The Wheeler J.V. improved their record to 3 and 0 with a 36 to 6 victory over the Shamrock Irish J.V.

Shamrock opened the scoring early in the first quarter with a 3 yd. TD run. The two point conversion attempt failed making the score 6 to 0 in favor of Shamrock. With 34 seconds left in the first quarter Matt Smith hauled in a 55 yard scoring pass from Joe Dan Ledbetter. The two point conversion failed tying the score at 6-6. Mark Marshall then scored on a 5 yd. TD run around the right side. Shannon Robinson caught a tipped pass from Ledbetter for the 2 pt. conversion making the score 14 to 6 in Wheeler's favor. Then with 3 seconds left in the 2nd quarter Matt Smith grabbed a tipped 2 yd. pass from Joe Dan Ledbetter for a touchdown. The 2 pt. conversion pass to Smith was good making the score 22 to 6 at the half.

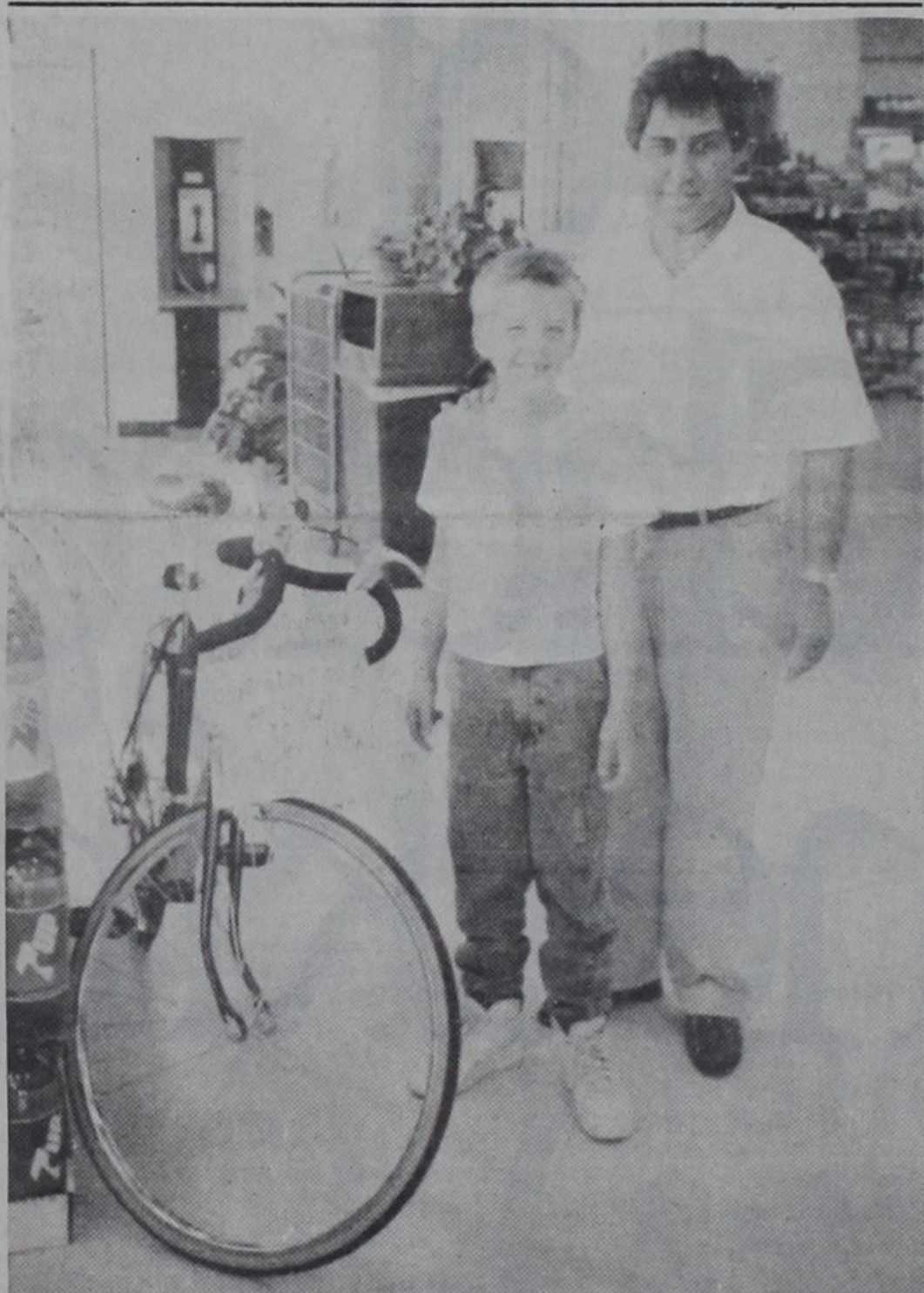
The Colts travel to Booker to take on the Kiowas at 5:30 Thursday.

Local Man Robbed East Of Mobeetie

An occupied residence east of Mobeetie was entered Saturday evening at 7:30. Two men, and one juvenile have been arraigned and are being held in Wheeler County jail.

The trio decided they needed some money and selected a victim, known to one of the men from Mobeetie.

The residence is located back from the highway. A knock at the back door was not answered, so one of the men went to the front door. The victim responded to the knock and was asked to use the phone. Upon gaining entry, the victim was tied, gagged and blindfolded.

The house was searched and guns were obtained. The victim was then forced at gunpoint to write a check. The victim was then untied and reportedly fell and cut his head on some broken glass.

The victim's car was stolen and later abandoned.

The three were spotted and questioned in Wheeler and released, due to lack of evidence.

Warrants were later issued and the three were arrested in Electra on Sunday and brought back to Wheeler for arraignment on Monday.

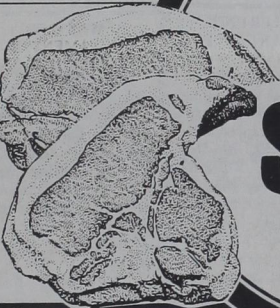

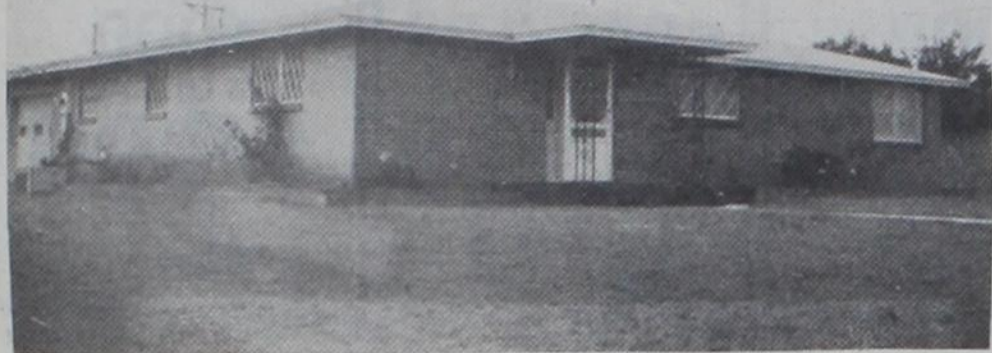

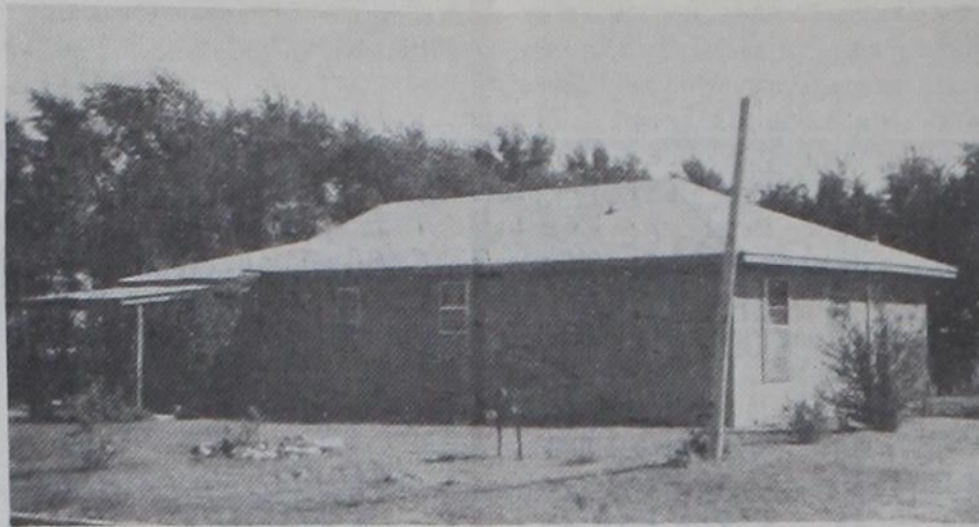

From The Minister's Desk:
A Biblical truth is stated on the bumper sticker that says: "Christians are not perfect—just forgiven". Yet this great truth is misunderstood by many people who are not Christians and it is misunderstood by people who are. The reason for this misunderstanding is that they believe Christians are to be sinlessly perfect.
To correct this misunderstanding, there are two observations that must be made. These observations are:—
1. The New Testament affirms that salvation is by the grace of God not man's attainment. Ephesians 2:8-9 says: "...By grace you have been saved through faith; and that not of yourselves, it is a gift of God; not as a result of works, that no one should boast." There are two phrases in this text that must be emphasized.
The first phrase is: "...By grace...". Salvation is by the grace of God which is a demonstration of the love of God that is unearned, undeserved, and unpayable. Salvation is not the result of a business transaction between God and man. It is "...the free gift of God..." that man receives. (Romans 6:23)
Then the second phrase is: "...Through faith...". Salvation is by the grace of God which is found in Jesus Christ. And access to this grace is "...through faith..." in Jesus Christ. Such a faith is tangible, expressing itself through obedience and service to the Lordship of Jesus Christ. (James 2:14-26)
Salvation is rooted in the grace of God not the perfection of man.
2. The grace of God is a continuous need in the lives of Christians. Someone has observed that there are only two types of sinners—lost and saved. Christians are not people who are sinlessly perfect. Rather they are forgiven sinners—forgiven by their obedient faith in Jesus Christ.
For example, consider the Apostle Paul. This man is usually idolized as a "super christian". But he evaluated himself by saying: "...I was formerly a blasphemer and persecutor..." and then he said: "It is a trustworth statement, deserving full acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners, among whom I am foremost of all." (1 Timothy 1:13,15)
Notice the change of tense that the Apostle Paul used. He changed from past to present. He said: "...Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners, among whom I am foremost of all." The Apostle Paul realized that he had daily sins, but he also realized that these sins could be forgiven. He said: "...Yet for this reason I found mercy, in order that in me as the foremost, Jesus Christ might demonstrate His perfect patience, as an example for those who would believe in Him for eternal life. (1 Timothy 1:16)
For Christians, the grace of God is not only the purging power for past sins. It is the purging power for present sins. Christians are saved by the grace of God and it is the grace of God that keeps them saved.
The bumper sticker is correct! Christians are not perfect; they are forgiven—by the grace of God.
