If you give them anything they really cherish it.

There are guards everywhere the U.S.A. is doing the same in Dubia that they did in Iran but they are being more cautious. At these gas wells being drilled, it takes 14 or 15 men to do what 4 men and a driller does here in U.S.A. the men drilling are fed good. The temperature is 135 degrees the humidity 100 degrees so sultry hot. So terrible hot you can barely stand it. The American boys can not understand these workers neither can they understand the American boys, they work by pointing and questioning, what a job, how sad, just to make a dollar or some dollars.

Wish we had a little of this humidity so we could at least have some dew in the mornings.

LINES from LINDA

Buying the best-quality wood furniture for the money depends on knowing about some generalities, about certain features and about your own needs and wants.

Furniture Generalities
MATERIALS--Plastics and other imitations often are more practical than "the real thing" if the quality is good. Veneers can give beautiful wood-grain effects, and they're as good as solid wood. "Solid" means that all exposed surfaces, tops, sides,

door and drawer fronts are made of the solid wood named on the label. Even so, the wood on the inside may be a different type.
CONSTRUCTION--Grooves, screws and no-gap joints are keys to quality.
On the other hand, nails, staples, gaps in joints and the absence of grooves are all signs of poorer quality.
For example, in quality con-

struction, the backs of buffets and chests are recessed into grooves and screwed into the frame, not nailed or stapled on.
A table or chest should feel heavy and well-balanced when pressed on firmly.
No spaces or gaps or glue should show where two pieces of wood are joined.
FINISHES--Finishes often are different from the wood itself--this doesn't affect quality.
Front, top and sides of a finish should blend, though--in color and graining.

Patterns on door panels and drawer fronts should match, too.
Furniture should feel smooth--apoor finish is textured or uneven.
Of course, a "distressed" finish is not quite as smooth as other types, even when it is good quality. Here, black "distress" marks should look random in appearance.
Also, a good finish doesn't flake off, if lightly scratched along an edge or joining.

PRICE--Consider wood furniture a long-term investment. Pro-rated its costs over a 15-year period before you decide you can't afford quality.
Of course, on the other hand, a high price tag doesn't automatically mean high quality furniture is available in most price categories.
Learn to tell the difference.

Furniture Features
DRAWERS--Drawers should open and close smoothly. Drawer bottoms should not buckle when pushed. Inside and outside surfaces should be smooth. Drawer panels should be well-fitted with no gaps. When you look inside the space for the drawer, are there wood reinforcement blocks? Also, dust panels between the drawers will keep clothing from getting caught.

DOORS--Doors should swing open evenly without squeaking or rubbing. They should fit snugly when closed. Catches in more than one place help to prevent doors from sagging. Inset panels should not rattle, jiggle or feel loose.
HARDWARE-- Look for well-secured hardware as a sign of quality. It should go through the drawer or door and be attached with bolts or washers to prevent falling off. Quality hardware is cast of heavy metal and has no rough edges.

Furniture Pieces
TABLES--"Leaves" are important to know about in comparing prices and values--especially how many you'll get and what size they'll be. Also, leaves should fit flush, be level and match the rest of the table.
Leaves should have an apron if the table does.
Look for drop legs, too. They'll give a table with several leaves the extra support it needs.

CHAIRS--Chairs should feel well-balanced and steady when you sit in them. In quality chair construction, chair back, back legs and seat are on continuous piece of wood.
Straight legs generally are

stronger than curved legs. A connection cross-bar gives more support.
FURNITURE DELIVERIES
If it's necessary to order

furniture, ask the store to check the date of the next "cutting" to help determine your waiting time.
Also ask about the store's

damage policy. Reputable stores will repair furniture deliver with scratches or other damages.

GRAHAM GREENE, Doctor Fischer of Geneva or the Bomb Party. Simon & Schuster. 156 pp.

Following on the enormous success and critical acclaim of Graham Greene's last novel, "The Human Factor", comes "Doctor Fischer of Geneva", a black entertainment which is also a profound study in human greed.

At the center of this remarkable tour de force is the enigmatic Dr. Fischer, millionaire, student of human nature, practical joker and party-giver. His parties are famous--or perhaps notorious--for they are part of his experiment to see just how far even (or especially) the very, very rich will go to satisfy their greed, a Grand Guignol entertainment observed by Dr. Fischer's son-in-law, who discovers at the last moment that Dr. Fischer's guests risk not only humiliation at his hands, but death.

Seldom have Graham Greene's inventive brilliance, his comic genius (so richly displayed in Travels with My Aunt) and his gift for exploring the deeper recesses of human nature been blended more artfully than in this masterly, chilling and disturbing book.

MERV by Merv Griffin with Peter Barsocchini. Simon and Schuster. 287 pp.

Merv Griffin, one of television's most successful and popular personalities, takes us behind the scenes of a remarkable career, from his childhood (when he had to keep his piano lessons secret from his father) to his present 90-minute show, watched weekly by a loyal audience of 20 million viewers.

Griffin talks about his adolescence, during which he had to overcome an embarrassing weight problem, and reveals the surprising steps that led to his becoming a highly paid radio singer by the age of twenty-one. For the first time, he discusses his little known days as a contract player with Warner Brothers, the years in which he met such actors as Montgomery Clift, Elizabeth Taylor, Marlon Brando and Marilyn Monroe. He traces his progress from band singer to game-show MC to the magical night when he became the guest host on Jack Paar's "Tonight Show," and evening that changed his life.

Griffin brings us behind the camera of his talk show, sharing anecdotes about his interviews with Bertrand Russell, Robert Kennedy and a particularly volatile Russian ambassador, and offers a touching if shocking recollection of Judy Garland. With emotion and honesty he writes of his courtship of Juleand Wright and recalls with extraordinary candor the pain of their subsequent divorce.

Merv is a personal story of persistence and hard-won success. It provides a backstage tour of how a talk show is produced, an intriguing look at many of the stars and newsmakers of the past three decades and, above all, an inside view of a warm and human entertainer who has delighted millions with his music, candor and revealing interviews.

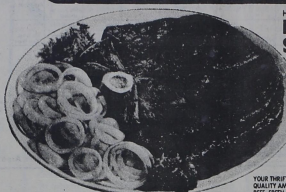
