# **School Tax Rate**

gram for its employees. However, two years ago the Association filed for bankruptcy, leaving the school districts responsible for the claims of employees.

A recent bankruptcy court decision determined that each of the school districts would be liable only for the employees' claims of that district.

'We're in the process of settling those claims now,'' Summers said. at present, eight to 10 employees have outstanding claims for an amount totaling slightly less than \$20,000.

'Mobeetie school district has chosen to drop medical insurance for employees after repeated effort to find a carrier,'' Summers said.

'Our district took a gusty move to raise taxes several years ago, just to keep the school open and functioning,'' Summers said. "Last year, we were able to maintain the rate from the year before. I would like to think it is because of good management.''

Presently, Mobeetie ISD has a tax base of \$33,000,750, which increased this year by approximately \$1 million in mineral values, Summers said.

'That sure helped us. It dove-tailed with what we were trying to do in the management of the school.''


Yet there are many Christians who try to live a faith that is based trimarily on its negative aspects. It is most compact but enetrating parables, Jesus warded against this tragic mistake. He aid: "Now when the unclean spirit oes out of a man, it passes brough waterless places, seeking est, and does not find it. Then it ays, I will return to my house from which I came; and when it comes, it inds it unoccupied, swept, and put norder. Then it goes and takes long with it seven other spirits nore wicked than itself, and they o in and live there; and the last tate of that man becomes worse han the first." (Matthew 12:43-45) The tragedy of the parable linges on the word, "--unocupied--". Notice that after "--the

unclean spirit--' was cast out of the house that it was ''--unocc-cupied--''. Taking advantage of this opportunity, ''--the unclean spirit--'' got ''--seven other spirits more wicked than itself--'' and occupied the house again. And the conclusion of Jesus was: ''-The last state of that man becomes worse than the first.''

The mere elimination of evil, however complete, is no equivalent for goodness. A faith that consists only of ''thou shalt nots' will never produce the abundant life. Such a faith is like adding up a column of zeroes; the answer is always zero. And the most damning of all sins is merely to do nothing. Think about the scathing denunciation that the one talent man received in the parable of the talents. (Matthew 25:14-30) The sin of this man was l''nothingless''. He simply did nothing! Jesus called this man wicked And lazy, saying; 'Cast out the worthless slave into outer darkness; in that place there shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth.'' (verse 30)

To function properly. Christianity, like the engine of an automobile, must be chAracterized by positive and negative aspects. It is absolutely essential that Christianity not be characterized by evil. But the elimination of evil is merely a preparation for producing positive works of good.
