176 nominees for the classic.

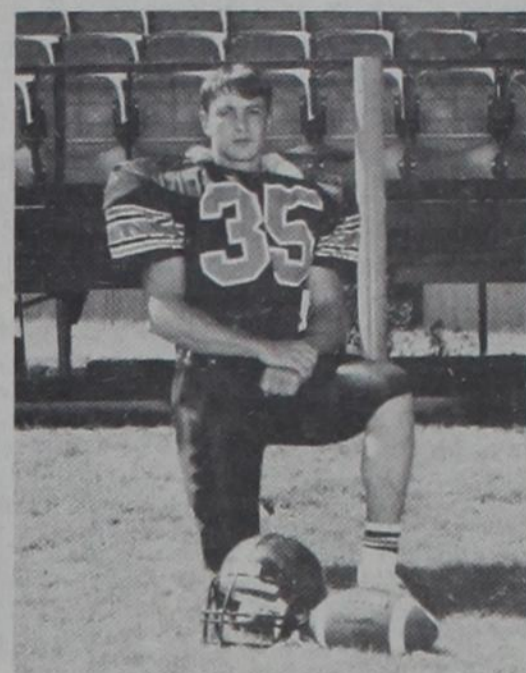
Chad was a 2-way first team all-district player for the Mustangs, and also earned all-state honors as defensive lineman.

Abraham Lincoln, the sixteenth President of the United States, was assassinated at Ford's Theatre in Washington, D.C. on April 14, 1865. After several stately ceremonies in a dozen cities, President Lincoln was buried in Oak Ridge Cemetery in Springfield, Illinois on May 4, 1865.

But since his burial, the body of President Lincoln has been moved sixteen times. Twice his coffin was opened—in April of 1887 and in September of 1901—and his body viewed by witnesses who had personally known the President. Finally the coffin was permanently imbedded in steel and concrete beneath the floor of the Lincoln Memorial in Springfield, Illinois where it rests today.

Why was it necessary for the body of the assassinated President to be moved sixteen times? And why was his coffin opened twice and viewed by witnesses who had known him? The explanation is relatively simple! Persistent rumors had convinced many Americans that the President's body was not in his coffin. For this reason, the coffin was opened so these rumors could be permanently laid to rest—along with the President's body.

Testicular cancer, if caught early, is one of the most curable types of cancer. If not, it is one of the most deadly. That's why it is so important to do a simple self-exam once a month.

The three-minute exam is best done after a warm bath or shower when the skin is most relaxed. Here's how to do it: examine each testicle gently with the fingers of both hands by rolling the testicle between the thumb and fingers to check for any hard lumps. If a lump or nodule is discovered, it may not be cancerous, but it should be brought to your doctor's attention.

I'm glad to say that testicular cancer is not a common kind of cancer. It accounts for only one percent of all cancer in males. Primarily it is a disease of young men between the ages of 20 and 35. In men between 29 and 35, it is the most common type of cancer.

The first sign of cancer of the testes is usually a slight enlargement and a change in the consistency of the testes. Although these tumors can be painless, there may be a dull ache in the lower abdomen and groin, with a feeling of dragging or heaviness. If the tumor is growing, there may be a sharp testicular pain.

Because of a lack of early symptoms or pain, patients don't usually go to their doctor for several months after a slightly enlarged testis. This delay probably accounts for the fact the cancer has spread to other organs by the time a doctor is seen. It's very important to see your doctor if you notice anything abnormal. It could mean the difference between life and death.

Men over 20 should take the time to examine themselves once a month.

TCC needs a volunteer coordinator in each county to represent TCC in the networking process, to arrange programs in their area, and to carry out the plans of TCC. This responsibility could be delegated to other volunteers in the county as the volunteer organization grows. TCC staff will be available to help the volunteer coordinator in organization and planning.

How You Complain Can Make A Difference

Got a complaint? When you complain about a product or service, be sure to do it the right way.

To register a complaint:
*Describe clearly your current problem or complaint. Use facts like dates, costs and problem.

*State exactly what you want the company or agency to do to make things right.

*Print, don't write, your complaint legible. Better yet, use a typewriter if you have one.

*Use standard paper, 8 1/2 by 11, preferably white. Colored paper often does not photocopy well. Since several people or departments may be involved in handling your complaint, your letter and other documents may be photocopied several times.

*Use a pen with dark ink, blue or black, and medium point so that the letter will be legible when copied.

*Include copy, not the originals, of all related documents, purchase receipts, service receipts, past correspondence with service agencies and the manufacturer.

* Date your letters and other documents.

* Provide your daytime telephone number.

* Reread your letter several times before sending. Put yourself in the reader's shoes. Your letter is not a place to vent your anger; only state the facts and what you would like as a resolution to the problem.

* Be polite remain calm. Customer relations personnel with a company or agency may be instructed not to deal with rude or offensive customers.

Once your complaint is in process:
*Don't delay providing any additional information that is requested.

* Follow the exact directions for procedures and filling out forms.
* Let the company know immediately of any new developments that may occur such as, the product was repaired or is working, a new problem has developed.
