9-1-1: The 9-1-1 system is now installed at the Wheeler County Sheriff's office. Kathleen Frankenbery is shown here testing the computerized system. The 911 number will officially go into service on Monday, January 6, 1992. Sheriff Jimmy Adams and his department will host an open house Monday from 2-4 and invite everyone to stop by the Jail and see the system. Pam Nielson of P.R.P.C. will be present to answer any questions you might have about 9-1-1. A call to 9-1-1 will activate the system and show your number on the screen; from the number, facts, including medical information, will appear on the screen. Medical information on family members can only be obtained from you, the forms printed in the *Times* provide the information needed for the computers to show on the screen. It is important that the forms be filled out and mailed to Panhandle Regional 9-1-1 Network, P.O. Box 9257, Amarillo, Texas 79105.

Mr. Daughtry was born in Kirby, Ark. He had lived in Wheeler since 1948. He married Opal Clay in 1930 at

Sayre, Okla. He served as the Wheeler county tax assessor/collector from 1947-1951. He then owned and operated Daughtry's Ben Franklin Store in Wheeler from 1952 until 1975.

Mr. Daughtry was elected Wheeler County clerk in 1976 and retired in 1984. He was a member of the church of Christ and Wheeler Kiwanis Club. He was a 32nd degree Mason, the past mayor of Wheeler and a past member of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce.

She stated, "Not only have I lost 30 pounds but my cholesterol has dropped from 232 to 143. I have two closets full of clothes which have not fit me in two years that I can now wear." In a separate report, a telephone interview revealed that a Wilmington, North Carolina pharmacist lost 14 pounds in 3 weeks on the product and was never hungry.

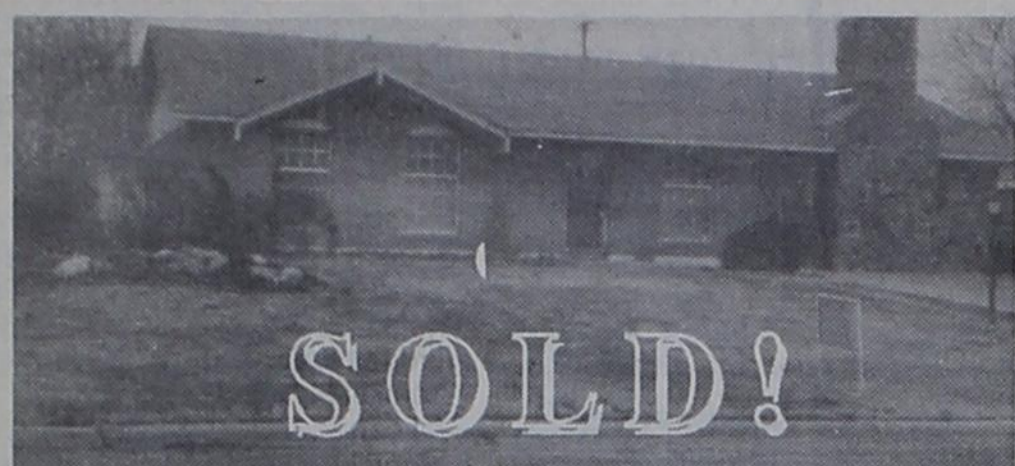

Overseeding Wheat Into Cotton

The Food Security Act has dramatically influenced farming nationwide. Cotton farming has been largely affected in the Texas Rolling Plains, and Wheeler County is no exception. One option for cotton farmers is the overseeding of small grain into cotton. Wheat is broadcast into cotton during the final cultivation usually in late August or early September.

One local farmer has fashioned a drill for overseeding into cotton. The drill is mounted on a 3-point hitch, and the spouts arranged to plant between the rows. The drill is calibrated to plant approximately 45 pounds of wheat per acre. This drill has been used to overseed 150-200 acres and the re-

sults are positive. Each farmer is responsible for following his Food Security Act plan. If any farmer has questions concerning his plan, he should contact the Soil Conservation Service immediately. The Soil Conservation Service does not discriminate on the basis of race, religion, sex, education, age, handicap, or national origin.
