## MUSTANGS MUSCLE BY WHITE DEER

### CHARITY STAMPEDE PLANNED FOR NOV. 19

The first annual Charity Stampede is scheduled for Sunday, November 19 at 2:00 p.m. in the Wheeler County Show Barn. This event, sponsored by the Wheeler Livestock Boosters, is planned to give members of charitable organizations a chance to raise money for their organization and have a good time competing against others from across the county.

Events included in the Stampede will be calf tie-down, ribbon race, goat milking and team branding. These events do not require a horse or highly advanced cowboy skills.

A team will consist of two members from the organization and the spouse of a member. There must be at least one woman on each team. Team members must have been a bonafide member of the organization on September 1, 1989 and must be at least 21 years of age on November 19.

Each team will pay a \$30.00 entry fee and compete in three events. Teams may get sponsors to pay their

entry fee and the sponsor will receive recognition throughout the Stampede. The entry fee will be jackpotted and paid back to event winner and the champion and reserve champion teams.

In addition, participating organizations will be able to sell tickets to the Charity Stampede for \$3.00 each. One dollar will be retained by the organization, \$1.00 will go into the prize money pot and \$1.00 will go to the Wheeler Livestock Boosters.

Entry blanks and rules have been mailed to many of the eligible organizations in Wheeler County. Any organizations such as civic clubs, sororities, volunteer fire department, community boosters interested in participating may contact a member of the Charity Stampede Committee for further information. Committee members are: Van Baize, Fred Goad, Gary Hardcastle, Delbert Thomas, Terry McCasland and Don King. A member of the committee would be glad to meet with any organization to discuss the Charity Stampede.

A 25 yard scoring pass from Shawn Bradstreet to Michael Kenney brought the Mustangs to a 7-7 tie with the White Deer Bucks just 23 seconds before halftime and then Wheeler dominated the final two quarters to win going away, 28-7 last Friday night.

The chilled Nicholson Field crowd witnessed a different Mustang team in the second half. Maybe it was scoring just before halftime or maybe it was a good chewing out during the break but whatever did it was the medicine the Mustangs needed to get the victory and take over sole possession of second place in District 1-1A.

White Deer garnered 141 yards of total offense and 120 of these yards

came in the first half as the Mustangs shut the Bucks offense down competently in the third and fourth quarters. The Bucks had a measly 3 yards rushing and 18 through the air against the aroused Mustangs after halftime.

You might call it a Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde performance for the Mustangs as they didn't make a first down themselves until nearly midway of the second quarter and only two more when they tied the count at 7.

Late in the second quarter, White Deer recovered a fumble by Kenney at the 50 and in just three plays were in the end zone. Daniel Gillespie ran for 33 yards to the 17 and Zach Thomas got 8 more to the 9. Quarterback Troy Cummins scored

from that point on a keeper at right end and Thomas booted the extra point with 1:52 to play.

Mack Marshall fumbled on first down after the TD and the Bucks recovered on the Wheeler 30 and it appeared that they were going to pad their lead but Bradstreet intercepted a Cummins pass on the Mustang 12 and was finally brought down on the White Deer 40.

An incompletion and then a 15 yard fine against the Bucks moved the ball to the 25 from where Bradstreet launched the toss that tied the game. Arthur Altamarino booted good on his first of four PAT's.

The tie breaking touchdown for the Mustangs was set up by a 29 yard punt return by Brandon Cnick to the White Deer 21. Four running plays and the Mustangs went in front for good with Kenney getting his second six pointer on a six yard run off tackle and fans sensed a victory for Wheeler as the hard hitting Mustangs throttled the Bucks offense at every turn.

Six plays into the final period, the Bucks stopped the Mustangs on the White Deer 6 but they were forced to punt and Gillespie's boot from his end zone sailed to the 40 where Bradstreet returned 8 yards to the Bucks 32.

Kenney ran 9 from the 10 for a first and goal but White Deer stopped 3 attempts by the Mustangs before Kenney finally crossed the goal line on fourth down and Altamarino's PAT all but sealed the win for Wheeler with just 3:26 left in the game.

A fumbled pass reception gave the Mustangs the opportunity to put the clincher on the board in the game's final minute. From the White Deer 29, Kenney ran for 9 and Bradstreet kept for four more to the 16. The Bucks drew five yards and Mack Marshall ran the final 11 yards.

It was a good week for Wheeler football against White Deer football as the Jr. High Colts won 8-6 and the JV Mustangs drilled the Bucks JV 48-0 on Thursday night before the Mustangs jolted the defending state champs.

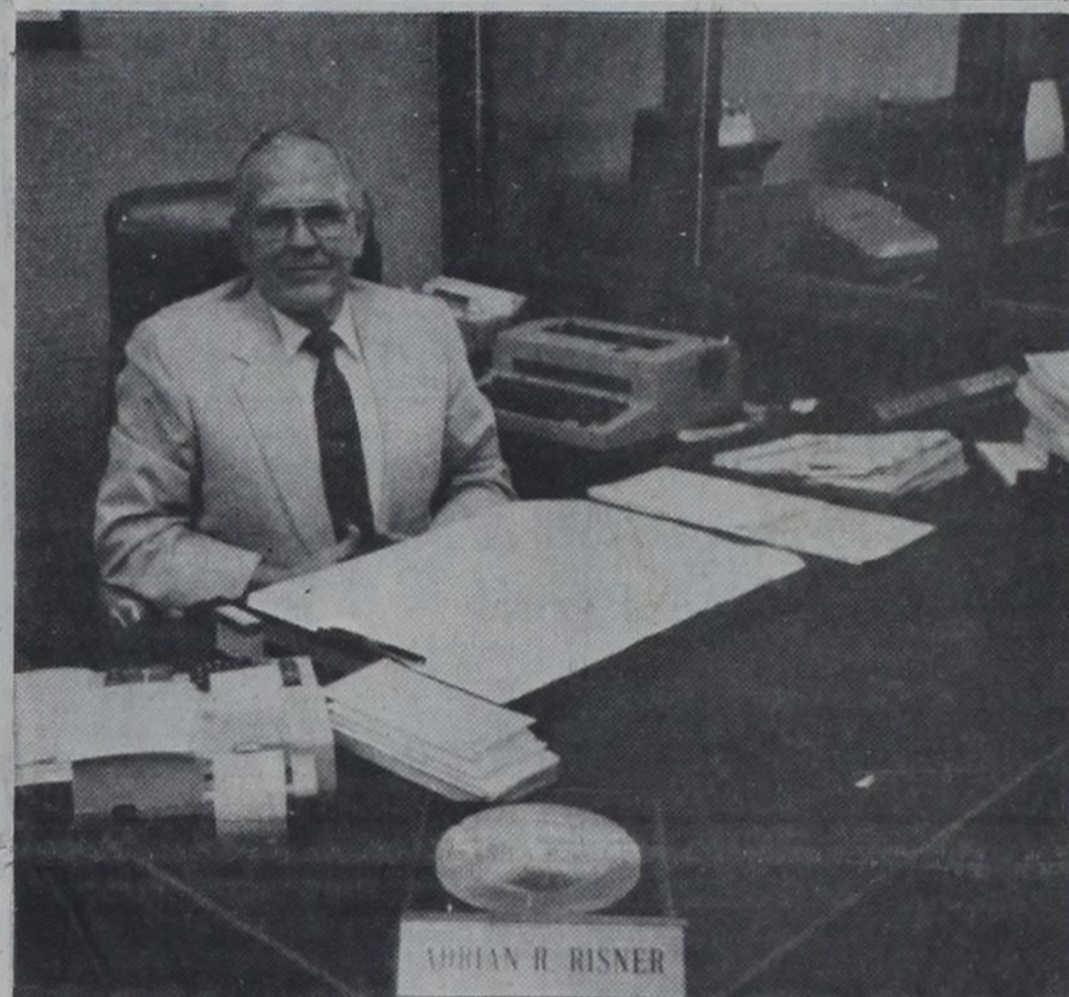
### Funeral Services Held For Rudy Rivera, Sr.

### REGULAR SEASON FINAL GAME A BIG ONE FOR WHEELER, BOOKER

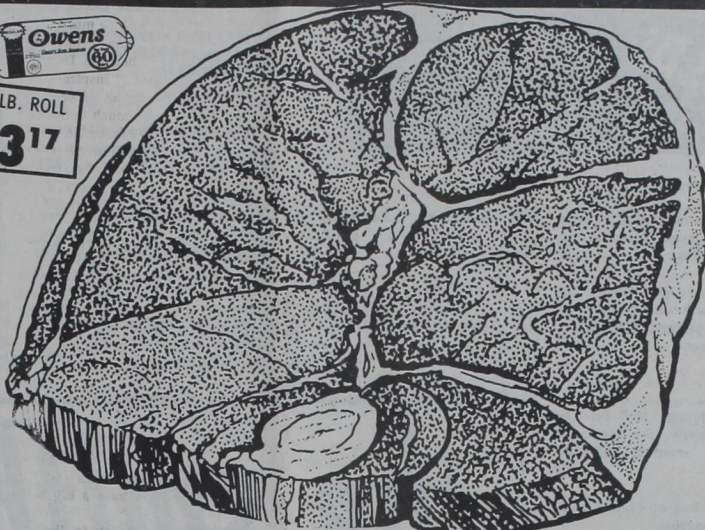

### —In Memorial—

William Jack Frye was the son of William and Nellie Frye. He was born March 18, 1904 in Sweetwater, OK. After his mothers death he lived with his grandparents Henry and Lula Frye at the Frye Ranch. He attended Rock School, Wheeler High School and Carver Chiropractic College in Oklahoma City.

1926—Age 23 Jack formed "Aero Corporation of California."

1927—Jack organized "Standard Airlines" a carrier division of Aero Corp. He was president of both.

1929—Jack made arrangements with Texas Pacific Railroads for joint operations for the Countrys first coast to coast air service.

1930—Jack merged Standard Airlines with Western Air Express, becoming Vice President in charge of operations.

1934—He was commissioned LT. U.S.NR.

1940—Promoted to Lt. Commander. Honorably discharged 1952. He was a member of the Army and Navy California Club, The Cloud Club, Sleepy Hollow County Club and Wings Club.

1959—Jack was killed in an auto accident in Tucson, Arizona and was buried there.

1962—TWA dedicated an eight-story building in Kansas City, MO. for the training of pilots, flight engineers and hostesses as the Jack Frye International Training Center. Ex-Pres. Truman spoke.

TWA was the first to put into commercial use the DC1—DC2.

In 1934 Jack became President of TWA.

Transcontinental travel time had

been reduced from 48 hours to 16 hours.

While with TWA Jack was the first to adopt de-icer system, Automatic Pilot, air brakes, anti static radio, direction finder.

1947—Jack resigned TWA and became President and Chairman of the Board fo General Analine and Film Corporation, after 8 years he resigned and formed the Frye Corp. of which he was President and Chairman of the Board.

1946—Jack was awarded the Medal for Merit by President Truman for performing air transport service in WWII. The Italian government awarded him with the "Order of Grand Officer of the Crown of Italy" for assistance and re-establishing air service after the war.

1921-22—Jack served U.S. Army Engineers.

1934—He was commissioned LT. U.S.NR.

1940—Promoted to Lt. Commander. Honorably discharged 1952. He was a member of the Army and Navy California Club, The Cloud Club, Sleepy Hollow County Club and Wings Club.

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Jack Frye was buried in Wheeler July 8, 1989 along side his brother, Don Frye, who was also an early pilot and aviation pioneer.

# Man Caught With Classified Information

### Claims information regularly published

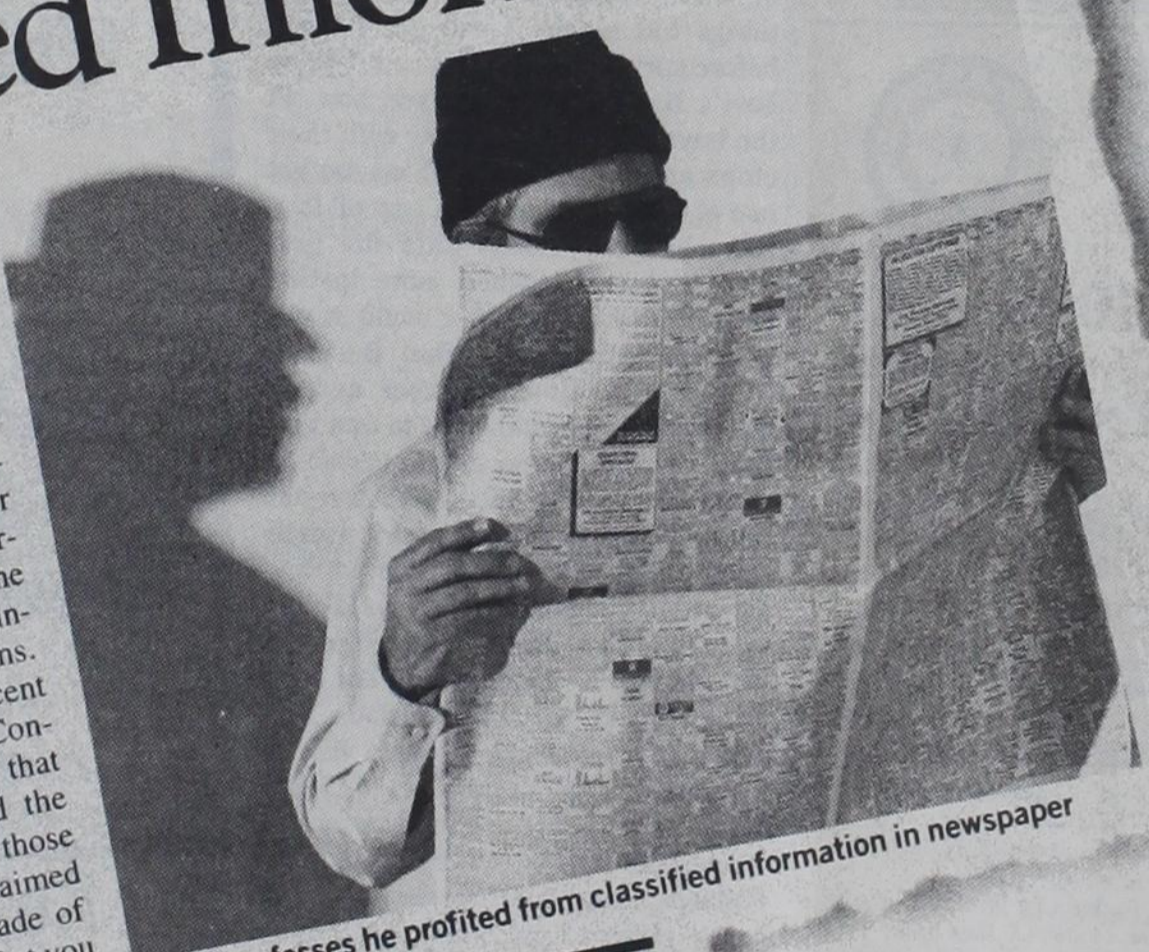
Neighbors today were surprised to learn Melvin Kline, a seemingly quiet, well-mannered man was making extra money with classified information. When questioned earlier this morning, Kline professed surprise that everyone wasn't using the classified section to earn extra income and get rid of unwanted items.

"It's common," he said. Recent studies tend to bear Kline out. Consumer Data Service reported that over 85% of the public read the newspaper and over 80% of those read the classifieds. Kline claimed widespread use was being made of the classified information. "But you have to act quickly," he remarked. "If I have something to sell, I can be in the paper by tomorrow. I do that a lot now," he confessed. "With classified, whether I'm buying or selling, I can reach a large market instantly. And it's easy... just pick up the phone."

When asked if price mattered at all, Kline stated he was in possession of Consumer Data Service documents that indicated newspaper readership increases as income increases. "The more money they make, the more they read the paper," he said, "and I can prove it." Asked for a last comment, Kline replied "No matter what you're looking for, a new job, a great car, merchandise, or even a home, take a long look at the classified section.

"Sure, I've made some money from classified information, but so can anyone who reads the paper."

The information's all there." Response Analysis Corp. studies indicate the public does exactly that, with 98% preferring the newspaper over radio and 68% preferring the newspaper instead of TV. Kline was last seen in the company of an unidentified man carrying two outboard motors.

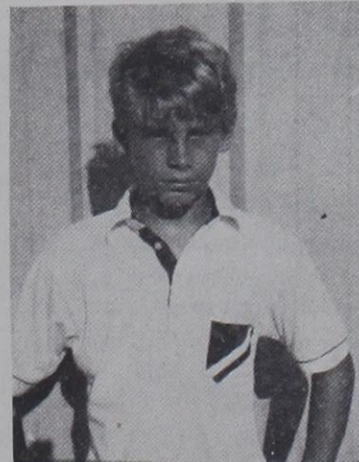
