Several years ago, a preacher moved to a large, metropolitan community in North Carolina that was prominent in banking, transportation, and textiles. He observed that the religious people in this community had developed a middle-class faith which he described as:-

Farmers Ready For 1990

By Fred Allison, Jr.
Soil Conservation Service

The Conservation Compliance Provisions of the Food and Security Act of 1985 disqualifies you for certain U.S. Department of Agriculture Programs if you produce crops on highly erodible cropland without a conservation system approved by the local Soil Conservation Service and the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District. You have until January 1, 1990 to have a plan signed and approved. DO YOU HAVE ONE? It is later than you think. Approximately one year!! Wheeler County has approximately 550 farm numbers with plans needing to be developed. We have developed all but about 180 plans. I urge each of you who do not have a plan developed yet to contact the SCS and see how you stand. Do not expect to wait until December 1989 to come in and want a plan. If you do you could miss a check in 1990.

The USDA farm programs affected by the cross compliance provisions: USDA price and income supports; Disaster Payments; Crop Insurance; FMHA loans; Farm Storage loans; and other programs under which USDA makes commodity payments such as CRP.

You have until January 1, 1990 to have and begin applying a conservation plan on highly erodible cropland. You have until January 1, 1995 to have a conservation system fully applied to the land. This is to allow for the establishment of grass, waterways and terraces or critical area treatment.

The Soil Conservation Service staff at Wheeler are here to help give you alternatives for your farm to make it remain in compliance. It is up to you to pick the alternative that you can best live with. Again we are here to help you remain in compliance, so contact the scs office as soon as possible to see how you stand.

Cabot Builds Pipeline

Cabot Transmission Corporation (CTC) is nearing completion of eleven miles of pipeline that will open new markets for natural gas in Western Oklahoma.

"This pipeline is an integral part of Cabot's overall strategy to increase supplies and markets and continue its recent record of significant volume growth," said R.L. Langenkamp, president of Cabot Transmission Corporation.

"As the result of a new emphasis on marketing, we were able to double our sales in 1988 after stabilizing our markets in 1987, following a period of significant sales decline. For the first time in recent years we have been sold out of supply. This new pipeline will allow us to continue our rapid sales growth by taking advantage of new supply arrangements from western Oklahoma," said Langenkamp. "However, if we're going to continue to maximize throughput opportunities for everyone, we have to increase our supply portfolio. That's why it is logical for us to look to western Oklahoma for additional volumes, where there is a large supply of gas but an inadequate pipeline capacity in the area," he said. The new pipeline, expected to be placed in service during December, will give western Oklahoma producers access to additional markets being developed by CTC in the West, Midwest and the Texas Gulf Coast.

Based in Houston, CTC is a wholly-owned subsidiary of Cabot Energy Corporation and is a regional energy company (natural gas, natural gas liquids and coal) with 1988 revenues in excess of \$600 million. 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ABOUT OUR SCHOOLS

Good News About Education

We may not realize it, but educators have done a fantastic job in the past fifty years. This fact is supported by hard evidence. We send more children to school than any other nation—and a greater percentage complete high school than anywhere else in the world. Those who criticize the schools tend to compare apples with oranges. They say, "When I was in school, children could read." Today, however, our country has a literacy rate of 98.2%. In 1945, the literacy rate was only 55%.

Just fifty years ago, only 60% of the youngsters eligible to be in high school were enrolled, compared with the current 94% student enrollment figure. Today, the average 25-year-old American has completed high school. In 1950, the average 25-year-old had completed only 9.3 years of schooling. By any standard, that's improvement. And, more than 88% of our high school graduates perform adequately or better on literacy tests. Wouldn't it be great if 88% of all the products we buy worked?

The record of schools reflects successes in educating many different kinds of people. Schools have educated millions of immigrants and have forged a common ideal from great variety. Schools have educated the poor, the disadvantaged, and the undermotivated effectively. Too, schools have carried the biggest burden of integration—and this achievement has been called the miracle of the century. One recent survey shows that an identical 17% of white and black families with incomes below the poverty line report at least one family member in college.

Without question, schools have become more and more skilled in dealing with different students, situations, and conditions. Schools have educated the handicapped, the gifted, and the average—and have succeeded with most of them.

Critics say, "All the signs indicate a decline in basic skills." To support their claim, they keep using the Scholastic Aptitude Test as a test of "Nationwide Educational Achievement". It's not! As the title of this test indicates, the test measures aptitude: The predicted ability of a pupil to do well in college. The College Entrance Examination Board does give achievement test—and scores on six of the ten

most widely taken achievement test have been going up since 1967.

Critics also talk about the merits of course requirements for secondary students in France, Great Britain, and the Soviet Union. Indeed, these requirements are rigorous by our standards. That's why some insist that our schools aren't demanding enough. Yet, a much higher percentage of our pupils remain in school until the 12th year. In European countries only 20% of the children who would be in the senior class are in school. Furthermore, critics fail to mention international studies which show that our most capable students perform on a par with the most capable students of other countries.

Our schools can and must do better. Yet, we must take pride in our successes. The level of education is increasing. And more education means more opportunity for more children. Unless we, as parents & citizens, are aware of those opportunities, we may not encourage our children to take advantage of them. We should!

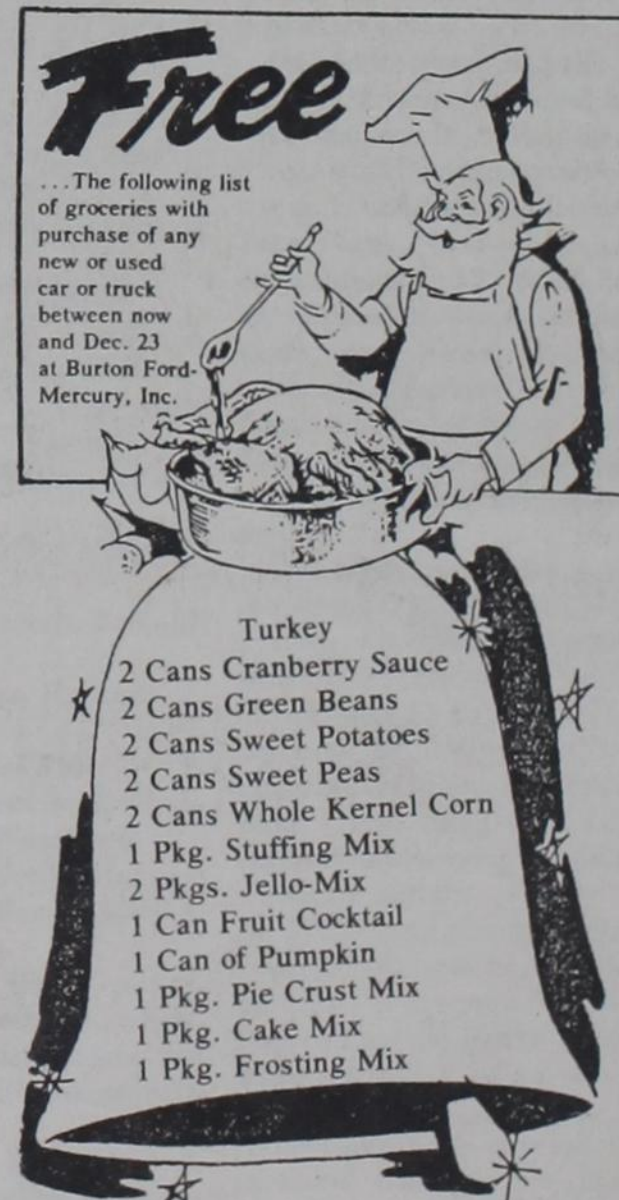

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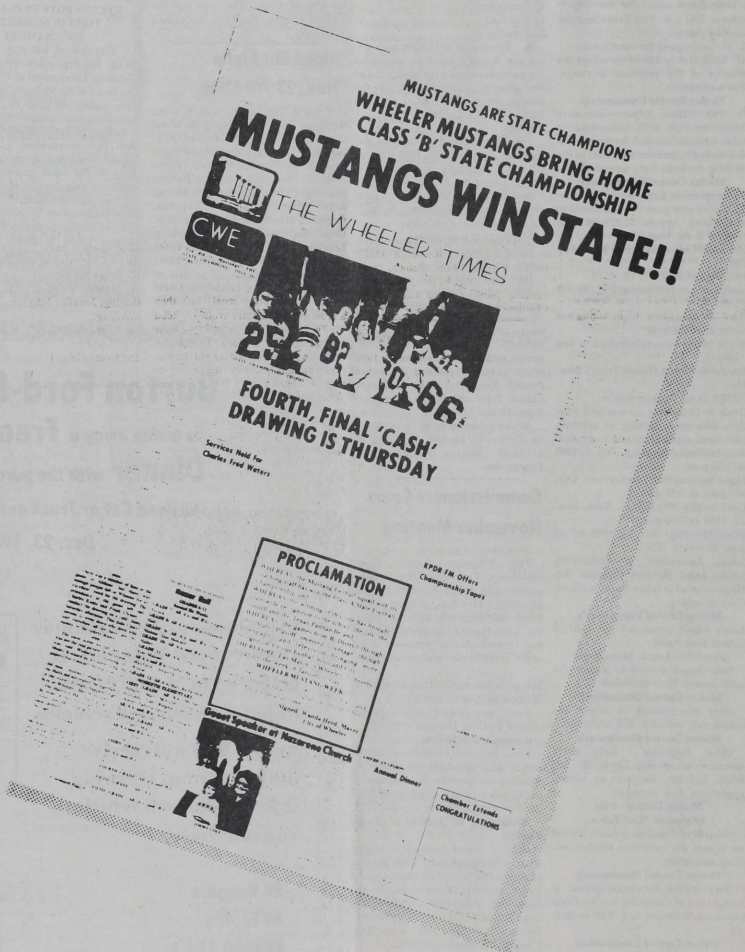

FCB Of Texas Signs With Jackson FICB

Officials of the Farm Credit system in Texas, Alabama, Louisiana and Mississippi will soon be working together to provide farm loans in the four states.

Paul S. Day, president of the Farm Credit Bank (FCB) of Texas, said a memorandum of understanding has been signed with the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank (FICB) of Jackson, Mississippi, paving the way for a future merger of the two districts. Under the agreement, the Texas FCB will perform certain management duties for the FICB of Jackson, and will provide services and funds to First South Production Credit Association (PCA) and Northwest Louisiana Production Credit Association beginning the first quarter of 1989.

The Jackson FICB is the source of loan funds for First South and Northwest Louisiana PCAs. Northwest Louisiana PCA in Arcadia, Louisiana, makes farm operating loans in Bossier, Bienville, Caddo, Claiborne, De Soto, Jackson, Lincoln, Ouachita, Red River, Union and Webster parishes. First South PCA, headquartered in Jackson, serves Alabama, Mississippi and all Louisiana parishes not covered by Northwest Louisiana PCA.

"The memo states that the FCB of Texas will provide management services for the FICB of Jackson while the two Farm credit Bank of Texas signs agreement with Jackson FICB banks prepare for merger," Day said. A merger of this type requires approval by the banks' stockholders and the Farm Credit Administration (FCA), the banks' regulator in Washington, D.C.

On September 30, the FICB of Jackson and its affiliated PCAs had \$495 million in operating loans to 5,777 stockholder-borrowers in Alabama, Louisiana and Mississippi. The Texas bank, 44 Federal Land Bank Associations and 22 PCAs had almost \$3 billion in loans outstanding to more than 40,000 stockholder-borrowers in the state. The Texas Farm Credit District is one of the strongest financial institutions in the country with a combined net worth of \$500 million.

The Jackson bank is the only remaining FICB in the Farm Credit System. All others merged on July 6 with the Federal Land Banks in each of the other 11 Farm Credit districts. On May 20, 1988, FCA placed the Federal Land Bank and Federal Land Bank Association of Jackson in receivership, leaving the district FICB without a partner.

"We believe this potential territorial expansion will be beneficial to all parties concerned," Day said. "Spreading the banks' fixed operating costs over a larger member base will help keep the cost of credit competitive to borrowers in Texas, Alabama, Louisiana and Mississippi."
