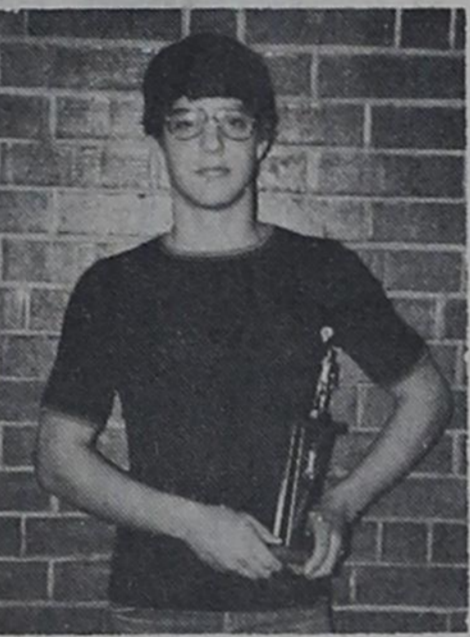
The machine has been placed in the work room at the library. The librarian will make copies for the public for ten cents per copied page.

Sheriff Ramsey's Monthly Report

The Wheeler County Sheriff's Department reports that during January, 1979, one burglary resulting in the loss of property valued at \$11.24 was reported. Four thefts were reported with a loss of \$203.58.

One aggravated assault was reported but the victim refused to prosecute. Four simple assaults occurred with one complaint filed. Two victims refused to sign complaints and one is still under investigation. One subject was arrested and convicted of forgery during January and received 5 years Adult Probation.

Ten white males and two white females were placed in jail this month. Six were charged with DWI, five with public drunk and one with forgery.

The department served six sets of civil papers from out of county and seven from Wheeler County.

A civil rights suit has been filed in Federal District Court in Amarillo, by James E. Campbell against Sheriff Doyle Ramsey, Deputy Sheriff Art Taylor and former Shamrock Chief of Police George Hooten. Campbell is now serving ten years in the State Penitentiary for the burglary of Mahken's Drug in Shamrock on January 2, 1978.

WHEELER HEALTH CENTER LIMITS MEMBERSHIP, OPEN TO TEENAGERS

Debt, dues and membership were the subjects of the Wheeler Health Center meeting Monday evening at the school cafeteria. An assessment of \$35 was placed on stockholders to payoff a debt which has mounted over the past six months. The raising of dues to \$17.50 per month per member should prevent a re-occurrence of the situation. Membership has been limited to the first 100.

The Health Center, located at 305 South Main was opened in March of 1977.

Offered by the center is a full line of exercise equipment, sauna, whirlpool—exercise areas are provided for men and women—and two full size racquetball courts. These facilities have been available to members on a 24 hour basis; admittance gained by the use of a key. With the misuse of the facilities having become a problem, some action had to be taken by the members and stockholders. New locks have been purchased and the re-issuing of keys will be necessary. Around 11:00 P.M. the front doors will be bolted and admittance will be limited to stockholders through a separate entrance. At 6:00 A.M. the front door keys can again be used.

MEMBERSHIP LIMITED

Membership over the past 18 months has been good, but collections in some cases has posted a problem. Drafting was voted as the means for the payment of dues. Present and future members will be required to authorize the drafting of their account for dues. A \$25 membership stands at 80—including the 46 stockholders; for the purpose of allowing the membership full enjoyment of the facilities, the number of members will be limited to 100.

TEENAGE MEMBERSHIP

Teenage membership is now available to the area youth. Dues for the high school students will be \$10 per month; draft authorization on the student or their parents will be required. The youth will not be issued keys, but will have access to the facilities Monday and Thursday from 7-10 p.m. and Sunday afternoon from 1-6. The teenagers will be allowed guests at a charge of \$2 per visit. Parent membership is not a prerequisite. The hours for the teenagers will be supervised. Cleaning and maintenance has at times been a problem at the health center. In attempting to deal with this problem, James Hiltbrunner has been hired; he will also be at the center during the time the facilities are open to the teenagers.

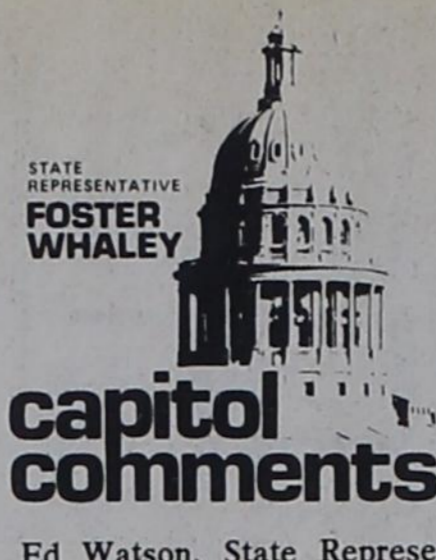

tative from Houston, recently introduced HB 484 which is a rerun of last years HB 518 that was vetoed by Governor Dolph Briscoe. This was labeled the "Painless Speeding Ticket Bill" last year.
Generally speaking, any speeding tickets you received would not count against your driving record or cause your insurance to be increased so long as the speed was below the maximum limit as set prior to the reduction from 70 MPH on major highways to 55 MPH.
Last year, there were something like 90 co-signers on this bill in the House. I co-signed the recent HB 484 with Watson, the author, as have many others. Our Panhandle highways were designed for 70 MPH and were considered ultra safe at this

speed before the speed limit was dropped to 55 mph for the purpose of conservation of fuel. The number of speeding tickets has gone up tremendously. The question arises, why should one fine be assessed to local city or county courts and another to the insurance company — double jeopardy. This might be justified if it could be proven the accident rate was higher among speeding offenders. It is highly doubtful this would be the case.
I am told several other pieces of legislation have been introduced that would prohibit the insurance companies from having access to the file of the Department of Public Safety.

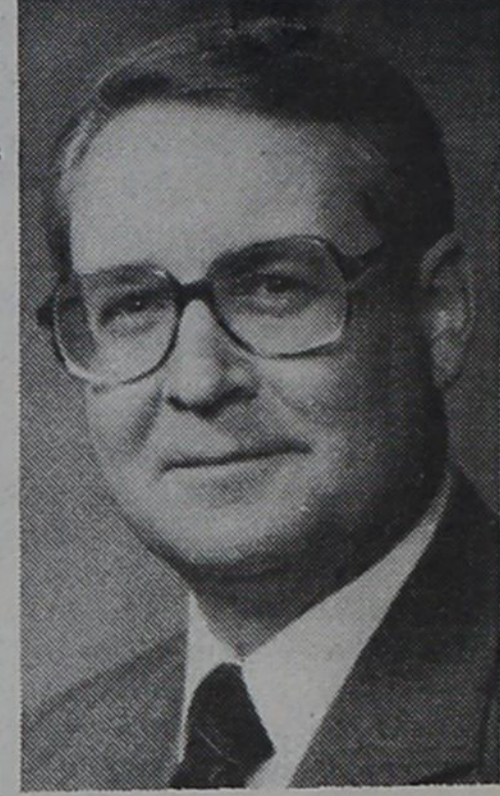

Sewing Secrets For Synthetic Suedes

Several sewing secrets for non-woven synthetic suedes mean homemade "ultra Fashion" success.

Non-woven synthetic suedes feel like real suede and look like it but have none of its problems. They will not water-spot or stiffen—and most are machine washable.

Sewing techniques are similar to those for leather.

Keep fabric rolled until ready to use to prevent creasing.

Pattern Secrets

Select a pattern with few pieces.

Raglan and kimono sleeves are easier to handle because non-woven suede is difficult to ease.

Keep fabric nap direction in mind when cutting.

Lay pattern on single thick-

Pin in seam allowance only, because all pin or needle holes will show. Use sharp shears and cut accurately.

Sewing Secrets

Use basting tape or paper clips to hold seam together before sewing.

Use medium tension and light pressure on machine—with polyester or silk thread and a size 14 needle.

Make stitch length 8-12 stitches per inch.

Tie the thread ends together because backstitching can make the stitching holes too large.

Seams, Hems, Dart Secrets

After sewing seams, finger press them open and fuses down seam allowances with heat-set fusibles, or top stitch them.

Make hems two inches or less, and secure with fusible fabric or top stitch them.

Make hems two inches or less,

and secure with fusible fabric or top stitch them.

Split darts open and fuse flat to avoid bulkiness.

Pressing Secrets

To press, use a synthetic setting and steam press on the wrong side, using a press cloth.

Fashion Trim It—With Piping!

"Piping" trim gives a fashion accent to homesewn garments, especially sportswear.

It is easy to make and apply—or buy it readymade.

Piping is regular (just an empty "tube" of fabric) or corded (cording covered with fabric).

Piping adds a professional touch to homesewn sportswear—mainly on the outside of pant legs or short legs and on jacket sleeves.

Traditionally it appears as a fashion trim for garment collars,

lapels, necklines, pockets and belts.

In choosing or making piping, keep it colorful and contrasting.

Readymade Piping

Readymade piping comes "by the yard" or prepackaged in pre-measured lengths. It is economical and a convenient time-saver available in a variety of colors and fabrics.

Homemade Piping

How to cut fabric to make your own piping, cut bias strips of colorful or contrasting fabric.

For strip length, measure the actual length of areas that will be trimmed with the piping.

For strip width for corded piping, fold some fabric over the cord to be used pin the fabric tightly against the cord. Then figure more width for seam allowances as explained in the paragraph above. The total fabric width used for this is the width needed.

How to prepare for inserting in garment for regular piping, press strip in half lengthwise right-side-out and mark trim width up and down toward the center, leaving seam allowance along each side.

For corded piping, fold right-side-out around cording and close to cord using a zipper foot.

How To Insert Piping

To insert piping into a garment, stitch it to a single

garment section before stitching the seam to join two garment sections.

Remember, always apply piping in a seam.

Fashion Trim

Stitch piping to the right side of the garment section along the garment seamline with trim edge facing the inside of the garment. Make sure the two seam allowances of the piping are together.

For corded piping, use a zipper foot to insert.

After piping is inserted whether regular or corded, then join the two garment sections as usual stitching them with right sides together. Sew over the piping stitching line.

Trim and clip seam allowances as needed. Turn garment right-side-out and press.

How To Splice Piping

Strips of piping, especially readymade piping, may need splicing somewhere in a seam.

If so, choose an inconspicuous place and avoid corners.

For corded piping, remove about one inch of cord filler at the end of a strip.

Take this "empty" end and curve it down from the seamline into the seam allowance.

Do the same thing with the adjoining strip of piping except lap this second empty strip end over the first strip end—beginning in the seam allowance.

Next curve this second strip

end toward the seamline so that the edge of the cord filler remaining in the piping on each strip will meet or line up at the seamline.

This splicing technique makes two strips almost seem to join each other, although one actually

Back Taxes Are Being Collected

Bob Bullock—Comptroller State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday said his office has collected nearly three-quarters of a million dollars in back taxes with a computerized system that

denies paychecks to anyone owning the state money.

Bullock said by using modern electronics his office will automatically withhold a warrant or paycheck to persons or businesses who have a tax delinquency.

"If they owe us money and we owe them money, our computer will kick out the state warrant and we can hold it until the debt is cleared," he said.

He said during the past six months the program identified more than 26,341 businesses who owed taxes and collected \$729,663 in overdue taxes.

Bullock said most of those owning back taxes settle up quickly so that their warrants will be release.

ICE DANGER EMPHASIZED

As winter's cold forms a layer of ice on the ponds and lakes, children are filled with visions of their northern and western neighbors enjoying winter sports. The novelty of ice, however, lures many youngsters to their death.

"Ponds around here seldom freeze thick enough to support the weight of even small children," Lavon Williams, district conservationist with the USDA Soil Conservation Service (SCS) in Wheeler, said.

The most dangerous ponds, he stressed are those that freeze fairly thick in areas around the edges. The ice may support a larger person for several feet from the edge in that area. But, over deeper water the ice is usually very thin," Williams continued.

There is no really safe ice thickness for skating, according to the National Safety Council, because ice conditions are always changing. For example, four inches of new ice can support more weight than four inches of "old ice" that has been subjected to the effects of the sun, refreezing after thawing, wind and changing water levels under the ice.

Realizing how hard it is to curb the natural curiosity on children, Williams suggested that the children be made aware of the dangers of thin ice. Also, children should be taught rescue techniques.

"Some pond owners keep a life ring or other floatation device attached to a long rope handy at the pond. A long pole can also be used to rescue victims of broken ice," Williams said. "If you must go onto the ice to help a drowning person, be sure to use a large board, ladder, pole, or sheet of plywood to distribute your weight. If none is available, lie prone on the ice and slide gently."

An Interview with Edith Donaldson: A Resume' of Her Life and the Early Days in the Texas Panhandle

Edith Donaldson was born in South Dakota in the middle of a snow storm in 1905. The doctor who delivered her had to go by horse and buggy. In 1908 (in the fall) her family moved to Montana. She would be four the following month. Her father rented an entire boxcar to carry their household goods and their

team of horses and a few milk cows. On their way a bridge had washed out over the Missouri River. In those days, people took everything they owned when they moved, and they had to wait for their personal property to arrive in Round-up Montana, their train stop. They crossed a temporary bridge by foot to another train which carried the passenger on into Round-up. There were four children that were born in South Dakota that were on the train.

Her father's homestead was twenty-eight miles from Round-up and the nearest post office was seven miles away in Flat Willows. When Mrs. Donaldson's family moved onto the land, there was no house, well, or any trees. Their lumber had to be brought in by horse-back and by buggy. They lived in a tent on their land from the early spring all through summer, underneath the rimrocks. They had three neighbors who all lived within a mile and a half of each other. Their house was finished two years later and three more children were born in Montana. Mrs. Donaldson's family raised only three crops in Montana in eight years. Her father decided he knew more about

dairying than he did about dry-

land farming, so they sold the farm and moved to Wisconsin. Her father had studied dairying under a Professor Babcott in Vermont. Professor Babcott invented the method of separating cream from the milk. They had lived in Wisconsin for two years when her brother came home from World War I with tuberculosis.

The family moved to South Texas on the doctors recommendations for her brother's health. It took them three days and nights to get to the Rio Grande Valley by train. Her father thought he would like it there, but he was afraid of the Mexicans because he could not understand them. He said, "All that's here are mosquitoes, mesquite trees, and Mexicans."

They began moving toward the Panhandle after that and once stopped and stayed in a family-style hotel for two or three weeks. Mrs. Donaldson was twelve at the time and said that the women and children stayed in one part of the hotel and the men stayed in another part. Everyone ate together at a big boarding house style table. The food was good, but strange. They had never seen people eat black-eyed peas, red beans, or okra. They had always had navy beans. Carrots and cabbage were the only foods they had in common. Mrs. Donaldson said that, "Coming from Wisconsin to South Texas was like going to another country."

They moved on the Kerrville, where people have been going for many years for lung problems. Later they moved to the Llano River, which took them "three days in a covered wagon with a team of balky horses." They lived there until Mrs. Donaldson was 17. There five girls at that time and no good schools around to send them to. Mrs. Donaldson's father moved the family to Canyon so the girls could go to school in 1922 and all of the girls except one became teachers.

Mrs. Donaldson moved to Hemphill County in 1927 to accept her second teaching job. She taught in a little school in the middle of the line of Hemphill and Wheeler counties called Highland for two years. Highland was a two teacher school and she had thirty-three students in the first five grades. While she was there she met her future husband, Millard Donaldson.

Mrs. Donaldson had five brothers and sisters and has had ten children herself in seventeen years. She rides horseback when she can and water and snow skis. She rides her bike now everyday to work at the restaurant in Allison. She will be 73 the thirteenth of November. Mrs. Donaldson has written and had published (in 1976) a book of poetry and has been recognized by the Amarillo Chapter of the National Library Board (1977). Her book is entitled, "My Rosary".

In "The Trial of Adolf Hitler," by Philippe van Rjndt, Adolf Hitler, alone in the Fuhrerbunker, commits his final error of the war; his suicide attempt fails. But as the years advance Hitler, known as Werner Busse, realizes that he cannot cheat death twice. Hans Kilemann is the prosecutor; Helmut Toller is the brilliant young attorney representing Hitler; Lillian Grubber is Toller's foster mother; the judges— from England, Russia, Israel, America and Germany— have the final decision.

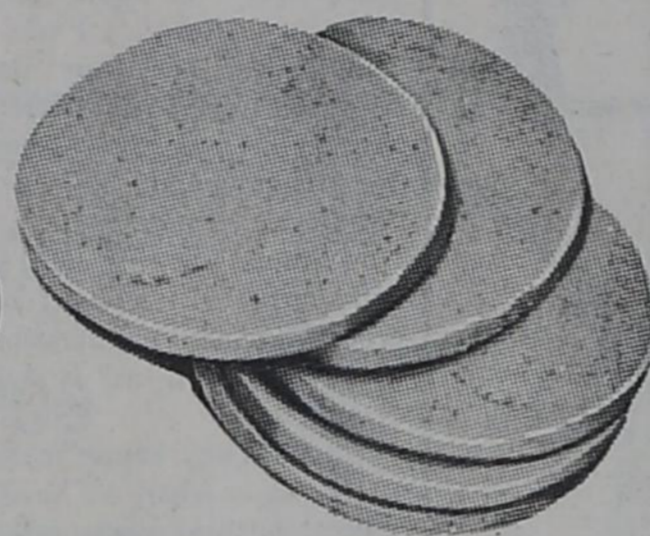
