

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

Dear Mr. Editor,

Ifeel compelled to write in response to an article in your October 22 issue of the TIMES. Mr. Bill Morrison wrote concerning the "Emmaus Walk", suggesting that it is not a proper vehicle for one who wants to become a better and more dedicated Christian. I recognize the respect that Mr. Morrison has in the Wheeler Community and therefore the damage his charges may do to this most excellent means of Christian renewal. As a former pastor in Wheeler, with some credibility among many of your readers, I write to set the record straight. I do so from my concern that Mr. Morrison obviously writes from an uninformed if not misinformed position. Certainly he has a right to express his opinion on this or any other matter affecting the Christian community, but Ifeel he owes it to his readers to get his facts straight rather than making charges that are without foundation. I speak from personal experience concerning Emmaus. I have attended the "Walk", have worked as a Spiritual leader in three others, and now serve as Spiritual Director of the Golden Spread Emmaus Community.

I am just one of some 1500 Christians who have attended the Walks conduced by this community alone. These come from almost every Christian church in the Panhandle of Texas, Eastern New Mexico, Western Oklahoma, Colorado, and Kansas. I would point out that the proof of its value is in the lives changed and enriched by having experienced it. All one needs to do is to talk to one who has attended. As I read Mr. Morrison's comments I was reminded of the story from the Gospel of John, Chapter 9. There was a man born blind who received his sight at the hands of Jesus. When questioned by the Pharisees as to the details of how it happened he replied, ...One thing I do know. I was blind.

Now I can see." John 9:25 For those of us who have experienced the marvelous outpouring of God's love and grace at an Emmaus Walk, we may not begin to have a perfect explanation for exactly what happens, or how, but we do know that lives are changed and enriched. Some attend with great burdens and myriads of problems and find relief. Some go simply seeking a deeper personal relationship with their Lord and are seldom disappointed. Some participants have met and received Christ as their personal Savior and Lord while on a walk. This is not the norm since the event is designed for Christians. Whether persons go with special needs or simply go because a friend suggests it, one fact remains. Countless persons have experienced great spiritual growth, healing and renewal while attending a Walk to Emmaus event. These ordinary Christians then returned to their individual churches to be better members and workers. They return to t heir homes to become better wives, husbands, parents and children. This is the true purpose of Emmaus, indeed, it is the only purpose. Emmaus has benefited thousands of Christians, their churches and their communities all over the world. It is not the only way to meet Christ in a rich and blessed way, but it is one way that is richly rewarding to all involved. Just as those first pilgrims on the Emmaus road had their hearts burn within them, as they recognized their risen Lord when he breaks bread with them, (Luke 24:13-35) so participants today experience that same burning, emotional desire

to share their own experience with the risen Lord when their own hearts are set aflame. When one experiences that fulness of God's love and grace, through Bible study, prayer and shared worship, it is no emotional ploy that grips them. It is the power of the Holy Spirit that burns within and drives them as they return home acting strangely, wanting everyone to share their excitement and their experience. Just as those first travelers had an emotional experience that may have caused their friends to doubt them, so do todays pilgrims, but the real proof comes when the friends experience it for themselves. Personal experience is the only proof. It is easy for one to stand on the outside and like the Pharisees condemn anything different they do not understand, but we who are leaders in the Christian community, owe it to our followers and to our Lord to express only informed

Emmaus is not a secret organization. Credible information can be obtained from any person who has attended or from most United Methodist Pastors. These events are carried out under the auspices of the United Methodist Upper Room and have been attended by persons of most every Christian group, Protestant, Catholic, non-denominational, and liberal to fundamentalists. Its pilgrims are made up of persons in their ninty's to teens, representing all races and economic classes. All Christians (the only requirement) are invited and will be blessed by attending a walk to Emmaus. You may consider this an open, personal invitation.
