Wheeler County voters turned out 56% to cast their ballots Tuesday, March 8. The result is a run-off in the county sheriff's race; incumbent Lonnie Miller will face Jimmy Adams on April 12 to determine who's name will appear on the ballot in November.

Incumbent county attorney Kent Sims defeated Guy Hardin for a place on the November ballot. Sims will face

Services Held For Charles F. Hubbard

Charles F. Hubbard, 60, died Friday, March 4, 1988.

Services were held at 2 p.m. Monday, March 7 at Paramount Terrace Christian Church. The Rev. Roy S. Wheeler, pastor, officiated. Burial was in Memorial Park Cemetery by Schooler-Gordon Bell Avenue Chapel.

Mr. Hubbard, born at Wheeler, graduated from Wheeler High School in 1945 and was married to Jo Rean Moore in 1947. He was a military veteran serving three years in the U.S. Navy and Navy Reserve. He received his master's degree in Fine Arts from West Texas State University. He taught school at Phillips Junior College and was a civilian instructor at Amarillo Air Force Base. He retired in 1985 from the Department of Energy at the Pantex Plant after serving 30 years in the Civil Service. He and his wife had recently moved to Caballo, N.M. He was preceded in death by his father, V.B. Hubbard, and a brother, Gene Hubbard, both in 1984, and his wife in November 1987.

Survivors include a son, Bruce Hubbard and daughter-in-law Susan Hubbard of Amarillo; his mother, Etta Kate Hubbard of Canyon; three sisters, Patricia Johnson of Pampa, Kay Barnard of Amarillo and Jo Richards of White Deer; a brother, Edgar Hubbard of Canyon; and three grandchildren.

City Election

In an election set for Saturday, May 7, 1988, the voters of Wheeler are to elect a mayor and two councilmen. As of Wednesday morning, Mayor Wanda Herd had filed for re-election and two are seeking place 4 on the council. Don Rose has filed for a second term in place on the council.

Mayor Herd will be seeking her second term. She wishes to continue her work toward the improvement of Wheeler. She would like to see a park project completed. The mayor stated she has enjoyed the challenges of the past two years and working with the people.

Councilman Rose filed for his place on the ballot with the city secretary, Mildred Ramsey on the day filing opened. He feels he has done a good job and would like the opportunity to continue serving his fellow Wheelers.

Councilman Robert Jones will not be seeking a second term, as he has been transferred to the Oklahoma City area. He was elected to place 4 in 1986.

Mark Frankenbery wishes the opportunity to return to the council. Frankenbery served on the council April, '85, thru April, '87. During his term of office he was the council representative for the fire department. Frankenbery is seeking place 4.

Bob McCain, owner and operator of McCain's Auto Body has also filed to have his name place on the ballot in the May election for place 4 on the city council.

Filing for seats on the council opened Monday, February 22. The deadline for placing your name on the ballot will be March 23.

Any individual who is a qualified voter and a resident of the City of Wheeler is eligible to place their name on

the ballot for anyone of the afore mentioned positions. Members of the council serve a two-year term and see to the management of city affairs. Those interested in serving on the council may file at the city office during business hours.

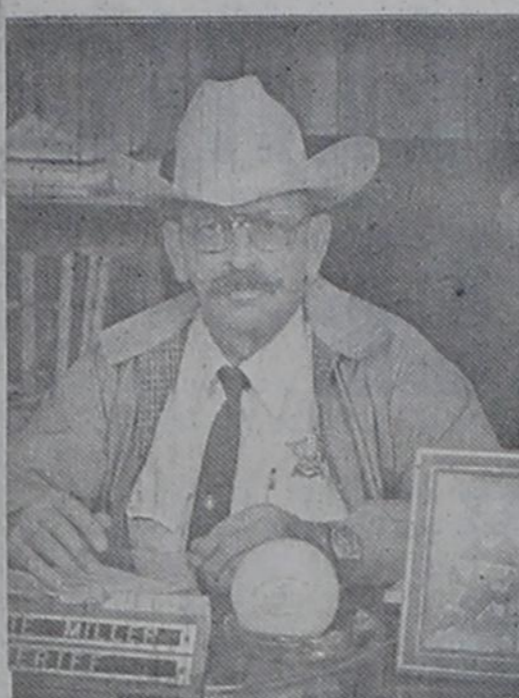

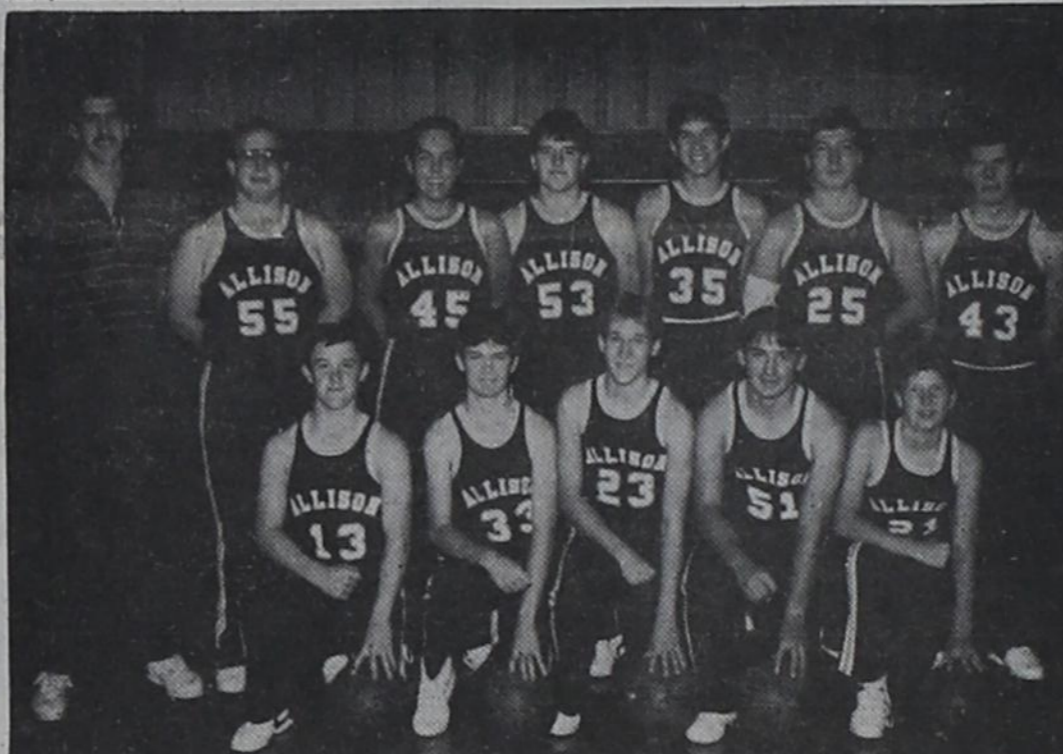

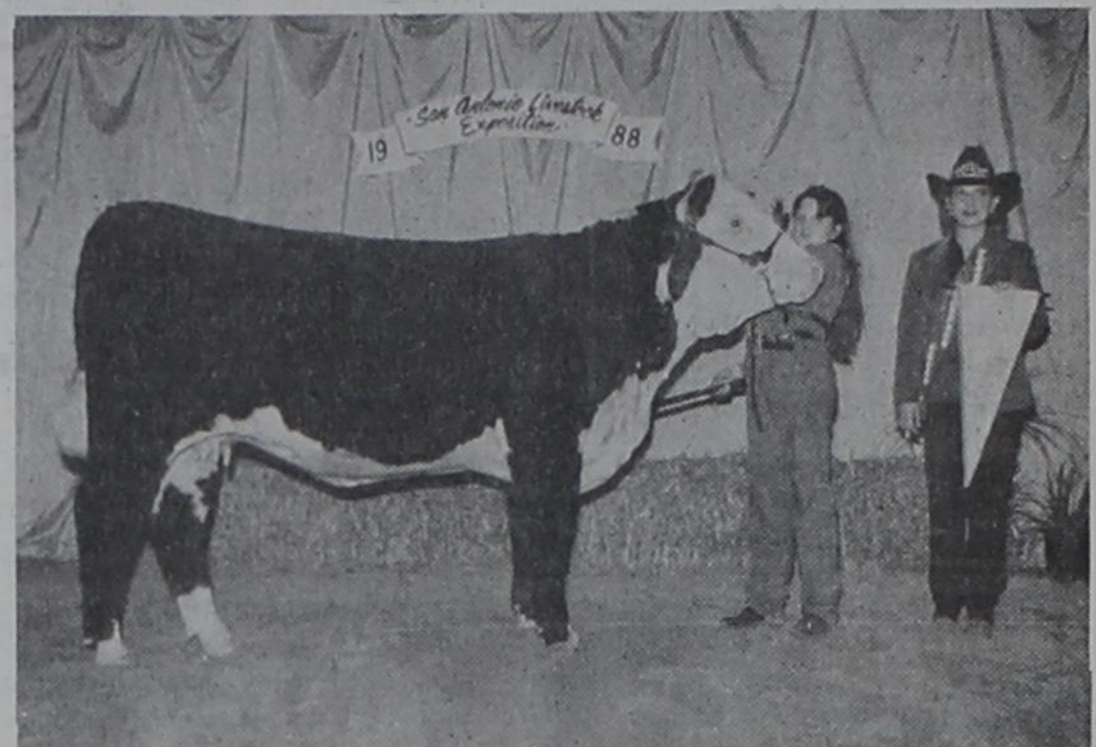
The Sayre Goodtime Band was entertaining at Wal-Mart's last Saturday. They sounded good and looked so trim and perky in their black and white outfits.

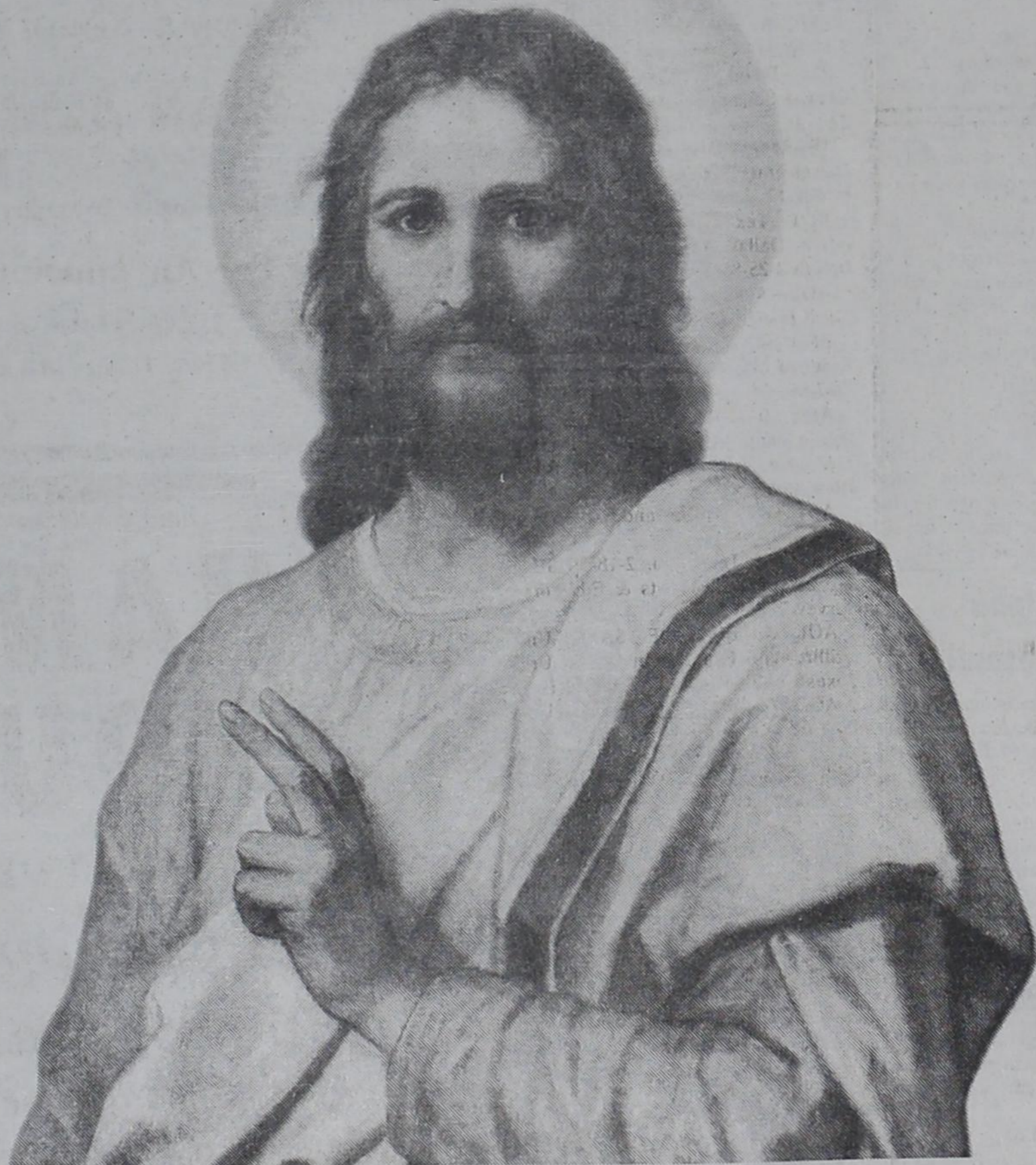

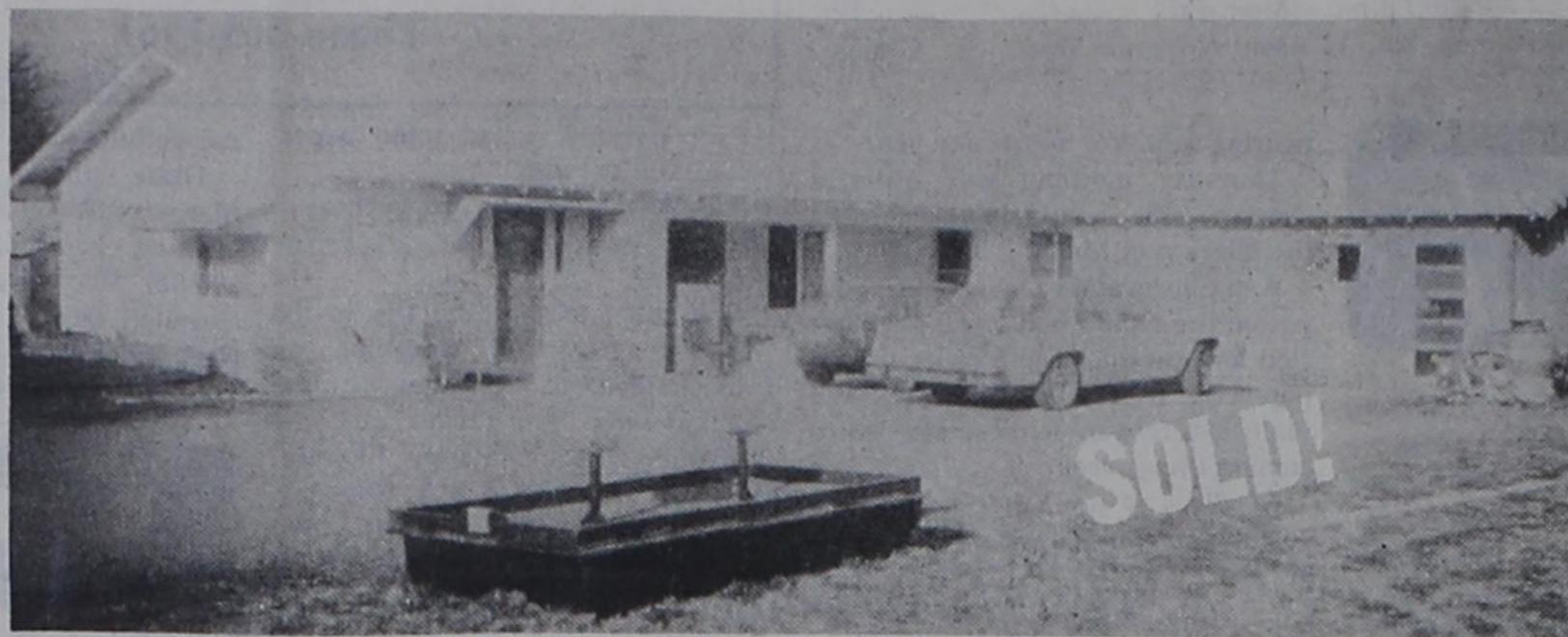

Elderly Homeowners Tax Deferral Available

Texans aged 65 or older can postpone paying delinquent and current property taxes on their homesteads by taking advantage of a tax option called over-65 deferral. The elderly homeowner simply signs a deferral affidavit at the Wheeler County Appraisal District office.

This special form of tax relief can also halt a lawsuit already filed to collect delinquent property taxes on an older Texan's homestead, according to Marilyn Copeland, chief appraiser of the Wheeler County Appraisal District. To stop a delinquent tax suit, Copeland said, the over-65 homeowner files the deferral affidavit with the court in which the suit is pending.

"This law means that, if the proper affidavit is on file, an older homeowner cannot lose a homestead because of delinquent taxes," Copeland said.

Once a homeowner files an over-65 tax deferral affidavit with the appraisal district, no taxing unit can initiate or pursue a suit for delinquent taxes as long as that person owns and lives in that homestead.

Copeland stressed, though, that tax deferral for the elderly only postpones paying delinquent taxes on the homestead; it does not cancel them. During the deferral period, taxes and delinquent penalties and interest continue to add up she said. "When the elderly taxpayer no longer owns or lives in the home, those accrued amounts become due. Taxing units can then sue to collect all the deferred tax, penalty and interest."

Forms for filing a tax deferral affidavit are available at the appraisal district office. "The homeowner should fill out the form and have the signature witnessed by a notary public," Copeland said. For more information, taxpayers may contact the Wheeler County Appraisal District 826-5900, 101 East Texas, Wheeler, Texas.
