The Wheeler Mustangs literally ran over the hapless McLean Tigers 38-0 last Friday night before a wet homecoming crowd at Nicholson Field.

It was no contest from the opening kickoff as the Mustangs scored every time they had the pigskin in the first half and built up a 32-0 halftime lead and padded that with another six pointer in the third quarter before the reserves took over.

The victory was the first for the Mustangs in defense of their district championship and also gave them a season mark of 5-1 as tailback Cody Wiggins and fullback Grayson Benson had big night's toting the ball.

Wiggins plowed out 117 soggy yards on 19 carries with Benson not far behind as the stocky fullback netted 88 yards on 12 calls. Wingback Danny Benefield and reserves Larry Erwin and Shane Guest added 82 yards to the Mustangs' rushing total.

A short punt early in the game gave the Mustangs great field position at the Tiger 30 and the Mustangs were in the end zone in just four plays with Wiggins getting the first of his three touchdowns. Wiggins broke off right tackle at the 17 and cutback to the middle and scored standing up. Charlie Miller booted the Mustangs

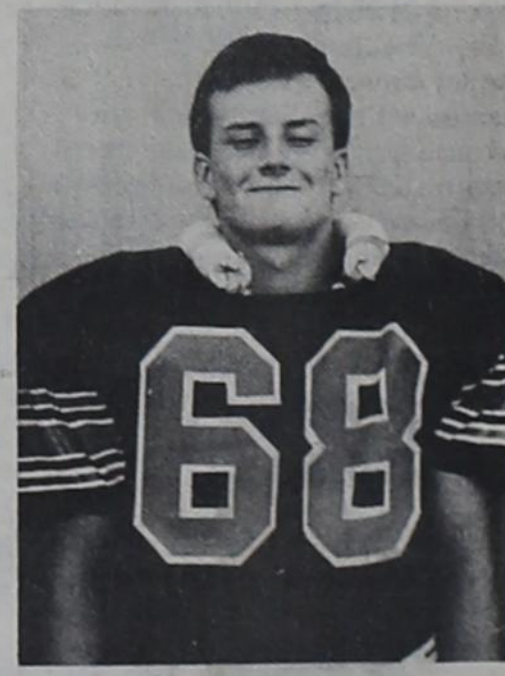
STEVEN HORTON

Fire Prevention Week At Mobeetie

First grade had a fire prevention poster contest. The winner was Tracy Densberger.

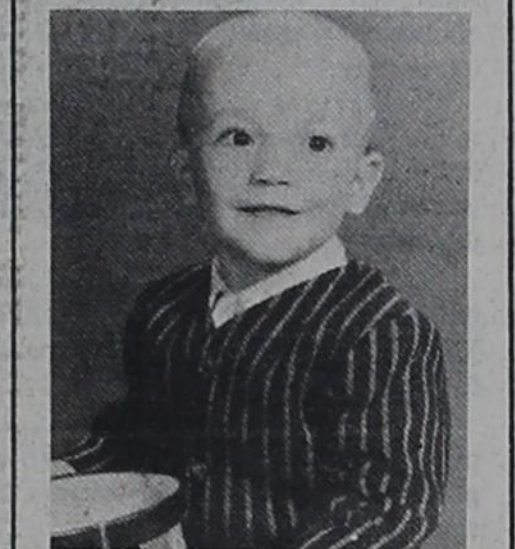

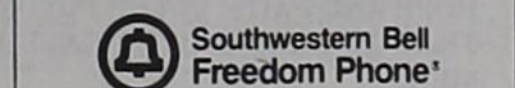
