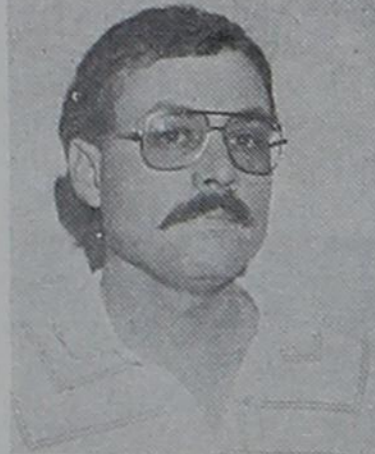

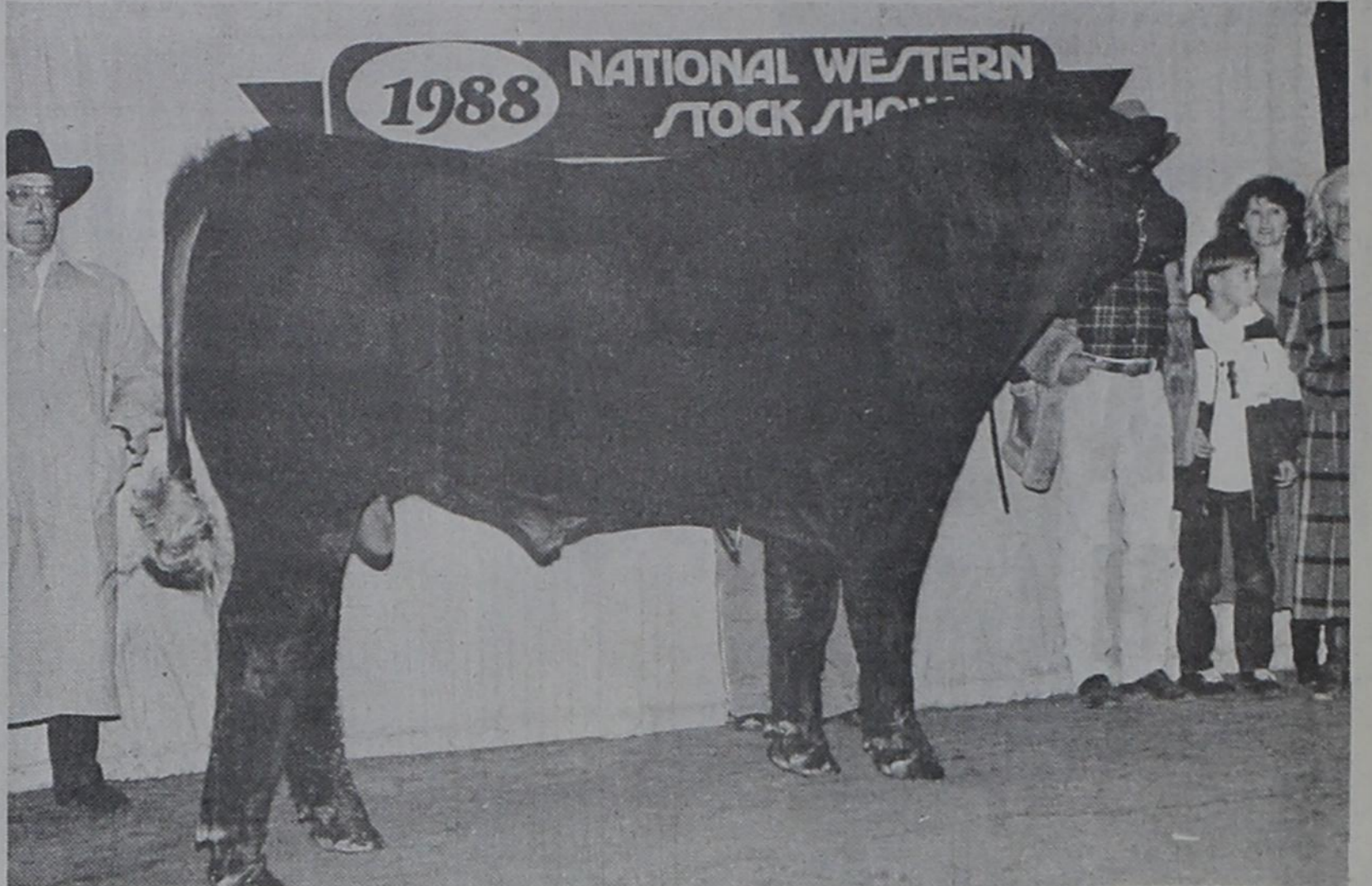

Joel Waldo To Begin Student Teaching

Joel Waldo of Wheeler is among 57 education majors at Northwestern Oklahoma State University, Alva, who have begun student teaching assignments. The group will be in area schools for 12 weeks and will follow the calendar of the schools in which they are assigned.

He is teaching math and physical education at Kelton High School. His cooperating teachers are Lisa Charton and Dave Johnson, respectively.

Waldo is a member of a teacher education program which is one of the best in Oklahoma based on teacher competency tests. Since the state legislature mandated such exams in 1982, Northwestern has ranked first among public institutions and third overall in pass rate.

Northwestern students have a six-year cumulative pass rate of 82 percent, behind only Oral Roberts University and the University of Tulsa.

In November 1987, the most recent testing date, Northwestern's education students had the highest pass rate of any public university in the state, according to figures recently released by the state education department.

Of the 86 Northwestern students who took the competency exams then, 75 passed. That computes to an 87.3 percent pass rate, second best among all colleges, public and private. Only Oklahoma Baptist University had a higher pass rate, 87.5 percent.

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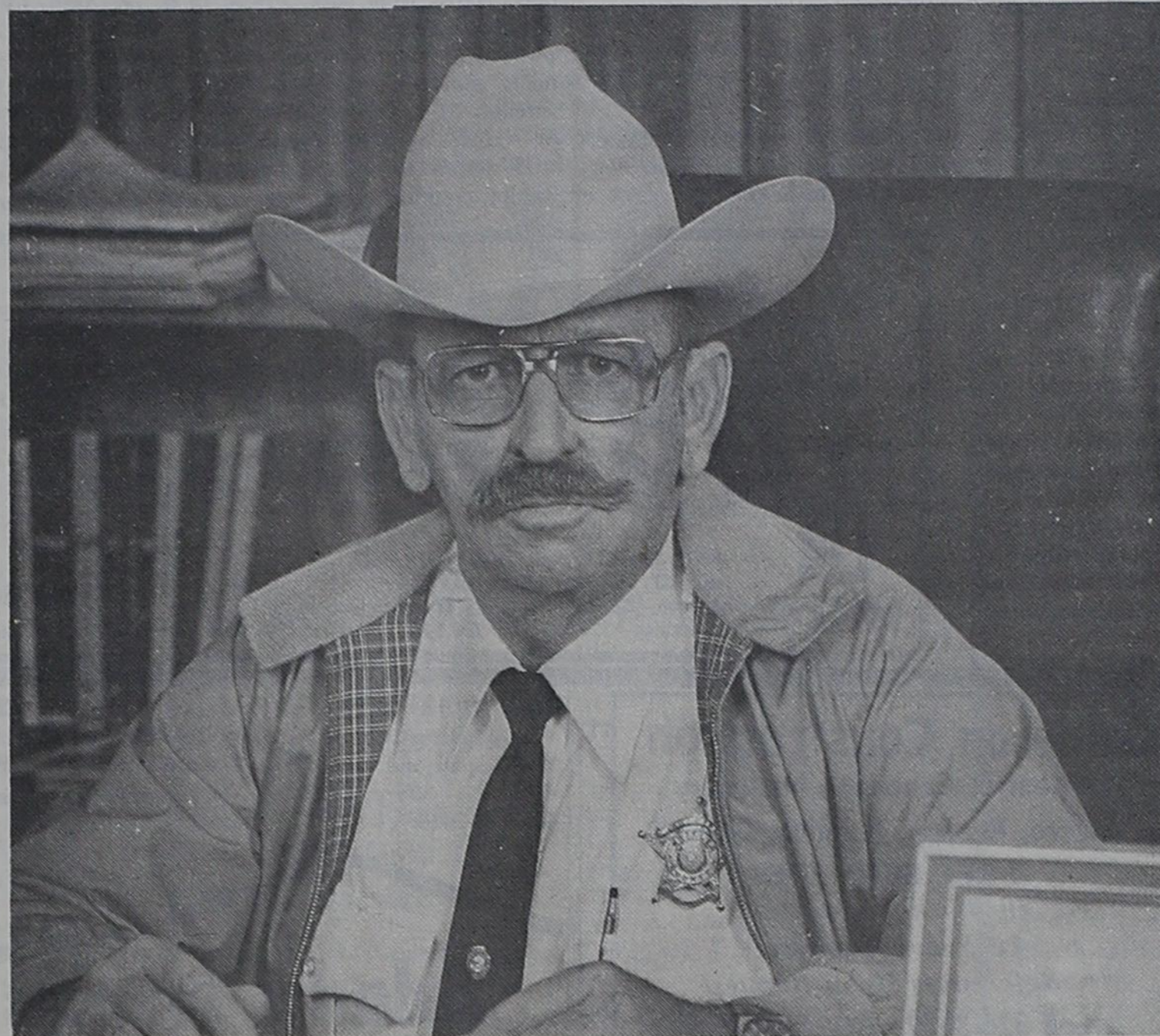

I have fought against drug abuse in our county. I have raided and apprehended 9 dope dealers and pushers and 22 users with various kinds of narcotic drugs.

It took 2 years to get the state to come in and help destroy the cultivated marijuana in Wheeler county. Before the state comes in to help on drug problems of any kind you must prove to them that it is a major problem. To prove to the state that the crop was a major problem, I had to call upon some people in Wheeler county to help. Teachers, coaches, preachers, mothers, fathers, my family, the constable, pulled the marijuana crop. We counted stalks and sent the results into the state. We did have a major problem in cultivated marijuana. The state brings helicopters twice a year and a team of men. And with the sheriff's office try to rid the county of this crop, a devil's tool that can result in untold efforts and dangers for our children. Marijuana is usually the beginning of any drug problem with any age. "Drug abuse is a problem that knows no social, economic, religious or racial boundaries". The drug problem throughout the U.S. is a never ending battle. Though the efforts of my office and many civic and educational organizations fighting to combat drug abuse in our county. And with the efforts of our people "who care" we can keep drug abuse controlled to the point, where our children can feel safe, hold their heads up and not be afraid to say "no".

When I took office as your sheriff of Wheeler county, I waged a war against drugs and the dealers, and I will continue to fight against drug abuse, alcohol abuse and child abuse. Let's keep our children from being chemical dependant.

Today, over 50% of your robberies, thefts, child molesting and beatings are connected with narcotic drugs. I ask you not to be afraid to get involved. Not one person that has helped me or giving me information on drugs, has their name been given out. Their names are in the strictest of confidence and not ever given to my deputies.

There is less crime in our county, less drugs, than ever before in our county. Why take a chance on a change when we have a working Sheriff with an outstanding record, who is educated, experienced and willing to work hard for our county.

.....

Under the state laws governing jail standards, the state ordered this county to hire a full-time and part-time jailer. I took a lady dispatcher, Pat Childress, who is a certified jailer, and put her as my full-time jailer. In the 6 months Mrs. Childress has been jailer, the jail has been run in a professional manner. The state jail commission has given the Wheeler county jail top rating. I commend Mrs. Childress in the quality and efficiency she has run the jail. (Pat Childress is from Briscoe.)

Bill Patterson is a part-time jailer and relief deputy for the night deputy in the Wheeler area. Deputy Patterson lives southwest of Wheeler. Dennis Hilburn is the Mobeetie deputy and covers the north side of the county. Deputy Hilburn lives between old and new Mobeetie. Deputy Rick Walden works mostly daytime and corresponds the prisoners to and from court. Deputy Walden lives in Wheeler. Deputy Farrell Alexander is the night time deputy, who covers the Wheeler area. Deputy Alexander lives in Wheeler. Carl Knoll is my chief deputy. Deputy Knoll sets his own hours and he lives in Shamrock.

Not any of my deputies are stationed in just one area, they work the county, both north and south of the river. Exception: For the night deputy, who works the Wheeler area. The city pays the county and under contract

for law enforcement in Wheeler, 7 days a week, so the night deputy is stationed in the Wheeler area.

I have Chief Deputy Knoll, Deputy Walden and Deputy Hilburn to cover Wheeler county. The federal law states a man works 40 hours a week.

Under these circumstances, it is impossible to run this Sheriff's office like a police department with someone on duty 24 hours. The sheriff's office is an investigating body; when the deputies are off duty, they must be on call 24 hours a day. I must use every minute of my time, my deputies are on duty to work the county wisely. Often the sheriff's office must transport prisoners to the state penitentiary; this takes one of the three deputies. Most of the time it is non-stop round trip. The sheriff's office also goes throughout the U.S. to pick-up person or persons on warrants. The sheriff's office serves from 5 to 10 documents a day from out of state, in state and in county. This is all part of the duties of the sheriff's office.

The Texas state jail commission states there has to be a jailer on duty 24 hours, 7 days a week, to keep the man power of my deputies out in the county. I have had the sheriff's office dispatchers certified as jailers under the state law. My full-time dispatchers-jailers must be secretaries also for they must keep records, do typing and the corresponding. This gives my deputies more time for their investigating duties. Every document, every person that is processed through this office has got to be taking care of according to the law. This is time consuming for there is no room for mistakes.

You may understand why as your sheriff I put in the hours I do to run the business side of the sheriff's office. It is so different from any other law agency. This is why the experience of 16 years in the sheriff's office is very important.

Feel free to call if you have any questions or need information concerning this office. You have that right. The sheriff's office is yours, you just hired me to run it for you. I am asking you to re-hire me as your sheriff for another 4 years.

.....

The Sheriff's office cannot be run like a police department. The sheriff's office is an investigating body; they do not just work traffic. The sheriff's office is head law enforcement agency of this county. A lot of hours are spent on just the investigation of a crime, hours are spent in court, the business takes up a lot of time, but everything must be within the law. Some of the laws need to be changed, but until they are, we must obey them. One wrong move can set a person who has committed a violent crime loose on your streets. We can't afford to be wrong; even in this election, we can't be wrong.

Each law agency has their jobs. Each one is important. And, it is important for them to work together. Everywhere there is one or two that don't work with you. Never have I had trouble with any agency in this state or in our neighboring states, and to go farther, the working relationships are good and the results are "great". Never was there a time when Art Taylor, Shamrock Chief of Police, and my department didn't work together to get a crime solved. Never was there a time when Jerry Bob Jernigan, constable, and my department didn't work together to get a crime solved. Never was there a time when Steve Walker, constable, and my department didn't work together to get a crime solved or any other to get a crime solved. Never was there a time the Highway Patrol wasn't there when needed, to get a crime solved.

The heads of our local department are law officers first. I have not been a part-time sheriff for our county, I am full-time. I take my work serious. I'm not a politician, I don't know how to be one.

I can just work and try to do the best I can. I'm honest, I'm not afraid of work, I want your neighboring county to know that Wheeler county has one of the best sheriff's departments in the country and I feel we do.

In my years as a law enforcement officer, I have never had the county or cities in a position of being sued. Recklessness and inexperience will raise the chances for a lawsuit to a higher percent.

You can't cut corners when it comes to the law. (That will get you sued.) Common sense can't change the law either.

Education behind the experience and a natural instinct can solve a crime, along with hard work and long hours, and I do work hard and put in long hours. But this is why I'm here. I'm dedicated to my work, I'm proud of what I can do.

I will continue to work for you, the people; your county is my county and what affects you, affects me.

I give my word, I will continue to do my best to justify your vote, in a continuing responsible law enforcement agency. I will continue to represent our county in a moral and honest manner, with the welfare of the people and county in mind at all times.

EMERGENCY LOAN

APPLICATION BEING ACCEPTED

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by blizzard and freeze March 23-31, 1987 are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Wheeler, FmHA County supervisor John D. Wolf III said today.

Wheeler County is one of a number of counties in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Lyng as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the freeze.

Wolf said farmers may be eligible for loans up to 80 percent of their

actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000 whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Wolf said. Farmers participating in the PIK or federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until October 5, 1988 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season, Wolf said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. Citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Wheeler is open from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

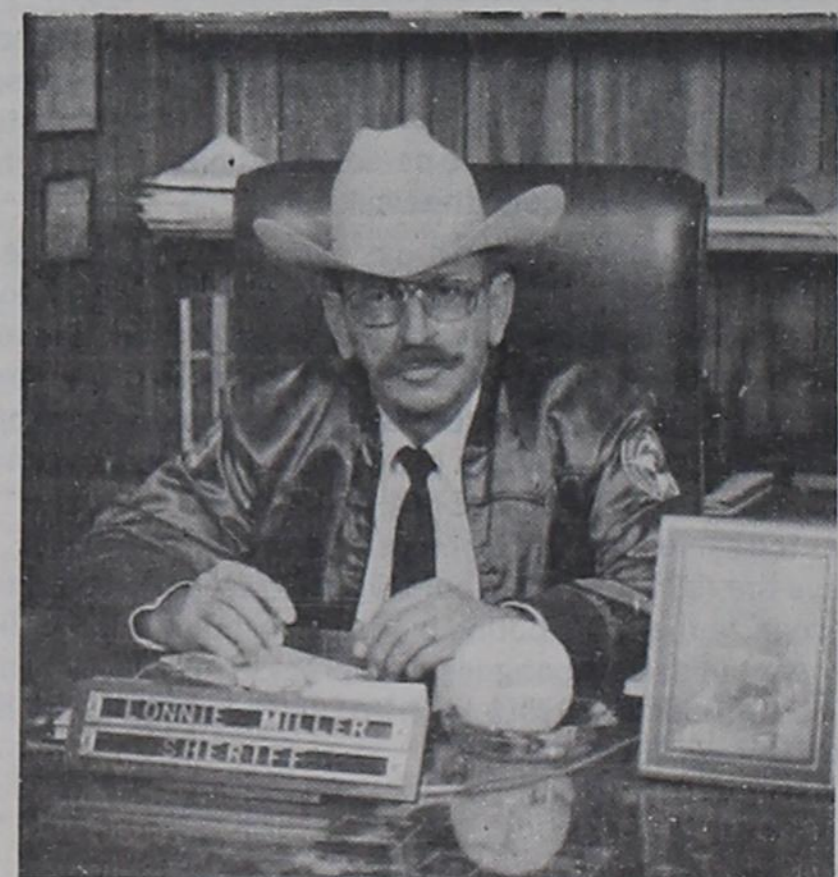

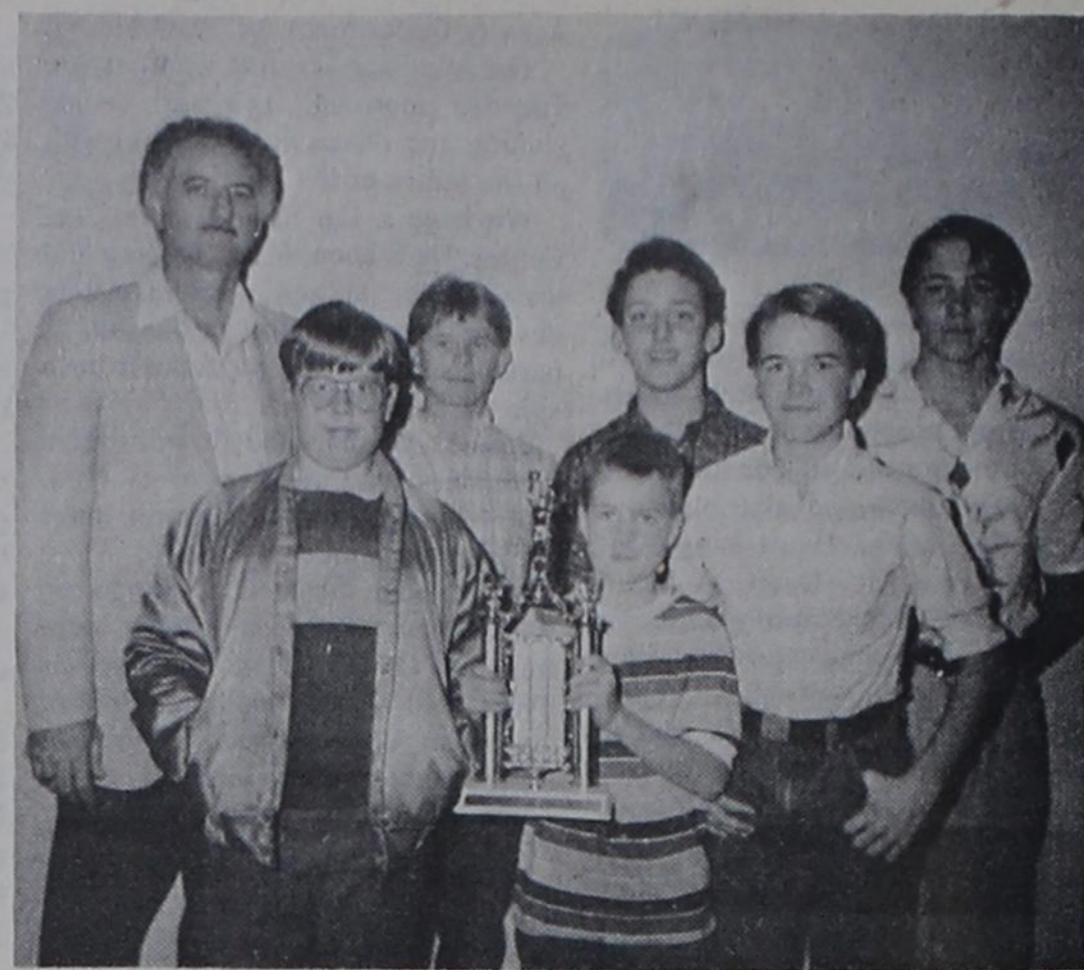

PROPERTY TAX RENDITIONS

31 Thursday March 1988
File Tax Rendition!

HELP YOU PROTECT YOUR RIGHTS AS A TAXPAYER

A rendition is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you own or control on January 1, 1988. You may also give your opinion of the property's value, if you wish.

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property used to produce income—such as the machinery and equipment used by a business.

The appraisal district may require any taxpayer to file a rendition by sending the taxpayer a written notice and a rendition form.

You may want to file a rendition, even if you aren't required to file, to preserve some of your rights as a taxpayer:

• You put your correct mailing address on record so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.

• You can put your own opinion of your property's value on record.

• If the appraisal district then places a higher value on your property, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.

• By filing a special type of rendition called a *report of decreased value*, you can notify the appraisal district of significant damage to your property that occurred in 1987. The district will send someone to verify the damage and take it into account when assigning a 1988 value to your property.

File renditions with your local appraisal district at the address shown below. Forms are available there.

The deadline for 1988 renditions is March 31. You can get an extra 30 days if you ask for it in writing before the March 31 deadline.

For more information, get a free copy of the pamphlet, *Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities*, at your appraisal district office or from the State Property Tax Board in Austin.

City Council Decides Against Grant For City Park

The City Council feels that we should inform the public on our decision not to pursue the grant for the City Park with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

In the fall we applied for a grant through the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission to the Texas Parks and Wildlife for a grant that would pay fifty percent of the park project. With this grant we would build a shelter, tables, B.B.Q. pits, walkways to the shelter, playground equipment and reviving the croquet

courts.

When the Parks and Wildlife reviewed our application we received 48 points and to qualify we needed to receive at least 60 points. The Parks and Wildlife informed us that we could reapply for consideration in July.

I went to Amarillo and met with the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission and to reapply we would need to build more facilities which would cost an additional \$13,000.00.

The council felt that we would be spending money on projects that we really did not need. And that we would be taking away the beauty of

our small unique park just to receive this grant.

At the present time we have received \$7,700.55 in donations toward the building of our shelter. To complete the project by the 4th of July we need to receive another \$5,000.00 in donations. And when the project is completed, we will have the satisfaction of proving we have been able to attain our goal without asking for help from the State.

AN APOLOGY TO THE DEMOCRATS FROM RICKY PFEIL

Last Saturday night (February 27), I angered most of the people in attendance at the Shamrock school in a "Meet the Candidates" meeting. It was not my intention to upset all of you people who were there. Since so many folks became so angry, I feel that I must apologize and attempt to clarify what I was really trying to do.

First of all, I want to make it as clear as possible that I DO NOT BELIEVE THAT ANYBODY IN THAT MEETING OR IN OUR COMMUNITIES IS A COMMUNIST. This seems to be the main crux of the misunderstanding. I said in that meeting that the Democratic Party leans toward the "pro-Communist" position and voted against the Freedom fighters in Nicaragua. Then, I stated that the term "separation of church and state" appears in only 3 places, one of which is not the U.S. Constitution. I said that the term appears in (1) the Constitution of the Soviet Union, (2) the Humanist Manifesto, and (3) the platform of the Democratic Party. All of these things are true, and if it is the facts that anger people when they are made known, I have no apology to make for that. Facts are facts regardless of what anybody wants to believe.

However, judging from the numerous comments that have been made since my 3-minute speech last Saturday, I don't believe that the facts are what have so many people upset. Most of what I have been told is that I either called all of you Democrats "Communists" or at least implied that anyone who is a Democrat is a Communist. I sincerely apologize to each of you and have contacted some of you to state this personally. I am willing to contact each and every one in the meeting if need be to make amends with you. My deep concern for the direction the Democratic Party has taken the last several years was not intended to be a personal attack on you sweet people of Wheeler County.

It is quite difficult to explain things fully in only 3 minutes, and because I had several things that I wanted to point out, I simply hit the points hard and fast and with bluntness. If Nicaragua goes the way of the Sandinista regime, that strategic part of our Hemisphere will become a stronghold of the Soviet Union. You will remember that the vote against aid to the Contras was a close vote. The vote a month ago was 219 to 211. Of course 219 votes against, 207 were Democrats. That, to me, is leaning in a "pro-Communist" direction. This same thing happened in 1986. The Democrat-controlled House rejected the aid requested by the President then. An editorial in the Houston Chronicle dated June 24, 1986 said, "It would be a tragedy of the first order for us to hand the Soviet Union and Cuba such a cheap and easy victory so close to our border." Evidently, I am not the only one who views these things as a "pro-Communist" position.

On July 30, 1984, James J. Kilpatrick had a column in the Amarillo Daily News in which he said, "The Democratic Party took some long steps at San Francisco to make itself the party of 'lesbians and gay men.'" He quoted from the Party platform adopted July 17 of that year. It said, "We will support legislation to prohibit discrimination in the workplace based on sexual orientation." In addition, the Party Rule 5C was changed to state that the Democratic Party "shall develop an outreach program to attract and recruit various groups that now may be under-represented in party affairs. These include 'ethnics, youth, persons over 65 years of age, lesbians and gay men.'" One of the goals of Communism as stated in "The Naked Communist" by Dr. Cleon Skousen published in 1959 was to "present homosexuality, degeneracy and promiscuity as 'normal, natural, healthy.'" ...

Again, that sounds to me like a "pro-Communist" direction to take when a political party opens its doors to receive gladly homosexuals. It also is obviously not just my opinion that the Democrats are making themselves the party of lesbians and gays.

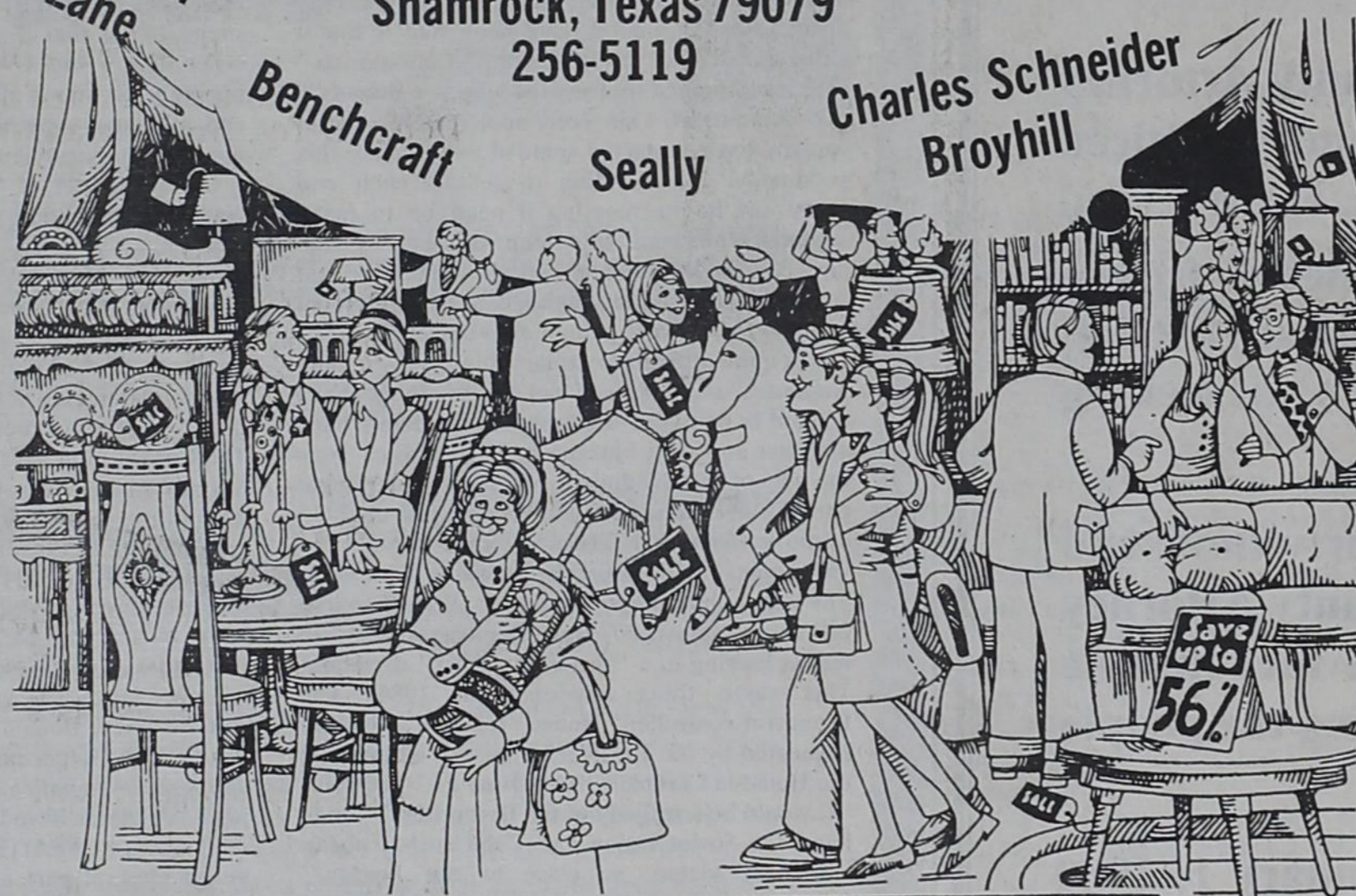

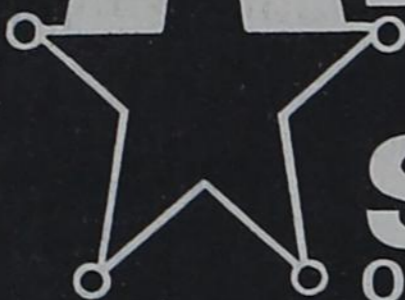
