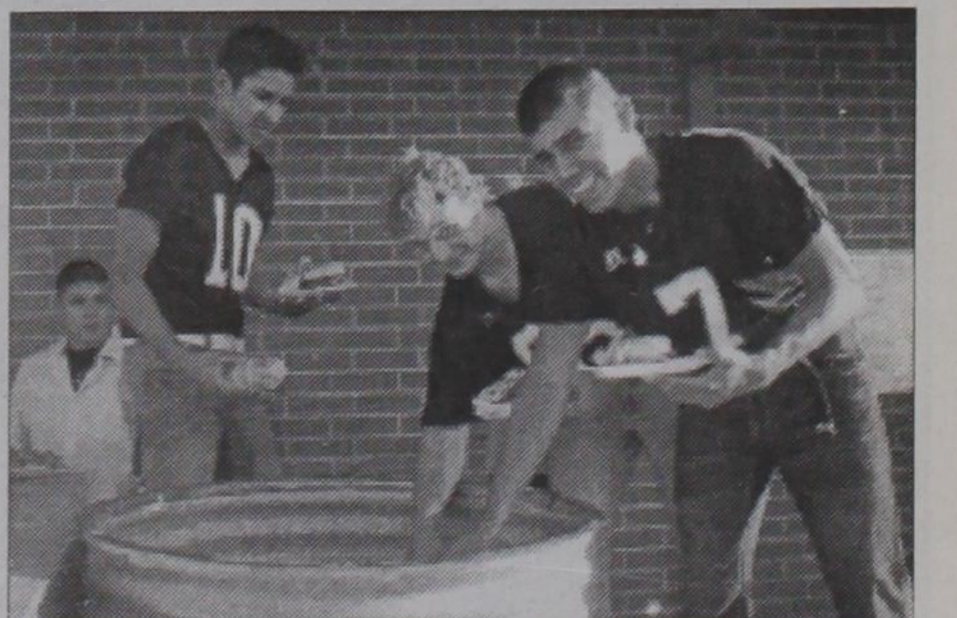

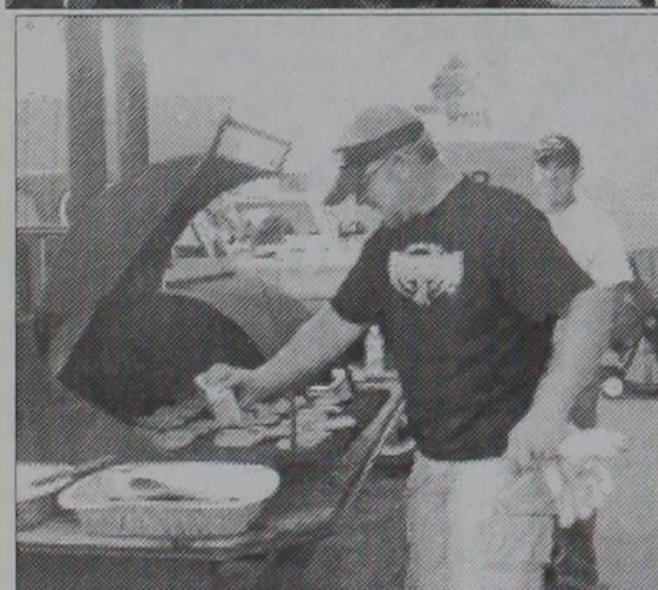

NOTICE OF RATE CHANGE REQUEST

Southwestern Electric Power Company (SWEPCO or Company) publishes this notice that on August 28, 2009, it filed its Petition and Statement of Intent to Change Rates with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT or the Commission), and with those municipal authorities in its Texas service territory that have original jurisdiction over SWEPCO's electric rates. This notice is being published in accordance with Section 36.103 of the Public Utility Regulatory Act and with Commission Procedural Rule 22.51(a)(1).

SWEPCO is proposing to change its rates for electric service provided to all of its 180,000 Texas retail customers. All such customers and all classes of customers will be affected by this change.

STATEMENT OF INTENT TO CHANGE RATES

SWEPCO's request is based on the financial results for a 12-month test year ending on March 31, 2009. The effect of SWEPCO's proposed rate changes would be to increase its adjusted test year revenues by \$74,988,528, an increase of 34.56%, exclusive of fuel revenues. This increase has three components: 1) an increase of \$27,052,578 in base rates (the part of the rates not including fuel costs or riders); 2) an increase of \$31,626,764 associated with the establishment of two new Generation Cost Recovery Riders; and 3) an increase of \$16,309,186 associated with the establishment of a new Reliability Rider.

In addition, when rates are changed in this proceeding, it will result in the termination of the merger savings and rate reduction riders related to the merger of American Electric Power Company, Inc. and Central and South West Corporation that are currently in effect. The termination of these riders will increase SWEPCO's revenues by \$6,933,882 based on test year amounts. The combined effect of SWEPCO's requested change in rates and of the termination of the merger savings and rate reduction riders will be a 37.75% increase in SWEPCO's revenues, exclusive of fuel revenues.

The overall impact of the rate changes listed above, considering both fuel and non-fuel revenues, is a 20.01% increase. The impact of the rate change on various customer classes will vary from the overall impact described in this notice.

SWEPCO has proposed that its requested rate changes become effective on October 2, 2009. The proposed effective date is subject to suspension and extension by actions that may be taken by the Commission and other regulatory authorities.

TARIFF REVISIONS

SWEPCO is proposing revisions to most tariffs and schedules. These changes include, but are not limited to: 1) merging of the SWEPCO North Texas Tariff with the SWEPCO East Texas Tariff; 2) instituting the three new riders discussed above; and 3) obtaining a Commission determination of the baseline values that will facilitate future Transmission Cost Recovery Factor (TCRF) filings pursuant to PUC Substantive Rule (SUBST. R.) 25.239, and approval of the form of the tariff sheet to be used to implement future TCRF updates.

RECONCILIATION OF FUEL COSTS

SWEPCO has also requested authority to reconcile its fuel costs for the period from January 1, 2006 through March 31, 2009. This request is pending in a separate PUCT proceeding, Docket No. 37162.

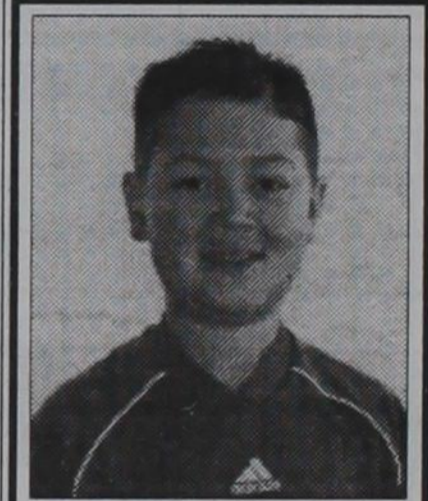

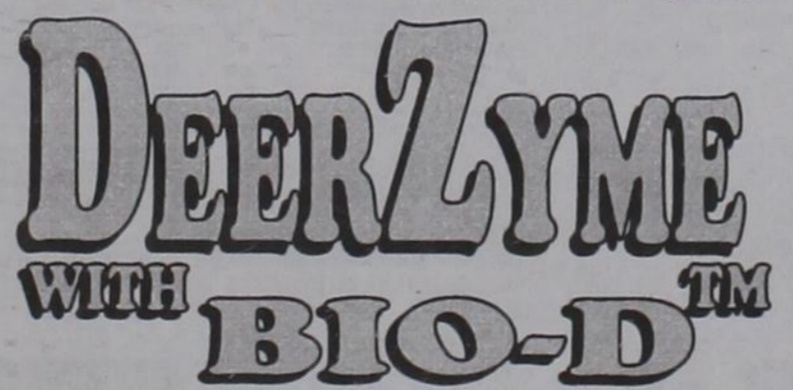

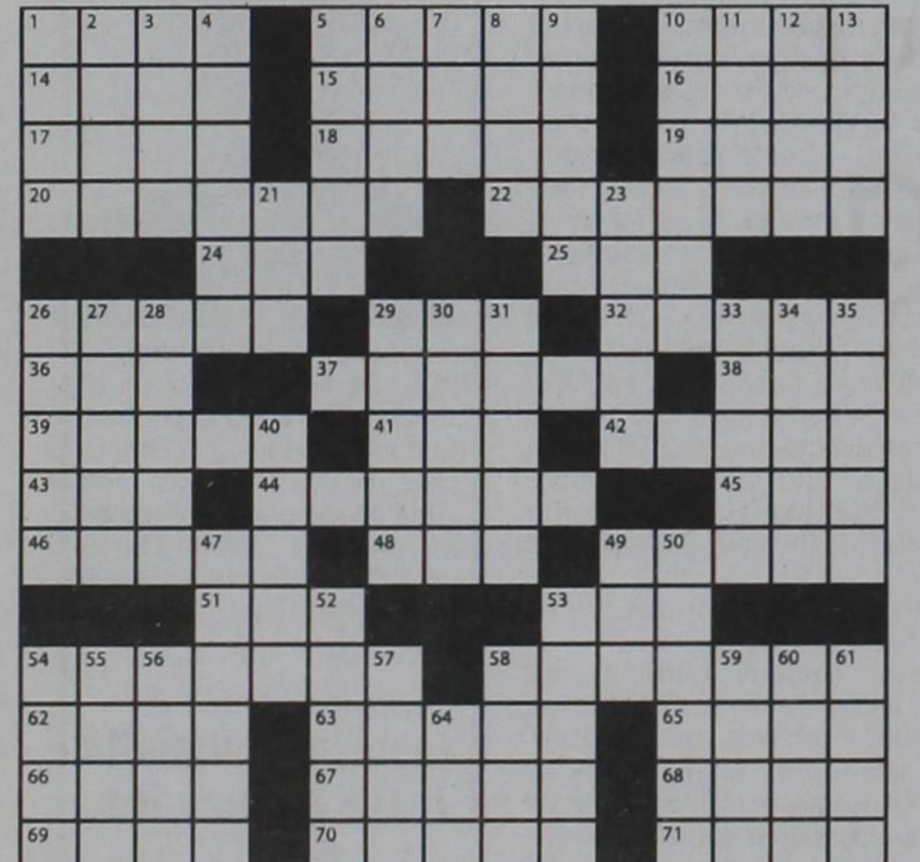

TxDOT Introduces New Educat'n Tool

What do you get when you combine a yellow cab with a police squad car? At a press event in Austin, TxDOT officials unveiled their newest public education tool: a unique "half and half" vehicle that appears to be a taxi on one end and a patrol car on the other. It's part of the agency's annual Labor Day campaign to warn drivers that law enforcement will be out in force to arrest drivers who've had too much to drink during the upcoming Labor Day holiday weekend.

Thanks to the support of police departments and sheriff's offices in communities in Texas with a high incidence of alcohol-related fatalities, actual police cars are being turned into mobile billboards reminding drivers to choose their ride: either by calling a cab, finding a sober ride home or letting officers provide a ride—to jail.

From August 21 to September 7, law enforcement statewide will be working overtime to find and arrest drunk drivers.

"Every hour, two Texans are killed or injured in an alcohol-related traffic crash," said Carol Rawson, TxDOT's Interim Traffic Operations Director. "We hope by supporting this special stepped-up enforcement effort and encouraging drivers to plan ahead to get home safely, we can make the roads safer for everyone this Labor Day."

In 2007, 1,672 people died in alcohol-related crashes in Texas. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, the Texas Department of Public Safety, the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission, Yellow Cab and hundreds of local law enforcement agencies are participating in the annual Drink, Drive, Go to Jail campaign.

"The price of a cab ride pales in comparison to the hefty fines, attorney fees and other cost associated with being arrested for driving while intoxicated," said DPS Assistant Director of Texas Highway Patrol David Baker.

Convicted first-time DWI offenders can pay a fine of up to \$2,000, lose their driver's license for as long as a year, and serve 180 days in jail. Safety officials say other costs associated with a drunk driving arrest and conviction can add up to more than \$17,000 for bail, legal fees, court appearances, court-ordered classes, vehicle insurance increases and other expenses.

JULY PERMITS TO DRILL
The Commission issued a total of 1,016 original drilling permits in July 2009 compared to 2,183 in July 2008. The July total included 809 permits to drill new oil and gas wells, 27 to re-enter existing well bores, and 180 for re-completions. Permits issued in July 2009 included 279 oil, 185 gas, 522 oil and gas, 21 injection, zero service and nine other permits.

JUNE CRUDE OIL PRODUCTION
Texas preliminary June 2009 crude oil production averaged 893,024 barrels daily, up from 880,380 barrels daily average of June 2008.

The preliminary Texas crude oil production figure for June 2009 is 26,790,714 barrels, up from 26,411,409 barrels reported during June 2008.

JULY OIL AND GAS COMPLETIONS
In July 2009, operators reported 368 oil, 471 gas, 39 injection and two other completions compared to 453 oil, 1,065 gas, 30 injection and five other completions during July 2008.

Total well completions for 2009 year to date are 10,561 up from 9,312 recorded during the same period in 2008.

Operators reported 1,170 holes plugged and zero dry holes in July 2009 compared to 395 holes plugged and four dry holes in July 2008.

JUNE NATURAL GAS PRODUCTION

Texas oil and gas wells produced 554,397,320 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas based upon preliminary production figures for June 2009, up from the June 2008 preliminary gas production total of 500,369,686 Mcf. Texas production in June 2009 came from 141,223 oil and 91,192 gas wells.

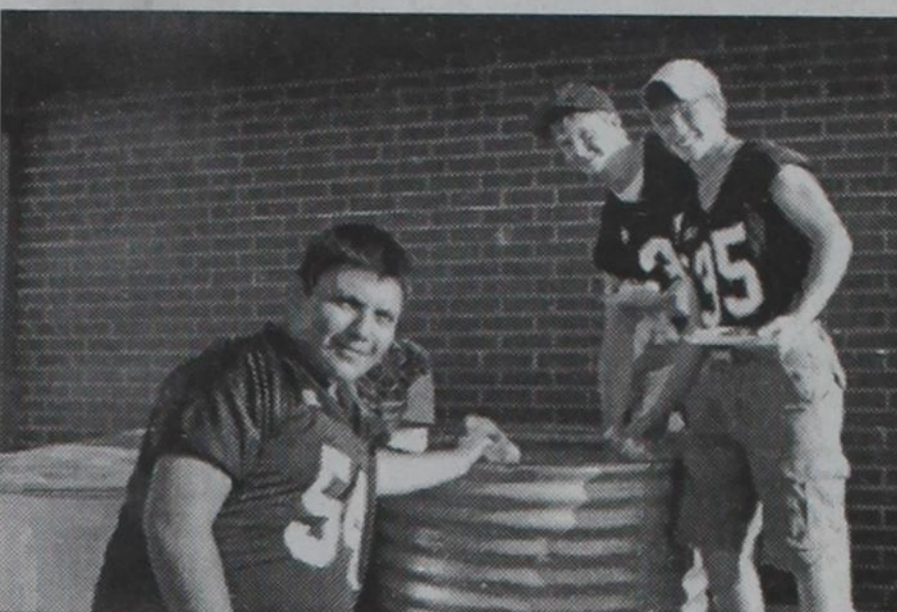

Labor Day Driving Tips

Labor Day marks the end of the summer driving season. During the three-day Labor Day weekend, millions of Americans will head out on U.S. highways for the last hurrah of summer. The beach is the No. 1 destination during the weekend, according to the American Automobile Association, followed by large lakes and amusement parks. With these strategies, you can get to and from your Labor Day destination safely and efficiently.

Get Your Vehicle Road-Worthy
Your trip may well be ruined if your car breaks down, so there's no better way to plan a Labor Day trip than to run the car over to your mechanic the week before. Get an oil change if it's been 3,000 miles since the last one. Have your mechanic check all the fluid levels and top them off. He'll also inspect your fan belts and windshield wipers, test the battery and its charging system and check your brakes.

Don't forget to service your radiator and cooling system. Overheating is a common breakdown problem during the summer.
If you think the price of gas is too high, get your tires checked. The correct air pressure in your tires can save 10 cents a gallon.

Being prepared means you know which exit to take before you are on top of it, which is the moment bad drivers choose to swerve in a panic so they don't miss their exit. They cause accidents instead.

If you are driving 130 miles at 65 miles an hour, you'll get there in two hours. If you hit the accelerator and try to make the same distance at 75 miles an hour, you'll get there in one hour and 44 minutes. The question is, would the risk of a speeding ticket or accident be worth the 18 minutes you will save?
