Bean Pickers leeded 300 Acre Crop **Maturing** Now

Over 200 bean pickers are needed immediately to begin harvesting a bumper 300-acre green bean crop in the Littlefield area which began maturing this week.

The produce is being shipped to the Whitson Canning Company in Hugo, Oklahoma, for canning. The season is expected to last about three weeks.

According to Whitson, president of the canning firm that con-tracted for the beans earlier this

year, the yield will hit as high as 600 pounds in some fields with the overall average between 3500 and 4000 pounds.

W. P. Whitson was in Littlefield Wednesday inspecting the bean crop and assisting the growers in obtaining pickers. Company trucks are leaving daily, moving the produce to Hugo where it will be canned under the Camp-fire label.

Nates Schulman, who, since 1943, has been giving away free meals at his restaurant in Chicago if people were humary and had no money, has thrown in the towel, Recently he took down the sign which had offored the free meals.

The sign, which had been in place since 1943, read; "If you are hungry and have no money, come in and we will feed you - free.

In recent times, some young West Side Chicago toughs have been giving Schulman a hard time. They would come in in groups and demand that they be fed according to the sign. Schulman would tell them that they were minors and would have to bring along their folks, but that didn't embarrass them or turn them away.

Schulman said they caused a lot of noise and embarresiment and that, therefore, he had to take down the sign

In a way, it is remarkable that the policy has stood the test for fourteen years. Schulman estimates he has givon away 14,000 mouls since then to people unable to pay or who channed as much, at least. It is something of a minor accial tracedy that a citizen's generosity and humanitarian policy is brought to a end by the unruly behavior of chilstren who have not had proper parental training and super-Minkeds.

The theory that hig business is destroying small business just lan't borne out by the facts.

The number of small businessfirms (those with less than 100 employees) has reacted a record high in this country. A tabulation based on the latest available figures shows that there are 4.209, 000 of these firms - an increase of 7.0.000 in the past 10 years. If the trend coefficies, as is expected, the number will swell to 5,760,000 by 1976.
