

Carolyn also helps facilitate training in women's issues and health, and together they are involved in children's and youth ministries within the local churches. When speaking in AGC sponsored primary and secondary schools, they teach life skills, discuss health issues, and share the gospel.

The Wades also minister through radio as Ken teaches on topics of spiritual interest and Carolyn shares devotionals and addresses relevant heath issues. Overall, their ministries emphasize evangelism and insights into Christian living, biblical family values, and life surrendered totally to Christ.







# **2010 South Central Regionals Affiliate Cup Wrap-up**

May 29-30th, CrossFit Amarillo sent a team of six athletes to Ft Worth, TX to compete in the 2010 South Central Regional Competition: Ryan Huseman, Grayson Benson, Chip Castle, Lindsey Fillingim-Criswell, Heidi Coffman, and Audra Bowman. The top eight teams would go onto to Los Angeles, CA to compete in the 2010 CrossFit Games Affiliate Cup July 16-19, 2010.

As reported by Lindsey: "How was the weekend? It was HOT. Imagine doing push-ups in 98degree heat on black asphalt. We did that. Despite the heat, we had a great time. The High Plains Lifters (our team name) showed up prepared to give it their best, and that's just what we did.

"The competition was stiff and the competitive energy was palpable. The first event involved Deadlifts and Double-unders. Audra and Grayson "went to town" on the double-unders, while Ryan and Lindsey did the heavy deadlifts. We didn't place as well as hoped because the Deadlift/ Double-under ratio was 4/1. The second event, "The 100's", was comprised of a laundry list of exercises, where the team had to complete 100 repetitions before moving onto the next exercise: 100 Thrusters, 100 push ups, 100 Hang Cleans, 100 Ring Dips, and 100 Overhead Squats. We were in the lead pack through most of the exercises until we reached ring dips. Unfortunately we had

some issues with the standards provided for the movement, which resulted in many missed reps. The third event was twenty-four minutes of rowing for maximum number of meters. The High Plains Lifters finished 300 meters behind the first place team...a solid performance."

"Even though we did not place within the top eight to compete in California, we had a BIG time. It was our first CrossFit competition and we pushed ourselves harder than ever before. We also learned something about our gym that





# **Production Stats** & June Allowables

The Texas average rig count as of May 14 was 639, representing about 44 percent of all active land rigs in the United States. In the last 12 months, total Texas reported production was 345 million barrels of oil and 7.4 trillion cubic feet of natural gas.

Texas natural gas production represents approximately 29 percent of total U.S. natural gas demand.

The Commission's estimated final production for March 2010 is 30,289,102 barrels of crude oil and 582,365,393 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas well gas.

The Commission derives final production numbers by multiplying the preliminary March 2010 production totals of 28,764,579 barrels of crude oil and 518,949,735 Mcf of gas well gas by a production adjustment factor of 1.0530 for crude oil and 1.1222 for gas well gas. (These production totals do not include

casinghead gas or condensate.) Texas natural gas storage reported to the Commission for April 2010 was 359,156,678 Mcf compared to 343,769,899 Mcf in April 2009. The May 2010 gas storage estimate is 365,270,868 Mcf.

The Texas Railroad Commission's Oil and Gas Division set initial June 2010 natural gas production allowables for prorated fields in the state to meet market demand of 14,560,118 Mcf (thousand cubic feet). In setting the initial June 2010 allowables, the Commission used historical production figures from previous months, producers' demand forecasts for the coming month, and adjusted the figures based on well capability.

These initial allowables will be adjusted after actual production for June 2010 is reported.

# **Chooling Sunscreen To Prevent Burning**

Whether or not to use sunscreen is no longer the message. For most, we know we need sunscreen to help prevent skin damage, premature aging, and skin cancer. But, choosing and using sunscreen appropriately is still a

With the myriad of choices in sunscreen products, how can we know what the best choices are for healthy skin protection? Here are some guidelines that may help. First, consider the SPF (sun protection factor) - the ingredient that protects you from UVB radiation (those rays that cause sunburning). Choose an SPF 15 or higher. An SPF 15 means it will take 15 times longer for your skin to burn than it would if you were not protected with the sunscreen. Note, however, that this SPF means that if your skin would normally turn red after 10 minutes, it will now take 150 minutes, or 2Ω dient titanium dioxide and/or zinc out of direct sunlight. Place your hours, to burn.

we also need to protect ourselves from UVA radiation

- the sun rays that penetrate more deeply and can weaken the skin's inner connective tissues and contribute to skin cancer and immune system damage. To be protected from UVA radiation requires choosing a'sunscreen product labeled broad-spectrum. which indicates that it protects the skin against UVA and UVB rays. Sunscreens —even those with the same SPF rating —can have different ingredients or different combinations of ingredients. To be important and necessary form of

sure the sunscreen protects against UVA radiation, check for any of the following common inaredients:

- benzophenones,
- oxybenzone,
- sulisobenzone, titanium dioxide,
- zinc oxide, or avobenzone

(also known as Parsol 1789). As far as the form of sunscreen, there are many - creams, lotions, ointments, sprays, gels, wax sticks, etc. Most of these forms are all fine and can be chosen on personal preference. Here are a few things that may help with your selection:

· Lotions tend to be less irritatspray-on and squeeze-bottle options that are both fine.

 Alcohol-based sunscreen the face, neck, ears, and feet. products should be avoided on children because they can cause irritation.

· Choose products that are PABA-free and contain the ingrewith sensitive skin. Litanium dioxide and zinc oxide physically deflect rather than chemically absorb ultraviolet radiation and, therefore, do not cause allergic reactions.

 Creams may work better on the face since gels can sting around the eyes.

 Lighter-textured choices may work better for those prone to acne. Just remember to apply a thick enough layer to be sure to protect yourself.

· Lip balms with sunscreen rated SPF 15 or higher are an

protection for the lips.

· Consider a water-resistant sunscreen if your activities involve water or heavy perspiration. These sunscreens stay on the skin longer even if they get wet.

 Avoid sunscreens that are combined with insect repellant. Insect repellant typically contains the chemical DEET, which is good for protection for about 8 hours and should be washed off at the end of the day. It should not be

reapplied as often as sunscreen. One of the ways we often misuse sunscreen is by not reapplying it often enough. Sunscreen should be reapplied at least every 2 hours - sooner if you towel off. We also need to use enough ing to children, but there are sunscreen. Apply sunscreen generously to all areas of exposed skin - being careful not to forget

The only exception is children under age 6 months. Infants' skin can be irritated by sunscreen. To protect your baby's skin from the sun, keep him/her in the shade, oxide for children and individuals child in light-weight, long-sleeve shirts and pants to cover their skin while avoiding over-heating. Use a wide-brimmed hat and 100 percent UV protective infant sunglasses to protect the head and developing eyes.

# **May State Sales Tax Revenues Increase**

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs today announced that the state collected \$1.78 billion in sales tax revenue in May, a 0.1 percent increase compared to May 2009.

"Total sales tax collections have met or exceeded year ago levels for a second month in a row, following 14 months of decline. This may indicate that a bottom has been reached," Combs said. "May sales tax collections from retail trade, oil and gas, and restaurant activity outpaced those of May 2009. Remittances from other sectors, however, such as construction and manufacturing, fell below last year. While over all economic conditions and sales tax revenues appear to be stabilizing, there remains a risk of further deterioration, before a sustained recovery is underway."

On Friday, Combs will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$437.3 million in June local sales tax allocations, down 0.9 percent compared to last June.



Farms are fun places - with all that fresh air, sunshine, and room to run around. But they're

also places where real work gets done. And some of that work involves equipment that can be dangerous if someone doesn't know how to be safe. Kids who live on farms really need to know what it takes to be safe. They probably help out on the farm and need to know the safety rules that can prevent injuries. According to the National Safety Council, farming is one of America's most hazardous jobs. Kids ages 10 to 14 are at high risk for injury, often because they take on a job or task that they aren't ready to handle. If you do work on a farm, listen to parents or other supervisors. Be careful where you play and don't go out to work on the farm on your own. If you're helping out, don't try to use equipment or tackle big projects if you haven't been properly trained. If there's a job you really want to do, such as driving a tractor, you'll probably have to wait until you get a little older.Safety Around EquipmentTake a look around any farm. How many different pieces of equipment do you see? And how many are bigger than you are? These machines may look pretty cool, but the bottom line is that kids should not operate farm machinery. Pickup trucks, tractors, threshers, lawn mowers, and all-terrain vehicles (ATVs) are powerful machines. But these machines and all other types of farm equipment are not safe for kids to ride on (even with an adult present), play on, or even be around, no matter whether they are in use or not. It's really easy to get thrown from a tractor, thresher, or riding mower. Here are some more tips to remember around equipment:Never ride in the back of a pickup truck or on the fender of a tractor. Never get on a tractor as an extra rider. Stay out of the path of moving equipment.Don't use electric power tools without adult supervision and always use protective equipment like gloves and

Under state law, the dollar amount of school taxes imposed on the residence homestead of a person 65 years of age or older or of the surviving spouse of such a person, if the surviving spouse was 55 years of age or older when the person died, may not be increased above the amount paid in the first year after the person turned 65, regardless of changes in tax rate or property value.

Notice of Rollback Rate: The highest tax rate the district can adopt before requiring voter approval at an 0.8921 . This election will be automatically held if the district adopts election is 0.8921 a rate in excess of the rollback rate of




