PRESENTATION: "Wheels Across America" was officially welcomed to Wheeler Monday afternoon. Bill Duff, a paraplegic, is making a 5000 mile trip across America for the purpose of raising money for "The Miami Project to Cure Paralysis", an internationally recognized non-profit organization under the aegis of the University of Miami Medical School and Jackson Memorial Hospital.

The young man averages 50 miles a day; he left Los Angeles on January 17

and will conclude the tour six months later July 1989 in New York City after traveling through 19 states. The average speed is 8-9 miles per hour; his downhill speed can reach 25 miles per hour. Rest breaks are taken every 12.5 miles, breaking his day into 4 wheeling segments.

Bill is using a customized racing wheel chair, equipped with brakes and steering to ensure maximum safety and control. One pair of gloves and a set of tires will last a week.

"Wheels Across America" arrived at 4:30 Monday after leaving Pampa at 7:30 a.m. A group of Wheeler residents were present; 1700 miles has been traveled to date. Bob McCain, a member of the Wheeler

City Council and president of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce, presented Duff with a proclamation, declaring Monday, March 6, "Bill Duff Day". The group left Wheeler and traveled back to Pampa to spend the night for a full day Tuesday of public relations. The group returned to Wheeler Tuesday evening and spent the night in the homes of local residents. Rising early, the group left Wheeler at 7:30 a.m. Wednesday.

Duff is a native Texan, born in Houston on June 8, 1962. He is partially paralyzed due to a car accident in 1982. He holds a Bachelor of Science in Mechanical Engineering from the University of Texas, having returned to college in 1984 and completing his education in 1987.

FILING OPEN FOR OFFICES

May 6, Election Day

In an election set for Saturday, May 6, 1988, the voters of Wheeler are to elect three councilmen. Places 1, 3 and 5 are to be filled.

Place 1 on the council is presently held by Bobby Vanpool. Walter Simmons has filed with the city office to have his name placed on the ballot in this slot. Simmons is an employee of General Telephone.

Place 3 on the council is presently being held by Berniece Hall.

Jess Sheets was elected to place 5 on the council; his term will expire this year.

Filing for seats on the council opened Monday, February 21. The deadline for placing your name on the ballot will be March 22.

Any individual who is a qualified voter and a resident of the City of Wheeler is eligible to place their name on the ballot for anyone of the afore mentioned position. Members of the council serve a two-year term and see to the management of city affairs. Those interested in serving on the council may file at the city office during business hours.

Wheeler ISD Board of Trustees will have two positions open for the May 6th election. Deadline for filing for one of these positions is March 22,

1989, 5:00 p.m. Applications may be picked up at the business office.

Briscoe Public Schools

The Briscoe Independent School District will hold a trustee election on May 6, 1989, for the purpose of electing two trustees for two full three year terms. Candidates may file for application to get on the ballot between February 21, 1989 and March 22, 1989, at the school administration office. The incumbents are Richard Meadows and Ray Hudson.

NEW YOUTH PASTOR AT CHRISTIAN CENTER

Have you seen the dark haired man running the streets of Wheeler? This young man, Bracken Christian, will be representing the United States in the Cup of Nations Hockey Tournament held in Montreux, Switzerland on March 23rd thru the 27th. Bracken was selected as a member of the United States Olympic Roller Hockey Team in 1982, and has been competing nationally and internationally ever since. He began roller-skating at the age of three in Lubbock, Texas where he has also been a member of the Rolling Ghosts Hockey Team since he was thirteen.

Roller Hockey is a relatively new sport in the United States. Although it is the second leading sport in South America and some European Countries. Roller Hockey has recently been selected as an exhibition sport for the 1992 Olympic games, but it has been a participating sport in the National Olympic games, but it has been a participating sport in the National Olympic Sports Festival and the Pan American Games since 1979. Roller

hockey is similar to ice hockey except it is played with a six ounce ball and not a puck, and is supposedly a non-contact sport. Bracken comments, "Even though it's non contact, it still gets pretty rough."

Besides Brackens involvement with the United States Roller Hockey Team, he spends most of his time investing his life in Christian ministry and working with youth. Bracken is working at Christian Center with the youth and is also leading the praise and worship. He is also involved with the local radio station, KPDR, and helps out at the Wheeler Christian Academy. He is married to Donna and has one child, Layne, with another one due in May. Bracken was a Family Studies Major at the University of Texas Tech in Lubbock, where he also played football for the Texas Tech Red Raiders.

Bracken says, "Although sports are an important and exciting part of my life, my number one commitment and desire is serving Jesus Christ and telling others about Him."
