### KPDR WILL NOT BROADCAST GAMES

KPDR has carried all the games of the Wheeler Mustang varsity football team the past 3 years, and we appreciate the kind comments that have been made in regards to our efforts. While many people attend every game that they can, there are elderly people and people whose job situation keep them from going as they would like. There are other physical limitations that hinder folks from going. We appreciate businesses and individuals that have helped us financially to pay the costs of providing this community service.

A number of factors have led to a decision to discontinue the broadcasting of every game. I believe that it would be proper for me to state some of those factors so that those who have become accustomed to listening to "Wheeler Mustang Football" will know why it is not on the air this year.

First of all, I was not able to hire anybody last year that had the ability to operate the control board at the radio station here, even though I tried. Running the ball games is the most complicated type of broadcasting with the constant shifting back and forth from the field to the studio, and since I didn't have anyone available and trained in that type of operation, I was obligated to be here each week myself. That kept me from attending any of the out of town games or any of the activities at home (if it went past about 5 o'clock) of our own school. I missed seeing my own children. I know that particular reason for discontinuing the broadcasts can be viewed as selfish on my part, but it does mean something to me and to my children for me to go see them. Therefore, I didn't want to be that restricted again.

Secondly, we have expanded our broadcasting by means of booster/translator stations into other towns. We have a translator in Pampa, Canadian, and Amarillo. Therefore, the majority of our listening audience are interested in hearing the regularly scheduled programs rather than the local football games. Some segments of that time are paid for, and it makes it necessary for us to make other agreements with those ministers. Most of our listeners turn us off since they are not interested in local football.

Thirdly, we lost our number one

## MOBETTIE LOWERS SCHOOL TAX RATE

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** The following story by Dee Dee Laramore appeared in the August 27, 1989 Pampa News.) Mobettie school board members adopted the 1989-90 budget and voted to lower the school district's tax rate at their regular meeting Thursday.

Donna Dollar, school business manager, pointed out that by doing this, the board would be actually lowering tax rate from the present rate of \$1.44864.

Board member Gary May and members Estes, Wade Harthaway and Hogan voted in favor of the tax rate. Earl Tabor opposed the motion.

Although the district's operating budget is actually set at \$625,269, an additional \$56,000 was added to help retire the district's debts, many of which arose from the bankruptcy of the Community School Association Trust, Summers explained.

**From The Minister's Desk:**  
One of the most essential parts of an automobile's engine is the battery. It is essential because it furnished positive and negative electrolytes. And both of these electrolytes are necessary for the engine to properly operate.

Genuine Christianity is also composed of positive and negative aspects. The Apostle Paul emphasized the proper mixture of these aspects when he wrote: "Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good." (Romans 12:21) Christianity is a balanced faith consisting of a proper mixture of its positive and negative aspects.

Yet there are many Christians who try to live a faith that is based primarily on its negative aspects. In one of His most compact but penetrating parables, Jesus warned against this tragic mistake. He said: "Now when the unclean spirit goes out of a man, it passes through waterless places, seeking rest, and does not find it. Then it says, I will return to my house from which I came, and when it comes, it finds it unoccupied, swept, and put in order. Then it goes and takes along with it seven other spirits more wicked than itself, and they go in and live there; and the last state of that man becomes worse than the first." (Matthew 12:43-45)

The tragedy of the parable hinges on the word, "...unoccupied...". Notice that after "...the

unclean spirit..." was cast out of the house that it was "...unoccupied...". Taking advantage of this opportunity, "...the unclean spirit..." got "...seven other spirits more wicked than itself..." and occupied the house again. And the conclusion of Jesus was: "...The last state of that man becomes worse than the first."

The mere elimination of evil, however complete, is no equivalent for goodness. A faith that consists only of "thou shalt not's" will never produce the abundant life. Such a faith is like adding up a column of zeroes; the answer is always zero. And the most damning of all sins is merely to do nothing. Think about the scathing denunciation that the one talent man received in the parable of the talents. (Matthew 25:14-30) The sin of this man was "nothingness". He simply did nothing! Jesus called this man wicked and lazy, saying: "Cast out the worthless slave into outer darkness; in that place there shall be weeping and gnashing of teeth." (verse 30)

To function properly, Christianity, like the engine of an automobile, must be characterized by positive and negative aspects. It is absolutely essential that Christianity not be characterized by evil. But the elimination of evil is merely a preparation for producing positive works of good.
