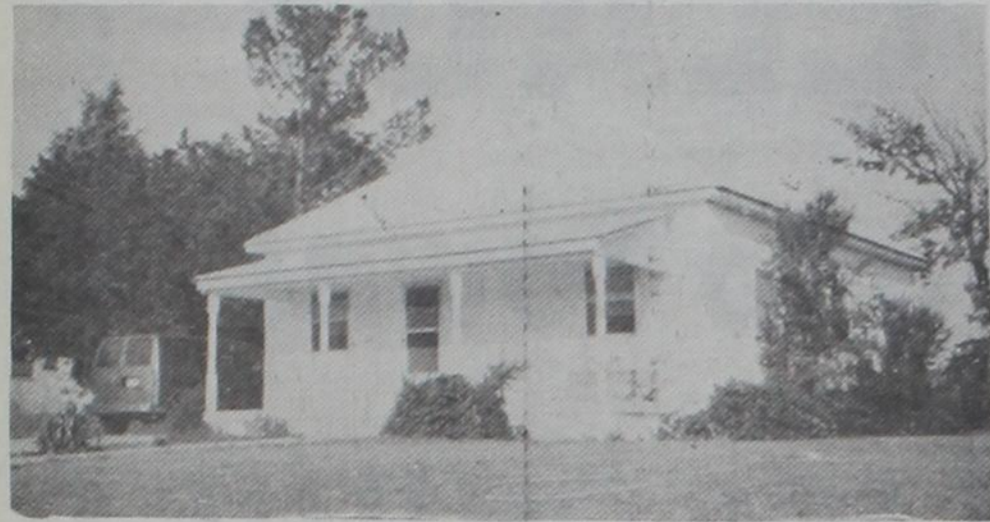

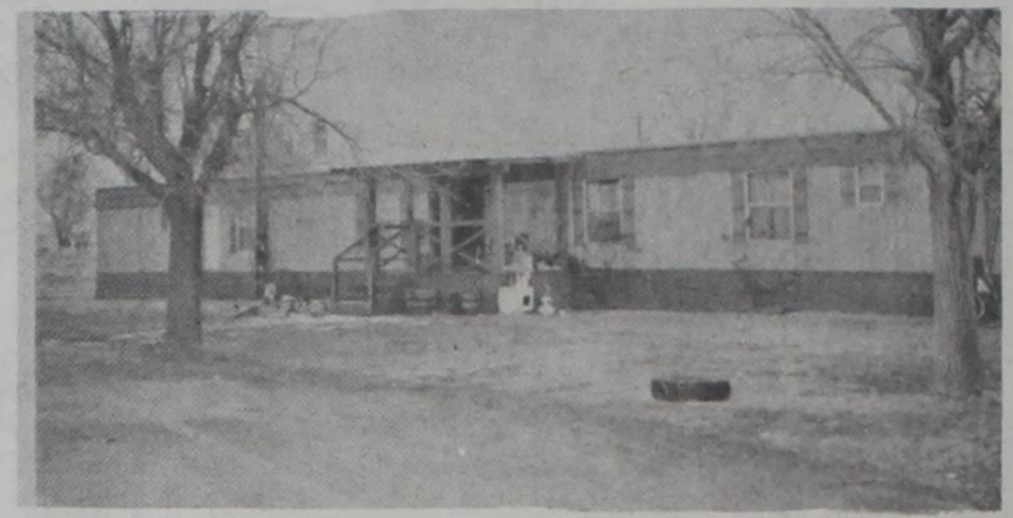

Check Safety To Make The Holidays Bright



- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Place your tree away from the fireplace or other heat sources and out of the traffic pattern.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree. Light strings with damaged insulation can electrically charge a metallic tree. Instead, shine unattached colored floodlights or spotlights on the tree.
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Never use lighted candles on a tree or near evergreens. And don't burn evergreens in the fireplace.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines. Make sure you or your decorations don't come in contact with them.
- Should you receive a CB radio or television this Christmas, let a qualified serviceman install the CB base unit or television antenna for you. This delicate job is best left to the professionals.
- Be sure electrical toys are tested for safety. Look for the UL mark.

ABOUT OUR SCHOOLS

Good Teachers Can Be Identified

Because teachers are individuals with individual styles, it is almost impossible to generalize "how" each educator teaches. However, based on what educators now know about effective teaching, we can look at the common characteristics which exist in the classroom of the most effective teachers. And discussion of the procedures and personality traits which seem to ensure students' learning success most often is possible. As parents, we may find this information very helpful.

First of all, we know that good teachers have high expectations for students. They motivate and challenge students in a trusting, non-threatening way. This allows students the opportunity to risk failure occasionally without being afraid to try again.

Second, good teachers use every means possible—conservation, observation, intuition, experience, testing, and examining records—to determine where to begin teaching with each student and class when introducing new material. They know each student learns differently, and that each student has had different learning experiences in the past. Good teachers understand these realities and attempt to meet the needs of each individual child.

Third, when new material is introduced, good teachers allow students plenty of practice time. Students practice with the teachers first. Then, when they are ready, students practice independently. Independent practice is vital in giving confidence. While students are practicing, these teachers determine exactly what students still do not understand and reteach those parts of the lesson.

Fourth, good teachers teach, test, reteach, and retest until each student has acquired mastery of the material. They also have the imagination and enthusiasm to keep students from becoming bored and nonproductive during the reteaching and retesting
