MUSTANGS PICK UP BID DISTRICT WIN, 35-22

The Claude Mustangs gave it their best shot as they tried to knock off the Wheeler Mustangs from the ranks of the unbeaten. But their best wasn't good enough as Wheeler picked up district win #2 and their 7th win of the season Friday night.

Wheeler held on to its share of the district lead by defeating a tough Claude team 35 to 22.

Led by good special teams play and the usual hard-hitting defense the Mustangs managed to overcome a strong home field advantage that Claude has developed over the years.

Wheeler started the game strong, on Claude's first offensive possession. Senior lineman Chad Harrison went high above the Claude line to deflect a pass into the hands of Joe Dan Ledbetter for the Wheeler interception at the Claude 34 yd line.

The Mustangs moved the ball to the Claude 20, but a holding penalty and a 3 yard loss, left the Mustangs with 2nd and long from the Claude 33.

Head Coach Ronnie Karcher reached way back into his playbook and called for the old "Hook & Ladder" play.

Quarterback Jason Beers found end Brandon Chick on a hook pattern 10

yards down field, Chick lateraled the ball to running back Mark Marshall who trailed the play.

Marshall took it in from there, to complete the 33 yard touchdown play. Ike Finsterwald kicked the extra point and Wheeler took a 7-0 lead.

After the kick-off Wheeler had one of the few breakdowns of the run defense all year long. On second down from the Claude 18 yd. line, running back Michael Campbell raced 82 yards around left end for the Claude TD. The extra point was good and the score was tied WHS 7 - CHS 7.

Senior return man Brandon Chick took the Claude score as a personal insult and returned the ensuing kick-off 56 yards for good field position at the Claude 24.

The Mustangs only managed 8 yards in three plays and found themselves facing 4th and 2 from the 16 yd line.

Nathan Willeford got the call on 4th down and followed Beryl Brister, Isidro Salas, and Travis Cook blocks for the first down at the 14 yd line.

On 2nd down from the 12 QB Jason Beers sprinted 12 yds. around left end for the Mustangs 2nd score. Finsterwald boomed another PAT. Wheeler 14, Claude 7.

Genero Meraz and Joe Dan Ledbetter combined to drop Claude RB Beau Brown for a 7 yard loss on 3rd down and forced a punt on Claude's next possession.

Wheeler drove 5 plays to the Claude 25, but failed to cash in when a fumble stopped the Mustangs.

Two plays after Claude took over Jimmie Winter fell on a Michael Campbell fumble at the 24.

Again the Mustangs failed to capitalize as QB Jason Beers lost the handle on the Claude 14.

Chad Harrison, Isidro Salas and Joe Dan Ledbetter hammered Claude fullback Ace Wheelchel for a 3 yd. loss on 3rd down to force another Claude punt.

Wheeler moved the ball 50 yards in 9 plays but was stopped on 4th down at the Claude 18.

Big Chad Harrison was all over the field as he dropped Campbell for another 3 yd. loss and force a punt.

Both teams failed to do anything offensively and traded punts.

Claude took over at their own 33 yd line, cornerback Jason Beers broke up a Claude pass, and Salas, and Harrison dropped Campbell for a 2 yd loss.

The Wheeler punt block was on as Genero Meraz tore through the Claude line and got a hand on the ball. Wheeler recovered at the Claude 1 yard line.

Mack Marshall barreled his way into the end zone for the TD. Finsterwald's kick was good and Wheeler led 21 to 7 at the half.

Field position played an important part of the game as punter Brandon Chick kept Claude backed up most of the 3rd quarter.

Claude threatened to mount a drive

as they moved from their own 20 out to the 43 yard line, but on third down Brandon Chick tipped a Claude pass and Chad Harrison picked it off at the 50 yd. line.

The Claude defense was not ready to give in and forced Wheeler to punt. Claude started deep in their own territory and got nothing in 3 plays.

On fourth down, a bad snap from center sailed into the end zone. An alert Jimmie Winter knocked the Claude punter out of the play and covered the ball for a Wheeler TD PAT was good Wheeler 28, Claude 7.

Claude was not giving up the fight as they started an 8 play 76 yard drive.


QB Beau Brown hit Jason Baker on a 20 yd. TD pass to make the score Wheeler 28, Claude 14.

Wheeler mounted their final scoring drive from the Claude 45 yd. line. Behind the strong running of Mack Marshall the Mustangs 9 plays to the Claude 4 yard line.

Mack plowed over left guard for the 4 yd. TD. Finsterwald was perfect on the night kicking and Wheeler led 35-14.

Claude put together a final scoring drive of 10 plays 67 yards for the TD but it was too little, too late.

City Council Adopts Ordinance On Dumping

The regular meeting of the City Council of Wheeler, TX was called to order by Mayor Wanda Herd.

Walter Simmons made motion, seconded by Barbra Koelzer to approve the minutes as written. The motion carried.

Mark Frankenbery made motion, seconded by Walter Simmons, to pay bills as presented. Motion carried.

Frank Clymer reported on the activities of the City employees.

Charles Kuntz presented receipts and disbursements and discussed same.

Barbra Koelzer made motion seconded by Bob McCain, to adopt Ordinance #161 prohibiting dumping of yard trash in city dumpsters and defining the terms of which non-residents of City may use City dumpsters for trash disposal. The motion carried. If a person is caught violating this Ordinance, it will be a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of not less than \$1.00, but not more than \$500.00.

The Council discussed lowering the roll-off container so it will be more accessible to the public.

The Jailer work program was discussed. The City will contact the Sheriff's department when they have work for the trustees.

The hours the City roll-off container will be open for residents of the City and County to dispose of trash will be Monday-Friday from 8:00 A.M. until 5:00 P.M. It will open on Saturday by special request.

Mike Hobbs met with council and stated that the landfill was covered. The Health Department will check and if there is anything that needs to be done to meet the State requirements, he will do at a later date as requested by the Health Department. He will charge the City only for the month of October, and if more coverage is needed he will charge according to the amount of time spent on the coverage.

Bob McCain made motion, seconded by Walter Simmons to pay Kiwanis Club \$15.00 a year for the Flag at the Wheeler Public Library.

Barbra Koelzer made motion, seconded by Mark Frankenbery to adjourn. The motion carried.


Harrison says, "I have enjoyed working for the people of Wheeler County over the past 15 years and would like the opportunity to serve the people another term."

"DISPOSAL OF YARD TRASH IN CITY TRASH RECEPTACLES PROHIBITED" and "USE OF CITY TRASH RECEPTACLES BY NON-RESIDENTS", MAKING IT UNLAWFUL TO DISPOSE OF YARD TRASH IN CITY TRASH RECEPTACLES AND DEFINING THE TERMS UNDER WHICH NON-RESIDENTS OF THE CITY OF WHEELER MAY UTILIZE CITY TRASH RECEPTACLES FOR TRASH DISPOSAL; DECLARING A VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE TO BE A MISDEMEANOR AND PROVIDING A PENALTY UPON CONVICTION THEREOF; PROVIDING FOR A SAVING CLAUSE, AND PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION

Terms Under Which Non-Residents May Dispose of Trash in City Trash Receptacles

No person who resides outside the city limits of the City of Wheeler, Texas, may dispose of trash, garbage, or other refuse in trash receptacles or other designated refuse containers or disposal units owned or operated by the City of Wheeler without first contracting through the office of the City Secretary for the payment of the sum of \$11.90 per month to the City for each month in which trash is to be so disposed of, and the City reserves the right to designate those trash receptacles or other refuse containers or disposal units in which trash may be disposed of by those persons, firms or corporations so contracting with the City.

SECTION 8-14 Penalty

Any person, firm, or corporation who violates the provisions of this Article is guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not more than \$200.00. Each and every act which constitutes a violation of this Article shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

SECTION 8-15

Should any provision of this Ordinance be declared invalid for any reason, such declaration shall not affect the validity of other provisions of this ordinance, it being the intent that the provisions of this Ordinance be severable and remain valid notwithstanding such declaration.

SECTION 8-16

This Ordinance shall become effective from and after its final passage and publication as provided by law.

SECTION 8-17


