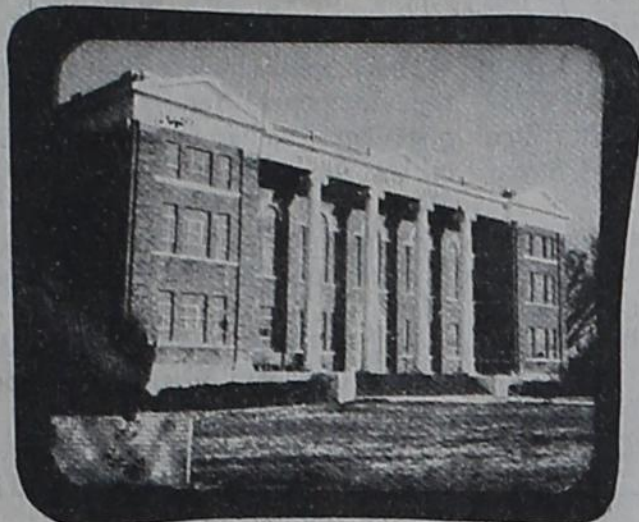


'TRICK-OR-TREAT' SATURDAY NIGHT

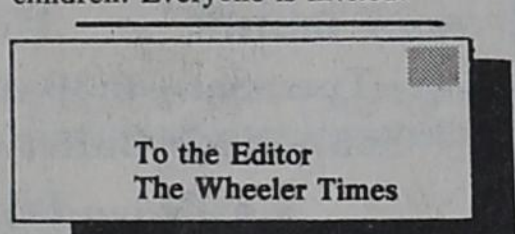

The Wheeler Colts plastered the Follett Kittens last Thursday 26 to 8. The win raised the Colts record to 5 wins and no losses.

Wheeler opened the game with a 12 yard punt block return by Ronnie Hungate for a touchdown in the first quarter. In the second quarter Follett broke a 45 yard run for a touchdown and made their two point conversion which gave Follett a 8 to 6 lead. The Colts scored with 2:58 left in the second quarter with Hungate scoring from 18 yards out.

Travis Hughes scored the two point conversion on a run around left end, Wheeler led at the half 14 to 8.

The Colts scored once in the third quarter with Jason Wood running a bootleg run for 30 yards out. Wheeler missed the two point conversion but led 20 to 8. 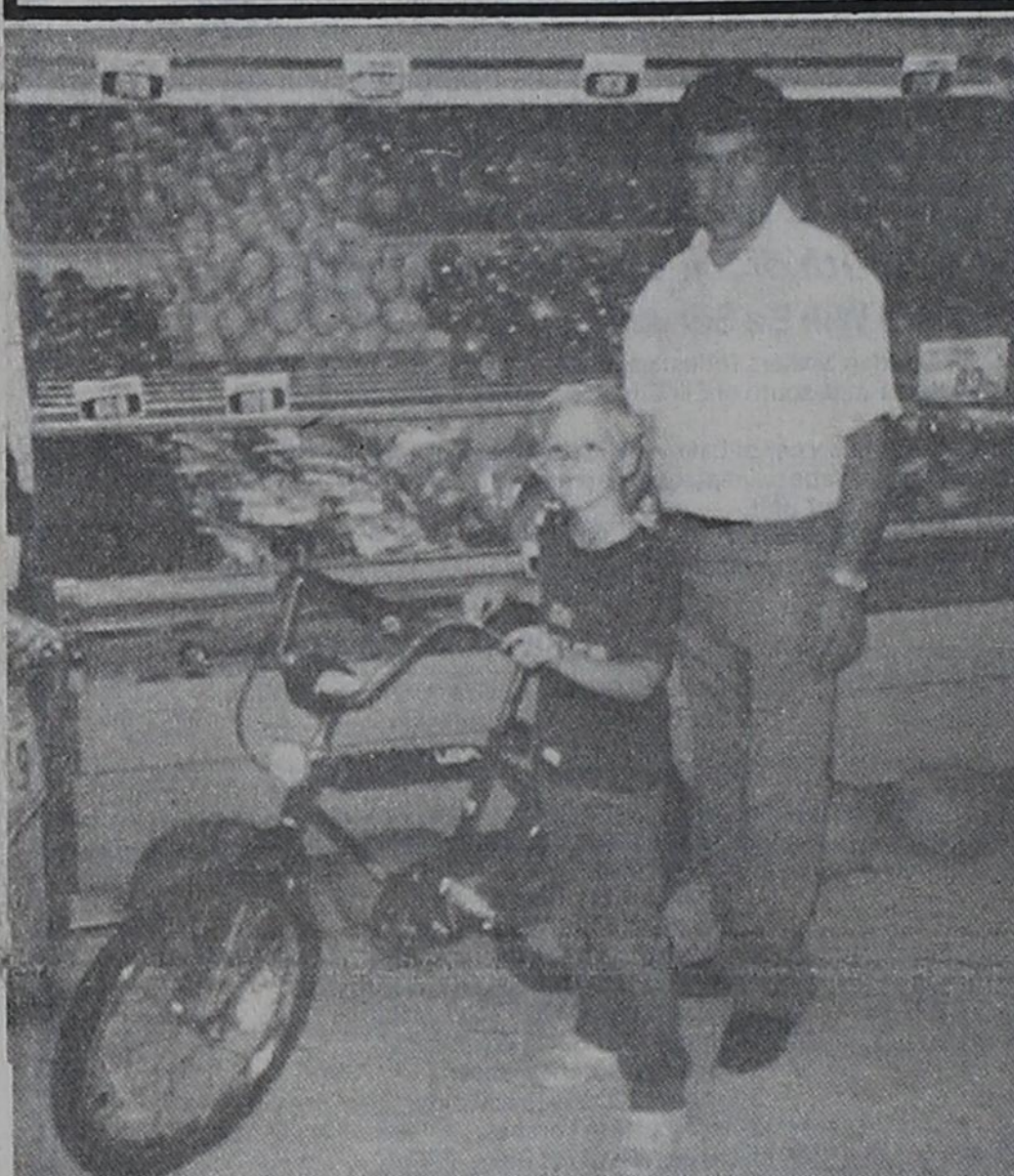

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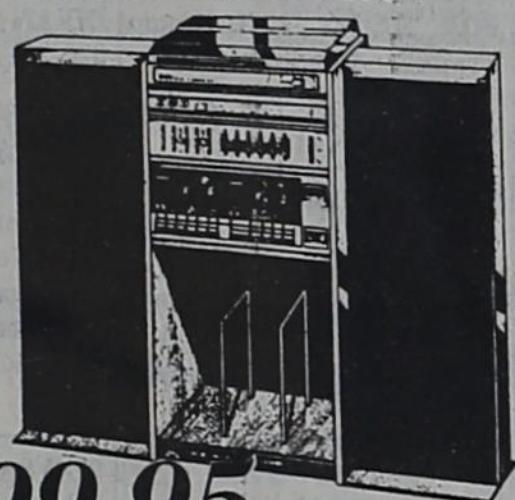

defense with a huge will to win proved too much for the visiting Bobcats who came to town with high hopes of knocking Wheeler off the top rung of Panhandle Class A football.

The Bobcats opened the game like that they might blow the Mustangs away early and fashioned a 13-0 lead only to see the Mustangs fight back for a 14-13 halftime margin. On their second possession of the football in the game the Bobcats drove 60 yards for their first touchdown with Joe Ely going over from the 2. Quarterback Steve Moore had set up Ely's TD run with a 48 yard dash to the 16.

A short punt of only 16 yards gave Sunray excellent field position at the Bobcat 49 the first time the Bobcats had the ball in the second quarter. Once more it was Moore that provided the fireworks as he scampered 24 yards to the Wheeler 21 on third down and following a late hit penalty against Wheeler to the 9, Moore scored in two plays.

The way that Sunray had moved the ball, it appeared that the Mustangs were in deep trouble but nobody had convinced the Black Machine of that and in the space of just over three minutes the Mustangs had quickly regained the upper hand and led by 14-13.

With the help of a 15 yard penalty, the Mustangs took the kickoff following the Bobcats second touchdown and drove to the Sunray 37 and had a first down. A pass was incomplete and two running plays netted 6 yards and the Mustangs faced fourth down. Mustangs quarterback, Augie Hennard, who coach Preston Smith lauded for his sterling play, passed 31 yards to David Jones who made a great, juggling catch for the touchdown. Richard Smith booted the PAT and Wheeler was right back in the game.

On second down after Jones TD

catch, the Bobcats fumbled and Wheeler recovered at the Sunray 12 and Danny Benefield put the Mustangs on the scoreboard for the second time and Smith's kick put the Mustangs up by one.

Wheeler lost a golden opportunity to go ahead more when Sunray fumbled the second half kickoff and the Mustangs took over at the 19 but the Bobcats held on fourth down and took possession at the 10.

Sunray lost 5 via a penalty back to their 5 but commenced a drive that took 11 plays to cover the 95 yards to the Wheeler end zone. Ely scored his second touchdown from the 7 and when the pass for two was incomplete, Sunray was back on top 19-14 and the Bobcats made this lead hold up until the fourth quarter.

Two passes from Hennard to Grayson Benson ate up 32 yards in the Mustangs go ahead drive that covered 78 yards in just 8 plays and Benson plunged over from eight yards out. Tailback Cody Wiggins ran the two pointer and Wheeler led by 3 but the Mustangs made that look bigger and bigger as their defense began to dominate the Bobcats.

The Bobcats went to the airways but found no success and time was running short when the Mustangs took over on the Sunray 32. Wiggins picked up 3 and Benson added 5 before the Mustangs called on Charlie Miller and the 176 pound senior responded with a 30 yard clinching touchdown run.

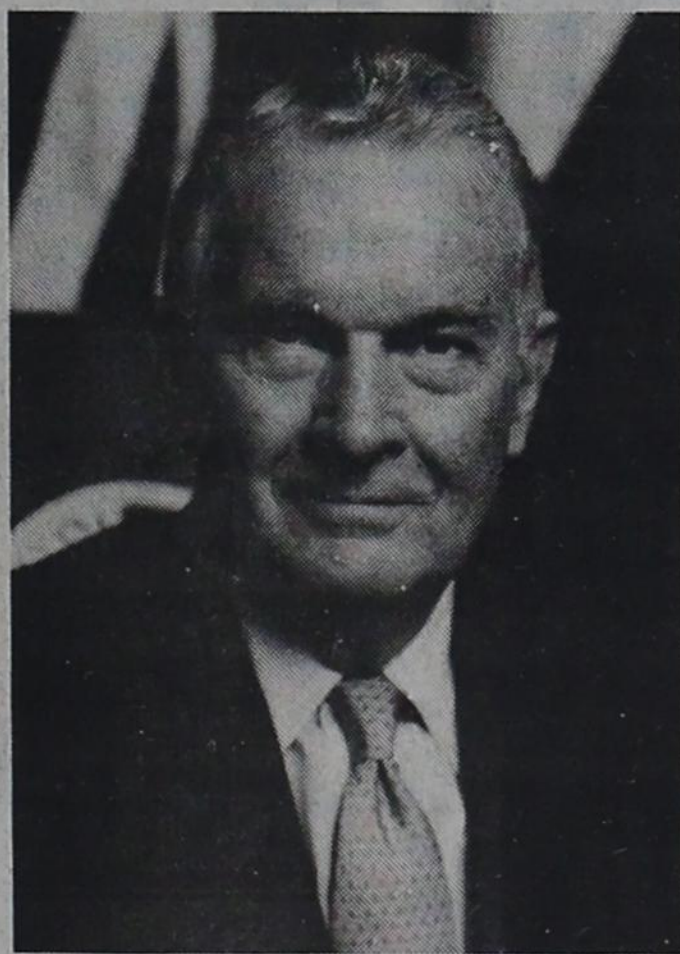

NOTICE OF PROPOSED REDUCTION IN AT&T'S TEXAS RATES

The Public Utility Commission of the state of Texas has entered orders in two recent cases that would substantially reduce the charges which AT&T pays to the state's local telephone companies and which could allow AT&T to reduce prices for most of AT&T's customers on calls placed within the state of Texas.

The total amount of the reduction to AT&T's customers is expected to be between \$115.3 million and \$120.6 million. This is in addition to the \$19.8 million reduction in AT&T's Texas basic long distance prices that went into effect on March 1, 1986 and is in addition to the approximately \$2 billion in AT&T interstate price reductions that took effect earlier this year.

If the changes are approved, all of AT&T's direct dialed long distance, directory assistance, WATS and 800 service customers would be affected, and would experience a decrease in their prices for these services when calling within the state of Texas. The following tables show the anticipated impact of the changes on AT&T customers by service category:
