Now, that takes care of food.

Amarillo, had an army-surplus store that dad really like to wander around in on occasion. It was almost like hunting Easter eggs in that place; every corner you turned there would be something that was really neat. As luck would have it, I'd made a great choice in the purchase of a genuine, army-

surplus, water canteen. With this, and my food problem already solved, I was about as well prepared as anyone needs to be.

While sitting under a shade tree one day after a long hike, eating my cake and swiggin' on my canteen; I noticed something that sure-nuff looked like hairs, right there.... in my cottonseed cake! Darned if it didn't look a lot like rat hairs... kind of gray colored. Wow!! I threw that one away, but still being hungry, I did the reasonable thing and pulled another one out of my pocket. It was becoming real plain to me; eating cottonseed cake required more learning than I had ever thought. You've got to pay close attention, take a small bite, look it over good, then take another bite. These details slowed

my eating down a great deal, not to mention my imagination "growing" about what I had already eaten.

Eventually, I quit eating that cake all together. Dad, started keeping peanuts around the house most of the time. At least you didn't have to worry about "rat hair" in your peanuts...

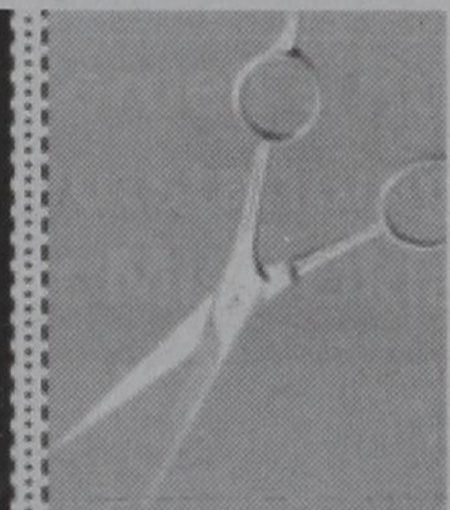

2010 South Central Regionals Affiliate Cup Wrap-up

May 29-30th, CrossFit Amarillo sent a team of six athletes to Ft Worth, TX to compete in the 2010 South Central Regional Competition: Ryan Huseman, Grayson Benson, Chip Castle, Lindsey Fillingim-Criswell, Heidi Coffman, and Audra Bowman. The top eight teams would go onto to Los Angeles, CA to compete in the 2010 CrossFit Games Affiliate Cup July 16-19, 2010.

As reported by Lindsey: "How was the weekend? It was HOT. Imagine doing push-ups in 98-degree heat on black asphalt. We did that. Despite the heat, we had a great time. The High Plains Lifters (our team name) showed up prepared to give it their best, and that's just what we did."

"The competition was stiff and the competitive energy was palpable. The first event involved Deadlifts and Double-unders. Audra and Grayson "went to town" on the double-unders, while Ryan and Lindsey did the heavy deadlifts. We didn't place as well as hoped because the Deadlift/Double-under ratio was 4/1. The second event, "The 100's", was comprised of a laundry list of exercises, where the team had to complete 100 repetitions before moving onto the next exercise: 100 Thrusters, 100 push ups, 100 Hang Cleans, 100 Ring Dips, and 100 Overhead Squats. We were in the lead pack through most of the exercises until we reached ring dips. Unfortunately we had

some issues with the standards provided for the movement, which resulted in many missed reps. The third event was twenty-four minutes of rowing for maximum number of meters. The High Plains Lifters finished 300 meters behind the first place team...a solid performance."

"Even though we did not place within the top eight to compete in California, we had a BIG time. It was our first CrossFit competition and we pushed ourselves harder than ever before. We also learned something about our gym that

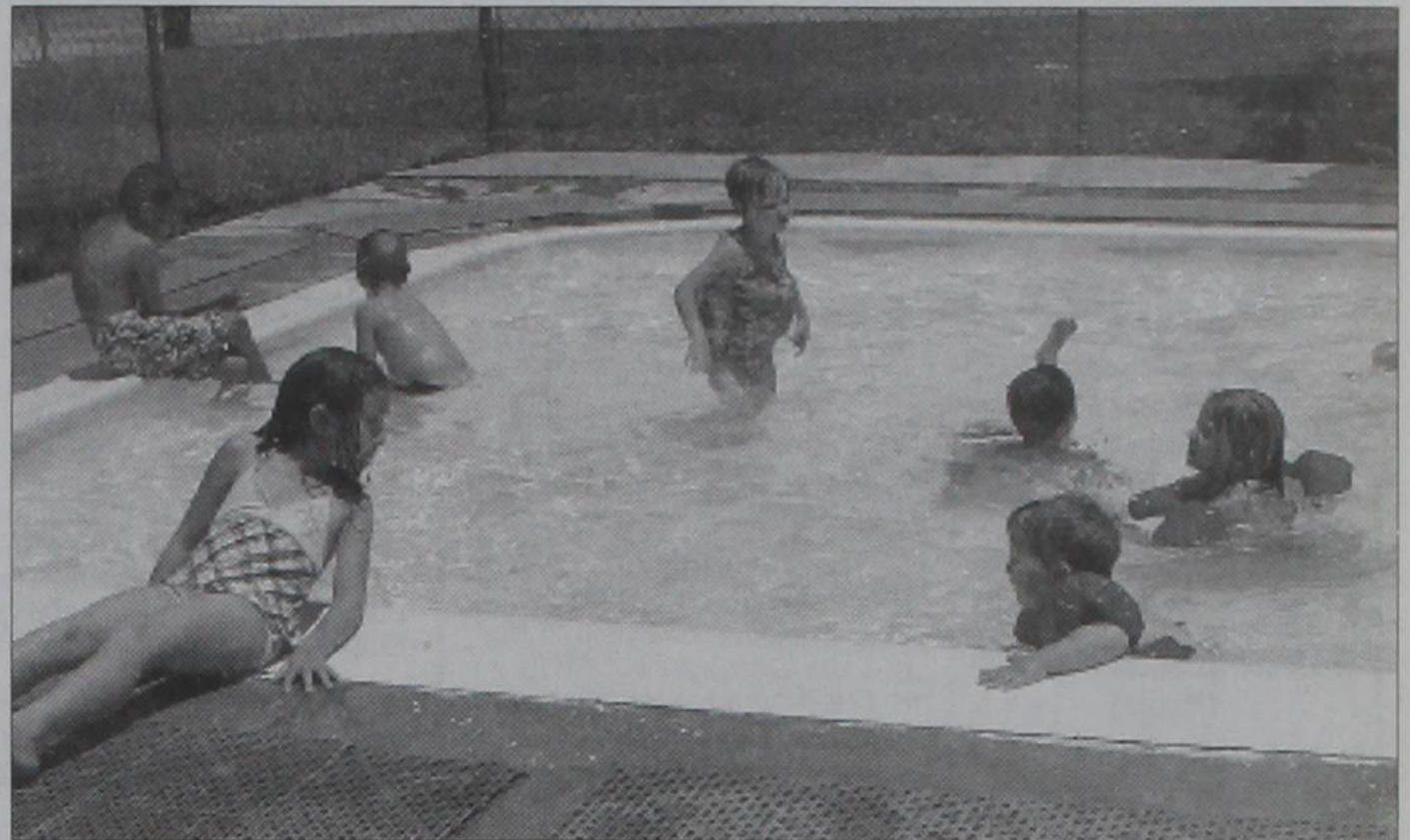

Protect Your Child From Cyber Bullying

How Can I Protect My Child From Cyberbullying?
National Internet Safety Month Kicks Off As

Expert Offers Tips For Parents

A year ago, many did not know what cyberbullying was. Today, parents all over the country are concerned about it, and want to know what to do to prevent it. Surveys indicate that around half of all children are victims of cyberbullies at some point during their time in school, and 11 percent of children have been bullied in the last 30 days. The Internet provides a free and anonymous tool for bullies to heap on the abuse.

"Our kids' online lives can sometimes be a mystery to parents," said Mary Kay Hoal, COO of Yoursphere.com, a positive place for kids online. "Whether it's because they set up multiple profiles on social networking sites and hide them from their parents or because not every parent is technologically savvy enough to see what is going on, it's important for every parent to know how to tell if their children are victims of cyberbullies, and how to prevent it and stop it in its tracks."

Hoal has studied cyberbullying, talked to parents around the country whose kids have been bullied online, and uses unprecedented measures to keep cyberbullies off her Web site. Her tips for parents to protect their children and to spot signs if a parent suspects their child may be a victim of bullying include:

- **Check for withdrawn behavior** - The American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry suggests that children who are being bullied will act withdrawn, and may be reluctant to go to school or use the computer.
- **Look for signs of depression and give your kids a hug** - Kids often feel like something is wrong with them when they are being bullied and they may feel all alone. Parents should remind their kids that bullies largely thrive on the reaction they get from their victims and it's the bully that has the real problem.
- **Teach your children** - "Be Kind Online" is a proactive message parents can share with their children. It's an important first step towards educating children about the way they should treat others online.
- **Give your kids tools to protect themselves** - The message shared with children: "Don't respond. Tell Your Mom. Make a copy," gives kids exactly the information they need to make sure they can protect themselves and an action plan for parents if there is abuse.
- **Get their school or law enforcement involved** - After the most recent trouble in Massachusetts that finds school officials being named in lawsuits because of the assertion that their inaction led to the suicide of 15-year-old Phoebe Prince, parents may find teachers and guidance counselors will be more proactive in halting or preventing the bullying of their students. Many bullies are victims themselves, sometimes suffering from problems at home. When the school gets involved, it is more likely that the bully's parents will become aware of the problem and help to resolve the situation positively for all the students affected. If your child is ever threatened with harm, contact your local police.

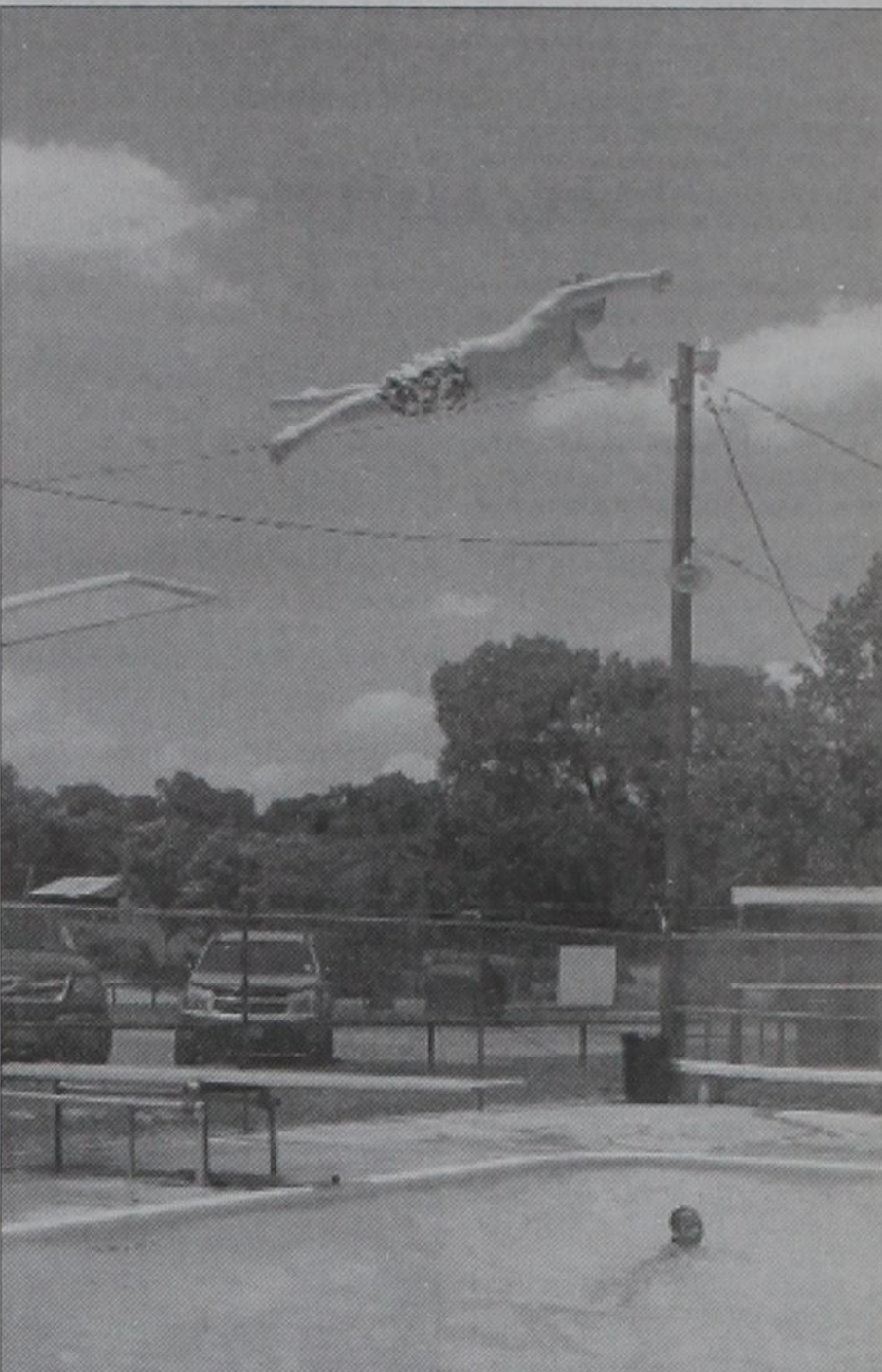

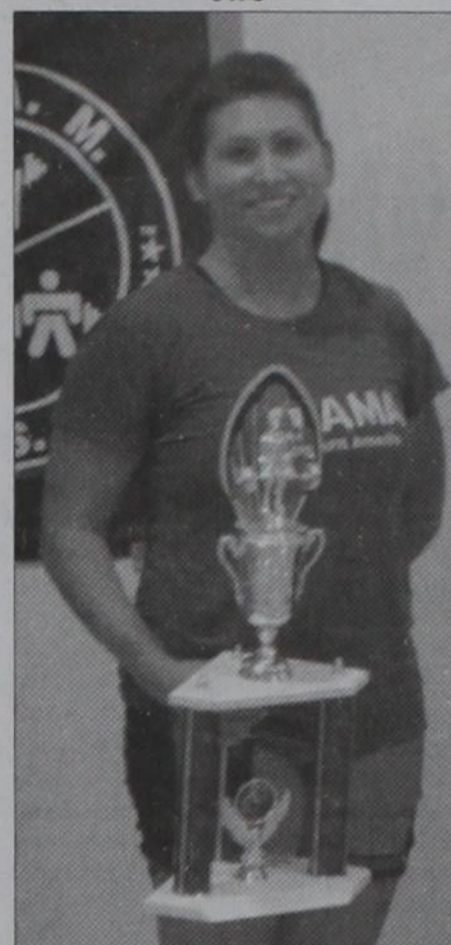

\$150 M Approved For TX Corridors

The Texas Transportation Commission today approved the use of \$150 million in Proposition 12 bond proceeds for consultant engineering that will enable the development of future projects and reduce congestion on some of Texas' most congested corridors.

All of these projects will help make improvements to the top 100 congested segments of roadways on the Texas Department of Transportation's (TxDOT) highway system. In cooperation with the state's transportation partners, TxDOT developed a list of potential projects to be developed with these funds.

According to Texas Transportation Commissioner Ned Holmes, "this funding will allow these critically-needed projects to continue the engineering work necessary to commence construction when future funding is available."

In July 2009, the Texas Legislature authorized TxDOT to issue approximately \$2 billion in general obligation bonds for highway improvements. Texas voters approved Proposition 12 bonds, which are backed by the state's general revenue not by fuel tax revenues.

In November 2009, the Texas Transportation Commission approved using Proposition 12 bond revenue to fund more than 70 highway construction projects.
