### CHRONIC OBSTRUCTIVE PULMONARY DISEASE (COPD)



Harvey Porter, the minister of the Montgomery Church of Christ in Albuquerque, New Mexico, recently wrote an excellent article that was entitled, "Through Thick and Thin." This article said:-

"Solomon had much to say about the relationships of life. He wrote of relationship with God, with family, and with neighbors and friends. Nine hundred years before Christ he wrote, "A friend loves at all times, and a brother is born for adversity." (Proverbs 17:17)

"Our world moves at a fast pace. Everyone is busy. We often do not have time for family, our children, our friends, the church. It seems to me that long-term friendships are fewer than they used to be. Many of us grew up in small towns where we formed friendships with those we knew in grade school and on up. They were always there. We knew them well; they knew us well. We moved away to a new place, new congregation, new neighbors and new friends at work and at play, and we made new friends. But in a way, it was not the same, for it takes time for deep friendships to develop. You have to weep together and enjoy together. This is the principle Solomon was speaking about: There is a friend who loves at all

boom hit Wheeler Co., I was working for the Queen, better known as Royal Dutch Shell. They had an old plant and were trying to move a new one into it's place and get rid of some people. I was offered several places to go and some were a little better than hell. I started looking for some other place to move besides, No Trees

I was told by an engineer of Shell if I had some money, to buy some land with minerals east of Mobeetie, so I did. While working on the place that summer I noticed a gas plant being built just south west of Mobeetie.

Well, the leader of our old plant was trying to get people to move, so they made sure you got lots of midnight towers. Well, I applied for a job at Mobeetie plant and was hired right then. Seems as they were having trouble getting it to process right, so we worked long hours and I did not get to meet a lot of people. On the way to the plant one night, about 12 or 1 o'clock, there were two old boys in the road beside a pickup. I stopped to see if they had trouble and there I met Ben Eads and Paul Hathaway. We visited awhile and I went on to work, as they were waiting for some hay to get ready to bail. This was in Sept. I had also got acquainted with Joe Darnell and D. L. Rector at the station where I bought

The next time I saw these people was Halloween. Seems this group of people were visiting different homes, especially those new to the town. They first made a trip to Gordon Estes' home where they found a long ladder, as this was a two story house. Whoever was in charge of extending the ladder didn't get it locked good, so old D. L. was about halfway or better up the ladder when it kinda brought him back down to the ground. Now, from what I saw later he wasn't killed, but he wasn't walking right. Now they made so much noise, I don't know if they ever got on the roof.

Next time these same bunch of trick or treaters were seen was just before sundown in front of my house. They had found my ladder and one of the group, by the name of Hathaway climbed on top of the house with a dummy, or the other way around. I heard the noise and told my sweet little wife, we've got prowlers. About that time some one knocked on the front door. I knew it was trick or treaters because there was no one on the porch. So, I told her to go out front and I would catch them at the back door. About the time I got out the back door all hell broke loose. Somebody screamed and I ran to the front. Paul had thrown the dummy down on the walk and D. L. had screamed. D. L. and Ben were hid behind some bushes in the yard. About the time I got stopped and saw what happened, I heard a noise over head. I forgot to tell ya'll that the roof on that old house was tin. Seems like Paul got tickled and lost his balance and came sliding off the roof. The telephone company had installed two lines in on that side so he ducked the first one, but got the second one under the chin. ### **Internet Telecomputing Course Is Being Offered**

Internet Telecomputing is a course being taught this summer and Computers and Information Access is a course being offered during the 1995 Daniels of Wheeler, Texas. fall semester at the Sayre campus of Southwestern Oklahoma State Uni-

Internet Telecomputing (ComSc 4013) will be offered this summer Monday through Thursday at 12:15 p.m., while the Computers and Information Access (ComSc 1022) course in the fall will be held at two different times on Wednesdays and Fridays at 1 p.m. and again at 2 p.m.

Internet Telecomputing-This course is about learning to use the Internet in productive and educational ways. Students will learn the basic tools, services, and methods for working with the Internet including E-mail, FTP, Telnet, Listserv and Usenet groups, Hytelnet, Archie, Gopher, Veronica, WAIS, and the World Wide Web (using Lynx, Mosaic, and NetScape). Network etiquette along with ethical, legal, security, and social issues will be considered. Each student will develop a resource guide for a subject area of their interest. A simultaneous session will be offered on the Sayre campus. Computer (and Internet) access outside the class meeting time is required. The course instructor is Mr. George Atkins.

Computers and Information Access—This is the general education computing course on the Weatherford campus. Computer hardware, software and applications will be surveyed. However, this introductory computer class primarily emphasizes the access of information through library databases, electronic bulletin boards and the Internet. 




