



# **Baseball Goes Modern**

In the summer of 1839, Abner Doubleday, an instructor at a military preparatory school in Cooperstown. New York, was alleged to have laid out the first baseball field and conducted the first game of baseball ever played.

On June 12, 1939, the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum was dedicated near Doubleday Field inCooperstown,

Later research proved the Great American Pastime, in a form we'd scarecely recognize was played at Valley Forge back in-1778! In 1781, the faculty of Princeton College forbate the students to play with balls and sticks in the back common of the college." Oliver Wendell Holmes told an interviewer that he'd played baseball while at Harvard

Today, it's believed that the game was derived from the English "rounders" or "feeler", as it was called around London.

-In the early days, baseball was played on the community "common", a tract of land open to the public. While women hung their wash, lovers pienicked and older folks sat sunning themselves. the young men ran the bases, obstructed here by a hedge and there by a clump of trees.


