## Baptist Church To Hold Marriage Seminar

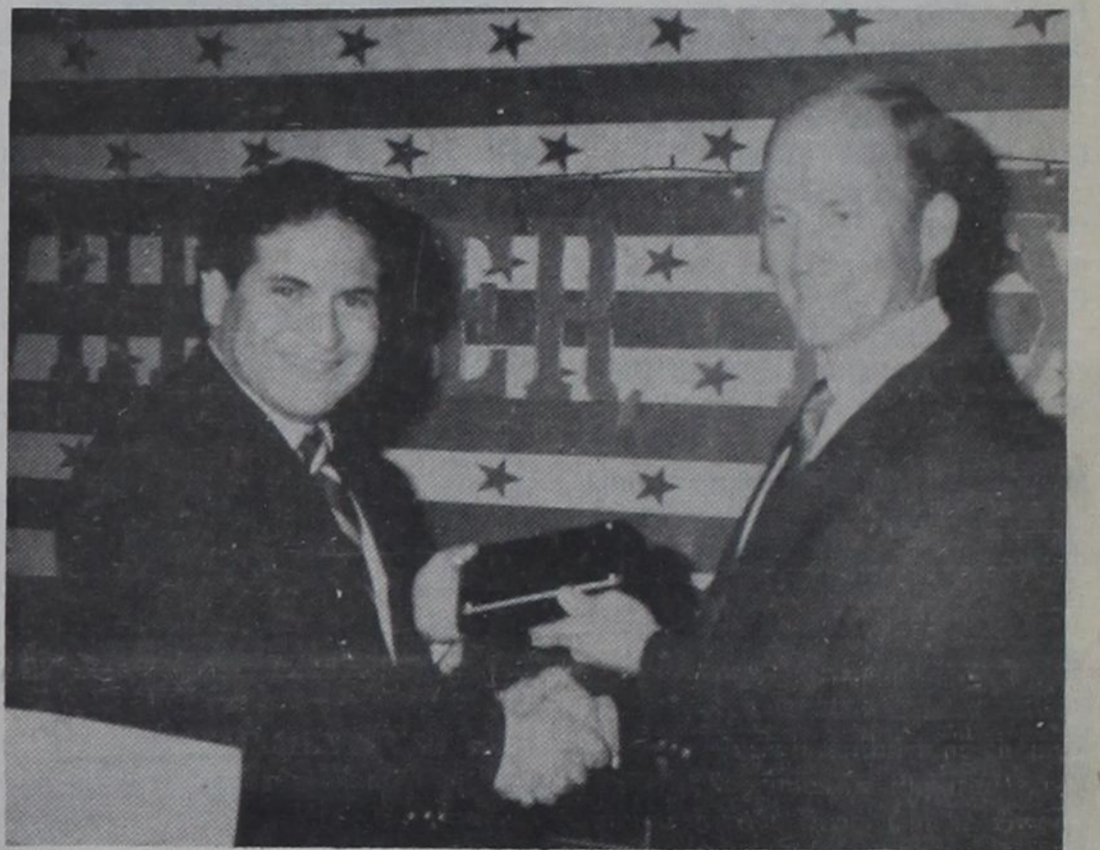

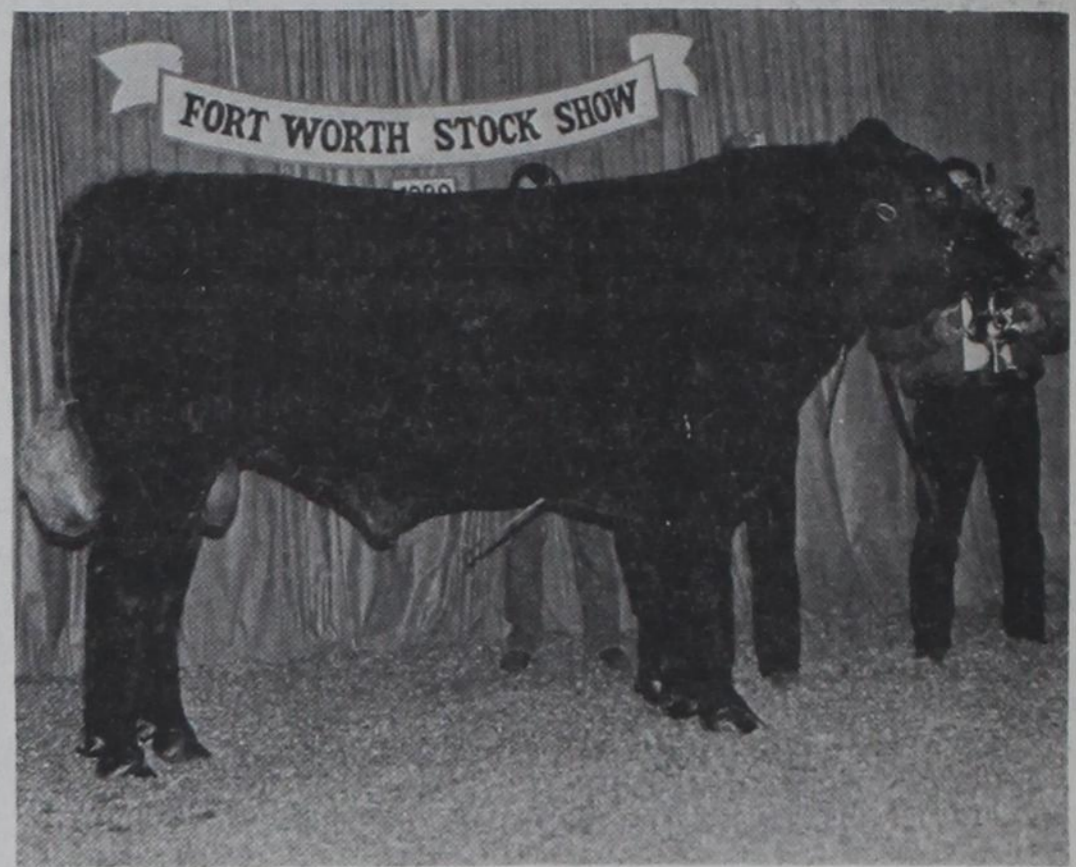

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## Ain't It The Truth

Boy this weather thing up in Alaska is sumthin ain't it? Imagine what happens to the fuel oil and the transmission oil and all the other things that we depend on to keep us going. What about all of the animals that we have around the house and the outside chores, and if a feller lives way out where there ain't all of the modern conveniences, what about the Outdoor Privy, wow what a nitmare that would be. If it wuz 70% below and the windchill would put it down to say 114% below then that would be a catastrophe to a feller that had the Direa wouldn't it. Most of us younguns with grey in our temples lived in homes that were a little drafty and when a blizzard would blow in it really blew in, yep rite in the house. Back in them Dust Bowl days we had a small scoop that we would sweep the dust into and pitch it out the door.

When the Japs bombed Pearl Harbor I was in Alaska and we immediately headed for what was called our field positions, we weren't quite ready for the war but we moved out in the cold anyhow. We slept in the open most of that winter and our cook tent was just a big tarp over the kitchen stuff and we had to enjoy the cooks delightful food sittin where ever we could and I remember the bread that was brought in from the main camp would be frozen so hard you could sit on a loaf of it. 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**Wheeler Church of Christ**

**Congregational Concerns:**  
On this coming Sunday, March 5th, at the conclusion of the morning worship service, a monthly fellowship luncheon will be held in the multi-purpose building.

**From the Minister's Desk:**  
Visualize a preacher as he looks across a pulpit at his weekly audience. What does he see? He often sees suffering people who have anxiety etched across their faces.

For example, he could see:  
A mother sitting beside her small, mentally retarded son. She is worried about his future.

A widower staring blankly towards the pulpit. Only three weeks earlier his wife's casket sat in front of the pulpit. The preacher had been there when the doctor reported that the growth was malignant. He must now raise three teenagers alone.

A family struggling with sorrow. They recently received a death message. Some of their relatives in a distant state were killed in a tornado. One of the fatalities was a six-month-old baby.

A young lady sitting in a wheelchair. An automobile accident that was caused by a drunken driver has left her paralyzed for the remainder of her life.

What should the preacher say to these people? How can he reconcile their faith in an almighty, benevolent God with the stark reality of their suffering? How can he relieve the anxiety of these people who suffer disproportionately and underservedly?

Human suffering is a complex issue that is often compounded by simplistic explanations. For example, one of these explanations is that suffering is the result of sin.

It is true that sin can and often does cause suffering. The way of the transgressor is hard! An inexorable Biblical rule is: "Do not be deceived, God is not mocked; for whatever a man sows, this he will also reap." (Galatians 6:7) The sins of the antediluvians brought death by the flood; the ashes of Sodom and Gomorrah clearly testify that people can suffer for their sins.

But is not true that suffering is always the result of sin. This

mistaken explanation underlies the disciples' inquiry about a man who was born blind. Their inquiry was: "Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he should be born blind?" (John 9:2) Jesus reputed this explanation by replying: "It was neither that this man sinned nor his parents; but it was in order that the works of God might be displayed in Him." (John 9:3)

Another text that records Jesus' repudiation of the explanation that suffering is always the result of sin is Luke 13:1-5.

According to this text, Jesus was told about some "Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with their sacrifices" which prompted Him to ask: "Do you suppose that these Galileans were greater sinners than all other Galileans, because they suffered this fate?" He then answered His question, saying: "I tell you, no, but unless you repent, you will all likewise perish." (verse 3)

To further show that suffering is not always the result of sin, Jesus next asked: "...Do you suppose that those eighteen on whom the tower of Siloam fell and killed them, were worse culprits than all the men who lived in Jerusalem?" (verse 4) He then gave the same answer to the question about the Galileans, saying: "I tell you, no, but unless you repent, you will all like wise perish." (verse 5)

These Texts thoroughly dismiss the belief that suffering is always the result of sin. It is true that sin can cause suffering, but because people have deadly diseases or die violently, does not mean that their suffering is the result of sin.

Life and its vicissitudes are complex issues. And these issues are not solved by simplistic and insensitive explanations, but they are best solved by a total dependence upon God who promised: -- "I will never desert you, nor will I ever forsake you--"

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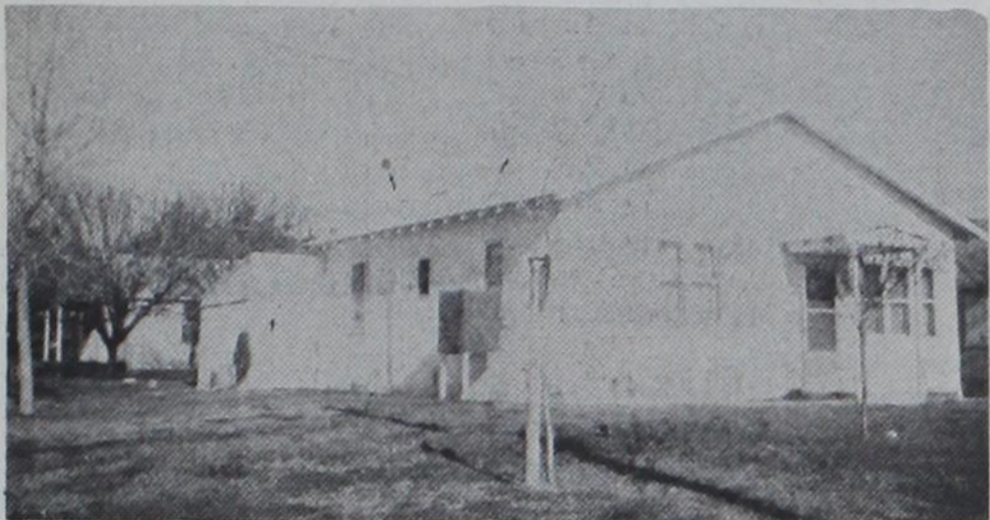
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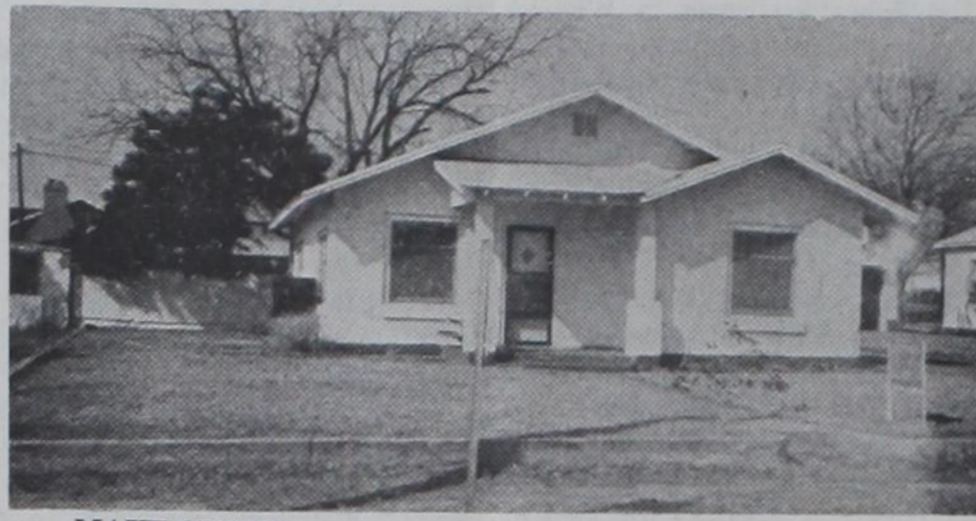

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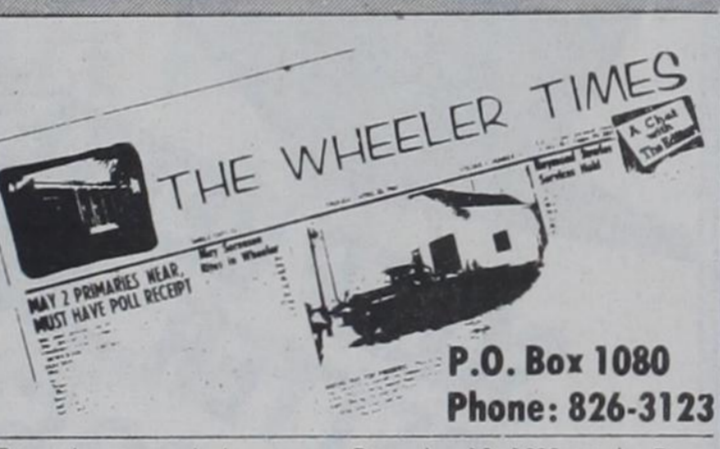

**WEEDING OUT THE RECORDS**  
Winter is a good time to reassess your financial habits because a year has just ended. Like most people, your financial papers and records could probably stand a little overhauling.  
But before you begin reorganizing, consider what you really need and what you can prune out. Most of us save more paperwork than necessary and it just takes up a lot of space.  
Start by setting out boxes and files to hold three types of records; those you can toss, those you need to keep six or more years, and those you need to keep for the rest of your life.  
**THINGS YOU CAN TOSS.** If you don't need the record for tax purposes or if you are sure it can easily be replaced, don't save it.  
Receipts for small daily purchases do not have to be saved, especially if they have no tax consequences. But keep receipts for expensive items to settle insurance claims in the case of loss, theft, or damage.  
It isn't necessary to keep monthly mutual fund and brokerage statements once a comprehensive year-end statement is issued. However, you should save trade confirmations and dividend-reinvestment statements. This information is needed to determine your cost basis when you sell a security. Without it, you may overpay taxes when you sell the security.  
You can safely discard most business receipts for less than \$25 and your credit card bills after your bank returns the cancelled check verifying that you paid the bill. However, if you need your credit card statement for analyzing itemized deductions at tax time, keep those statements with your tax records.  
**RECORDS TO KEEP SIX OR MORE YEARS.** Plan to keep tax records for as long as they are important for any Internal Revenue Law. Keep records that support an item of income or a deduction appearing on a return until the statute of

limitations for the return runs out. Usually this is 3 years from the date the return was due or filed, or 2 years from the date the tax was paid, whichever date is later.  
Sometimes you may have to keep tax records for a longer period, such as in property transactions, when the basis for the new or replacement property depends on the old property's basis. Keep those records for as long as they are important in figuring your property's basis.  
**RECORDS TO KEEP FOREVER.** These records include birth and death certificates, list of financial assets, medical records, powers of attorney, trust agreements, wills and W-2 statements. Also keep divorce decrees and custody agreements, military papers, naturalization papers and prenuptial agreements.  
Getting a handle on your paper trial will take a little time and effort, but will be worth it, once you've accomplished this task, you'll be able to find every paper you need.

## Telephone Prize Scams Warning

Postal Inspectors warn of Telephone Prize Scams

The U. S. Postal Inspection Service today warned the public about the increasing number of "boiler room" scams that use the telephone to pitch a variety of products, usually attached to a "free gift" gimmick.

Chief Postal Inspector Charles R. Clauson says the bogus companies flood post offices with computerized mailings notifying people "they've won a prize," usually after offering for sale everything from vitamins to office supplies. "The operators then followup with high-pressure telemarketing," Clauson says, "usually asking for money or a credit card number to cover shipping charges." Clauson says the best way to defend against the scam is to "check out the company and call them back—without giving out your credit card number or any money—and if still suspicious get in touch with a postal inspector through the nearest post office."

Just last week a promoter and 12 telephone pitchmen were arrested in New York City area for misrepresenting the sale of cleaning supplies.

Several weeks ago four operators from Seattle, Washington and Las Vegas, Nevada, were arrested for mail

and wire fraud for offering prizes as part of a nationwide promotion.

And in Houston, William E. Gardner, 35, operator of International Direct Mail Marketing, Inc., is awaiting sentencing after pleading guilty to mail fraud charges. He told those who responded to his mailings to call a Houston area phone number to claim a motorboat and out board motor, he said was worth as much as \$500, as part of a marketing survey. The thousands who responded—by each paying more than \$120 for shipping—received an inflatable raft and motor worth \$40.

Chief Inspector Clauson says "the telephone boiler rooms have been concentrated in certain areas of the country but the victims come from all over."

Serve More People

More low-income women, infants, and children who are at nutritional risk will be receiving food assistance and nutrition education in Wheeler this month, as a result of the Jobs Bill recently passed by Congress.

Local officials of the Texas Supplemental Food Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) are encouraging those who feel they may be eligible to apply for WIC services.

Your local WIC office at Texas Dept. of Health Hughes Bldg. Suite 100 Pampa is currently accepting applications. CALL 806/665-0746 to make an appointment.

Wic participants receive a monthly supply of nutritious foods such as milk, eggs, fruit juice, iron-fortified cereal and iron-fortified infant formula.

Monthly nutrition education classes are also provided so that WIC participants can learn about the relationship between health and good nutrition and how to buy and prepare nutritious meals.

To receive this assistance, participants must have health or nutrition related problems and meet specific income criteria.
