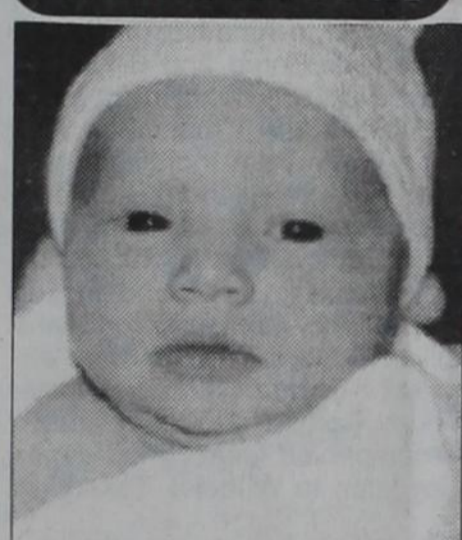

Advocate Speaks on Brother's Behalf on ACS Site

David Gilmer with his sister Julie Shields, who works to educate the public about the dangers of tobacco, wants everyone to know that spit tobacco is not a

safe alternative to smoking. She knows because her brother, David Gilmer II, died of oral cancer caused by spit tobacco. "When David was sick and unable to talk, I promised him I would be his voice and I would do my best to educate others of the extreme dangers they face when they use spit tobacco," said Julie. In 2006, David's story won a Texas Media Award when reporter Katy McGarr of the Canadian Record wrote about his life and death. David's story, as it appeared in the Record, can be found at www.cancer.org. To access it, search for the name "David Gilmer" or "Julie Shields". David was a lifelong user of spit tobacco until his diagnosis with tongue cancer in 2004. Despite chemotherapy, radiation treatments and radical surgery to remove his tongue, upper and lower cheekbone, floor of his mouth and part

of his throat, the cancer took his life on July 26, 2005. "People may think they are only hurting themselves by dipping," said Tonya Finsterwald, David's oldest sister. "Although the tremendous pain he suffered through has ended, ours goes on daily. This is not something ANYONE would want to put their loved ones through. I know if David could have known the sad-

Graveside services were held Tuesday, April 17, 2007, in Wheeler Cemetery, Wheeler, Texas, with Pastor James Baker officiating.

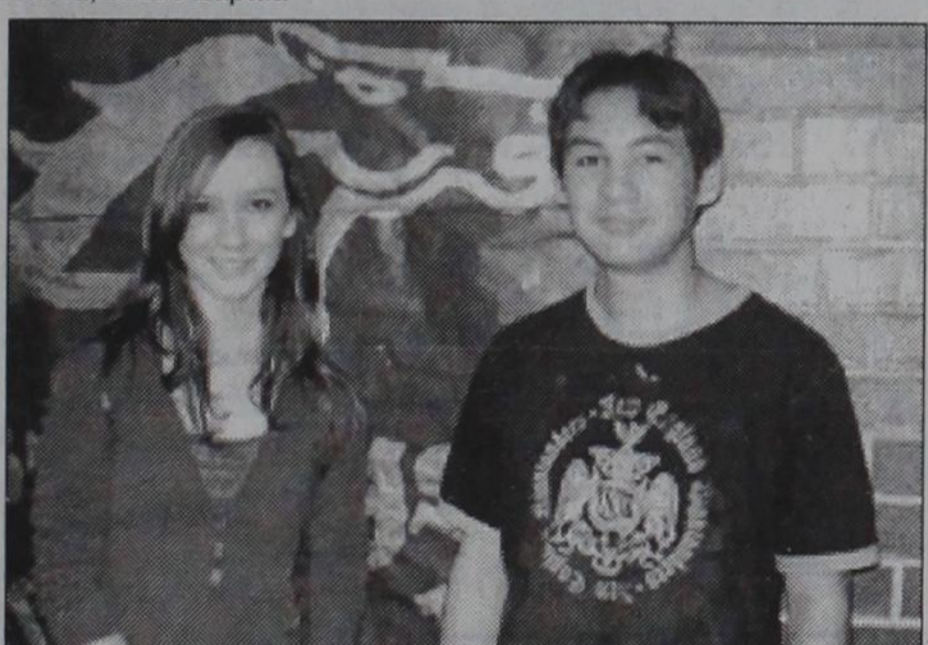
Burial was in the Wheeler Cemetery, Wheeler, Texas, under the direction of Wright Funeral Home, Wheeler, Texas.

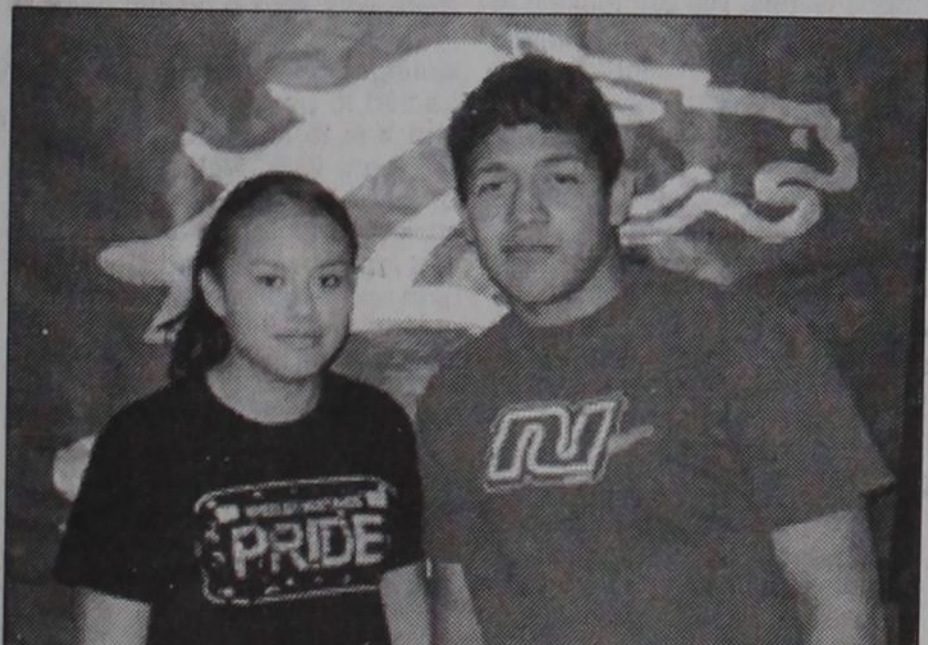

ness his death would bring to the lives of his loved ones, he would have stopped dipping a long time ago. It doesn't just hurt the dipper, it hurts ALL those who hold him dear, including family and friends, not to mention a little girl who will grow up with only brief memories of her Daddy who cherished her more than life itself. In the photo accompanying this story, David is pictured with his sister, Julie Shields, at Carlsbad Caverns just a few weeks prior to his death. He wanted to go to the mountains one last time with his family. Following a trip to Red River, though very ill and exhausted, he wanted to take his daughter and nieces to see the caverns and insisted on walking through the whole thing. "He definitely lived life to the fullest even

until the last breath," said Finsterwald. David graduated from Briscoe High School in 1991 and was a toolpusher in the oilfield at the time of his death. He was married to Shannon Gilmer of Wheeler. They have one daughter, Adley. David's parents are David and Winnie Gilmer of Briscoe. His sisters and their families are Tonya, Bill, Randy and Brandon Finsterwald of Mobeetie and Julie, John, Maddie and Katilin Shields of Canadian. A fund is still set up at the First State Bank of Mobeetie to assist with Adley's College Education. It is under the name of "Tonya Finsterwald for Adley Gilmer."

We have started a new series of Sunday evening sermons that will continue until around the end of the school year (in other words, for another 6-8 weeks or so) that we are calling a Song Book Series. We are looking at a few songs and the songwriters to find their motivation for writing that song. Not only do these songs address things in scripture, but often also address things that they were facing in their life at the moment they wrote the song. What we also discover is that the motivations that they had are very similar to the emotions we sometimes face.

For example, the song, "Precious Lord, Take My Hand," was written by the blues and gospel songwriter, Thomas A. Dorsey, back in the 1930s. It is a beautiful and meaningful song that shows the person from a rock-bottom position desperately crying out to the Lord to save him. There are scriptural considerations, of course, such as when Jesus reaches out his hand to save Peter from drowning after he came out to walk on the water (Matthew 14:30-31) or recognition that God's right hand sustains me (Psalm 18:35). But, there was also a pivotal event in Dorsey's life that inspired this writing. Dorsey had been contracted to perform in St. Louis and had to leave his 8-month pregnant wife, Nettie, back in Chicago. While gone, he received a telegram informing him that his wife had died in childbirth and that the baby boy had also died. Understandably, Dorsey went through a period of depression after this. It was during this time of depression that he wrote these words: "When my way groweth drear, precious Lord linger near, when my life is almost gone; Hear my cry, hear my call, hold my hand lest I fall; take my hand, precious Lord, lead me home."

cost-based reimbursed for critical access hospitals, in our case there would be a negative financial impact for 18-24 months. We would have to have adequate funds to completely cover costs for that time period. After much discussion and questions and answers between the Board, Ms. Fagan Cook and Ms. Whitley consensus was that this would not be a feasible option for Parkview Hospital at this time. Ms. Fagan Cook was instructed to relay this information to our physicians. Ms. Whitley left the meeting at 7:20 p.m.

Ms. Stiles made a presentation regarding the renewal of our Level IV Trauma designation. The process to reapply takes one year beginning June 1, 2007. In order to reapply there has to be support from the Board of Directors and all care givers involved. We have had some difficulty in getting the support of local physicians to serve as Trauma and Emergency Room Director. Ms. Stiles reported that she had talked with Kim Petty, RN who is the State Director for Trauma Designation and Ms. Petty stated that the director does not have to be a local physician, but any qualified physician may serve in that position. After discussion James Batton made a motion to give the letter of support for redesignation and to proceed with the process. Sue Chandler seconded the motion and the motion carried unanimously. Ms. Stiles left the meeting at 8:00 p.m.

Chairman Tipps returned to Agenda item 2 and James Batton made a motion to approve the minutes of the March 2007 meeting as presented. Dale Garner seconded the motion and the motion carried unanimously.

Thomas Helton made a motion to approve payment of the bills. Sue Chandler seconded the motion and the motion carried unanimously.

ter considerable discussion, Mr. Garner amended the motion to postpone the decision until the May meeting. Seconder of the

motion agreed and the item will be on the May agenda.

Ms. Fagan Cook reported that the electric cook stove in the kitchen is not in proper working order and cannot be safely repaired any more. Request made for a new stove to replace this one that has been in service for 23 years. James Batton made a motion to purchase a new commercial range. Motion seconded by Sue Chandler and the motion carried unanimously.

Medical Records Coordinator Sheryl Lane has requested new dictation equipment. Three bids were discussed. Dale Garner made a motion to purchase the recommended equipment. Sue Chandler seconded the motion and the motion carried unanimously.

Ms. Fagan Cook reported that the Lason Imaging scanner used to archive records is no longer functional. The drum has been replaced four times and the scanner is no longer adequate. Bids were reviewed and Sue Chandler made a motion to purchase the

Fujitsu scanner. Thomas Helton seconded the motion and the motion carried unanimously.

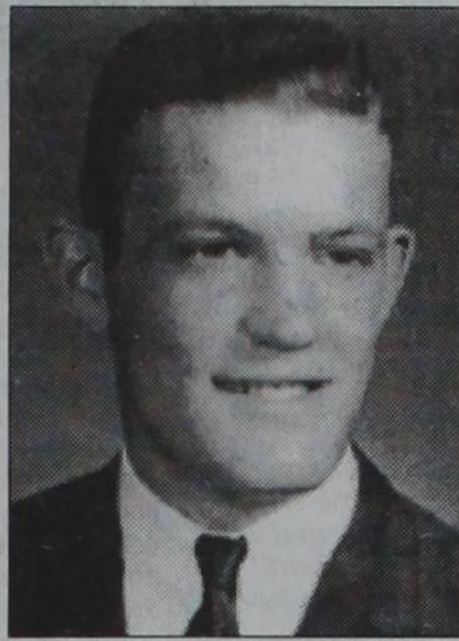

Old Mobeetie Association Board Minutes Mar. 8 - April 6

March 8, 2007
7:00 P.M.

The Old Mobeetie Texas Association met March 8, 2007. The meeting was called to order by President Joe VanZandt at 7:00 p.m. Louise Hogan opened the meeting with a prayer.

The minutes of the February meeting were read by Secretary Bobbye Hill. Joe declared the minutes approved as corrected.

Melba Corcoran gave the February treasurer's report. Joe announced that he had taken out an advancement loan for \$100,000.00 from First State Bank of Mobeetie to be used for school building expenses until the first T-note matured March 31, 2007. Jim Hill's motion to approve the February treasurer's report was seconded by Maurita Stribling. Motion carried.

Melba gave the visitors report. In February, the museum had 144 visitors with three from out of state. Louise gave the web site report. The web site had 56,084 requests with a daily average of 2003 requests. Montserant was a new country making a request.

Melba gave the volunteer hour report. There were 335 volunteer hours worked in February.

Melba Corcoran gave the Col-

lection Management Report. 22,290 work sheets have been completed and 42,237 items have been cataloged.

Old Business

The Music Festival was discussed. Dutch had started selling ads in Pampa. Bobbye and Ada Lou Lester are working on the T-shirt and have an idea at an artist.

The Hoe Down was discussed. Tonya Finsterwald has sent out a confirmation request to Marc Ferguson. Ada suggested that Lance Buzzard from Lipscomb, who is a buffalo hunter reenactor, be contacted to set up an exhibit.

Joe announced that the Grantham firm had finished the financial audit. Copies were inspected.

Joe discussed the insulation on the interior walls of the school for noise control and to save energy when heating or air conditioning is turned off in parts of the school building when not in use. Previous meetings discussed insulating the exterior walls and it was decided it was not practical to do so. Bill Finsterwald made a motion to insulate all interior walls, Dale Corcoran seconded and motion carried.

Joe discussed insurance for the building. Joe thought the association had liability insurance since the insurance agent had said he would just add the school building to our existing liability policy. Bobbye stated that the Association had property insurance on the buildings only, as we could not afford liability insurance on a budget of \$24,000.00 for total operations. Maurita Stribling read the policy and it was only for property insurance on the Jail and Lodge buildings. Maurita will research the liability insurance cost. Bill Finsterwald made the motion to purchase Builder's Risk Insurance in the amount of \$750,000.00. Ada Lester seconded the motion and it carried.

Old windows and interior doors that will not be used because they are too narrow for ADA requirements were discussed. It was decided to put these in Lyndon Loyd's auction on March 24.

The group agreed to accept an old washing machine and a garden-type plow from Louise Hogan.

Joe discussed the water situation for the Mobeetie school building and for the camper hook-ups on the museum grounds, as well as routine visitors. Melba stated that Texas law required treated water must be delivered to all camper and RV hookups. Joe stated that the plumber said he could put a chlorine injector on our water well systems. Discussion was also had about putting in a water line from the Mobeetie city water line near Highway 152, west of the Cowboy Oasis. This issue will be decided at a later meeting.

Joe announced the low bid, from three that were received, for installing 5/8" sheetrock and tape and texture on the school building was \$26,665.00 from Denman Building Products, Ltd. Dale Corcoran made the motion to accept the bid from Denman, which was seconded by Jim Hill. Motion carried.

Joe VanZandt distributed papers relating to the costs and estimates for the school project and the audited financial report of the museum's financial records for the year 2006.

Members addressed concerns and expressed their opinions on the progress of the grade school project thus far.

Joe asked that the bylaws be updated and inquired about the status of the history book.

Melba Corcoran made a motion to give Joe VanZandt a vote of confidence to run the project as he sees fit. Dutch Elliott seconded the motion. Voting for the motion were board members, Louise Hogan, Maurita Stribling, Dale Corcoran, Melba Corcoran, Bill Finsterwald and Dutch Elliott. Those abstaining from the vote were Bobbye Hill, Jim Hill and Ada Lester. The motion carried.

The Red River War exhibit, which is for the Mobeetie school building, was discussed. Joe stressed that the exhibit would be a group effort and encouraged input from all concerned.

Ray Dixon, an attorney from the Underwood Law Firm in Amarillo, Texas, was a guest at the meeting at the request of OMTA president, Joe VanZandt. Bobbye made a motion to hire Ray Dixon for legal advice and to write a legal opinion on business affairs of the association. Bill seconded the motion and it carried.

Ray Dixon stated he had reviewed bylaws of the Association; minutes of board meetings from September, 2006, through February, 2007, and correspondence with Trustees of the Sybil B. Harrington Trust. He stated that Harrington Trustees granted funds for "the restoration of the Old Mobeetie school building (as proposed)." Dixon further stated that he did not find any evidence that the Association or its directors were failing to exercise due diligence or failing to act as good stewards of the Association's financial resources or act in bad faith or in a grossly negligent manner in managing the remodeling project or accounting for the Harrington funds. Ray Dixon further stated that we find the association's directors are focused and passionate about its mission, and have promptly and fully responded to any requests from the

Harrington Living Trust for information concerning expenditures of the Harrington funds. Nearly every expenditure on the remodeling project and all major decisions concerning materials, plans and specifications have been brought to the full board by the building committee for consideration, discussed in detail at the Board meetings and voted upon by the directors.

The Old Mobeetie Texas Association met in a Special Meeting, March 30, 2007, to discuss progress and impending decisions to be made on the Old Mobeetie Grade School project. The meeting was called to order by President Joe VanZandt at 3:00 p.m.

Members present were Ada Lou Lester, Dale and Melba Corcoran, Maurita Stribling, Dutch Elliott, Joe and Janie VanZandt, Bill and Tonya Finsterwald and Susan Lohberger. Guests included Adley Gilmer, Jimmy Davis, Project Carpenter and Charlie Martin, electrician. Board members absent were Louise Hogan, Bernice Hefley, Jimmy Hill and Bobbye Hill.

Members reviewed a letter from Underwood Attorneys and Counselors at Law which discussed questions arising in the March 7, 2007, meeting.

President Joe VanZandt reviewed the financial schedule for the project. Currently, expenses are right under \$100,000. Joe discussed the Work and Funds Schedule in detail.

Wood trim for the building was discussed. After looking into refinishing the current trim and doors, it was found to be cost-prohibitive. Tony Daly of Jenkins Doors and Windows called about doors measuring 36" x 7" they had in storage. They are solid fir doors, never picked up by a previous client, and Jenkins will sell them to the Old Mobeetie Texas Association for \$100 each.

Handicap accessibility was discussed for the exterior doors. The group discussed the installation of automatic metal doors at a cost of approximately \$9,000 versus wood doors (one narrow and one wide) with an estimated cost of \$1,500.

The transoms above the interior doors will have to be reconstructed and will not be functional. This will cost \$195 each. Old doors, frames and transoms will be used on the 2 east doors. The rest will be new.

The group contemplated staining the trim versus painting it. Although the stained woodwork would be 30% more expensive than paint, stain was decided upon due to its look and durability.

Discussion turned to cabinets and the option of having them continue all the way to the ceilings in the rooms for additional storage. Fans for the rooms was also discussed as was recessed lighting. The group tentatively decided on beige canisters.

The group compared appliances for the kitchen. Circle N in Amarillo offered two display stovetops at substantial savings. Photos and specifications of the refrigerators were shown. Double-oven options were reviewed. The group liked the idea of putting in two self-cleaning ovens side-by-side with warming drawers underneath both. Also discussed was the microwave and oven vent.

The future of the Fort Elliott flagpole was discussed with Maurita motioning to table the discussion. This was seconded by Ada.

The water system was also discussed. Current plans are to run a 2" line from Highway 152 to the jail grounds. The wells will be used to water the grounds. About 3,800 ft. of pipe will be needed for the project at a cost of about \$60/ft. Motion made by Dutch to go with city water. Bill seconded and the motion carried.

A motion was made by Bill to place underground electricity to the building. Dutch made a second and the motion carried.

Floor covering was discussed, but not decided upon.

A motion was made by Maurita to go with the appliances picked out earlier in the meeting. Dutch seconded the motion. Voting for were Maurita Stribling, Ada Lou Lester, Bill Finsterwald and Melba

Corcoran. Dale Corcoran abstained.

Melba made a motion to go with a 3ft. & a 2 ft. fir door in the front and another pair in the back. The smaller front door will have vertical glass. The transom will remain. Motion seconded by Bill and carried unanimously.

Maurita made a motion to stain the woodwork. Seconded by Dale and motion carried.

Meeting adjourned.

Special Called Meeting

The Old Mobeetie Texas Association met April 6, 2007, in a Special Called Meeting. Meeting was called to order by president Joe VanZandt at 3:30 p.m. The main purpose of the meeting was to make some decisions on cabinets in the kitchen, as Jim Davis is ready to start on them. He is caught up on work in the building until the roof is completed.

Discussion was held on arrangement of appliances in the kitchen and how the cabinets would be arranged. Melba made a motion that Jim Davis put a bank of drawers on each side of the sink on the west wall and around the perimeter where they will work and that slide-out shelves be put in base cabinets and adjustable shelves be put in the upper cabinets. Maurita Stribling seconded the motion and it carried. Discussion was held about possibly needing a 4-foot vent hood over the 3-foot cook top. Joe is to check into this situation.

Discussion was held about a dishwasher and most of the group thought it was needed.

Discussion was held about locations for the refrigerator, ovens and warming drawers located under each oven. Louise Hogan seconded the motion and it carried.

Discussion was held about awarding the floorcovering job to S. & S. Carpet. They submitted a bid based on using very high-quality products for both carpet and tile. Dutch Elliott made a motion to award the job to S. & S. Carpet with their use of Media J0062 and to use the magazine pattern 62204. Tile selections from S & S. will be made at a later date. Melba Corcoran seconded the motion. The motion carried with Dale Corcoran abstaining.

Discussion was held about the floor in the school exhibit room. Maurita questioned about how the old original floor would look. Jim Davis said that after the repair job, it would look nice after it was sanded and refinished. It was decided to continue with our earlier decision to not carpet it.

Joe announced that Parsley's were working on the trim around the fascia and soffit. They will start on the roof when the trim is completed, which should be sometime next week.

The exterior door situation was discussed. We can use a 3-foot door and a 2-foot door in each of the 5-foot openings (front doors and rear auditorium). The 3-foot doors will be equipped with the push bars and handles to satisfy ADA requirements. This will eliminate the need for the very expensive electric pushbutton doors. The 3-foot doors will cost \$100, while the 2-foot doors will be special ordered along with the outside stage door. Maurita made a motion that we use matching solid wood doors with the 2-foot door to be fixed in the front doorway, while the rear auditorium doors would both operate so that things wider than 3 feet can enter that doorway. Dutch Elliott seconded the motion and it carried.

The meeting adjourned. Those attending were: Nathan Lancaster, George Kilcrease, Bill Finsterwald, Bernice Hefley, Louise Hogan, Joe VanZandt, Dutch Elliott, Maurita Stribling, Jim and Theresa Davis and Dale and Melba Corcoran.

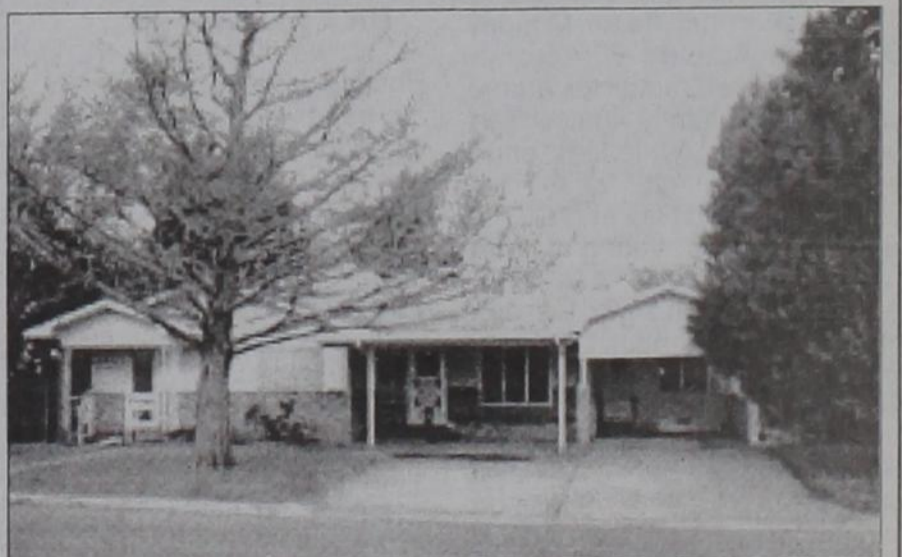

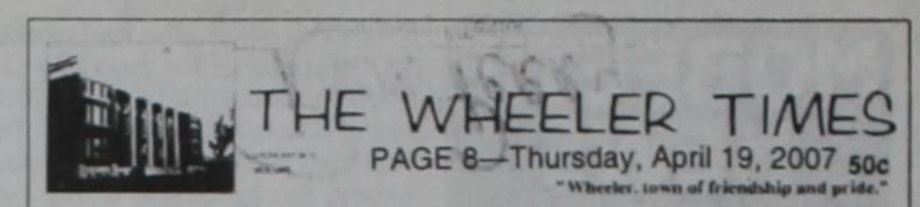

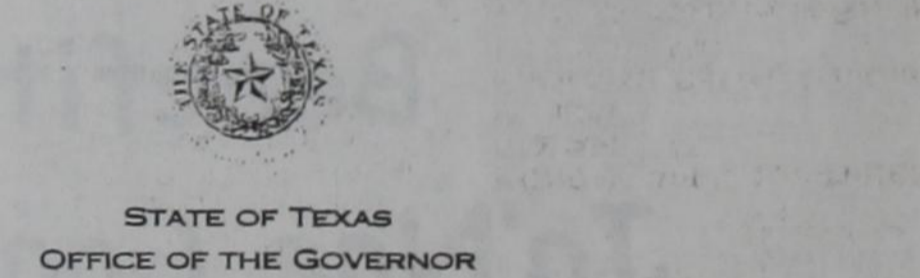
AGGIES UNITE FOR DISTINCTIVE TRADITION

Muster honors the memories of A&M men and women whose deaths prevent them from answering Roll Call at this year's Muster. The Roll Call is a roster compiled of all former and current students who have died over the past year. As each name is called, a friend or family member will answer "Here!" symbolizing that their memory lives on in the hearts of Aggies everywhere. Muster is more than just a ceremony; it is also an annual way for Aggies to renew the loyalty and unity which constitute the foundation of their friendship for each other as well as their love and devotion for their school.
