


The Wheeler Mustangs rolled over the Skyrockets of Wellington with the

A totally traditional Circus, the Big Top will be set up at the Wheeler County Ag Barn.



## New Equine Health Rule To Take Effect in 1997 To help control the spread of Equine

Infectious Anemia, additional health regulations will go into effect January 1, 1997 for equine, which include horses, asses, mules, donkey, and zebras.

Equine must have had a negative EIA test within the past 12 months before they undergo ANY change of ownership, whether it is a market sale, private treaty, trade, or sale to slaughter. The EIA test documentthe VS 10-11 form-is proof of testing. Equine dealers must keep records for two years on equine bought and sold. Records must include the names and addresses of buyers and sellers. Equine in ANY trail rides, shows, fairs, competitions or other events where equine are gathered must have had a negative EIA test within the past 12 months.

# TASURA: A COMANCHE REMEMBERS" TO BE PRESENTED AT MOBEETIE OCT. 5

The Old Mobeetie Jail Museum presents an off-site Gallery Theater production by The Witte Museum of San Antonio on October 5, 1996. The one man performance will follow a chuck wagon dinner served between 1:00 and 2:00 p.m. The free performance is an educational outreach program sponsored by the Jail Museum in conjunction with the Fort Elliott cross country meet.

The character of Tasura is performed by Uzziel Martinez, a San Antonio actor and high school teacher. The original script was written by Richard Slocum and directed by Camilla Richey.

Tasura, a Comanche who died over 100 years ago, appears before the audience to retell the story of his life. It is a story which closely parallels the demise of the Comanche people who were a dominant power in what is now the Southwestern U.S. and northern Mexico, where they ruled as "Lords of the Plains."

Dependent on their horses, which were prized above all things, and the buffalo, which provided food, clothing, shelter, and raw materials, the Comanche's fate was sealed in the late 1800's as ranchers and settlers pushed into their territory, destroying their livelihood. The Comanche fought back, which led to retaliation and raids on Indian encampments by the U.S. Army. Tasura sadly recalls how he lost the four most valuable things in his life: his wife and son, his brother/friend, and his horses during a raid by army soldiers.

Remembering happier days, Tasura tells the audience the Comanche were born to ride and what life was like for a Comanche man. This life centered around the horse, its capture and training.

was white. His body was put in an unmarked grave in "No-Man's Land." Having told his tale, Tasura leaves to rejoin his wife. His life and death symbolize the dilemma of a culture caused by change.

An extensive physical conditioning program complemented his course of study


He joined the Marine Corps in September 1981.

Horses meant wealth and economic prosperity. They were the gift a man presented to parents of the woman he wished to marry. To become a man, a Comanche boy had to catch a horse and break him on his own. Tasura recounts how, after the death of his family, he drifted around Texas and New Mexico with no real purpose. Finally, outside Kenton, Oklahoma, he lost a fight with five cowboys and was killed by a blow from a piece of fence post. According to the local preacher, Tasura looked too Indian for a cemetery burial, even though his grandfather




Many years ago we were headin to California an were on US 66. We

## **TEACH KIDS HEALTHFUL** EATING HABITS

As children grow, they learn from what they know and by watching the clues from parents, sibling, teachers and friends about making the right

cancers, parents can help children set healthful eating habits by offering a variety of foods and creating balance in their own eating patterns.o

Plan meals using the pyramid idea of building a healthful diet. At the base of the pyramid, start building a strong foundation to a healthful diet by selecting six or more servings of bread, pastas, cereals and rice group and at the middle select at least five a day of both groups-vegetables (three to five servings) and fruits groups (two to four servings). On the next level above the middle pyramid balance with the recommended servings of two 3ounce servings of meat, poultry, fish, dry beans, eggs and nuts group and two to three servings of milk, yogurt and cheese group. At the pinnacle of the pyramid are the fats, oils and sweets group which is recommened only in small servings and only if you can afford the extra calories.

Nutritional contributions at each level are significant. The breads, fruits and vegetables all contribute complex carbohydrates and sugars which are valuable energy sources as well as rich in vitamins and minerals available for a child's growth an development. Breads, cereals, pastas, and rice are rich sources of the B vitamins, iron and fiber. Fruits and vegetables as well supply carbohydrates, vita-mins A and C, and folic acid to keep eyes, skin and blood healthy. Meats, poultry, fish, dry beans and eggs provide hight quality protein and heme iron-a readily absorbable form of


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## **GUILTY:** GRANITE PAIR PLEAD BE SENTENCED

(Editor's Note: This article originally appeared in The Clinton Oklahoma Daily News on September 6, 1996.)

In what prosecutor Keith Aycock said was a surprise to him, Granite prison escapees Adam Wright and Dale Wadsworth pleaded guilty Thursday to a variety of charges filed in connection with the kidnapping of an Elk City woman and her small child 13 months ago.

Wright and Wadsworth had been scheduled to go to trial late his month, but both entered guilty pleas Thursday at the Custer County Courthouse. Aycock said they were "blind" pleas, with no agreement in advance as to punishment.

District Judge Charles Goodwin, who accepted the pleas, ordered presentencing investigations for both defendants. He scheduled sentencing for Oct. 21 at 1:30 p.m.

The 27-year-old Wright, already a convicted double murderer, pleaded guilty to escape from prison, robbery with a firearm, two counts of kidnapping, rape, attempted rape, forcible oral sodomy, child abuse, carrying a firearm after former conviction of a felony, and shooting with intent to kill. Two counts of running a roadblock, three of feloniously pointing a firearm, and one of rape by instrumentation were dismissed.

Wadsworth, 44, whose record included no violent crimes until the escape, pleaded guilty to escape, robbery with a firearm, two counts of kidnapping, child abuse, carrying a firearm after former conviction of a felony, and shooting with intent to kill. The same two counts of running a roadblock and three of feloniously pointing a firearm that were dismissed against Wright were also dismissed against him.

"That was in exchange for them to plead guilty to what we thought was the meat of our case," said Aycock, an assistant district attorney in Comanche County who was appointed as a special prosecutor to handle this case. "We asked the court to dismiss the rape-by-instrumentation against Wright after consulting with Mrs. Childress," he added.

Gena Childress, then 23, and her 2-year-old daughter, Caitlyn, were kidnapped from their home north of Elk City sometime after 9 a.m. on Aug. 7, 1995. They were driven in the Childress family van to a gas well site off the Pie Flat Road in western Custer County where the woman was raped, then were taken on a wild 40-mile chase over back roads that ended in firearm, larceny of an automobile, and misdemeanor assault and battery are pending against Wright and Wadsworth in Kiowa County, in the Third District, in connection with a break-in which occurred prior to the kidnappings at Elk City. The two escapees allegedly tied up a woman at Retrop and stole three guns and a car

They're scheduled to go to trial Monday on those charges; however, Aycock said he understood Assistant District Attorney Mathew Salter had offered to let their sentences run concurrently with whatever punishment they'll receive in Custer County if they would go ahead and plead guilty without trial. Salter was in court this morning and could not be reached, but his secretary said at noon that no guilty pleas had been entered as of that time.

Wright was serving two life-withoutparole sentences for the murders of an Anadarko wrecker operator and his 4-year-old grandson when he and Wadsworth escaped from the Oklahoma State Reformatory at Granite by tunneling their way out.

Wadsworth was serving a 10-year sentence for forgery in Comanche County, but his record also includes an escape from a Michigan prison.

Wright's escape was the second by a convicted murderer in less than a year from the medium-security Granite prison and led to the firing of warden Jack Cowley.

Since their recapture, Wright and Wadsworth have been held at the maximum-security Oklahoma State Prison in McAlester.

Avcock said Mrs. Childress has expressed a desire to address the court at the sentencing and will be allowed to do so.

"I'm sure she will have an opinion as to what she thinks punishment should be," he said.

Both prosecuting and defense attorneys also will be allowed to make recommendations regarding punishment. Aycock said he has a recommended punishment in mind but he wouldn't disclose it at this time.

"I have to be real careful about what I say to the media regarding future events," he said. "It will be the judge's decision as to what he feels is proper. What I can say is that there's not an agreement the defendants will take certain punishment. Both sides will have an opportunity to express what they feel punishment should be."

Even though both defendants have prior criminal records, including

# Wheat Growers Will Be **Offered New Insurance**

Texas wheat growers will be able to try a new kind of crop insurance this year that protects them against revenue losses, as well as yield losses. But they must decide quickly-September 30 is the deadline for choosing this new crop insurance.

"It's a new approach because it guarantees farmers a stated amount of revenue," said Ken Stokes, Texas A&M agricultural economist based in Dallas. "It's more expensive than traditional policies, but for the first time, covers losses from low prices, low yields, or any combination of the two. Traditional crop insurance policies cover production losses only."

Stokes stressed, "Wheat farmers in the High Plains, Rolling Plains and Blacklands should be sitting down very soon with their crop insurance agents to examine this new option against other insurance programs to choose the best product for their situation." "Crop Revenue Coverage (CRC) is an alternative to Multiple Peril Crop Insurance."

CRC was approved as a pilot program in Texas and six other states by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation. It guarantees a minimum revenue calculated using a grower's yield history, a base price established this August prior to planting and a harvest time price determined next June.

"CRC" insurance has two appealing characteristics. First, producers are guaranteed a minimum revenue per acre which should help in obtaining financing. Second, if price increases between the initial and final price determination the minimum revenue guarantee also increases at no additional cost," according to Steve Amosson, Texas A&M agricultural economist based in Amarillo. "This concept is the same as house insurance where items lost are replaced at current market value rather than original purchase price." Points out CRC producers need to remember are:

\*CRC guarantees a minimum revenue per acre


\*CRC guaranteed revenue will increase if wheat prices increase at no additional premium

\*CRC coverage is definitely more expensive than multiple peril coverage

\*CRC coverage is only available through private insurance carriers

\*The deadline for obtaining CRC coverage on this year's crop is September 30.

Amosson says, "The CRC is definitely worth considering. Each producer needs to evaluate his/her own situation to determine if the coverage

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
