Two hundred fifty animals are entered in the 1989 Wheeler County Junior Livestock Show which gets underway on Friday, January 20, when the hogs and lambs are weighed in. Members of Wheeler County 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters have been feeding and fitting their animals for several months in preparation for the show.

The market hog show will begin at 1:00 p.m. on Saturday. One hundred fifty-one hogs are entered. Eighty-one lambs are entered in the market lamb show, which is scheduled for 6:00 p.m., Saturday. Twenty steers will be weighed and measured between 2:00 and 3:00 p.m. Monday, January 23. The steer show will begin at 5:00 p.m. Monday, and will be followed by the heifer show.

The premium auction will begin at 7:00 p.m. Monday.

Billy Buckingham, President of the Wheeler County Livestock Show

Association which is sponsoring the show, invites everyone to attend the show and auction. He said public support and recognition is very important to the youth who have invested so much money and effort preparing for the show.

Many local individuals are giving their time to make the show a success. Delbert Thomas and Van Baize will be in charge of the beef cattle show, Johnny Chapman and Mike Lee will serve as superintendent and assistant superintendent of the lamb show, and James Baxter and Dave Pearson will direct the hog division. Billy Buckingham will be the general superintendent and James Baxter will be the assistant general superintendent.

Canadian Production Credit Association is furnishing the awards for the lambs and hogs and Wheeler County Farm Bureau will supply the beef cattle awards.

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About Our Schools

BEING A CHEERLEADER FOR CHILDREN

At almost every level of competition, athletic teams have cheerleaders. The purpose of the cheerleaders is to encourage the crowd to yell positive cheers to the members of the team. The cheerleaders consistently discourage booing or negative chants which might start among the crowd because cheerleaders know that teams react best to positive reinforcement. Even when a team is losing badly or playing poorly, the cheerleaders continue to cheer. They never give up. They never stop believing in the team. We can all learn a lesson from this philosophy as it relates to our children.

We all want our children to be the best they can be, and sometimes the answer to solving a dilemma they're having seems quite obvious and simple to us. Yet, when we share our solutions with them by saying, "Why don't you do it this way?" We sometimes meet resistance. Or worse, they may attempt to solve their problems by doing exactly what we tell them not to do.

How can we help our children without intimidating or upsetting them? First, we must remember that we all learn best by trial and error. Sometimes, it is all right to allow children the freedom to try something their way—even though we know in advance how it will come out. If they fail in their attempt, we don't need to tell them why because they will probably already know. Occasionally, however, children do succeed by doing something their way. And such successes help their confidence levels to soar. Yet, it's difficult to watch our children try so hard without offering our suggestions for accomplishing the task more easily—but it's best that we let them try on their own. We need only to trust that we've established the correct rapport with them. We need to be patient and know that

they'll ask for our advise if they need it.

Second, we need to pay close attention to the times when our children do something correctly. For instance, we've asked them repeatedly to make their beds, and finally, one day they do. We need to be sure to say something positive about it. All we need to say is, "I appreciate the fact that you cared about taking the time to make your bed. I know that it is not a high priority on your list of things to do, but it's important to me. Thank you for helping me out that way." Too

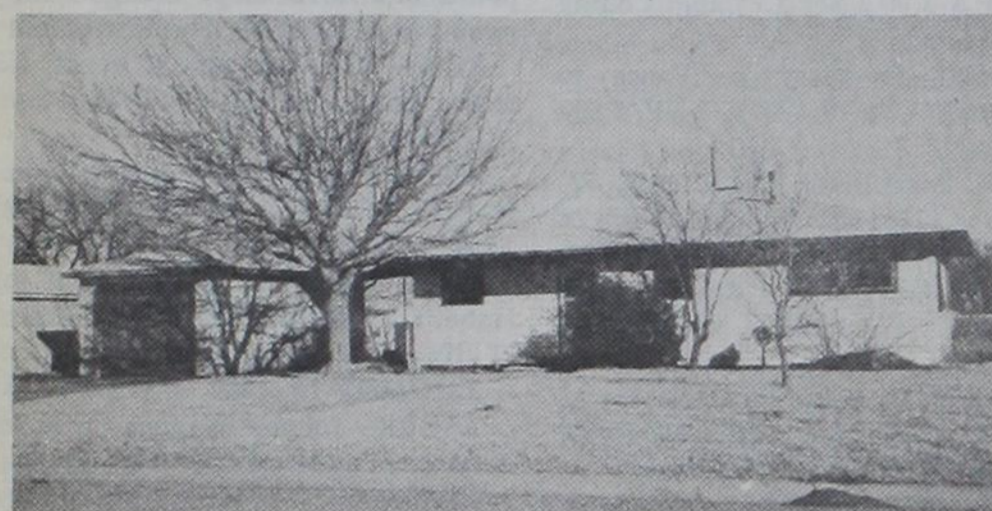

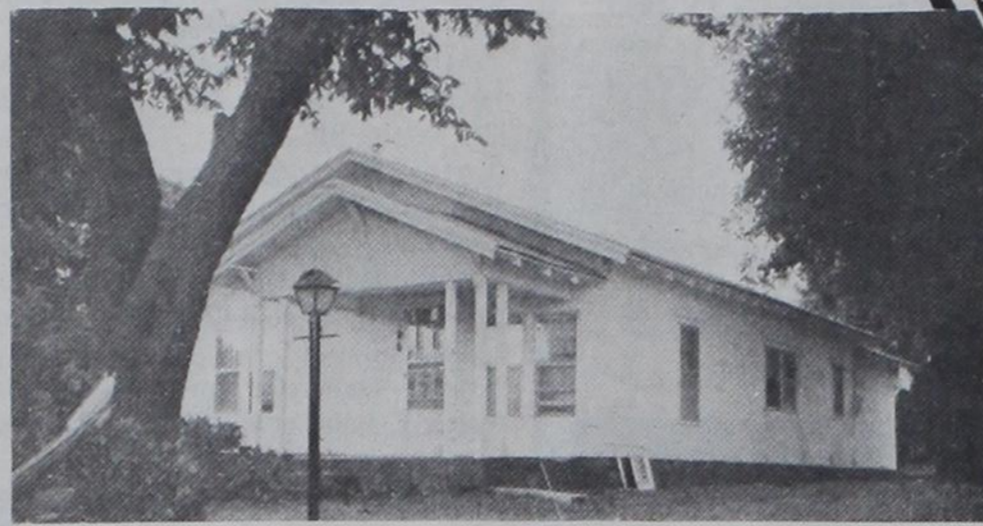

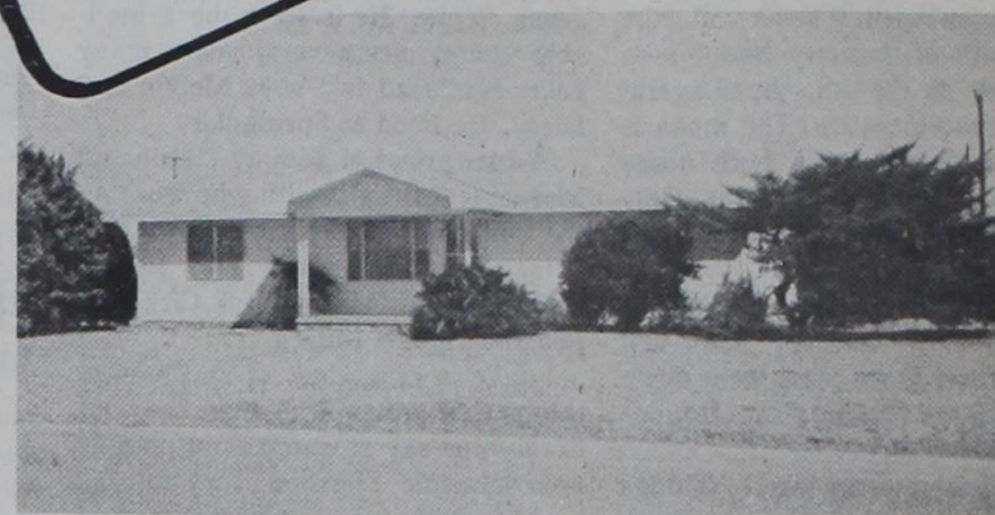

The conservation compliance provision of the Food Security Act of 1985 discourages the production of annual crops on highly erodible cropland without an approved conservation plan. The conservation plan must be approved by the soil conservation service and the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District. If you produce annual crops on such fields without an approved conservation plan, you will lose your eligibility for government payments.

Farmers, it's that time of the year to have a conservation plan developed on the places you own or operate. Many of the farmers take the farm bill of 1985 for granted. Farmers feel that

the farm bill of 1985 doesn't involve them. The farm bill of 1985 involves the farmers who receive government payments or participate in government programs.

You have until January 1, 1990 to develop and begin actively applying a conservation plan. You have until January 1, 1995 to have that conservation plan fully operational.

For more information about the conservation provisions or for conservation planning assistance, contact the Wheeler Soil Conservation Service field office. The Wheeler Soil Conservation Service is looking forward to seeing you and developing a conservation plan on your highly erodible land. Thank you for your cooperation.

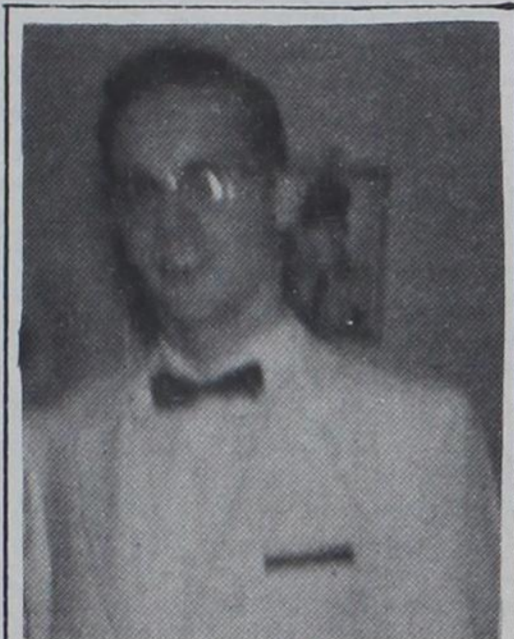

Community Colleges Ready For TASP

TASP (Texas Assessment Skills Program) is a statewide college program mandated by the Texas Legislature and designed to improve the quality of Texas college graduates by identifying deficiencies in basic educational skills, then helping remedy those deficiencies through special, developmental college courses.

The 1989 Fall Semester will be the first time college freshmen will be required to take the TASP test. Until that deadline Clarendon College will offer suitable transferable freshman courses at various sites to allow students to meet the exemption of having earned three or more semester credit hours at a public institution in the State of Texas prior to the end of the 1989 Summer Session.

Eventually all students entering Texas colleges will be required to pass TASP tests in reading, writing, and math skill areas before advancing to upper-division college courses. The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board estimates that 40% of the state's entering freshmen will need remedial coursework in some basic academic area.

While all colleges in Texas are working hard to implement the TASP test and follow-up with compensatory courses for students needing remedial help, it is safe to say that no segment of Texas higher education is as prepared for this newest challenge than are its 49 community college districts. Compensatory instruction has been a part of the community college mission since the beginnings of the movement, and most community colleges have tested entering

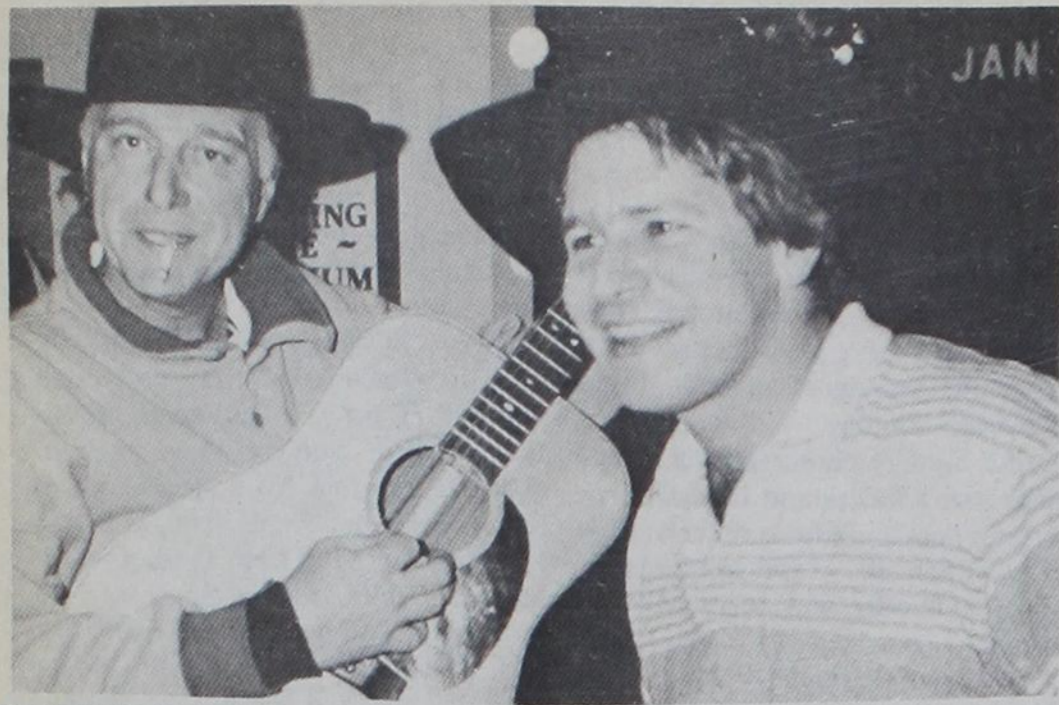

Allison School Board Addresses Superintendent Mims

[Editor's Note: David Mims, Superintendent of Schools at Allison, resigned his position January 12, effective June 30, unless other employment is found. This letter is being published for the education of the general public.]

Dear Mr. Mims:
As President of the Allison Independent School District Board of Trustees, and with the express authorization and direction of the Board, I am writing to inform you of certain concerns which the Board has regarding your performance and the general administration of the District. These concerns fall under three categories: personnel, students and the Board. I will address each separately.

I. Personnel

As you know, the Board has been concerned with the performance of a teacher, Ms. Nall. Specifically, the Board voted to deny Ms. Nall's grievance and to leave in her personnel file a letter placed there by former Superintendent Nora Hutto. In that letter, Dr. Hutto stated to Ms. Nall, "It will therefore be necessary for the next Superintendent to carefully monitor your teaching in the fall and the achievement of your students, then report to the Board of Trustees in October your level of performance." You are fully aware of the Board's concern in this matter, but you have failed to provide the Board any meaningful assessment or other report of Ms. Nall's performance.

You are hereby directed to submit to the Board no later than December 1, 1988, a written report concerning Ms. Nall's performance, particularly in the areas noted by Dr. Hutto. I realize that you must rely upon the assistance of Principal Rives in this task. The final responsibility to comply with this directive is, however, entirely yours.

B. Again, in the matter of Ms. Nall's performance, the Board gave you a verbal directive, during an executive session of the Board, to put a window in the door of her classroom. You failed to comply with that verbal directive, so I now give you the directive in writing. No later than December 1, 1988, you shall have a window installed in the door of her classroom. Your disregard of the Board's informal, verbal directive is particularly disappointing. It is not our wish to translate every request into a written directive. We would prefer to have a comfortable working relationship with a responsive chief administrator. In the absence of an appropriate response from you, however, we now give you this directive.

You also were given an informal directive to assign Ms. Nall to 4th and 5th grade reading, and you failed to comply with that directive. In view of the fact that Ms. Nall is performing other duties, assigned by you, the Board does not renew that directive. Your failure to comply with the

original directive is, however, further evidence of your failure to take the Board's direction seriously.

C. Further, with regard to personnel, the Board directed you to furnish to a teacher, Mr. Vorheis, certain teaching aids. You have not complied with that directive. I now direct you to provide to Mr. Vorheis the teaching aids which he requested and to report in writing to the Board no later than December 1, 1988, regarding your completion of this task.

D. Finally, in the personnel area, you have failed to address the matter of teacher morale adequately. You are directed to address this crucial concern and to provide to the Board a specific and detailed report regarding the state of teacher morale, noting every incident involving teacher morale which you have handled during the present school year with an account of the resolution, if any, of each incident. This written report is due no later than December 1, 1988.

II. Students:

You allowed information regarding the identity of students who participate in the School Reduced Price Lunch Program to become known to others. I direct you to ensure that this never happens again. I further direct you to provide to the Board no later than December 1, 1988, a written account of the incident in question including an explanation of how this was allowed to happen.

III. The Board:

A. There are certain administrative matters with which the Board is not satisfied. For example, the checks were not available for signing at the October Board meeting. I direct you to ensure that this does not happen at future meetings and that you pay closer attention to administrative detail.

B. The Board is concerned about the confidentiality of executive sessions. I direct you to provide to the Board, no later than December 1, 1988, your written assurance that you will observe scrupulously the confidentiality of executive sessions. This confidentiality is authorized by law and local policy, and it shall be observed.

C. The board is concerned that you are not keeping the Board and its President adequately informed on matters of importance to the District. The Board's role is to make policy; your role is to administer the district in compliance with those policies. We do not wish to intrude upon your administrative function. This does not mean, however, that we will tolerate inadequate information. Accordingly, I direct you to present to the Board in writing, no later than December 1, 1988, an administrative procedure, addressing communications from the Superintendent to the Board. This procedure shall address matters of routine communication, unusual or emergency communication, timeliness and any other matter properly addressed in such an administrative procedure.

D. Finally, the Board directs you to give serious thought to your general attitude toward your relationship with the Board. It is our feeling that you do not respect this Board or take its direction seriously. Please understand that we will not tolerate this attitude.

In conclusion, allow me to assure you that the Board seeks a good working relationship with you. The purpose of this letter is to make entirely clear our expectations in order that there be no misunderstanding on your part. We look forward to your written reports on the matters set

forth in this letter, no later than December 1, 1988, and to a successful working relationship in the future.
