Mustangs 45-14 Victors Over Bucks



Taking advantage of two White Deer fumbles, the Wheeler Mustangs built a 12-0 lead at the end of the first quarter and rolled to an impressive 45-14 victory over the visiting White Deer Bucks last Friday night.

The win upped the Mustangs record to 2-1 and with the open date this week, the Mustangs have two weeks to get ready for their district opener against the Phillips Blackhawks.

Quarterback Steven Snapp and fullback Darren Grimes

led the Mustangs offensive show as Snapp ran for a couple of TD's and passed for two more and Grimes gouged out 94 yards and 2 touchdowns in 22 rugged trips up the middle.

Grimes bolted up the middle from 7 yards out for the Mustangs first six pointer at

8:32 of the first quarter. The inside running game of the Mustangs was devastating most of the game.

The hapless Bucks fumbled at the White Deer 17 after the Mustangs initial score and Larry Trevino recovered for the horses to set up Wheeler's second TD. Snapp passed to

SAUNDRA MEEK RESIGNS

Saundra Meek, who has been associated with West Texas State University for almost 20 years, has announced her resignation as dean of student affairs.

Meek has resigned effective October 15 for personal and business reasons. She informed members of the staff in the Office of Student Affairs and other related areas of her decision during a morning meeting on Tuesday, Sept. 13. "First I'm going to rest," said Meek. "There are a lot of things I've let go over the years that I want to pay some attention to."

Members of the administration will advertise the position nationally and a committee of WTSU administrators, faculty and staff members will be appointed to evaluate the applicants and choose a new dean of student affairs, said Dr. Richard Moseley, WTSU executive vice president. The committee will include six persons.

Meek, a native of Wheeler, enrolled at WTSU following her graduation from Briscoe High School. She earned a Bachelor of Science degree in 1963. After teaching at public schools at Clayton, N.M., Briscoe and Highland Park independent School District in Amarillo, Meek returned to WTSU where she earned a master's degree in education in 1969.

She also worked in testing and counseling services while working on the degree. She served as assistant dean of student life for women from 1969 until 1972 when she was appointed associate dean of student life for women.

In 1980 she became dean of student affairs. She supervises residence hall activities for students in the 12 residence halls at WTSU. Activities Center, housing and other student life activities.

"I'm leaving with really good feelings about everything," she said. "My experience here has been the nearest thing I've ever done. It's been so good for me and to me. It's difficult to leave the position I'm in because it has been so good."

Meek said she plans to remain actively involved with

"In the years that Saundra Meek has been working in student affairs, both as dean of women and more recently as dean of student affairs, she has always demonstrated a deep interest in students and their problems and has given dedicated and positive leadership to the development of all campus activities pertaining to our students," said Dr. Gail Shannon, WTSU president.

"We shall miss her contributions, but do extend our best wishes as she moves forward to other plans," he said.

During a reception during the 1982 spring semester, residence hall students, directors and other staff members praised Meek for her dedication to the students and her work toward improving activities and student life.

"She has been an exceptionally good person to work with and has made exceptional contributions to WTSU," said Moseley. "It's with a great deal of regret that we accept her resignation."

"The strength of WT lies with the people and I feel so blessed and fortunate to have worked with many of them," said Meek. "I feel good about what I'm doing. I think this is the right time for myself and the university."

TWO DIE IN SEPARATE ACCIDENTS IN AREA

A one-car accident Saturday morning near Briscoe resulted in the death of Alicia Kay Johnson from Elk City, Okla. Julie Ann Cook, also of Elk City, is in Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo recovering from injuries she received in the wreck.

Miss Johnson, 20, was the driver of a Toronado; she lost

control of the vehicle "20 miles south of Canadian". The car rolled, throwing the 19 year-old passenger, Julie Cook, out; the auto landed on it's top with the driver pinned

with her head resting on the pavement. Miss Cook was wandering about the scene following the accident.

The Wheeler Volunteer Ambulance was called to the scene, along with the Briscoe and Wheeler Volunteer Firemen. Wheeler's "Jaws of Life" were used in the removal of Miss Johnson from the wreckage.

The victims of the wreck were brought to Wheeler's Parkview Hospital where they were treated and transferred to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

Alicia received head and internal injuries and was assisted in breathing during the trip; the heart stopped 10 minutes from Nwth and CPR was started. She was revived at Nwth, but was pronounced dead a few minutes later. Alicia was unconscious when discovered and did not gain consciousness.

Julie received back injuries and a broken ankle in the accident; the Shamrock Ambulance was called to carry her

For instance, the 4-H shooting project attracts numerous youngsters each year who are interested in learning to shoot and observe gun safety.

Livestock projects give youngsters a chance to be responsible for an animal and enter stock shows where they learn competitiveness and sportsmanship.

4-H'ers can even learn to make their own clothes through clothing projects.

Besides projects, other activities such as the share - the - fun give youngsters a chance to participate in organized recreation. Members in 4-H can go on trips, take tours of interesting and educational places, and help finance their college education with scholarships awarded through 4-H.

Boosting the 4-H program is the private sector which provides great resources of money, personnel and materials for the advancement of 4-H. The many business and industrial leaders who support 4-H give significant testimony that 4-H is a valuable educational program for America's youth.

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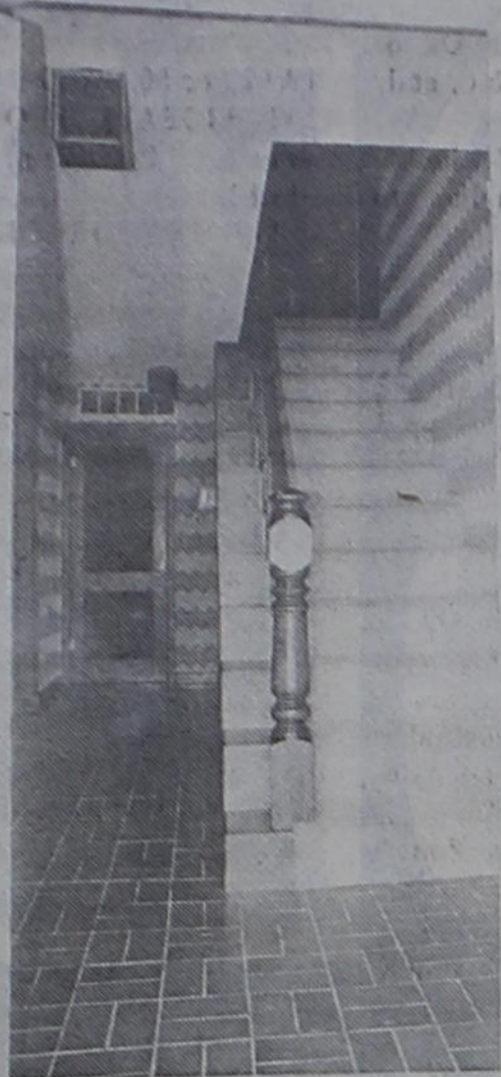

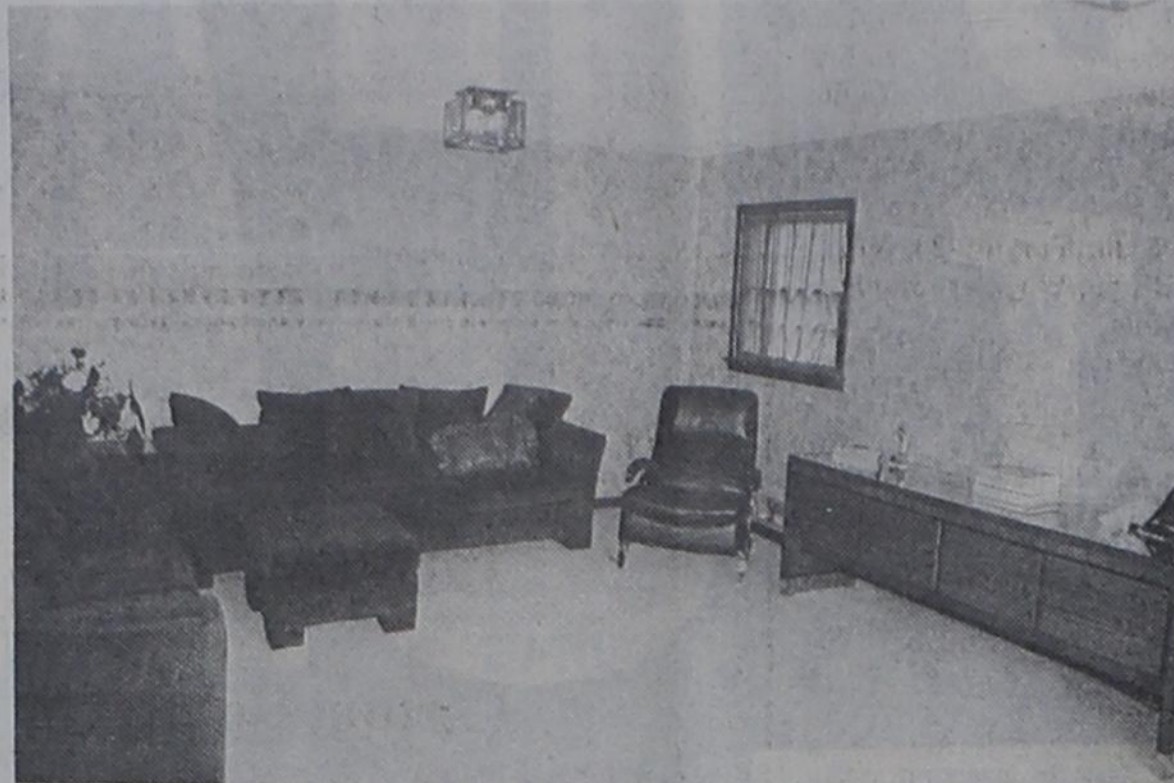

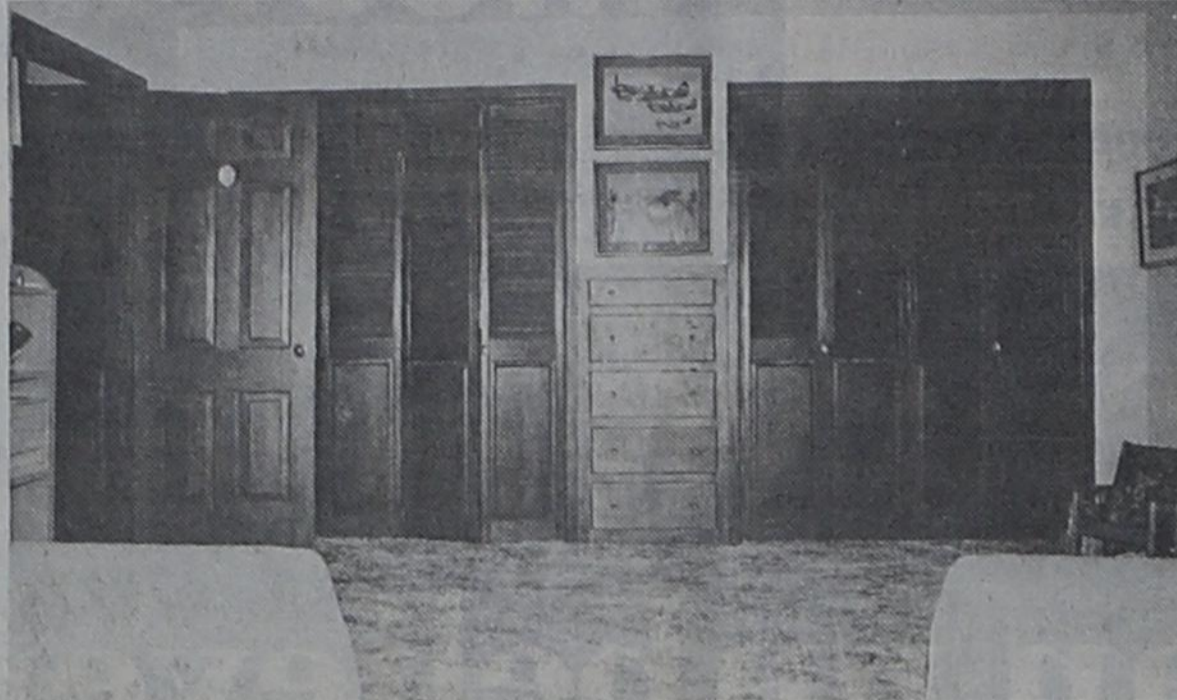

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 8, 1983

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 91 proposes a constitutional amendment which requires a county with a population of 30,000 or more to be divided into not less than four nor more than eight justice of the peace precincts. A county with a population of 18,000 or more but less than 30,000 shall be divided into not less than two nor more than five justice of the peace precincts. A county with a population of less than 18,000 shall be designated as a single justice of the peace precinct or, upon a finding of necessity by the commissioners court, shall be divided into more than one justice of the peace precinct but not more than four. The amendment provides further, that in any precinct in which there is a city with a population of 18,000 or more, two justices of the peace shall be elected. The amendment allows a justice of the peace, constable or commissioner to continue in office until the expiration of his term, although a change in precinct boundaries results in the officer no longer being a resident of the precinct for which he was elected or appointed and allows a justice of the peace or constable to continue in office until the expiration of his term even though a change in precinct boundaries results in the abolition of the precinct or more than one justice of the peace or constable serving the precinct. Vacancies in the office of justice of the peace or constable that result from a precinct boundary change shall be filled by the commissioners court until the next general election. The amendment would take effect on January 1, 1984, and counties with populations of less than 30,000 and with more than four justice of the peace and constable precincts would have until January 1, 1987 to comply with the amendment.

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 105 proposes a constitutional amendment which would limit a homestead in a city, town or village to a lot or lots amounting to not more than one acre of land, together with any improvements on the land. The constitutional requirement that, at the time of

designation an urban homestead not exceed ten thousand dollars in value without reference to the value of any improvements on the land would be eliminated.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment replacing the limitation on the value of an urban homestead with a limitation based on size."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Legislature to enact legislation that permits representative associations of agricultural producers to collect refundable assessments on their product sales to be used solely to finance programs of marketing, promotion, research and education relating to those products. It provides, further, that adoption of the proposed constitutional amendment will bring into effect Senate Bill 607, Acts of the 68th Legislature, Regular Session, 1983, with rejection of the amendment resulting in Senate Bill 607 having no effect.

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 30 proposes a constitutional amendment which authorizes the Legislature to enact laws to provide for the succession of members of the Legislature in the event of enemy attack and allows the suspension of procedural rules imposed by the Constitution in the event of, or immediate threat of, enemy attack. The amendment empowers the Governor, after consultation with the Speaker of the House and the Lieutenant Governor, to suspend the constitutional requirement that the Legislature hold its sessions in Austin and allows the suspension of procedural rules by the Governor issuing a proclamation in which the House of Representatives and Senate concur by resolution approved by a majority of the members present. Suspension of the constitutional rules may not exceed a period of two years under a single proclamation; however, the Governor may renew the suspension by issuing a new proclamation concurred in by the House of Representatives and the Senate through a resolution approved by a major-

ity of the members present.

The amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing statutory provisions for succession of public office during disasters caused by enemy attack, and authorizing the suspension of certain constitutional rules relating to legislative procedure during those disasters or during immediate threat of enemy attack."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 12 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Legislature to enact legislation providing for the use of the permanent school fund and income from the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts. The amendment provides, further, that the Legislature may appropriate part of the available school fund for administration of the permanent school fund or of a bond guarantee program established pursuant to the amendment.

The constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing use of the permanent school fund to guarantee bonds issued by school districts."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment which would permit the Legislature to provide for the garnishment of wages to court-ordered child support payments. The garnishment remedy would not be available for other purposes.

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 14 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Veterans' Land Board to provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed \$800 million to provide financing to veterans of the state. The amendment requires that three hundred million dollars of the state bonds be dedicated to the Veterans' Land Fund. The Fund is to be used to purchase land to be sold to veterans under such terms, rules and regulations as may be authorized by law. The amendment creates the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund and requires that \$500 million of the state bonds authorized by the amendment be dedicated to the Fund. The Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund will be utilized by the Veterans' Land Board for the purpose of making home mortgage loans to veterans for housing within the state and for the administrative

costs of administering the fund and issuing the bonds. The amendment provides, further, that if there is not money in either the Veterans' Land Fund or the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund available for payment of principal and interest on the general obligation bonds issued pursuant to the amendment, then money coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year is appropriated in an amount sufficient for payment of principal and interest due in that fiscal year.

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes political subdivisions to exempt veterans' organizations from ad valorem taxation on their property. The amendment requires that the veterans' organizations be chartered by the United States Congress, be composed of members or former members of the United States Armed Forces, and be organized for patriotic and public service purposes. The amendment provides, further, that political subdivisions may exempt fraternal organizations from ad valorem taxation on their property. The amendment requires that the fraternal organizations be organized to perform and be primarily engaged in charitable or benevolent functions. The Legislature would be authorized to enact laws that prescribe eligibility requirements for fraternal organizations to benefit from the exemption and to pass legislation limiting the types or amount of property owned by a fraternal organization which may be exempted from ad valorem taxation.

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 70 proposes a constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to provide, by local or general law, a method by which judges of statutory courts with probate jurisdiction may be assigned to any other statutory court with probate jurisdiction and to any constitutional county court in any county in the state.

jurisdiction and to county courts."

PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 17 proposes a constitutional amendment that authorizes the Legislature to enact laws which would allow a city or town to expend public funds to relocate or replace sanitation sewer laterals on private property if done in conjunction with the replacement or relocation of sanitation sewer mains serving the property. The amendment requires that the law authorize the city or town to affix a lien on the private property, with the consent of the owner, to cover the costs of the replacement or relocation of the sewer laterals on the property. The lien may not be enforced until five years have expired since the date the lien was affixed. The amendment provides, further, that the law require that the costs of the replacement or relocation of the sewer laterals on the private property be assessed against the property with repayment to be amortized over a period not to exceed five years and at an interest rate provided by law.

PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 13 proposes a constitutional amendment that would change the Board of Pardons and Paroles from a constitutional agency to a statutory agency and would eliminate the Governor's power to revoke paroles. The Legislature would be authorized to establish the Board of Pardons and Paroles and to require it to maintain records of its actions and the reasons for its actions. The amendment would empower the Legislature to enact parole laws. Constitutional language specifying the qualifications and terms of office for members of the Board of Pardons and Paroles is eliminated. The constitutional language governing the composition of the Board of Pardons and Paroles and the manner of filling vacancies on the Board is eliminated.

PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to change the Board of Pardons and Paroles from a constitutional agency to a statutory agency and to give the board power to revoke paroles."

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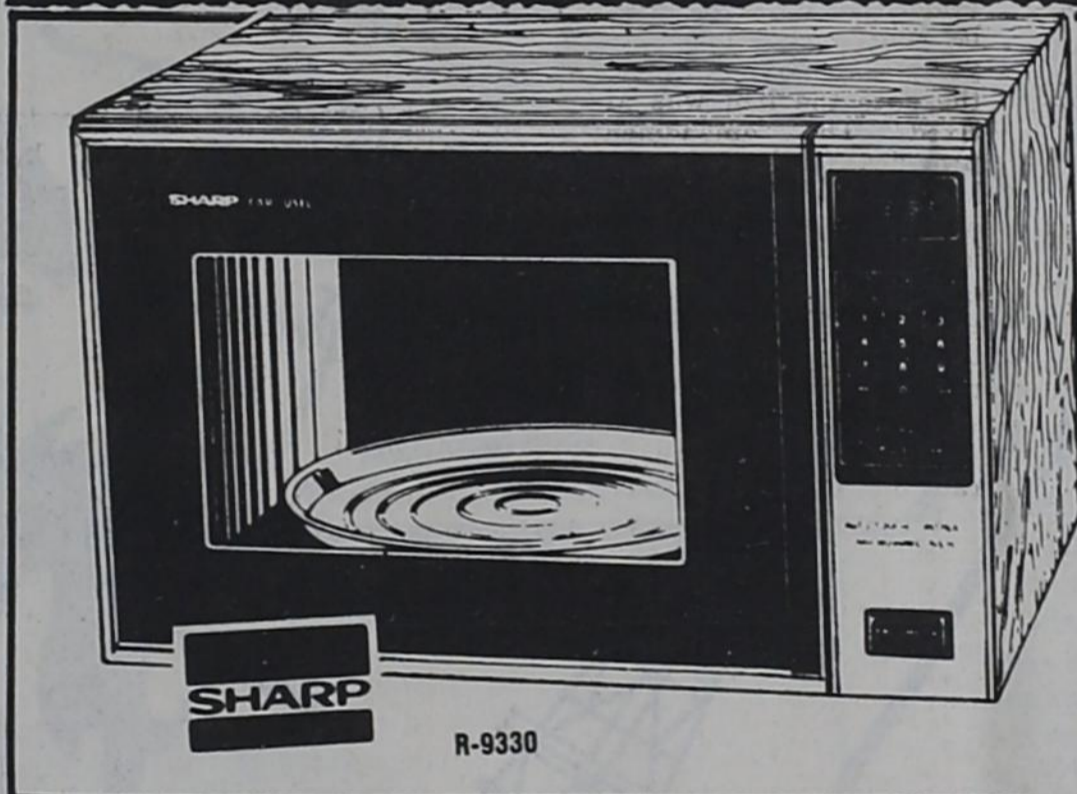

Mobeetie has a 3-5 record for the season. Coach Bacon says the scores don't reflect the growing improvement he sees in the Mobeetie girls.

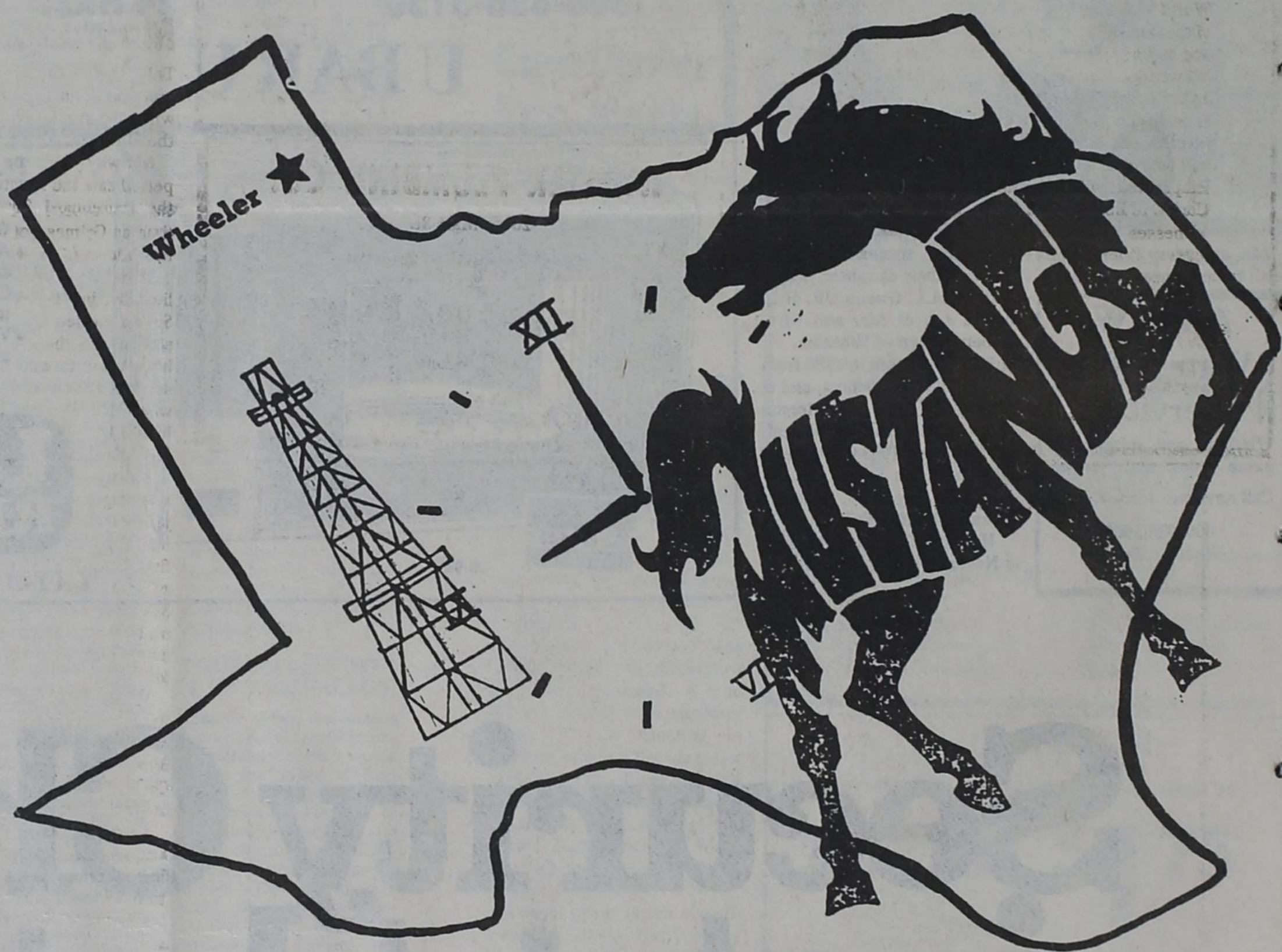

WHEELER CITY COUNCIL HOLDS SEPT. MEETING

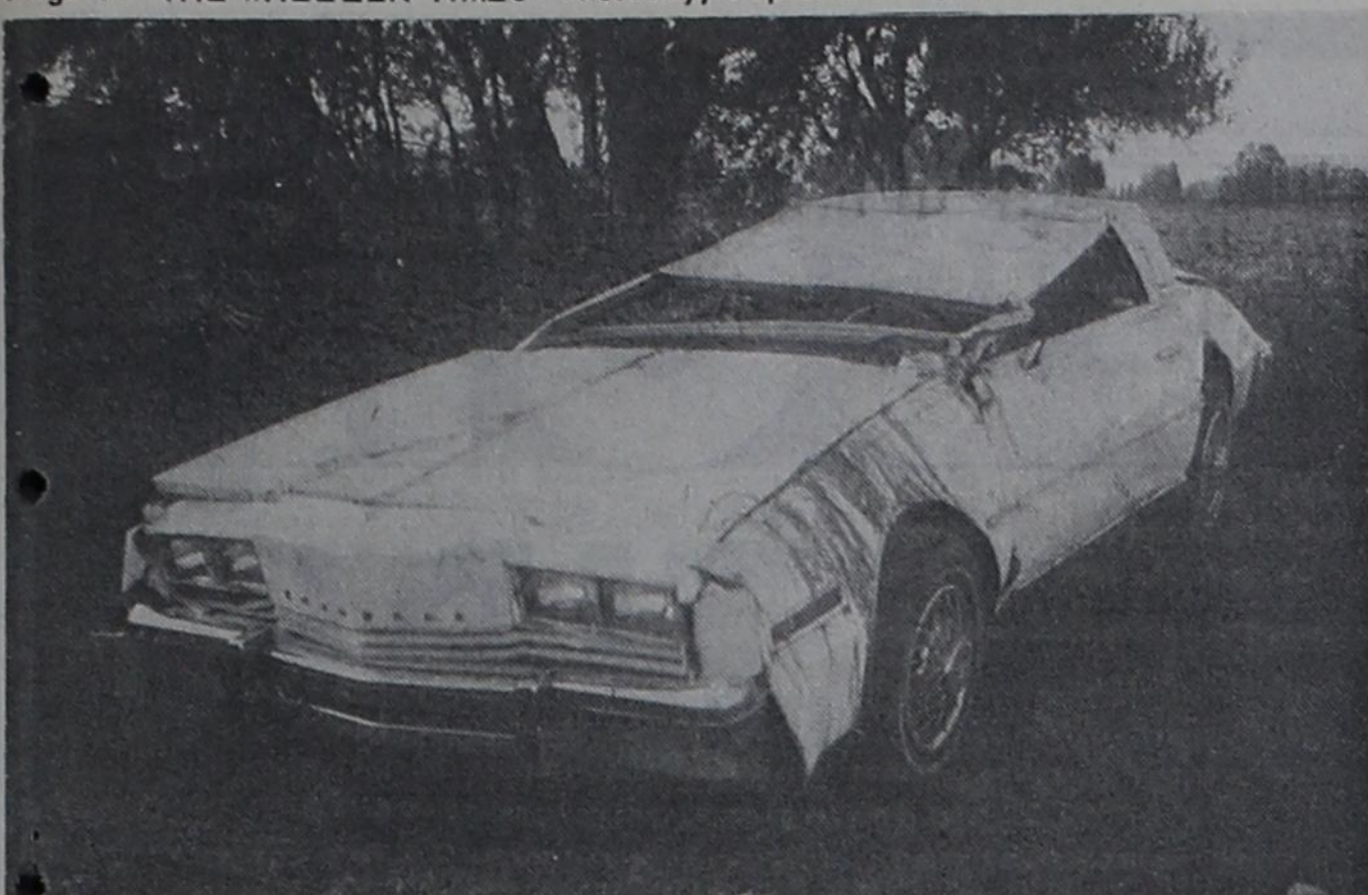
September 1983

There were two proposals received: Tradewinds Industries of Liberal, Kansas, and Emco Mfg. Corporation of Plainview, Texas. After reviewing bids, Kirven Roper motioned to table the issue until the Attorney had reviewed the contract with BFI. Joe Montgomery seconded, motion carried. Mr. Owen reported on progress of irrigating from Imhoff system. Mr. Owen reported on his meeting with Mobeetie Council about trash hauling.

Richard Wallace presented receipts and disbursements and explained same. Kirven Roper motioned to purchase a 6 month C.D. in amount of \$5000.00 from the Swimming Pool account. Joe Montgomery seconded, motion carried. Mayor Louis C. Stas discussed cutting down on street lighting on Oklahoma avenue. Today I worked in the Newspaper office. Being assigned to the job of finding some information of the 1930s' 40's, I did a lot of searching in the files. It was a fascinating piece of work! I couldn't let them go until I jotted down a few things I found in those tomes. Just for fun I'm going to enter a few things I found in this column.

In 1934 Wheeler won a basketball game from Twitty.

In 1937: The Kellerville Scouts had a meeting. Arthur Whitener announced his candidacy for Commissioner for precinct 2. The Rogue Theatre advertised Gene Autry in Rootin', Tootin', and Rhythm. The Movie Chatter was by a Rogue. (Would you believe that "Rogue" was I, Laura Guthrie.)

In 1938: People were elected for offices as follows: Raymond Waters, County Sheriff. (Waters was later a Texas Ranger. He is now deceased.) Homer Moss re-elected as County Attorney, Allen Cavanaugh re-elected County School Superintendent, Holt Green re-elected District Clerk. (I couldn't fudge on the boss's time to look up the other offices.)

A. C. Wood (He might have been judge then) was showing his homegrown tomatoes at Christmas time. (He confesses he had grown them in pots indoors.) Mobeetie Meditations by Mrs. Flanagan, and Mobeetie Happenings, by an unnamed correspondent, (I was trying to find a column by Goldie Gordon, but I didn't find it.) Coach Stina Cain was promoting a basketball Tournament. The entrance price to see four games was .15 and .20.

In 1941 Harold Nash sold his Appliance business to some Shamrock men. Texas Shelter Belts had a good season, The McDowell Drug Store was offering "Relief for Colds," Archie Hibler, the McCormick-Deering Dealer of Wheeler, married Lila Massey of Alnared. Reverend Wayne Cook, pastor of the M.E. Church, performed the ceremony. Mesdames Joe Hyatt, Bronson Green, Glen Porter, R. Wm. Brown and Ansel McDowell motored to Okla. City for business and pleasure. Mr. and Mrs. Gwen Edwards returned from a visit with their son in Ft. Sam Houston. They were accompanied by their grandson Scott Helton. Pfc. Edwards had served 13 months in the Palous. Pfc Max Wiley visited with his family.

In 1946, "The war is over and women quit their jobs so men can take them. Coach W. G. Carrick planned for a basketball tournament. He asks for rooms for the visiting teams. A few days before the Tournament, he pleads, "Not a door has been opened to the visiting players," Virginia Marrs has been accepted as society reporter after the resignation of Mrs. Cliff Weatherly. Headline: Miss Waters and Mr. Weatherly wed (that's Joe and Mary Alice). Puckett's Grocery advertises Jello, all flavors, Sc. Clay's advertise 1 carton of matches, six boxes per carton, 25c.

Back in the 30's and 40's, The Wheeler Times had reporters from Pleasant Hill by Joetta Johnson, South Chapel by Earlene Jenkins, Kelton by Rena Johnson, Locust Grove by Mrs. L.A. Histilow, Davis Items by Zura Bullock, Union News and Corn Valley News did not name their reporter. The local news has an anonymous writer, but I think that during C. G. Miller's time as Editor his wife gathered news.

Now if Wheeler Times get news from all those communities there would have to be more room and more people to work. (Today, Tuesday, five people were at work and plenty busy.) Wonder why the difference. In past years they did their own printing. Jerry Newberry wouldn't be hauling it to Childress to get it printed.
