





From the Minister's Desk:

May 25, 1787 through September 17, 1787, are probably some of the most important dates in the history of this nation. On May 25th, delegates from the thirteen colonies met in Philadelphia to discuss the creation of a new plan of national government. After winning their independence from England, the colonies had a plan of national government that was called the Articles of Confederation. With this plan each colony functioned like an independent country because there was no central governmental authority. For this reason the delegates wrote a new plan of national government which they called the Constitution of the United States. This plan established a balanced national government, dividing authority among three independent branches-the executive, the legislative, and the judicial. And on September 17, 1787, the majority of the delegates signed the Constitution. After signing the Constitution, the delegates then decided that each colony should hold a convention and review the new plan of national government. It was also decided that when three-fourths of the colonies had ratified the Constitution, its purposed national government would be established. But when the Constitution was presented to some of these conventions a serious problem arose. Some of the colonies did not believe that the Constitution guaranteed the rights and liberties of individuals. To solve this problem it was decided that some amendments would be added to the constitution which would guarantee these rights and liberties. These amendments were the Bill of Rights. And when they were added to the Constitution, it was ratified by the colonies and the national government of the United States was established. Over two hundred years have passed since the Constitution was ratified, but the rights and liberties that are stated in the Bill of Rights are still guaranteed to American citizens. While each of these rights and liberties are deeply cherished, none are cherished more deeply than those stated in the first amendment. This amendment reads: "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the

Citizens to Government

In his Gettysburg Address, President Abraham Lincoln described the government of the United States as a "--government of the people, by the people, for the people -- ". Strictly speaking, the United States government is a representative government which consists of elected officials who represent the people. And these officials are derelict if they do not listen to the voice of the people who elect them. While these elected officials have a responsibility to the people, the people also have a responsibility to these officials. These officials should be respected. And the most respectful people should be Christians. Their respnsibility was emphasized by the Apostle Paul when he wrote: "--Rulers are servants of God, devoting themselves to this very thing. Render to all what is due them; tax to whom tax is due; custom to whom custom; fear to whom fear; honor to whom honor." (Romans 13: 7-8) Christians are not commanded to like elected officials, but they are commanded to respect them. In the relationship between citizens and the government, the citizens should respect the officials that they elected. And the officials should honor one of these citizens most cherished liberties-the freedom of speech.
