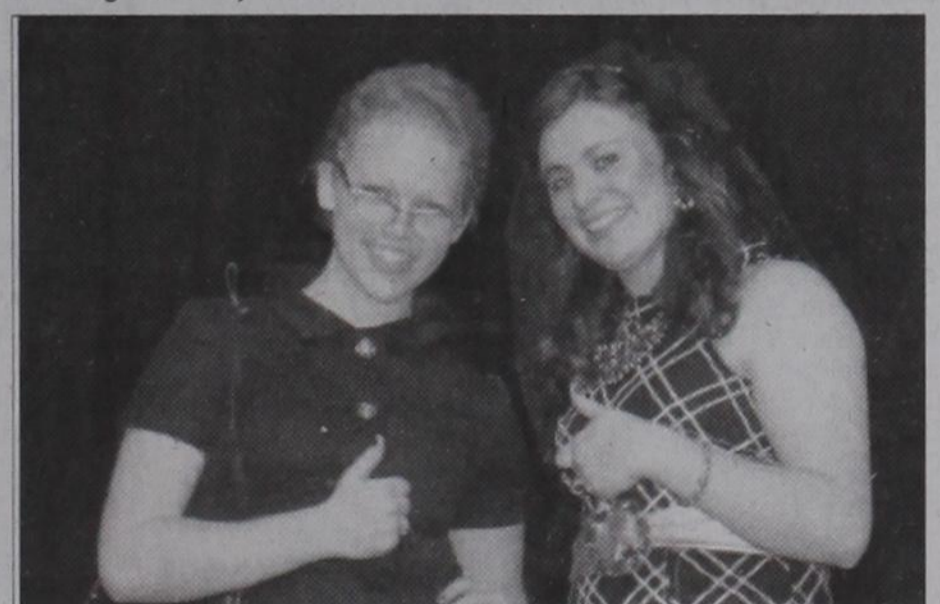

City Council Minutes Hwy. 83 Sidewalk Bids To Be Taken

FEBRUARY 21, 2011

Directors Present: Mayor, Bob McCain, Stacy McCasland, Don Rose, Barbra Koelzer, Jimmy Hill, Walter Simmons; Kristi Petit, Coordinator and Paul Arganbright, Water Supt.

Budget workshop discussion at 6:45 pm

Mayor, Bob McCain called the meeting to order at 7:05 pm.

Jimmy Hill made a motion to approve the January minutes as presented. Stacy seconded. Motion carried unanimously.

Walter Simmons motioned to approve the monthly bills as written. Seconded by Don Rose. Motion carried.

Scott Honeyfield and Michael Krusing from Parkhill, Smith, and Cooper discussed our options on improving our water. Water samples were tested from different areas and Scott reported to the Council which land should have further testing due to it's low levels of nitrates. Scott will contact a hydrogeologist to do the testing of possible well sites.

Don Rose made a motion to budget \$50,000.00 in the Water & Sewer account for engineering, research and testing. Walter seconded the motion. Motion carried unanimously.

Scott also discussed the seal coat project and gave an estimation of cost on both the North and South Seal Coat Programs. Barbra made a motion to go with Scott's recommendation of the South Seal Coat Project (Lubbock project). Stacy seconded. Motion carried unanimously.

Scott and Michael both reported on the Sidewalk project. They will send an opinion of probable costs. Bids will be accepted for a period of three weeks.

Barbra Koelzer made a motion to advertise in the paper for a swimming pool manager. Stacy seconded the motion and motion carried unanimously. Ad should run for two weeks.

Kristi reported that the EDC motioned to give 20% of hotel occupancy tax collected to the Chamber of Commerce for operating and event expenses upon the approval of the City Council. The advertising budget will remain so that the Chamber will still be allowed to approach the EDC for advertising funds for those large events that meet the HOT expenditure criteria. Stacy motioned to approve 20% of the H.O.T. funds collected to be paid to the Chamber of Commerce and distributed on a quarterly basis beginning with 1st quarter collections of 2011. Walter seconded. Motion carried unanimously.

Charles Kuntz presented the financial statement.

Paul Arganbright reported on the activities of the city. They replaced a pump at the sewer plant and a starter on another pump. He does not anticipate a need for any equipment that would be costly enough to add to the 2011-2012 Budget.

Barbra Koelzer made a motion to increase the budget for all employee salaries to include a 5% increase for the budget year 2011-2012. Stacy seconded. Motion carried unanimously.

Kristi reported on the grant application process for the pool. An acquisition of Cecil and Nancy Pierce's land is necessary for the Walking Trail project to be included in the master plan. Stacy made a motion to offer the Pierce's \$5000.00 for the .70 acre of land that is included in the Master Parks plan. Barbara seconded. Motion carried unanimously. Kristi will contact the Pierce's and make this offer.

Barbra discussed the interviews for the Library applicants. Barbra made a motion to hire Patty Brooks for the PT position at the Library. Don Rose seconded. (Continued Page 6)

When I was growing up, I don't remember anyone that lived out in the country having a TV set. Some people in town were beginning to get TV's, but the reception wasn't very good. The first one I ever watched looked a lot like people walking around in a snow-storm. Needless to say, I wasn't too impressed. Entertainment came along on occasion, in real live action. Such as what this short story is all about. I would enjoy seeing this again.

During the school year, there was always something going on to look forward to, but in the summer, there wasn't much happening.

Little did I know, pretty soon, I was going to witness a real, live, serious, horse race. A couple of neighbors who lived out north of town, each thought they had a really fast horse. After a good bit of blowing about their horses, they decided to settle the matter, once and for all!

The race was to be held on a turnrow about half a mile north of

the drive-in theater, north of town. (If you don't know where the drive-in theater was, you may have to ask somebody, who's old.)

Day 1: We left OKC early and drove to the Clarion Inn in Tupelo, MS., (birth place of Elvis Presley).

Day 2: We visited the Callaway Gardens in Pine Mountain, GA., which included a butterfly conservatory and saw the Bird of Prey demonstrations. We ate supper at the Golden's on the Square in Newnan, GA. Very unique cafeteria in a very old building with brick inside walls. 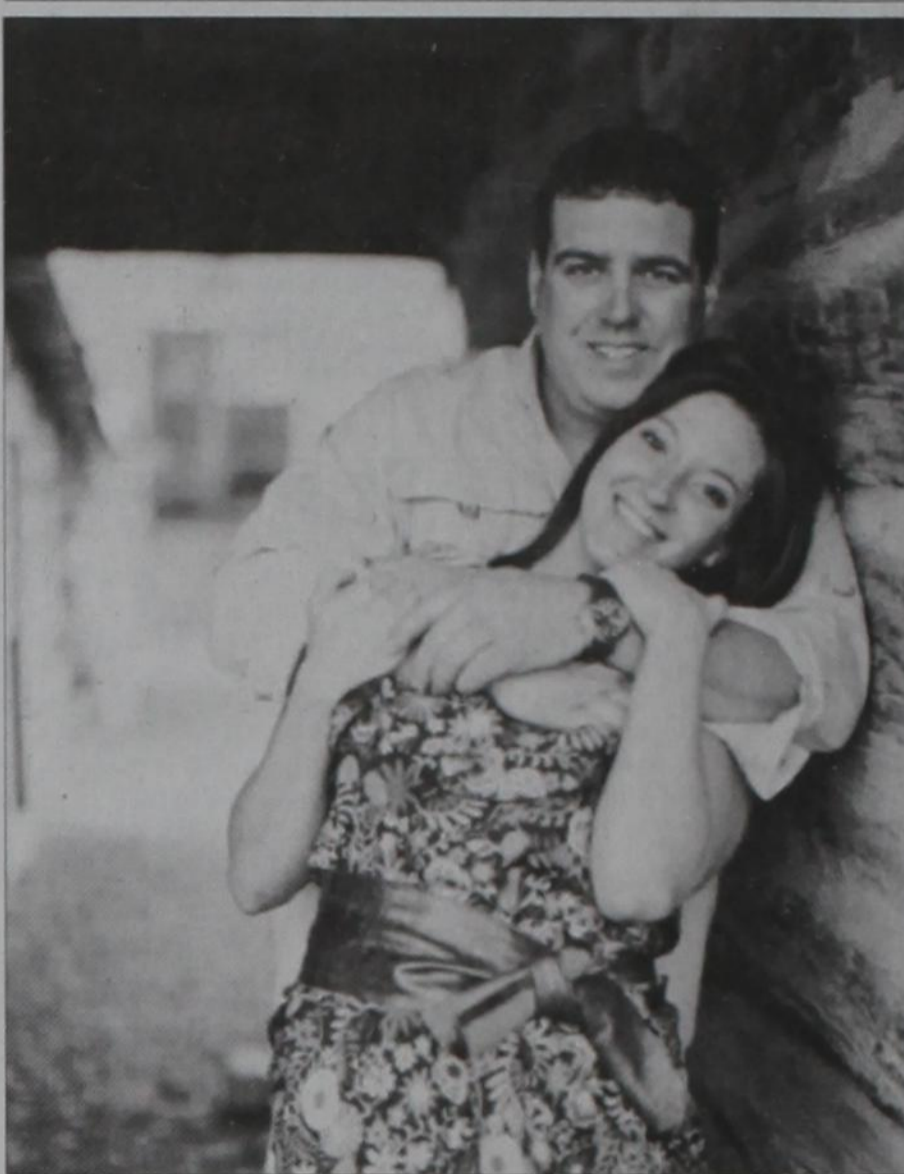

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General Requirements for Agricultural Burning

The following information is provided for your protection when conducting agricultural burning.

Main points: You are responsible for everything that happens after you start a fire.

You must not infringe upon your neighbors property or environment.

No burning during Red Flag Conditions.

You must notify the dispatch office in your area prior to burning.

The Outdoor Burning Rule sets the following general requirements for allowable outdoor burning. These requirements apply to the specific situations for which they are mentioned above. They are designed to reduce the likelihood that burning will create a nuisance, cause a hazard, or harm the environment. **The party responsible for the burn remains liable for damages, injuries or other consequences that may result from burning, even when it is carried out in compliance with these regulations.**

Burn only outside the corporate limits of a city or town, unless the incorporated city or town has an ordinance, consistent with the Texas Clean Air Act, Subchapter E, that permits burning.

Commence or continue burning only when the wind direction and other weather conditions are such that the smoke and other pollutants will not present a hazard to any public road, landing strip, or navigable water or have an adverse effect on any off-site structure containing "sensitive receptors" (a residence, business, farm building or greenhouse).

Post someone to flag traffic if at any time the burning causes or may tend to cause smoke to blow onto or across a road or highway.

Keep fires downwind of, or at least 300 feet away from, any neighboring structure that contains sensitive receptors. This requirement may be waived only with the prior written approval of whoever owns or rents the adjacent property and either resides or conducts business there.

Begin burning no earlier than one hour after sunrise, end it the same day and no later than one hour before sunset, and make sure that a responsible party is present while the burn is active and the fire is progressing. At the end of the burn, extinguish isolated residual fires or smoldering objects if the smoke they produce can be a nuisance or a traffic hazard. Don't start burning unless weather conditions are such that the smoke will dissipate (winds of a least 6 miles per; no temperature inversions) while still allowing the fire to be contained and controlled (winds no faster than 23 miles per hour). **[National Weather Service will issue a Red Flag Warning when: Winds are expected to be above 20 mph and Relative Humidity is expected to be below 15%, No Burning is allowed under these conditions.]**

Don't burn any electrical insulation, treated lumber, plastics, non-wooden construction or demolition materials, heavy oils, asphaltic materials, potentially explosive materials, chemical wastes, or items that contain natural or synthetic rubber.

Always notify the Wheeler County Sheriff's Office or Shamrock Police Dept. prior to starting burn.

Texas Penal Code Regarding Fires

**Subjects Covered: Definition of Arson
 Penalties for violating Burning Rules
 Responsibilities for results of Burning**

Section 28.02 (Arson)

(a) A person commits an offense if the person starts a fire, regardless of whether the fire continues after ignition, or causes an explosion with intent to destroy or damage:

- (1) Any vegetation, fence, or structure on open-space land; or
- (2) Any building, habitation, or vehicle;
- (A) Knowing that it is within the limits of an incorporated city or town;
- (B) Knowing that it is insured against damage or destruction;
- (C) Knowing that it is subject to a mortgage or other security interest;
- (D) Knowing that it is located on property belonging to another;
- (E) Knowing that it has located within it property belonging to another;
- (F) When the person is reckless about whether the burning or explosion will endanger the life of some individual or the safety of the property of another.

(b) It is an exception to the application of Subsection (a)(1) that the fire or explosion was a part of the controlled burning of open-space land.

Persons in violation of Texas Commission on Environmental Quality Rules for Outdoor Burning face the following penalties:

1. An offense under these rules is punishable for an individual by a fine not less than \$1,000 or more than \$50,000, confinement in the county jail for a period not to exceed 180 days, or both [Section 7.177 Texas Water Code].

2. An offense is punishable for a person other than an individual by fine of not less than \$1,000 or more than \$100,000. [Section 7.177 Texas Water Code].

3. Under 111.221 of the Texas Administrative Code, a person in violation of the Outdoor Burning Rule may be held liable for the consequences, damages, and/or injuries resulting from outdoor burning.

Section 111.221 (Responsibility for Consequences of Outdoor Burning.)

The authority to conduct outdoor burning under this regulation does not exempt or excuse any person responsible from the consequences, damages, or injuries resulting from the burning and does not exempt or excuse anyone from complying with all other applicable laws or ordinances, regulations, and orders of governmental entities having jurisdiction, even though the burning is otherwise conducted in compliance with this regulation.

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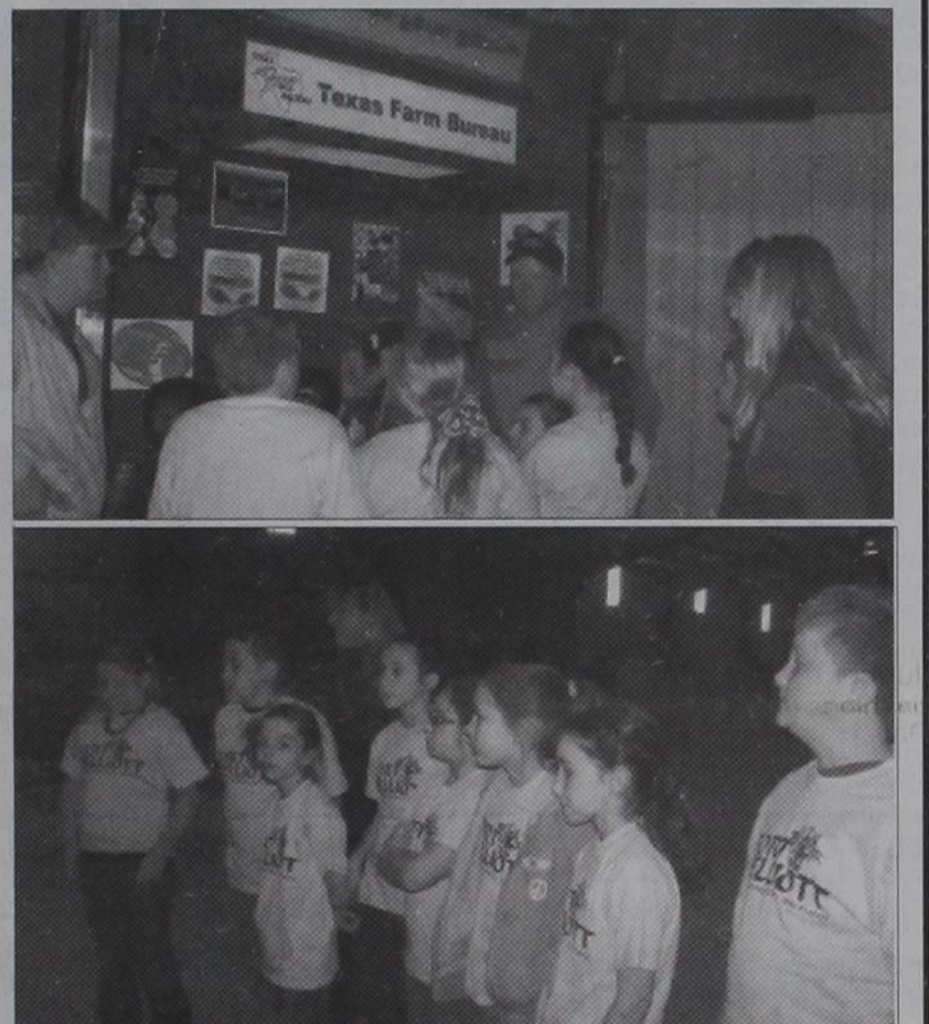

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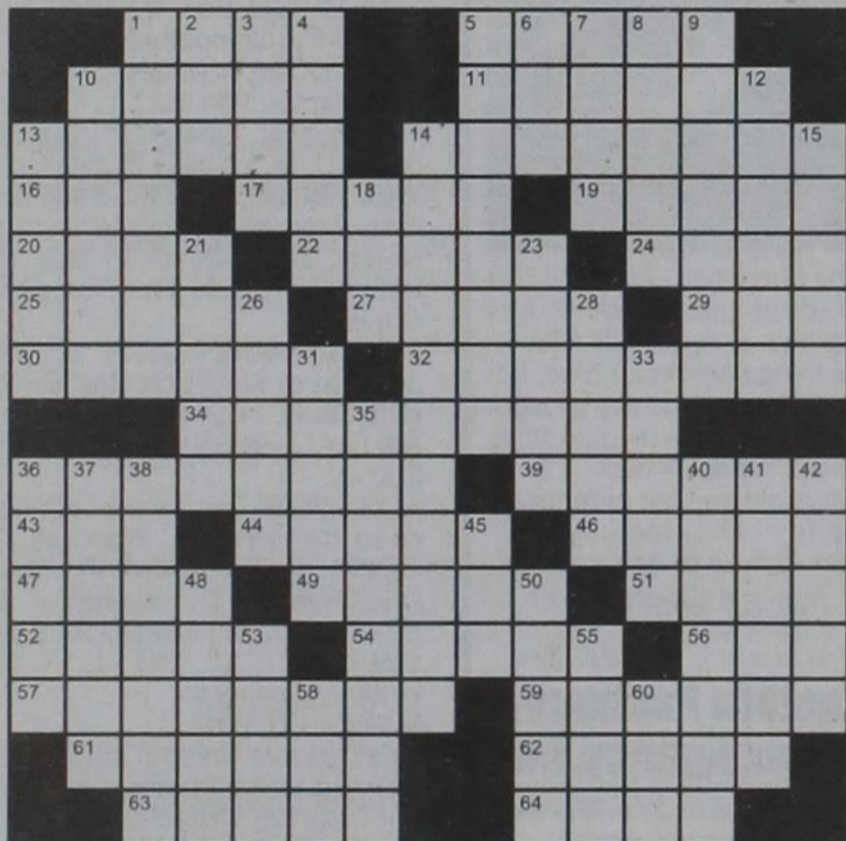

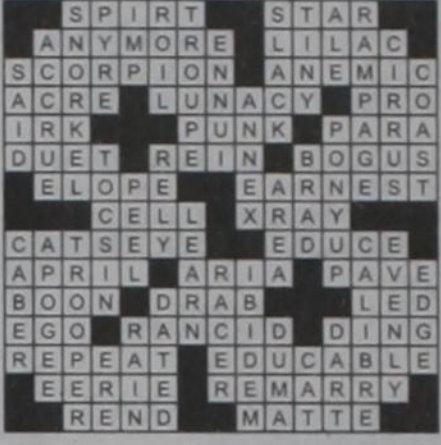
