The woodwind ensemble, which also attended, received a Division II for their performance, but medals were only given to Division I groups. "These three events participated last year and each one of them improved one division," commented band director Manuel Martinez. "This was an impressive showing for us."

The Division I and II by the soloists gives the Wheeler Mustang Band 10 additional points toward the State Sweepstakes Trophy.
