Teressa Odell, who attends school in Springfield Missouri, spent Saturday night and Sunday with her aunt, Lucille Burgess. She drove to her

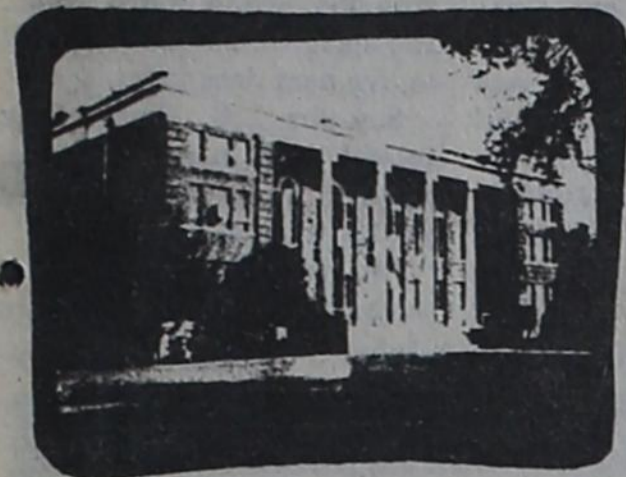
home in Lubbock Sunday afternoon.

WHEELER COUNTY LIVESTOCK SHOW UNDERWAY; SALE SATURDAY SHOW BEGAN WEDNESDAY, CONTINUES THRU SAT. CHAMBER BANQUET IS MAR 8

Wheeler County 4-H and FFA members will exhibit their livestock projects in the Wheeler County Junior Livestock Show February 23-26. The show, sponsored by the Wheeler County Livestock Show Association, will be held in the Wheeler County Agricultural Center in Wheeler.
Hiram Begert, president of the Livestock Show Association and general superintendent of the show, said entries include 131 lambs, 130 market hogs, 36 steers and 910 beef heifers. 4-H and FFA members have been working for many months preparing their animals for this show.
The show will begin Wednesday evening, February 23, with the weigh-in of animals at 6:00 p.m. Weigh-in will be completed Thursday morning from 8:00-10:00 a.m.

The lamb show will get underway on Thursday evening at 6:00 pm on Friday. Tracey Haymes, County Extension Agent in Randall County will serve as judge for all species.
On Saturday, the barbecue will begin at 5:30 pm and the highlight of the show, the auction sale, will begin at 7:00 pm.
Johnny Chapman will be superintendent of the sheep show, and his assistant will be Mike Meadows.
In the beef cattle division, Mike Lee will be superintendent and he will be assisted by Dave Britt. There are 36 steers and nine heifers entered in the beef cattle show.
Mike Hobbs will be swine superintendent and Don Rives will serve as his assistant.
Doug Corse will be the

announcer for the show and Bedford Forrest and Chester Butler will be the auctioneers for the sale on Saturday night.
Canadian Production Credit Association and Wheeler County Farm Bureau will provide the ribbons and trophies for the show.
Beef Cattle Company and Wheeler Feed Yard will donate the beef. Thriftway Grocery of Wheeler and Wheeler County Farm Bureau will also

donate toward the barbecue. Larry Cook will slaughter and process the beef. The meals will be sponsored by the Kelton Community.
General Superintendent Hiram Begert said, "On behalf of the Wheeler County Livestock Show, I want to invite everyone to come to the Show and give us the support we need for the youth of the County."

RAPE CRISIS SEMINAR SCHEDULED FOR MAR 14

Children's Program
March 14 7PM Wheeler School Cafeteria
"Speak Up, Say No!" is a 6-minute filmstrip, which teaches children how to avoid sexual abuse. The filmstrip features a delightful little character, Penelope Peabody Mouse, who in a positive, nurturing way teaches children not only to beware of strangers, but to recognize and avoid sexual abuse from trusted friends.
In America today, there is a one-in-four chance that a little girl will be a victim of incest, child molestation, or rape by the time she is 18. There is a one-in-seven chance for little

boys by age 16.
A high percentage of this sexual abuse comes from people a child knows (80% and more). Too many children will comply with inappropriate requests because they are uninformed, or because they are unlucky enough to be in the presence of an adult who takes advantage of the child's innocence, needs, or fears.
A child's best defense against sexual abuse is:
1. a sense of his/her own power as a person
2. knowledge of what constitutes child sex abuse.
3. resources available for support and protection.
The Rape Crisis and Sexual Abuse Service of Amarillo presents an hour long program for children and their parents. The program is designed to inform children on what to do if they are ever in a situation where they feel powerless or afraid about an adult touching their body. The program also tells children how to avoid being a victim, through games and role playing.
* Children should be aware that sexual abuse is not their fault and that it's okay for them to report incidents to their parents, teachers, counselors, police, or a trusted adult.
* Children need to be informed that they have rights, and that those rights extend to their bodies. Talking about these things takes away the helplessness that comes with being a child and that is multiplied by being a victim.

Texas women were effective politicians and reformists, responsible for enacting legislation on child labor, infant health care, women's suffrage, prohibition, education and prison reform. They ran ranches, businesses, hospitals, children and entire communities. They brought civilized life to Texas.

Using photographs, artifacts, diary excerpts and words of the women themselves, "Texas Women—A Celebration of History" depicts not only the state's most accomplished heroines, but also reveals the struggles, sorrows, and joys of the more typical women.

The exhibit includes an overview of Texas women's experiences and achievements.

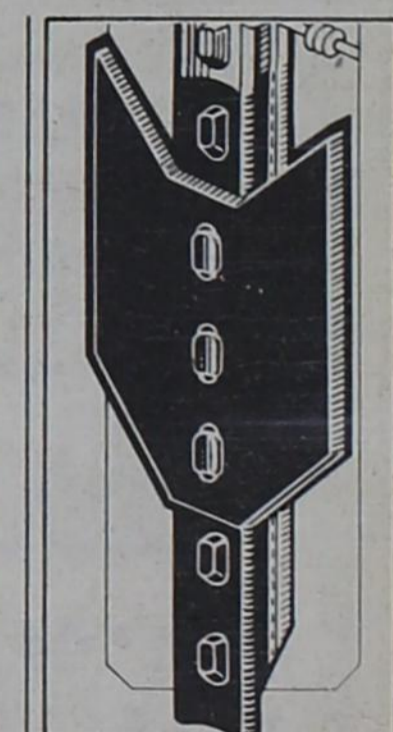
