

Spaniards May Arm Against An Attack, UN Probers Learn

NEW YORK, May 23 (AP)—Jose Giral, premier of the exiled Spanish republican government, told a United Nations sub-committee investigating Franco Spain today that the Franco regime has told every Spaniard he could arm himself to defend Spain "against an attack by Russia."

Giral, appearing before the United Nations Security Council sub-committee in its first public hearing in the month-long inquiry, said that: "Two months ago the Franco regime decreed that every citizen could arm himself to defend the fatherland against an attack by Russia." He did not explain his reference to "an attack by Russia."

New Auto Price Raise Granted; Fourth Hinted

Chance For Cut During Full Production Slim

WASHINGTON, May 23 (AP)—OPA, slapping four to eight per cent price hikes on top of previous increases for new automobiles, kept the door open today for a possible further boost.

A high OPA official who asked to remain anonymous said the agency "does not plan to try to reduce prices after cars begin to roll from assembly lines at the pre-war rate. Manufacturing costs usually decline as production goes up."

The increases announced yesterday range from \$33 to \$167, averaging about \$75 for 16 makes of cars built by Chrysler, Ford, General Motors, Hudson, Nash, Packard and Studebaker.

Illness Fatal To John Watkins, T And P Employee

John P. Watkins, 63, general chairman of the Brotherhoods of Railway Conductors for the Texas & Pacific system, died in a hospital at Fort Worth today of cerebral hemorrhage. Mr. Watkins, a veteran T&P employe and for 31 years a resident of Big Spring, suffered a stroke two years ago and had been showing improvement until he died suddenly early this morning.

Saturday Scheduled As VFW Poppy Day

Saturday will be observed as "Poppy Day" by the Veterans of Foreign Wars, officials of the Christian-Tucker post have announced. Each year on the Saturday preceding Memorial Day, VFW posts throughout the country offer poppies for sale as a means of financing the charity fund for disabled veterans, are purchased by the individual posts, who, in turn offer them for sale to the general public.

WASHINGTON, May 23 (AP)—The White House announced at 2 p. m., just two hours before a strike deadline, "every effort is being made to settle the rail labor dispute."

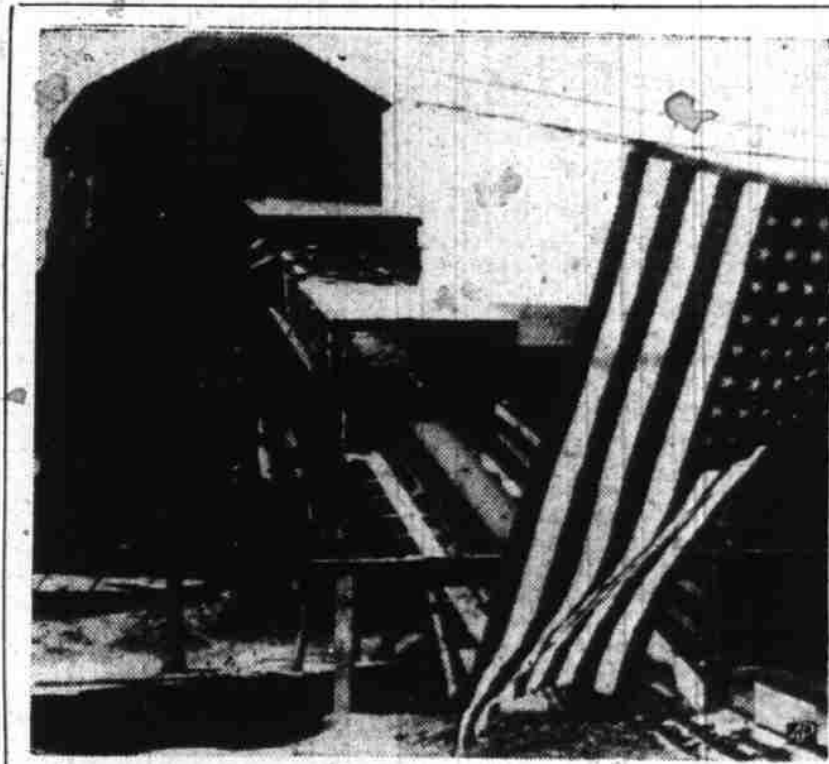

Many Coal Men Refuse To Work For Government

WASHINGTON, May 23 (AP) — With more than a third of the soft coal miners idle despite government seizure of the mines, a White House conference sought today to work out a wage contract acceptable to both John L. Lewis and coal operators. Among the conferees at the early morning meeting were Secretary of Interior Krug, federal mine boss; Secretary of Labor Schwellenbach; Dr. John R. Steelman, President Truman's labor adviser; and Reconversion Director John W. Snyder.

The picture was not rosy. The best that Secretary of Interior Krug could offer as government mine boss was a guarded "hope" that the end of the current two-week truce Saturday would not plunge all the pits back into idleness.

The first 24 hours of government seizure produced discouraging results from the administration point of view. Thousands of miners, who had gone back to work under the truce, quit their pits.

This return to idleness closed down an additional 243 mines, increasing the number immobilized by the bituminous dispute to more than 2,100 out of 4,500, total. The latest federal estimates are that more than a third of the 400,000 soft coal miners are now staying away from work.

LOS ANGELES, May 23. (AP)—A 21-year-old man who described himself as a former Army Air Forces gunner, was booked in central jail on suspicion of murdering today after Detective Sergeant F. A. Fahrman and T. L. Kelly had questioned him in connection with the slayings of five persons recently in the Texarkana, Texas, area.

AAF To Begin Reserve Training

WASHINGTON, May 23 (AP)—Wartime airmen from the University of Texas were told yesterday that the army air forces would start training reserve pilots and ground crews in July at 40 bases.

The officers said he would be held for further investigation by Texarkana officials. Kelly said the man, who was arrested at a downtown shooting gallery early today, told them he had hitchhiked here from Texarkana and had only been in town a few hours. He told the officers, they reported, that he had been in a coma from March 23 to May 3 and could not remember much of that period.

WASHINGTON, May 23 (AP)—The Pearl Harbor committee today rejected, 3 to 1, a demand by Senator Brewster (R-Me) that it look into State Department files he contended might contain information on 1,200 to 1,500 pre-war messages exchanged by President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill.

Drainage Funds Paid

DALLAS, May 23 (AP)—Federal Works Administrator Major General Philip B. Fleming said today that advances totaling \$56,800 were made today to the city of Beaufort, Tex., and Jefferson county, to finance planning and specifications for storm drainage works, which will cost an estimated \$8,000,000.

Chinese Government Troops Retake Manchuria Capital

MUKDEN, May 23 (AP)—The government today announced that national troops formally recaptured Changchun at 11 a. m. after having engaged "communist remnants remaining in the city in sporadic fighting." "The resistance soon was overcome," said the communique, from the headquarters of Gen. Tu Li-ming, government commander for northeast China (Manchuria).

Appealed to the communists, through General Marshall's truce commission at Nanking, to evacuate Changchun to prevent further destruction of the city, there was no immediate indication why the Reds had left. Previously, the communists had reported they were prepared to heavily defend both Kungchuling, 35 miles to the south, and Changchun. But government forces easily took both places—Kungchuling fell Tuesday—after having overcome communist forces at Sepingkai, 70 miles south of Changchun, in a 32-day battle.

Milling Operations Temporarily Halted

WICHITA FALLS, May 23. (AP) — Milling operations at the General Mills plant here were temporarily suspended Wednesday as officials said they could not continue to produce flour until the government increased the flour subsidy or the ceiling price.

Eugene Berry, general manager, said "the government raised the wheat price ceiling May 13, but has not raised the subsidy or ceiling on flour. We are not in a position to sell or grind any flour until an equilibrium between these prices is reached."

Berry said he hoped some government action would be taken within the next week. Employees affected by the shutdown will be used in the elevator and maintenance work, he stated.

The General Mills elevator has received about 250,000 bushels of new wheat thus far.

Ambulance Driver Tells US Court Enemy Ignored Red Cross Patch

DACHAU, Germany, May 23. (AP) — An American ambulance driver who helped wounded Germans in Normandy told a US military court how enemy troops ignored his Red Cross insignia and shot him four times after he surrendered at the Malmédy crossroads Dec. 17, 1944.

Glaring at 74 SS war crimes defendants, Samuel Dobyns of Sandusky, O., described the shooting of more than 100 soldiers as they stood with hands upraised in surrender in a field in Belgium during the battle of the Bulge.

Dobyns was trapped by cross-fire that day and his ambulance was riddled by machinegun fire. He said he had just painted new red crosses on it.

He and his helper hit the dirt and the ambulance was wrecked against a tree. He surrendered to a group of German troops, he testified, and one private wanted to kill him on the spot.

"An officer told him not to shoot me," Dobyns said.

He walked slowly before the defendants, but was unable to pick out the officer.

Dobyns said he was lined up with perhaps 150 others, including five wearing Red Cross insignia. A pistol shot rang out and a man near him fell.

"I broke ranks and ran to the rear," he said. "Then I heard another pistol shot and others in the rear started to disperse. At least

two machineguns opened up and we all hit the dirt. I was shot four times and there were eight or ten other holes in my jacket."

"I saw three or four German soldiers shoot the wounded that were crying for help. I thought I was the only one left alive."

After several hours, Dobyns and 15 or so others jumped up and ran to safety.

Dobyns said he could not identify the captors as SS men.

Homer D. Ford, a military police private of Leeton, Mo., told how he was captured that day and escaped from the bloody field almost after he had been shot.

This testimony concluded the prosecution's presentation of eye witness accounts by five enlisted men and one lieutenant who survived the Malmédy shootings. All six now have been mustered out. They were brought by plane to Dachau for the trial. Seventy-one bodies were covered from the Malmédy field.

Publishers Urged To Conserve Stock Of News Print

NEW YORK, May 3. (AP) — Loggers strikes on the Pacific Coast and coal shortages on the Eastern Seaboard, if continued much longer, could seriously curtail the nation's already short supply of news print, Crantson Williams, general manager of the American Newspaper Publishers Association, said today.

Publishers were urged by Williams to conserve their stocks and keep up inventories because of uncertainties in the coal, transportation and wood-cutting industries. Though Pacific Coast paper mills have wood on hand, the strike of the International Woodworkers of America (CIO) in British Columbia, unless soon settled, can deplete those inventories quickly, Williams added.

Newspapers in Texas, Oklahoma and throughout the Southwest will be affected by logging strikes because they get their newsprint from British Columbia mills, Williams pointed out.

The newsprint service bureau reported April production of news print in North America was 434,421 tons, highest April output in history, and that April shipments were 446,927 tons. Stocks at the end of April totaled 196,270 tons, against 208,776 at the end of March.

Douglas reported 175 reservations for double rooms already had been received, and he predicted that many Lions may be called on to supply facilities in their homes to care for the promised over-flow crowd.

Farm And Ranch News

A spraying demonstration for lice, ticks and flies on livestock, tentatively on schedule for several weeks, will be held either late this month or early in June, County Agent Durward Lewter reports. A machine owned by Coke county and widely used by ranchers in that area will be used, and T. B. Hicks, Coke county agent, will be here to assist with the demonstration. Hicks already has notified Lewter that he can bring the spraying machine any time that local arrangements can be made. Lewter is hoping that conditions will permit spraying a Howard county herd in separated groups in order that effectiveness of various mixtures can be determined. He wants to spray one group with rotenone and sulphur, currently used by most local stockmen for spraying and dipping, and use solutions of DDT varying from 2 percent to approximately 2 percent. One chemical company has contributed a 55-gallon drum of DDT and another has given enough to mix about 10 gallons of 2 percent solution.

Hicks has reported that DDT worked well with cattle in Coke county, and that it positively controls horned flies for three weeks after spraying. He also said they have definitely controlled lice by using two initial sprayings and then repeating every six weeks.

Texas Electric Service company plans to give several prizes to 4-H club boys at the end of the electrical appliance show Saturday night. To become eligible for the prizes the boys must register, either at the display headquarters on the mezzanine floor of the Settles hotel or at the tent housing the farm appliance display at 5th and Johnson streets. Deadline for registration is 9 p. m. Saturday, at which time the prizes will be

awarded. The prizes will be five baby chicks and laying hens.

I. B. Cauble and son will offer 39 head of bidders at their bull sale May 31 in the new West Texas Livestock Auction company plant. Included will be 25 two-year-olds, two herd sires and 12 yearlings.

Several out of town visitors will be here Tuesday for a tour of 4-H club calves in Howard county now on feed. The group will visit as many of the club boys as possible, and some of the animals probably will be vaccinated at that time.

An order for 53,900 lbs. of Johnson grass poison has been placed by the Howard county farm bureau. Most of the order, which is enough to destroy about 12 1/2 acres of solid grass, was submitted by Howard county farmers. Small amounts were requested by Midland and Martin counties.

Winners in the annual Sewall essay contest for 4-H club boys will be announced by the end of the week, and awards will be distributed next week. A good number of entries reached the county agent's office before the deadline Monday.

Moscow Expected To Make Historic Policy Decisions

WASHINGTON, May 23. (AP) — Diplomatic authorities here looked today for a series of historic foreign policy decisions by Moscow in the next three weeks affecting the whole immediate course of postwar events.

They believe Premier Stalin and Foreign Minister Molotov will do the deciding before June 15 — the date the foreign ministers conference resumes in Paris — and thereby determine the extent of future Soviet cooperation with the United States and Britain in making the peace.

These are the critical issues on which the Kremlin now appears confronted with decisions:

1. Do the Soviet leaders consider it more important to keep Red occupation armies throughout Eastern Europe or to get Eastern European countries on a peacetime basis with regular treaties concluded?
2. Are they willing to make a settlement of the Trieste dispute which would fall to give Yugoslavia that entire strategic area at the head of the Adriatic? Some officials here say that Trieste evidently has become a symbol of Russia's ability to deliver the goods for a friendly Communist government.
3. Will Stalin overrule Molotov's initial objections to the proposal by Secretary of State Byrnes for a 25-year four-power German control pact or will he uphold Molotov's objections to making such an agreement?

Physician Reports Removal Of Stomachs

Boston, May 23. (AP) — Dr. Frank H. Lahey, director of the widely-known Lahey clinic, has reported 89 successful operations in which the patients' stomachs were removed completely. Addressing the Massachusetts Medical Society, Dr. Lahey said the gastrectomies were done to remove cancerous or other growths. He said a "substitute stomach" is provided for these patients through a loop in the intestines. Dr. Lahey also advised people past middle age who have indigestion that lasts longer than a week to submit to X-ray examinations because "they may be suffering from ulcers or cancer."

Area Businesses Pay Fines For Violation

DALLAS, May 23. (AP) — Business establishments in Texas, Oklahoma and Louisiana have paid out more than a quarter of a million dollars in fines for violation of the wage stabilization law, A. Langley Coffey, War Stabilization Board chairman, said. The majority of the violators, 159 in all, were in the building and construction industry, Coffey said.

Sugar Stamp Racket Still Plagues OPA

FORT WORTH, May 23. (AP) — The sugar stamp racket is bobbing up again in the Fort Worth OPA district, this time in the Lubbock area.

A. Fox Curry, Jr., district sugar rationing officer, today said numerous complaints are being received from grocers in the South Plains region that sugar purchasers are turning in bogus stamps, manufactured by pasting a part of a blue food stamp, no longer in use, over an expired sugar stamp.

Curry advised grocers and clerks to inspect all stamps carefully. Otherwise, he warned, they will not be able to replace the sugar which they sell by accepting faulty stamps.

Tomato Growers Take Holiday From Sales

HARLINGEN, May 23. (AP) — Seventy-seven valley shippers have taken a tomato shipping holiday starting at midnight last night, lasting until midnight Sunday.

The shutdown is designed to stimulate overloaded markets on which 600 cars of tomatoes were awaiting sale yesterday. The association has criticized high retail prices as the reason for slow sales of the big Texas tomato crop.

Veteran Educator Wants To Retire

PALESTINE, May 23. (AP) — Thomas Gatlin, 40 years an educator, says he wants to retire. The veteran head of the Slocum schools recently accepted his reappointment only on condition that he serve until a successor can be named. He said he desires to retire because of ill health.

Known as the hero of the Slocum tornado which destroyed the school in 1929, Gatlin has taught in Texas for 32 years. He is a native of Tennessee where he taught for eight years.

In 1929 a tornado hit Slocum resulting in heavy damage. As the tornado approached the town Gatlin ordered his pupils to lie flat on the floor and a few moments later the twister wrecked the building leaving only the floor, desks, Gatlin and his students intact.

New Livestock Auction To Open At Big Spring

With three head of buffalo at a reminder of the old West, an institution symbolic of the new West will be opened here formally on June 4.

It is the West Texas Livestock Auction company, an expansive operation located just west of the Big Spring Cotton Oil company in northwest Big Spring.

I. B. Cauble, veteran Howard county Hereford breeder will send some 40 head of registered bulls through the ring May 31 in a pre-venue sale, and officials anticipate around 2,000 head for the formal opening on June 4.

Back of the venture are five men who formed a partnership for the plant, one of the largest in West Texas. They are John T. Masers, Homer McKinley, Marion Edwards, Cecil Leatherwood and Dewey Martin.

Martin is in charge with Leatherwood as yard manager. Leatherwood had the difficult job, too, of serving as building superintendent during construction.

The building is one of the best and most modern in the entire state. A careful check was made of other plants of a like nature in various parts of the country, and when the blueprint was made for the West Texas Auction barn it contained all the best features of many, and none of the objectionable ones. It is planned so that livestock may be rushed to and from the sales floor without the least friction and with no loss of time whatsoever. And, different from most places of the kind, the patrons and visitors will find parking space in abundance.

On entering the building the stock comes onto the sales floor directly between the auctioneer and his audience. When it is pronounced "sold" it is moved a few feet onto the electric scales, and from there pushed to the loading ramps, to the right if to be moved by truck, and to the left if by rail. The electric scales, which are of the most modern type, are state tested and when fully equipped will flash the accurate weight of the last offering on an illuminated dial just above the auctioneer's head, where all may see it.

The seating capacity of the amphitheatre will care for an audience of 2,000, with an arrangement of some 60 steel chairs on the floor level, adjoining the ring, for the bidders. Every one is in full view of the auctioneer, and every person will have a clear vision of the sales ring.

The east side of the building will be used exclusively for offices. A battery of accounting machines of the latest type has been provided, with a clerical force sufficient to handle the work promptly. The northeast corner is arranged for private offices, and an intercommunicating telephone system enables the office to contact any part of the pens or auction box at will.

The entire northwest portion of the building has been arranged for a cafe where many may be fed at one time. Large gas stoves and refrigerator plants, huge coffee urns—in fact everything needed to feed the patrons in a hurry has been provided. Lonnie and Leonard Coker, well known cafe men, who operate the Twins cafe in Big Spring, will have charge here.

That mystic maze of stock pens in connection with the main building is indeed a puzzle for most folks. The corrals include some 150 or 200 separate pens, all connected in some devious manner with driveways leading to the sales ring. Preparations have been made for both feed and water in each of these pens, and in connection, larger corrals have been built which will care for as many as 16 carloads of cattle. In those separate pens stock may be held until the owner sees fit to load out. Should a buyer desire to hold a bunch from one sale date until the next he will find ample accommodations for this purpose, as holding pens are provided, with running water and feed to be had in any amount. Railway cross ties have been used for posts in all the pens and corrals, and all are neatly painted, which emphasizes their part of the permanent structure.

Attendants are on the job day and night, which assures the customer that his cattle will be cared for regardless of the times of arrival. Cattle of any class, beef, butchers, stockers or feeders will be handled in a manner making it convenient for the seller or buyer to sell or buy at will.

Bill To Legalize Gambling Returned To New Orleans

BATON ROUGE, La., May 23 (AP)—The plan to legalize gambling in New Orleans was back in the lap of the city administration following yesterday's rebuff by the state house of representatives.

The house's action in killing two such proposals sounded the death knell for any hope of action at this session of the legislature along the lines proposed by Mayor deLeesseps Morrison of New Orleans.

The city official sought to have slot machines and horse race books legalized and limited in the city, but the slot machine bill was postponed indefinitely by a house vote of 66 to 27. A constitutional amendment along the same lines was tabled 63 to 27.

Still a third proposal, one which would permit the city to tax 250 handbooks, was referred to the committee on New Orleans affairs, but legislators said it probably would die there.

The virtual removing of legalized gambling as an issue still left the lawmakers confronted with several others which are expected to engender considerable debate and controversy.

Set for public hearing Thursday by the house judiciary "C" committee is a so-called "right-to-work" bill which would outlaw the closed shop in Louisiana.

Another measure expected to develop controversy during consideration was one introduced in the house to increase the natural gas gathering tax from the present one-half cent to three cents per 1000 cubic feet.

Also placed in this category by capitol observers was a proposal to place gas pipelines under supervision of the state public service commission.

Senator Opposed To Any Further TVA Authorities

WASHINGTON, May 23 (AP)—Senator Thomas (D-Okla.) declared today he is opposed to the creation of "any further authorities" such as the TVA.

In an interview on the proposed program of the Southwestern Power Administration, Thomas said "this has the earmarks of the beginning of a new authority."

But, the senator added he would not take a position on the question of appropriating \$7,500,000 for Southwestern Power next fiscal year until he hears all the evidence on both sides.

That amount is in the Interior Department appropriations bill passed by the House. Hearings on the bill are under way before a Senate appropriations subcommittee.

The House appropriations committee recommended appropriation of a little more than \$3,000,000 for SPA, but the House increased the amount to \$7,500,000 on the plea of Speaker Rayburn (D-Texas). He said the amount was needed to hook up the Denison, Norfolk and Grand River hydroelectric projects.

Five Howard county 4-H club boys now feeding steers to be entered in competition at the state fair in Dallas next fall are being informed that their sleeping quarters and meals will be furnished on the fair grounds, County Agent Durward Lewter said today.

The boys planning to enter steers in the Dallas show include R. J. Echols, James Coates, Lloyd Robinson, David Newton and Perry Walker.

Lewter said he has just received word from the state fair association that school-age exhibitors entering livestock in the junior division next fall will be cared for through arrangements made by the association's junior farm and ranch committee. The committee also will provide entertainment for the young fair visitors on farm and ranch youth day.

Messing facilities will be established on the fair grounds to furnish food for participants, and exhibitors will be housed in dormitories in the livestock show area.

Argentines May Put Hoover On Spot

WASHINGTON—The last time Herbert Hoover went to the Argentine — as President-elect in 1928 — he put his foot in his mouth at almost every step he made, beginning by kicking the representative of the powerful newspaper La Nacion off his bath-tub.

Today it looks as if the Argentines were going to help him repeat. Already they have devised a neat plan to challenge us to restore rationing during Herbert Hoover's trip.

In the first place, the Argentines regard Hoover's trip as primarily a "propaganda" move. Argentine government officials say that not another grain of wheat or another ounce of fats for European famine relief can be squeezed out of their country. Therefore, they argue, the former President's tour must be interpreted as a gesture, intended to impress South Americans with the humanitarianism of the USA.

So, President Peron is planning to go the United States one better. He will inform Hoover that Argentina is prepared to institute food rationing, and urge that the United States do likewise. This suggestion will be given full publicity, with the idea of bringing Argentina out on top no matter what happens.

Truman's Old Friends

NOTE — Truman paid off in the fall of 1943 when he braved Roosevelt wrath by introducing the so-called "Truman resolution" giving railroad labor an 8-cent-an-hour increase, despite Roosevelt's determination to hold the price-wage line. Roosevelt threatened to veto the resolution if it passed.

Big Spring Paint and Paper store will move to its new location at 1701 Gregg street beginning May 25, and O. L. Nabors, owner, hopes to be established in the new building for a June 3 opening.

The new building utilizes 2500 square feet of floor space, three times more than that now consumed in the Main street location. The building has a white exterior, and within the texture ceiling has been painted a shade of blue-green. Walls and fixtures have been given a surface of pastel ivory.

Nabors declared that a new system for displaying wallpaper patterns has been devised whereby samples of each design will be displayed along one wall. The buyer may select his pattern, and for closer observation the salesman may exhibit the paper taken from the stock bins. The paperman explained that this method would eliminate taking samples of the paper from the actual wallpaper stocks, and thus prevent mixing up of the stocks.

Another innovation for the Big Spring Paint and Paper shop in its larger home will be the stocking of draperies and materials and floor coverings, both linoleum

and woolen coverings, when they become available.

"By doing that," Nabors declared, "the home decorator can select window hangings, wallpapers and floor coverings at one time, making the decoration not only easier but also much more unified." Such a move would mean that the homeowner could see how all of the coverings would blend together without attempting to match by samples.

Although the new patterns have not yet been designed, Nabors stated, manufacturers have released information to the effect that different, if not new, patterns will be on the market in the future. A two months stop of wallpaper manufacture will begin on July 1, and during that period the new papers will be provided. It is hoped by retailers that such patterns will be on the market by late fall at least.

"We invite all our customers, new, old, or prospective, to come to see our new set up after June 3," Nabors reminded.

Primary purpose of the Veterans Administration is to assist ex-servicemen in applying for the benefits and services administered by the function—a job the local supervisor, Ray Boren, has discovered keeps him busier than the proverbial cranberry merchant.

Last month alone, Boren conducted 75 separate interviews with ex-soldiers and sailors planning construction of new homes. He sometimes talks to as many as 13 a day seeking education benefits. Former GI's and gobs who desire surplus government property find the local office well supplied with catalogues on the available stock, being processed for sale in the southwest.

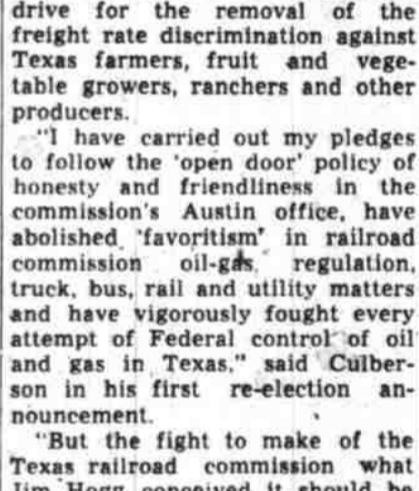
