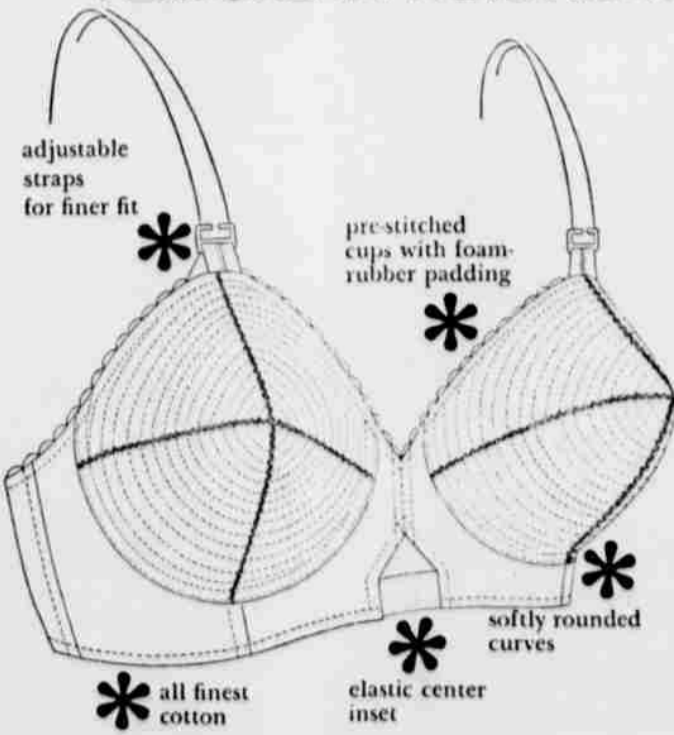

The Texas State Committee on Public Education has drafted and announced a set of "Criteria of a Good School Board Member."

The 50-member citizen group which drew up the Criteria is composed of business and professional men, housewives, college and public school administrators, former teachers and board members, newspaper publishers and college professors.

The Criteria follow: A good school board member:

1. Is one who has a strong belief in public education -- its importance to the individual, to the community, to the state and to the nation.

2. Should be sincerely interested in children never forgetting that they are the reason for public schools and for his trusteeship.

3. Should understand the difference between policy and administrative or classroom procedure and should understand but not usurp the teacher's or the superintendent's professional responsibilities.

4. Should never forget that the public schools belong to the public and should represent all the people of a community, not a particular area, nor vested interest nor special small-friendship group.

5. Should be informed of and sincerely interested in the instructional program and other facets of the school system and willing to accept new developments in each area.

6. Should be able to judge the strengths and weaknesses of the school and should endorse improvements or changes only after open-minded consideration of all the facts.

7. Should be able to work with fellow board members, should support board decision, regardless of personal views, and have moral integrity and courage to accept criticism.

8. Should be able to think independently, objectively, and soundly and should always remember that he is a school official only in official board meetings, and at no other time in a position to make a related commitment.

9. Should be willing and able to give the necessary time to board service to insure he is an informed and effective board member.

10. Should do his work without desire for personal consideration or gain.

11. Should be willing to study current literature on school boards and to participate in study groups.

 the minimum, the farmers would
 have to make up the differ-
 ence.
 Earlier in the week a new
 interpretation of the bracero
 law was released in which the
 length of time a bracero could
 be employed was extended to
 210 days from the previously
 determined time of 180 days.
 However, the extension also
 provided that the 210 days would
 have to fall in a 35-week per-
 iod. This means that if a bracero
 is used for only one day during
 any week, the week is
 actually counted as seven days
 of the 210 day limit.

 "Maybe we should put in our
 agriculture complex a feel of
 industrial research," he posed,
 "that may well fit the agricul-
 tural base around Littlefield."
 "Maybe it is time we investigat-
 ed water sources from out-
 side the current water plateau,"
 Walker added.
 "But we have two resour-
 ces with great potential. Two
 resources rarely considered by
 the individual" Walker stated,
 "We have space and sun."
 "There needs to be a change
 in redefining our natural re-
 sources," he pointed out.
 "Your town never stands
 still," Walker concluded, "it
 either moves forward or back-
 ward."
