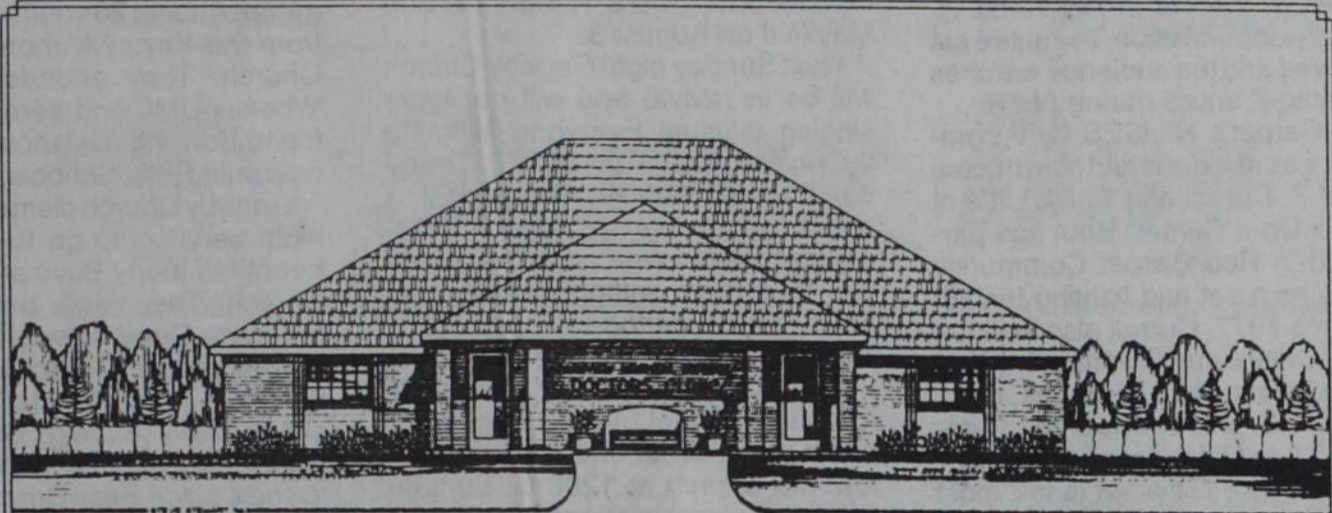

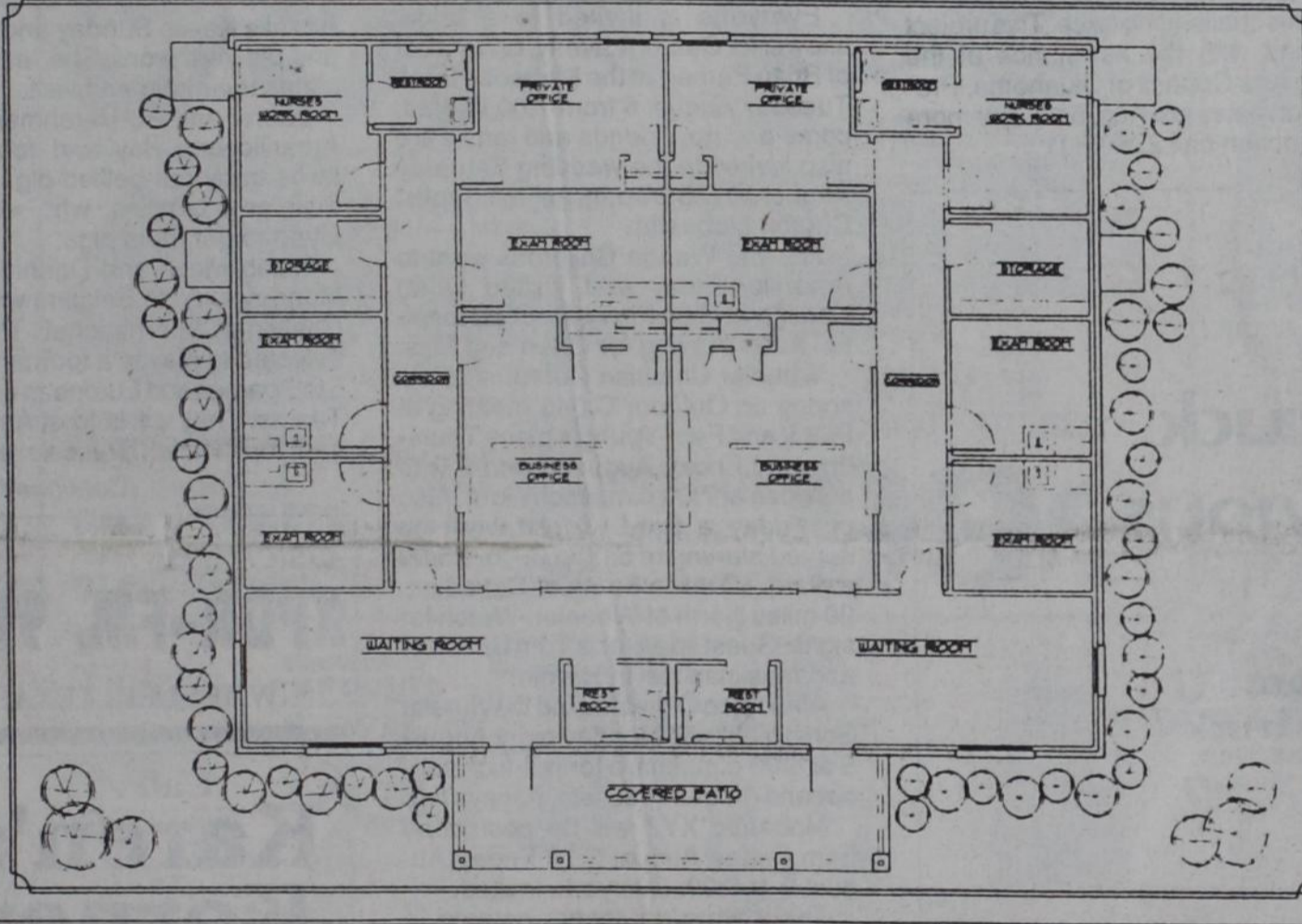

Hoy Hunter was born April 28, 1914, in McLean, Texas to Jim W. and Ollie Mae (Swink) Hunter and passed away Saturday, July 27, at the age of 82. He moved to Cheyenne as a young boy, where he was raised. Hoy was married to Ruby Purvis and they established their home near Crawford. To Family and Friends of Eric Snowden,

I'm writing to ask for your help. One year ago today, Edgardo Kennebrew was convicted of First Degree Murder of killing Eric. His sentence was Life in Prison, but because of the way the system works, he is eligible to apply for parole in 7 years. This is 6 years from now. It is totally unfair that he should be allowed to get out of prison that early - or at all. My main reason for writing you is this: I know we can not bring Eric back, but if we could help save some other person and family from the tragedy we have gone through, that is what I feel God is wanting me to do. The District Attorney in Dekalb County has told me that we should all write and explain the effect of Eric's death has had on his family and friends. The Parole Board really will take our letters into consideration when Kennebrew's files an application for parole.

I want to tell you a little bit about Mr. Kennebrew. He was a drug pusher who moved from motel to motel trying to stay one step ahead of the law. The night that he killed Eric, he and two other boys had been smoking dope and drinking beer for about 4 hours before he committed the crime. That was the way he lived his life. During the trial he kept looking at us without one bit of remorse. It is hard to believe that someone could take another's life and not feel anything. Even when the verdict was read, he had no reaction. This is what kind of person he is. If you feel that it is unfair for Kennebrew to be released early, please write a letter to the Parole Board letting them know your relationship with Eric and how you feel about Kennebrew being released. Please write now; the letters will be retained in his file for consideration when he makes his application for parole in six years.

I want you to know that God has been so good to take care of me and the kids. He has help to ease the pain and hurt. We have a long way to go, but I know with his help we will make it. I thank you for caring and praying for us during this difficult time. Thank you so much for remembering Eric in this way. Our family appreciates all your support. God bless you and your families.

I did not attend, but we were hosts for a couple of bluegrass fans and entertained Star Canyon on two occasions.

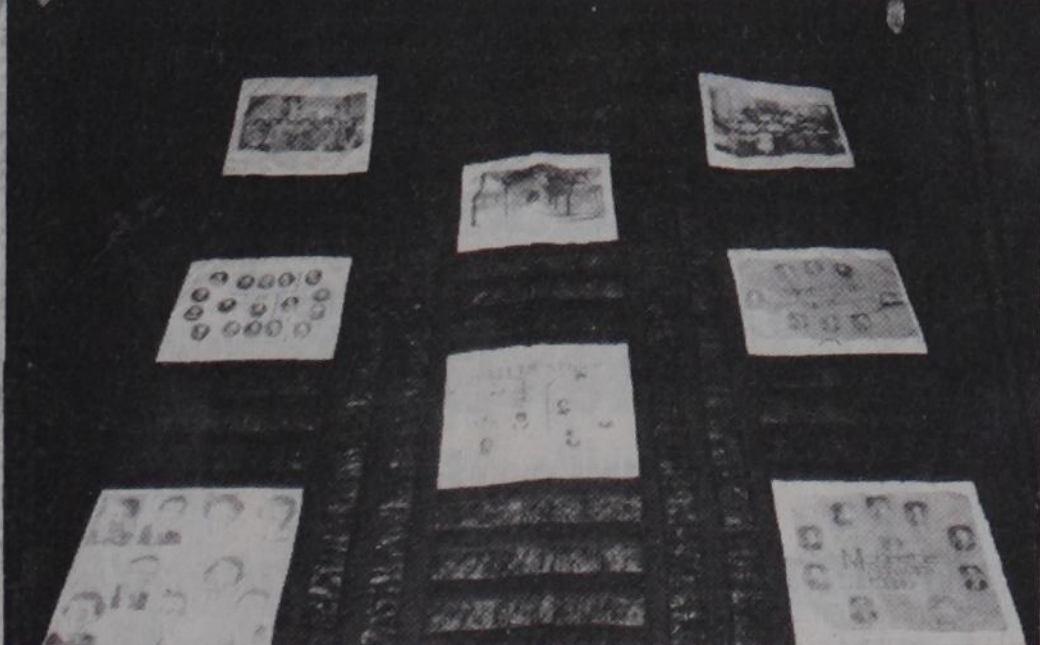

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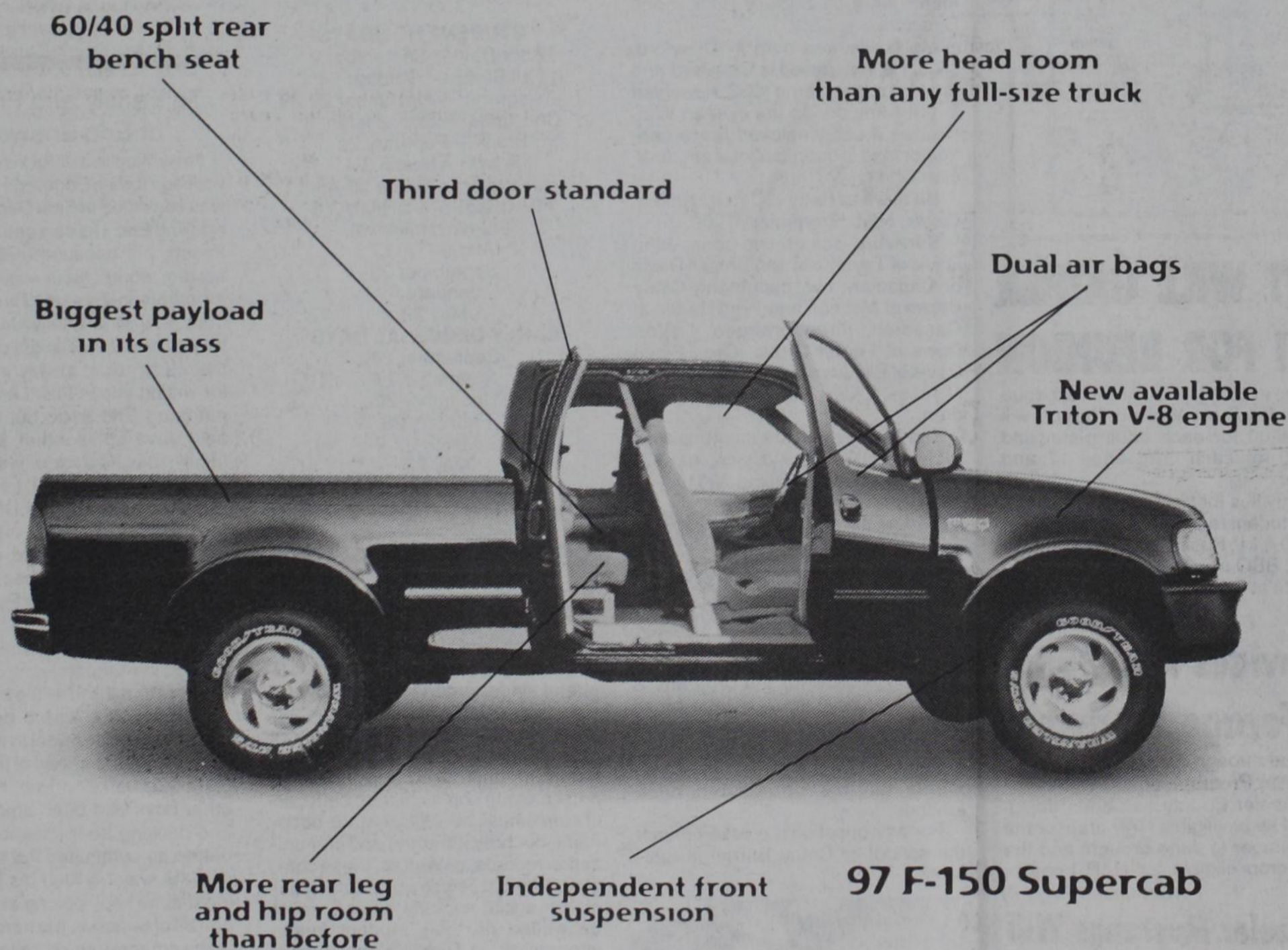

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Extension Update

BRINGING BACK MEALTIME

"Please pass the love, unity, and spaghetti." An unlikely request? Perhaps. But in truth, that's what you give your child when you sit down together at the family table.

Mealtime means more than refueling your child with nutrients - they're also getting a hefty dose of emotional, intellectual, and spiritual nourishment. As you serve the peas and butter the bread, you convey your values and establish traditions.

Yet, some experts worry that the family meal is headed for extinction. During the past 10-30 years, a degeneration of the family structure has taken place and families now eat fewer meals together.

Child experts and nutrition specialists are concerned that families are losing the unity that traditional meals once provided. Although recent surveys show a decline in the number of meals families eat together, the good news is that most American families still break bread together often.

A survey by Rice-A-Roni indicated that, on average, Americans eat with their families five nights a week, and 40 percent spend every night dining together. But other polls show a more alarming trend. Out of 1,000 people interviewed in the Los Angeles area, one in three households did not eat regularly as a family.

Many families continue to maintain the tradition of shared meals, but the trend is shifting.

It is believed that eating with the family helps foster a child's development. A child's development is spurred by a positive mealtime atmosphere, traditions shaped through shared meals that offer young children a sense of security. Children learn to communicate effectively in a non-threatening environment by sharing the day's events, expressing feelings and listening to one another.

Parents should try to make a point to talk to kids at mealtime, keeping conversations pleasant and saving problems and discipline for another time. Ask children about school, their activities and things they enjoy doing.

Family meals also can promote cooperation, especially when mealtime chores are divided up. Even children as young as 2 can have a job associated with mealtime, such as carrying napkins to the table.

As most parents know, manners don't just happen. The dinner table is one area that offers plenty of opportunities for parents to model subtle etiquette lessons. Besides, it is difficult to get through a meal without a few rounds of "please," "thank you," "excuse me," and "may I?"

Mealtime also is a time to express and acknowledge love, seek renewal, and develop in a spiritual sense. Families may choose to speak to God together, count blessings and express concerns at the family table.

I Thessalonians 4:16-18, "For the Lord himself shall descend from heaven with a shout, and with the trump of God; and the dead in Christ shall rise first.

Then we which are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds, to meet the Lord in the air; and so shall we ever be with the Lord.

Wherefore comfort one another with these words."

From The Minister's Desk:
From 1957 to 1976 Darrell Royal was the head football coach at the University of Texas. During this tenure of nineteen years, Coach Royal and his teams compiled an impressive won/lost record, winning the national championship in 1963, 1969, and 1970.
For a successful football coach, Coach Royal had an unusual philosophy about the game of football. He believed the game to be a brutal game that did not build character in football players. In his biography, *The Darrell Royal Story*, Coach Royal is quoted as saying: "I would tell the parents of the players that I was recruiting that if they send a good one, I would probably send them a good one back. But if they send me a weak one, I would probably send them a weak one back."
Apparently Coach Royal believed that the development of character in children was the responsibility of their parents. I wish some of the critics of society were as perceptive in their observations.
It has become extremely popular to blame churches and schools for the lack of character that many children demonstrate. Yet the Bible clearly teaches that "—children are a gift—" to parents. (Psalms 127:3) The Bible also teaches that parents are "—to train—" their children in the way that they should go, disciplining them wisely and firmly. From these admonitions it should be obvious that parents are responsible for the development of character in their children—not schools and churches.
