Due To Construction, Annual Auto Show Will Not Be Held

The Wheeler Chamber of Commerce will again sponsor their annual City-Wide Garage Sale on Saturday, May 5, 2007. The annual car show will not be held this year, because of the construction projects on Alan L. Bean Blvd—Highway 83 and Oklahoma Street—Highway 152.

TxDOT is in the process of replacing the boulevard paving and pouring concrete surfaces at the wishing to hold a garage sale are invited to have a booth either on the square or at their residence. John M. "Mickey" Mixon, 95, passed away Friday, April 20, 2007, in Hobbs, New Mexico. Services were held at 2:00 PM, Tuesday, April 24, 2007, at the First Baptist Church in Mobeetie, Texas, with Rev. Aaron Laverty, pastor of the Gageby Baptist Church, officiating.

Burial was in the Mobeetie Cemetery under the direction of Carmichael-Whalley Funeral Directors of Pampa, Texas.

Mr. Mixon was born December 11, 1912, in Johnson County, Oklahoma. He married Dorothy Golleher on December 21, 1935, in Canadian, Texas. She preceded him in death November 3, 2003.

Old Mobeetie Texas Association was given permission to cross Hamburg Street, Dickerson Street, McKamy Avenue, O'Laughlin Avenue and Court Street to lay a water line.

Lee George was added to the payroll as a full time employee, effective 4/10/07 for Pct. 2 at a starting salary of \$2,183.92 a month.

Ken Daughtry was added to the payroll as a full time employee. He has been serving as County Emergency Management as a volunteer and will now be salaried by each of the county entities paying a portion of the salary.

The county employees are to be making a list of surplus property of the county to be auctioned at a later date. The deadline for submitting the list has been moved to the next court date.

Jan Hill, Wheeler Postmaster, met with the commissioners to inform the court of county roads which need attention to aid in the delivery of mail. The court was aware of the problems and is working to correct the situation.

The County Treasurer, Jauna Benefield presented her continuing education certificate to the court.

The Treasurer's Report was accepted by the court.

The court was made aware of the need to construct a building at the weigh station at Shamrock on Interstate 40. Specs for a 40'x100' building and a 100'x20' will be prepared and bids will be taken.

Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC) met with the court to discuss the preparing of a map of Wheeler County Roads. The proposed map will be presented to the public through mail outs, townhall meetings will be held and a county road map will be adopted. The court will be given an 84"x84" map to be placed in the courthouse for reference purposes when the project is finished. The schedule calls for a proposed map to be made available to the public by October 12, 2007 and the first public meeting be held November 12, 2007.

The next regular meeting of the Commissioners' Court will be Monday, May 14, 2007.

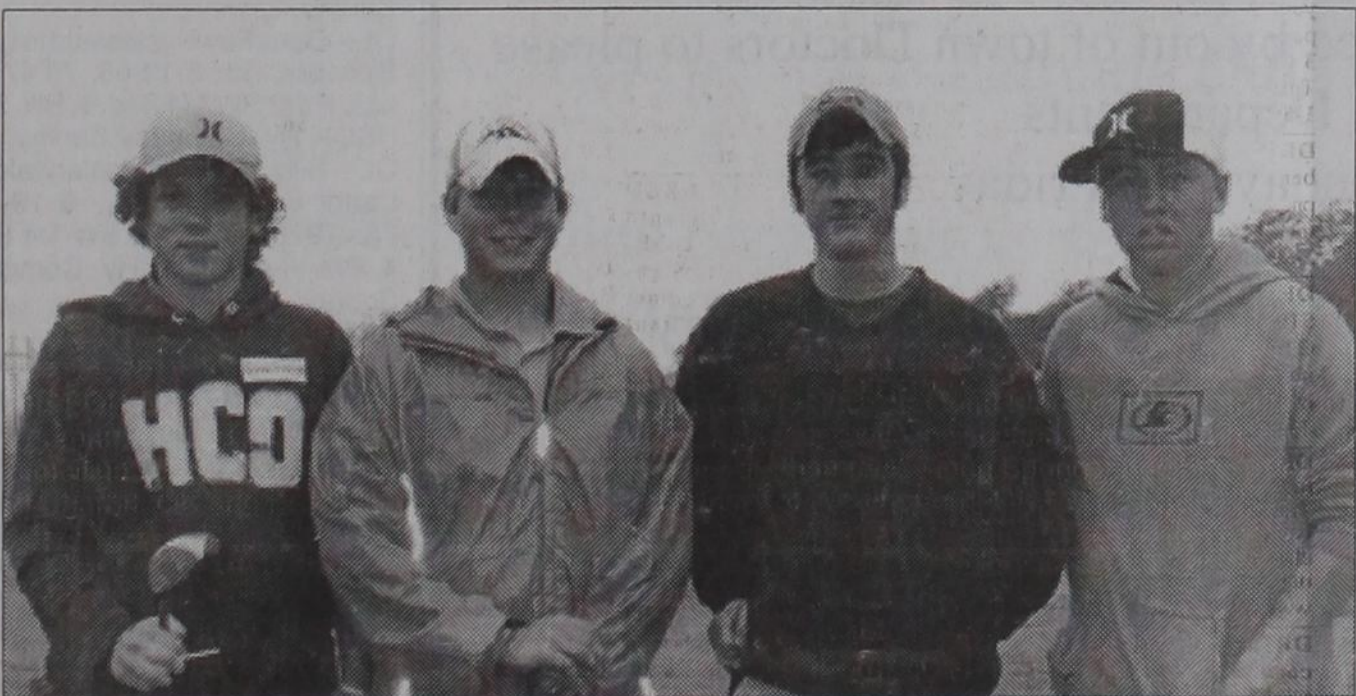

Students Receive Loan Assistance

Texas Students Receiving More Assistance To Avoid Defaulting On College Loans

Katie Tate is a junior community health major at Texas A&M University, and the first member of her family to ever attend college. Besides juggling her course schedule and an on-campus job, she is also learning the tough lessons of managing money.

As a first-generation college student whose family earns a yearly income of less than \$40,000, Tate receives a \$5,000 yearly grant from the A&M Regents Scholarship Program. The rest of her college tuition, books, and living expenses are financed through college loans. And whatever happens in her future, the native of the West Texas hamlet of Wall is sure of one thing: she will not be among the many who default on their college loans.

"Not having a background of support, it was important for me to understand my responsibilities," she said. "The information and support that I have received here at A&M has really helped. I've learned that some of the money I am getting is not an allowance, and I'll have to pay it back."

To be sure, default rates of college loans across the nation have steadily decreased over the past decade. There has been ample progress in Texas as well, although the state's default rate in 2004 was 6.8 percent, about a third higher than the 5.1 percent national average.

The recent trend across college campuses is to provide students with more tools and information to prepare them for their financial responsibilities once they leave school.
