Again, from the Chamber, "Thanks for coming despite the weather."

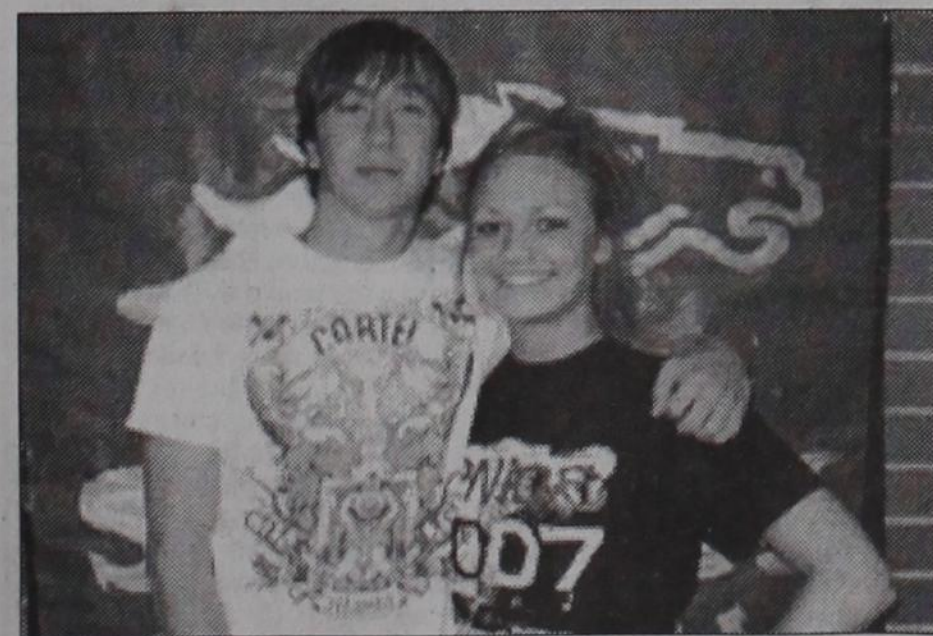

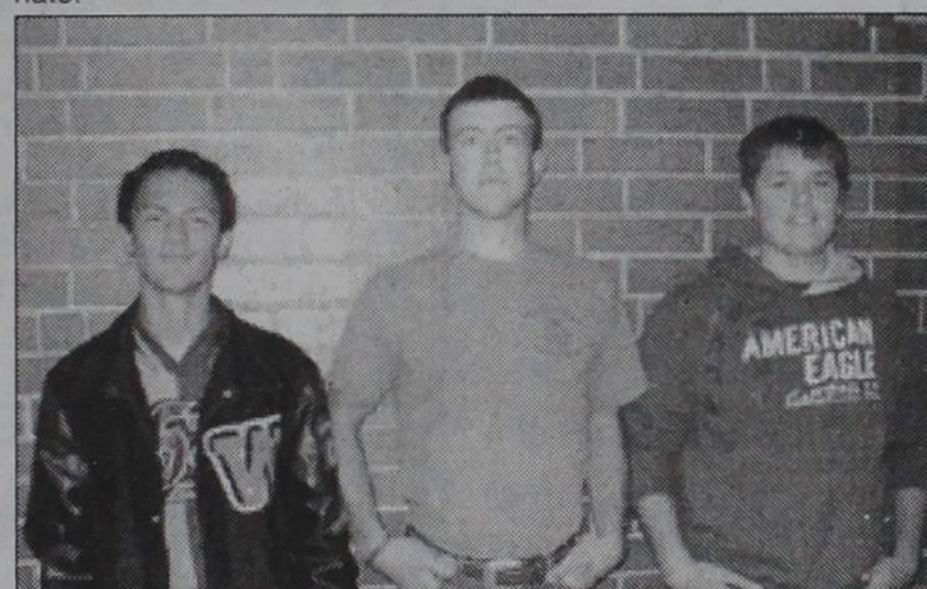

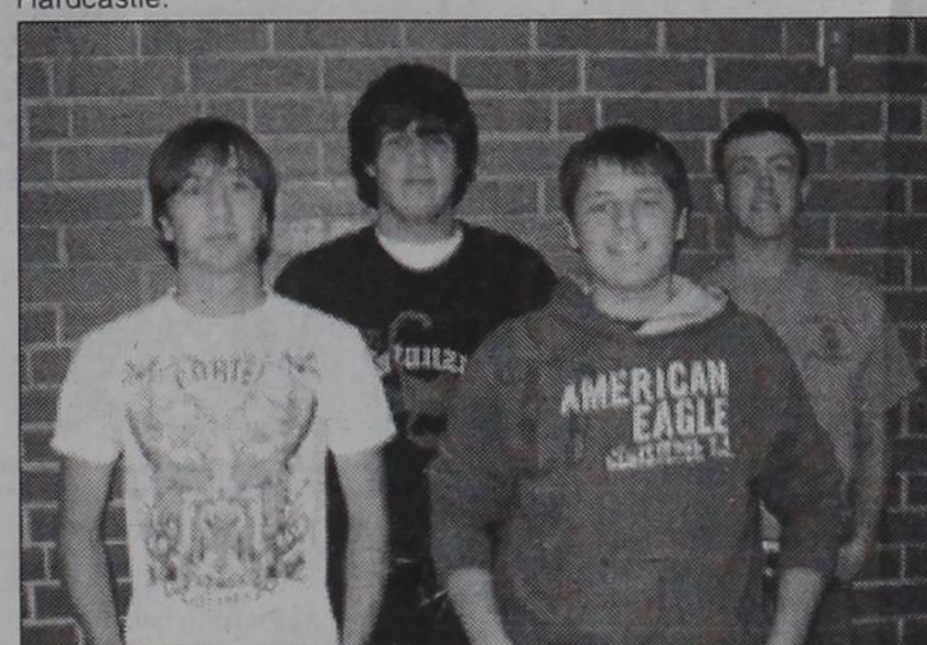

Scam working its way around small panhandle towns

A scam has been run in a couple of the local small town papers up and down US 287. The scam suggests making up to 2,700 dollars a week from home over the internet. The company claims to be internet based and that you can work from home on your computer. Once you contact them they tell you that they only need you to cash checks for them from overseas companies. The scams vary in amounts but it always boils down to you cashing a check for them. After you cash the check you are to deduct your ten percent and forward the remaining amount. The company usually asks you to do this through Western Union. The next day you will get a call from your bank telling you that the check was bad.

"Please avoid these scams they are always to good to be true", said Trooper Daniel Hawthorne information officer for Texas DPS in Childress.

"Anytime you are told you can make this much money at home on your computer for another company it is a scam", Hawthorne added.

TORNADO WARNING INFORMATION FOR WHEELER

The Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department is out storm watching anytime Wheeler is put under a severe storm watch and the Wheeler County Sheriff's Department sends out a page.

If a funnel is spotted in the county, which is or the fire department feels will be a threat to Wheeler, the siren will be sounded.

Should the electricity be off at the time the sirens need to be sounded, the fire trucks and/or the sheriff's cars will travel up and down the streets warning the citizens of the danger.

When the siren is sounded, take shelter immediately. There will be no "all clear" sounded.

For those citizens without shelters, the Wheeler County courthouse is unlocked and available when Wheeler is under tornado alert.

The Wheeler school has a basement which is available for use by the students, should the siren be sounded while school is in session.

Please do not go to the school to pickup your child or children. They will be taken to shelter until the danger is passed.

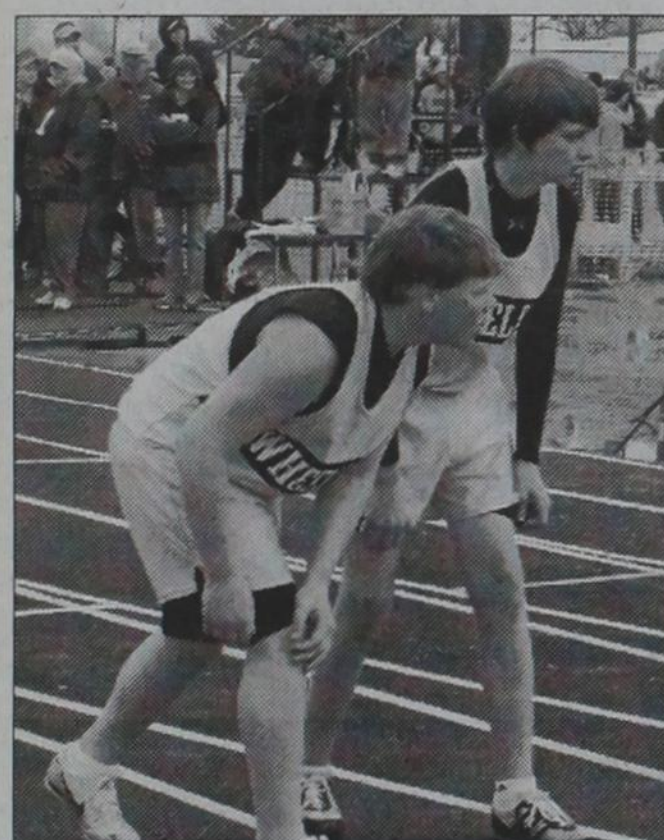

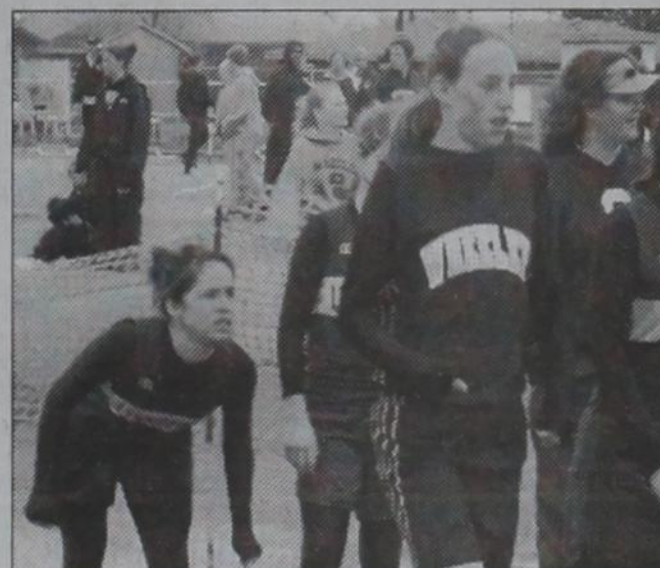

A private pesticide applicator and M-44 license certification training will be held April 3 at the Clarendon College RFO Building, according to Leonard Haynes, Texas Cooperative Extension agriculture agent in Donley County.

The private pesticide applicator training will begin at 8 a.m. for those who are seeking to obtain a license. Current license holders may also attend this meeting to obtain three continuing education units, Haynes said.

Texas Department of Agriculture will administer the certification test at 1 p.m. for those that have completed the mandatory training.

In addition to the private applicators license certification, an M-44 (predator control) license training will be conducted for interested landowners beginning at 5:30 p.m. at the RFO Center.

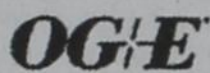

As part of its long-term electric supply resource plan, SWEPCO has determined that it needs to obtain additional long-term capacity and energy supply resources in the near future. In an effort to meet these long-term needs, SWEPCO selected this generating unit through a competitive bidding process. The docket number and style of the case are PUC Docket No. 33891, *Application of Southwestern Electric Power Company for Certificate of Convenience and Necessity Authorization for a Coal-Fired Power Plant in Arkansas*. SWEPCO is not seeking to change its rates in this proceeding.

On December 8, 2005, SWEPCO issued a market-based, competitive solicitation for long-term power resources by way of a Request for Proposals (RFP). The RFP solicited up to 600 MW of long-term baseload resources to be available by the summer of 2011. Based on an evaluation under the criteria in the RFP, along with the oversight by the independent monitor of the RFP process, SWEPCO has selected a nominally-rated 600 MW ultra-supercritical coal-fired generating plant approximately 15 miles northeast of the City of Texarkana, Arkansas. The plant's emissions will be cleaned using Best Available Control Technologies. SWEPCO was the entity that submitted the winning bid proposal for this facility in response to the RFP. Three other entities have given notice of their intent to participate in the ownership of the generating plant, subject to the execution of construction, ownership and operating agreements, for a combined total of 160 MW. SWEPCO's ownership share is thus expected to be 440 MW.

The total estimated direct cost of the entire plant is approximately \$1.343 billion, of which SWEPCO's share is approximately \$0.986 billion. When the \$231 million of carrying costs in the form of Allowance for Funds Used During Construction (AFUDC) are added to SWEPCO's share, the total estimated cost to SWEPCO is approximately \$1.2 billion for the plant. In addition, SWEPCO estimates \$136 million of transmission investment will be necessary, together with an additional \$21 million of AFUDC on that transmission investment. SWEPCO's total estimated cost of the facility including transmission and all related AFUDC is \$1.374 billion. The plant unit will be built by American Electric Power Services Corporation (AEPSC) as SWEPCO's agent, and all AEPSC goods and services will be supplied at cost.

SWEPCO requests that its CCN be amended to include the generating plant described in this filing. SWEPCO has already made similar filings with the Arkansas Public Service Commission and the Louisiana Public Service Commission.

The deadline for intervention in this proceeding is April 20, 2007, and a letter requesting intervention should be received by the Commission by that date. Old Mobeetie Association Minutes

March 8, 2007
7:00 P.M.

The meeting was called to order by President, Joe VanZandt. Louise Hogan opened the meeting with a prayer.

The minutes of the February meeting were read by Secretary, Bobbye Hill. Joe declared the minutes approved as corrected.

Melba Corcoran gave the February treasurer's report. Joe announced that he had taken out an advancement loan for \$100,000.00 from First State Bank of Mobeetie for the school project. Jim Hill's motion to approve the February treasurer's report was seconded by Maurita Stribling. Motion carried.

Melba Corcoran gave the volunteer-hour report; there were 335 volunteer hours worked in February.

Melba Corcoran gave the Collection Management Report; 22,290 work sheets have been completed and 42,237 items have been cataloged.

Old Business
The Music Festival was discussed. Dutch had started selling ads in Pampa. Bobbye & Ada are working on the t-shirt and have an idea at an artist.

The Hoe Down was discussed. Tonya has sent out a confirmation request to Marc Ferguson. Ada suggested that Lance Buzzard from Lipscomb, who is a buffalo

enactor, be contacted to set up an exhibit.

Joe announced that the Grantham firm had finished the financial audit.

Joe discussed the insulation of the interior walls of the school even though the exterior walls will not be insulated. Bill's motion to insulate all interior walls was seconded and motion carried.

Joe discussed insurance for the building. Bobbye stated that the Association had property insurance on the buildings only. Joe stated that the Association had liability insurance as well. Bobbye stated the Association had never been able to purchase liability insurance on a budget of \$24,000.00 for total operations. Maurita read the policy and it was only for property insurance. Maurita will research the liability insurance cost. Bill's motion to purchase builder's risk was seconded by and motion carried.

Old window and doors are left that did not comply with ADA requirements. Motion that the excess doors and windows be placed in Lyndon's Auction on March 24 was seconded and motion carried.

The group agreed to accept Louise's parents' old washing machine and a plow.

Joe discussed the water situation for the new school and the Mobeetie Jail delivered to visitors and camper and RV hookups. Melba stated that Texas law required treated water must be delivered to all camper and RV hookups. Joe stated that the Association should fly under the radar as far as the rules were concerned. Joe stated that the plumber recommended that the Association could put on a chlorinator injector or bring water from the city water line at the Cowboy Oasis. The issue will be decided at a later meeting.

Joe announced the low bid for dry wall, tape and bed on the school was \$26,665.00 from Denman. Dale Corcoran's motion to accept the bid from Denman was seconded by Jim Hill. Motion carried.

Joe VanZandt distributed papers relating to the cost and estimates for the school project and the audited financial report of the museum's financial records for the first time since the project began in November, 2006. Bobbye ques-

tioned why the Association started the project without knowing the total cost and having final bids. She stated that all the projects dealing with public funds in which she had been involved with the board or commissioner's court had known the final costs before the projects were begun. Joe replied, "Guess what. You are in one now."

Joe spent the next 20 to 30 minutes getting a lot of anger off his chest because his management of the school project had been questioned. He believed that a lot of discussion had been going on behind his back. He noticed that when he showed up on the school site that some people left by the other door to avoid him. This was a problem that he could not tolerate. Ada Lester later assured him that she and Bobbye left through the other door to see the front facade of the school that will soon be covered up with sheet metal and they wanted to see it for a last time. He accused Bobbye of delaying getting an appraisal he had requested for the school at the time the Association bought the school so that the value of the school could be puffed up rather than the actual selling price in order for the seller to receive an inflated appraisal so they could show a loss on the sale for tax purposes. Bobbye had informed Joe that the Museum had never provided appraisals for any donors as it is not done by any museums. Good museum practice is to let donors get their own appraisals. She had advised Joe that the Association should not be involved in any fraud for IRS purposes. Joe had gone ahead later and found his own appraiser to provide the appraisal. He accused Bobbye of not updating the Bylaws as he had requested. He further accused her of not writing a book the Association had signed a contract on even though it was a project Tonya Finsterwald was appointed to be in charge of by Joe VanZandt. At the time, he had sarcastically remarked to Bobbye she had better not plagiarize the book. He stated that Bobbye had found time to write a book for the Wheeler Centennial and was currently working on one for the Wheeler Ex-Students. 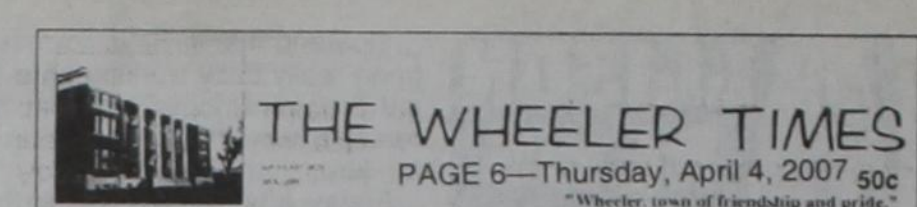
