The Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District is again offering trees for windbreaks. Several trees have already been purchased from the district, but there are still trees available.

Evergreen species still available include Arborvitae, Arizona Cypress, Ponderosa Pine, and Eastern Redcedar. The price for evergreen trees is \$42.50 for a minimum order of 30

Delicious species still available are Cottonwood, Desert Willow, Green Ash, Honey Locust, Little Walnut, Pecan, Red Oak, and Russian Olive. THE CAUSE: Wheeler and Mobeetie The price for deciduous trees is \$21.25

for a minimum order of 50 trees. In addition to individual orders, there are also wildlife packets available. Different species of trees are included based on the type of wildlife packet selected. The final date for March 14. A more definite date will be announced later. For more information or to place an order, contact the Wheeler Co. SWCD at the Soil Conservation Service office in Wheeler. Lovegrass may be obtained by either drilling of broadcasting the seed. A roller-packer should be used after the seed is planted to pack the soil. Seeding should be fertilized before or after seeding.

The require seeding rate for weeping Lovegrass is 1.5 PLS. The require seeding rate for Plains Bluestem is 1.8

In the past few years, most of the producers have gotten a real good stand of Lovegrass in a clean-tilled seedbed. Each year is different. Some years are real good and other years are not too good.




