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





Horse Clinic Scheduled For May 2


Nutrition, feeding management, training and horsemanship will be the topics covered in a horse clinic scheduled for May 2, 1989 in Wheeler. The clinic, sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will be held at the Wheeler County Show Barn.

Speaker for the clinic will be Dr. Doug Householder, Horse Specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Texas A&M University. During his 14 years as Extension Horse Specialist, Dr. Householder, has become a well respected authority on all phases of the horse industry across Texas and the nation, according to Joe Don King.

In the first session, beginning at 4:00 p.m., Householder will discuss nutrition and feeding of horses. Topics covered will include the horse's digestive system, feeding the growing horse, riding horse, performance horse and brood mare. He will also answer questions horsemen have concerning their horses.

The evening session, beginning at 7:00 p.m., will be devoted to training and horsemanship. Dr. Householder will demonstrate the proper method for starting a young horse and over coming problems in older horses. He will also demonstrate basic horsemanship techniques that apply to all uses of the horse whether it is pleasure riding, ranch or feedlot work, roping, barrel racing or the show ring.

There is no charge for the clinic and all interested people are invited to attend. Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socio economic level, race, color, sex, religion, handicap or national origin.


