prices.

"The PUC has before it an opportunity to enhance the economic growth of this state, while ensuring to everyone the benefits of a truly competitive telecommunications market place," Sheppard said.

"The Commission's proposal claims to foster deregulation of AT&T," Sheppard said, "when in fact the proposed new rules are so complex they could achieve the exact opposite."

Sheppard said the PUC's proposed rules are overly bureaucratic, costly and time consuming. They restrict the introduction of new telecommunications services and do not flow the benefits of competition to all consumers.

The PUC rules fail to achieve three very important goals that AT&T feels are essential for the continued growth of the telecommunications industry in Texas.

- Those AT&T goals are:
1. The ability to introduce new products and services without participating in formal regulatory hearings which in the past have taken from six months to a year.
 2. The establishment of a reasonable range of prices for AT&T long distance service that would allow the company to quickly adjust its prices in response to the competitive marketplace.
 3. To allow the forces of a competitive marketplace to drive down costs and increase telecommunications options for Texas consumers.

Sheppard added that contrary to the commission's proposal AT&T's prices could remain the same in rural areas as in major metropolitan cities, and that AT&T would continue to provide long distance service to all areas it operates in today.

"This would ensure everyone quality service at reasonable prices," Sheppard said, "and at the same time encourage the statewide introduction of new products and services so that no one gets left off the technological bandwagon."

Sheppard said that if AT&T's proposals were adopted, consumers and the state would gain the benefits of a vibrant telecommunications industry.

"Our proposed rules would enhance the Texas information infrastructure, stimulate economic development, encourage new technology and most importantly, meet the ever chan-

Sheppard said the issue confronting the PUC is not one of deregulation of AT&T, but rather how to best utilize our state's business resources to help diversify the Texas economy while fostering the growth of both competition and technology.

"The most rapidly growing segment of the nation's economy is the movement and management of information. Its development is critical to the growth of Texas," he said.

"How can Texas improve its economic position in this important sector when the state's leading telecommunications company, and the only one that reaches every city and town in the state, continues to be held captive by restrictive regulatory policies," Sheppard said.

"This is in sharp contrast to the greater regulatory flexibility granted AT&T in more than half the other states during the last two years," Sheppard added.

Sheppard said AT&T will submit its formal comments on the proposed rules within the next few weeks and will continue to work PUC officials to develop rules which meet the intent of the Texas Legislature.

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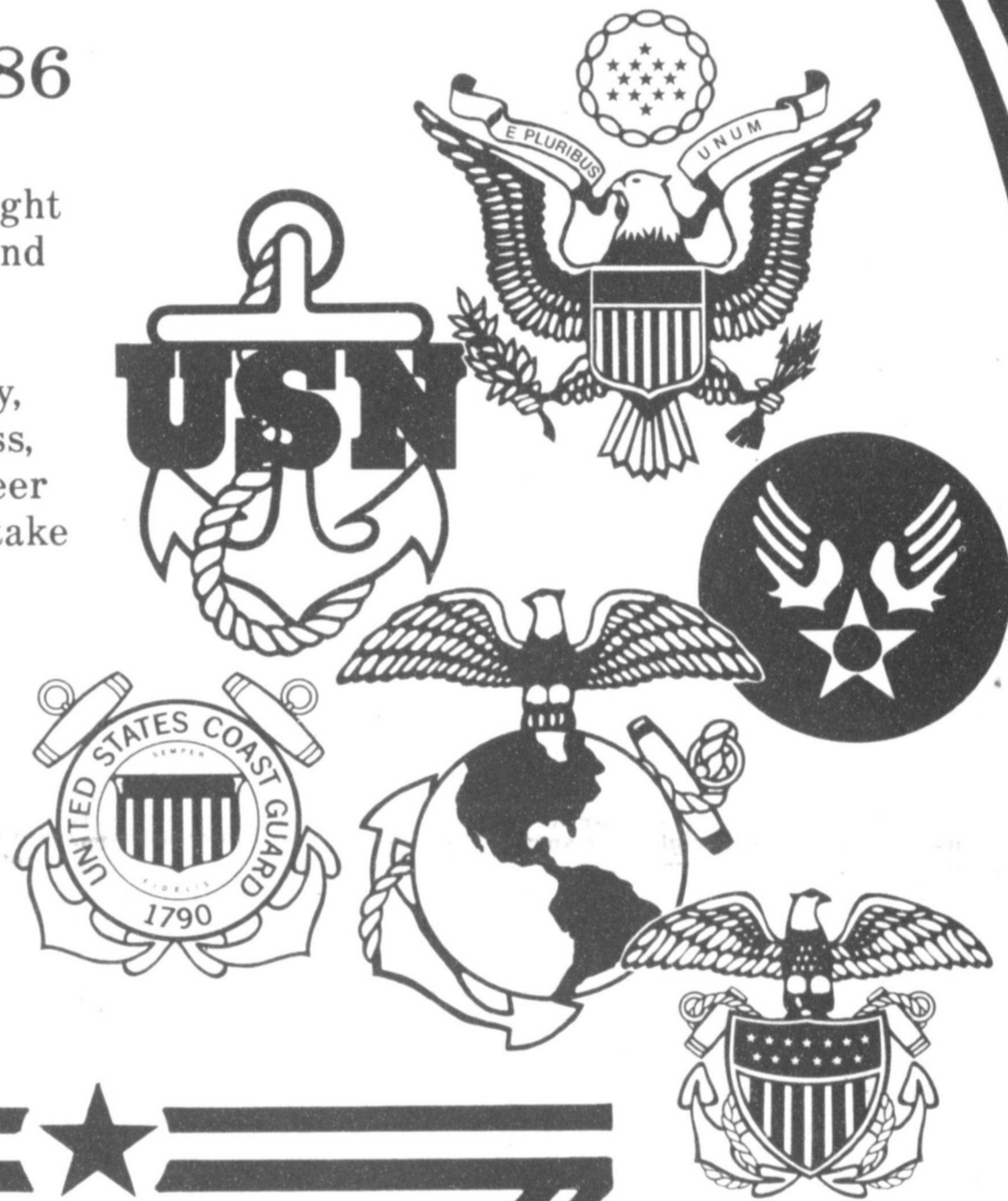
