To Family and Friends

I'm writing to ask for your help. One year ago today, Edguardo Kennebrew was convicted of First Degree Murder of killing Eric. His sentence was Life in Prison, but because of the way the system works, he is eligible to apply for parole in 7 years. This is 6 years from now. It is totally unfair that he should be allowed to get out of prison that early - or at all. My main reason for writing you is this: I know we can not bring Eric back, but if we could help save some other person and family from the tragedy we have gone through, that is what I feel God is wanting me to do. The District Attorney in Dekalb County has told me that we should all write and explain the effect of Eric's death has had on his family and friends. The Parole Board really will take our letters into consideration when Kennebrew's files an application for parole.

I want to tell you a little bit about Mr. Kennebrew. He was a drug pusher who moved from motel to motel trying to stay one step ahead of the law. The night that he killed Eric, he and two other boys had been smoking dope and drinking beer for about 4 hours before he committed the crime. That was the way he lived his life. During the trial he kept looking at us without one bit of remorse. It is hard to believe that someone could take another's life and not feel anything. Even when the verdict was read, he had no reaction. This is what kind of person he is. If you feel that it is unfair for Kennebrew to be released early, please write a letter to the Parole Board letting them know your relationship with Eric and how you feel about Kennebrew being released. Please write now; the letters will be retained in his file for consideration when he makes his application for parole in six years.

I want you to know that God has been so good to take care of me and the kids. He has help to ease the pain and hurt. We have a long way to go, but I know with his help we will make it. I thank you for caring and praying for us during this difficult time. Thank you so much for remembering Eric' in this way. Our family appreciates all your support. God bless you and your families. The night time lighting ceremonies program is very stirring.


Another big attraction in the Back Hills area is the Passion Play a Spearfish, South Dakota.







BRINGING BACK MEALTIME

"Please pass the love, unity, and spaghetti." An unlikely request? Perhaps. But in truth, that's what you give your child when you sit down together at the family table.

Mealtime means more than refueling your child with nutrients - they're also getting a hefty dose of emotional, intellectual, and spiritual nourishment. As you serve the peas and butter the bread, you convey your values and establish traditions.

Yet, some experts worry that the family meal is headed for extinction. During the past 10-30 years, a degeneration of the family structure has taken place and families now eatfewer meals together.

Child experts and nutrition specialists are concerned that families are losing the unity that traditional meals once provided. Although recent surveys show a decline in the number of meals families eat together, the good news is that most American families still break bread together often.

A survey by Rice-A-Roni indicated that, on average, Americans eat with their families five nights a week, and 40 percent spend every night dining together. But other polls show a more alarming trend. Out of 1,000 people interviewed in the Los Angeles area, one in three households did not eat regularly as a family.

Many families continue to maintain the tradition of shared meals, but the trend is shifting.

It is believed that eating with the family helps foster a child's development. A child's development is spurred by a positive mealtime atmosphere, traditions shaped through shared meals that offer young children a sense of security. Children learn to communicate effectively in a nonthreatening environment by sharing the day's events, expressing feelings and listening to one another.

Parents should try to make a point to talk to kids at mealtime, keeping conversations pleasant and saving problems and discipline for another time. Ask children about school, their activities and things they enjoy doing.





From The Minister's Desk:

From 1957 to 1976 Darrell Royal was the head football coach at the University of Texas. During this tenure of nineteen years, Coach Royal and his teams complied an impressive won/lost record, winning the national championship in 1963,

1969, and 1970. For a successful football coach, Coach Royal had an unusual philosophy about the game of football. He believed the game to be a brutal game that did not build character in football players. In his biography, The Darrell Royal Story, Coach Royal is quoted as saying: "I would tell the parents of the players that I was recruiting that if they send a good one, I would probably send them a good one back. But if they send me a weak one, I would probably send them a weak one back. "

Apparently Coach Royal believed that the development of character in children was the responsibility of their parents. I wish some of the critics of society were as perceptive in their observations.

It has become extremely popular to blame churches and schools for the lack of character that many children demonstrate. Yet the Bible clearly teaches that "--children are a gift--" to parents. (Psalms 127:3) The Bible also teaches that parents are "--to train--" their children in the way that they should go, disciplining them wisely and firmly. From these admonitions it should be obvious that parents are responsible for the development of character in their children--not schools and churches. As a minister and as a former member of the school board I am tired ! I am tired: ---Of young, unprepared marriages

Of young people camouflaging the fact of impending parenthood with a marriage ceremony.

Of our wanting our children to have success more than goodness. Of broken hearts and ruined lives so needlessly.

I am also tired of churches and schools being blamed for these broken hearts and ruined lives. It is time for more parents to take responsibility for their lives and the lives of their children. Churches and schools can offer help and encouragement to parents, but the ultimate responsibility for the development of character in children belongs to their parents. In a recent issue of McCalls Magazine this responsibility was emphasized in an article that said: "Parents, let your children know where you stand. They need parents who will love them and who will discipline them."

There is a Chinese proverb that says: "You cannot carve rotten wood. A football coach, like Darrell Royal, cannot. Neither can churches and schools. If parents send good kids to churches and schools, churches and schools will probably send good kids back to the parents. However, if parents send bad kids to churches and schools, churches and schools will probably send bad kids back to them.





under this designation at this time is seeded small grain forage. Producers who suffered seeded small grain forage losses due to the drought should have timely reported their acres, losses, evidence of production and all other information required to determine their eligibility for NAP benefits at the county office. Acreage reports, notices of loss, and NAP applications filed now are considered late-filed.

"Seeded small grain forage producers must meet the late-filing deadline of August 30, 1996, to apply for NAP benefits, " said Bennett. Any requests for NAP for 1996 seeded small grain forage filed after this date will not be approved.

Seeded small grain forage producers must file all necessary information with the local FSA Office by August 30. This includes acreage reports, notices of loss, and applications for payment, along with acceptable records of both historical and current year production.

Only a person who actually owns or leases the acreage, plants and produces the seeded small grain forage crop, and grazes or leases the acreage for grazing to another person is eligible for NAP benefits.

Seeded small grain forage includes fields seeded to wheat, barley, oats, rye, triticale, or any combination of those crops. Seeded small grain forage eligible for NAP includes.

1) acreage planted and reported with an intent of full season grazing (fall, winter, and spring)

2) acreage planted and reported with an intent of fall and winter grazing only, followed by grain production in the spring

3) acreage planted and reported with an intent of spring grazing only




