EDC Approves Three Projects

Guests present: Toby Brooks, Buc Weatherby, and Matt Sullivan
Ben Ed Hillhouse called the meeting to order at 12:08 p.m.

Randy McCurley said an opening prayer.
Stacy McCasland motioned to approve the May minutes with corrections on stating how many voted for, against, or abstained. Cannot use the wording "all Director's present". Bob Stiles seconded. Motion passed with 6 in favor of and 0 against.

Buc Weatherby and Toby Brooks presented a Visitor's guide and a cost breakdown. Examples were presented of both Shamrock and Perryton's publication. This would be printed by the County Star News, circulated by placing them in local Motel's, Chamber and E.D.C. offices, and some local businesses. It would highlight activities in our city, special events, and local business advertisements that would be distributed twice a year. PDF files would also be available for websites.

Randy McCurley motioned to enter into a contract with County Star News for one year at an annual cost of \$9625.00 for two 6 month publications (2500 copies each edition) for a 24 page "Wheeler Area Visitors Guide" to be paid for out of the Hotel Occupancy Tax fund. The motion was seconded by Lanette Lewis. The motion passed with 6 voting for and 0 against.

Matt Sullivan presented a proposal on behalf of the Wheeler Texas Rodeo Club. They are asking for financial help to build a 30' x 40' steel building complete with a concrete slab and bathroom and kitchen areas on the rodeo grounds to be used during rodeo events. The proposal included an estimate for concrete and building supplies from Diamond A Concrete and Construction totaling \$12,925.00. Also provided in the proposal is a list of other estimated costs in the amount of \$10,000.00 for lumber, fixtures, electrical, etc.

Randy McCurley made a motion to grant \$25,000.00 out of the Hotel Occupancy Tax fund to the Chamber of Commerce for construction of the building. Stacy McCasland seconded. The motion carried with 6 voting for and 0 against.

Also presented to the Board was an estimate of costs for a new Pharmacy, provided by Crystal McEntire, listing cost of utility work and land purchase. Crystal had addressed the Board in the May meeting about her plans to build a new Hyland's Pharmacy.

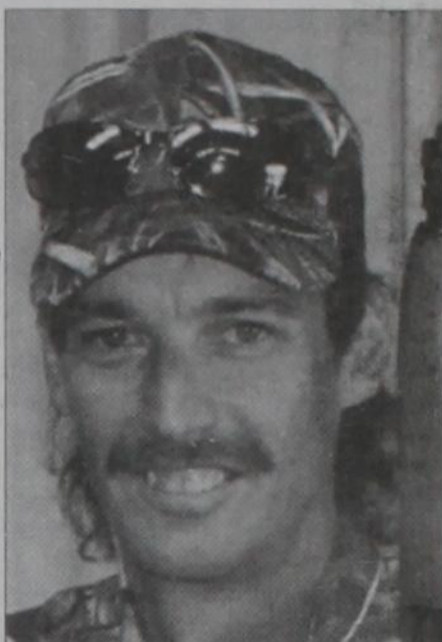
Kent Gaines Buried At Wheeler July 13

Preston Glazner Services Held July 12

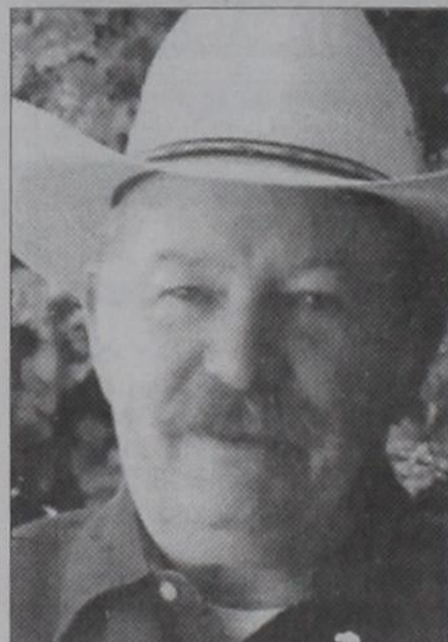

Texas NRCS Offers Additional Funding Following Wildfires

Landowners affected by wildfires in the West Texas region can apply for financial assistance through the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) for range deferral of all livestock grazing throughout the growing season, plant health concerns, and cross fencing assistance. EQIP is a continuous sign-up program and NRCS will be accepting applications for current funding assistance through July 29, 2011. In order to apply, landowners must visit the local NRCS office in the USDA Service Center in their county to fill out an application. Applications will be ranked and those approved for funding will be offered an EQIP contract. Mickey Black, NRCS assistant state conservationist said, "NRCS is prepared to assist landowners with prescribed grazing for deferral to rejuvenate plant health and prevent soil erosion due to drought and the effects from wildfires." "We want to provide assistance that will enable landowners and livestock producers to accelerate the recovery of the health and vigor of affected grazing land," he said. Black suggests landowners consult with their local NRCS district conservationist to develop a conservation plan, which can be an effective strategy for pasture and rangeland recovery and mitigating the effects of the dry conditions that Texas is experiencing. Wildlife habitat also can be impacted by wildfires and NRCS can provide technical and financial assistance in re-establishing the habitats for desired species. For further assistance in evaluating your land and planning practices to address concerns following a wildfire, contact your local NRCS office or Soil and Water Conservation District. For more information about EQIP, visit Texas' NRCS website at tx.nrcs.usda.gov/programs/eqip.

Texas NRCS Receives Funding For Panhandle Water Conservation

The USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) has announced additional funding in the Panhandle and South Plains regions to enhance natural resources on Texas agricultural working lands. Additional funds are now available through the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) to address water conservation concerns through the Agricultural Water Enhancement Program (AWEP) and the Ogallala Aquifer Initiative. "AWEP and the Ogallala Aquifer Initiative are both voluntary programs and provide financial and technical assistance to farmers and ranchers to improve water conditions on their agricultural land," said Salvador Salinas, NRCS state conservationist for Texas. "With water supplies at an all time low, this is just one more way agriculture can help conserve its use." AWEP and the Ogallala Aquifer Initiative promote ground and surface water conservation by helping farmers and ranchers implement agricultural water enhancement activities. Projects address water quantity resource concerns in the 49 Panhandle and South Plains counties within the Aquifer area. Types of water enhancement activities include water quantity or water conservation plan development; irrigation system improvements and irrigation efficiency enhancements; water conservation

should contact their local NRCS office for technical and financial assistance and learn how program options can benefit their needs.

The LPC initiative is a local and regional working partnership through the NRCS EQIP program focused on assisting producers in

conservation plan development to help maintain, establish, improve and manage habitat for the LPC.

This program provides an opportunity for cropland and rangeland producers in the designated priority counties to implement practices for improved Lesser Prairie-Chicken habitat and grazing conditions on rangeland," said Manuel DeLeon, NRCS wildlife biologist in Lubbock.

"This current drought situation may have some farmers and ranchers thinking about critical areas that have been impacted by dry conditions, high-winds and wildfires. For example, these funds may be used by producers to plant native grasses on critical cropland areas to minimize erosion and help improve LPC habi-

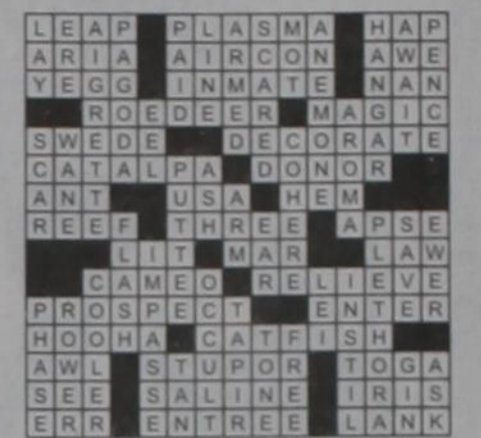
