### Range Improvement Work Carried On In Northwest Texas

The range conservation feature of the agricultural conservation program has added impetus to pasture improvement work in northwest Texas and the Panhandle and county agricultural agents are receiving many calls for aid in this connection, according to the A. and M. college extension service.

In Lynn county, 10 pasture contour demonstrations, involving 545 acres, were established during March and April. The contour listing was not done in connection with the range conservation program but to improve small pastures around the farms which are used for grazing work animals and other farm livestock.

Sites have been selected for 25 dams to impound reserves of water in Hansford county, where ranchmen will construct several hundred tanks in connection with the range conservation program.

Killing mesquite trees with kerosene was the subject of a meeting of some 100 Taylor county 4-H boys. Approximately 75 trees were treated.

### Conservation Group Sets Dates For Receiving Farmers

COLLEGE STATION—The Wednesday after the third Monday of each month has been set aside by the Texas agricultural conservation committee to receive farmers and committeemen who may wish to consult with the group on matters connected with the agricultural conservation program, according to George Slaughter, chairman of the committee.

The committee, which determines the policies of the agricultural conservation program in Texas, will hold regular monthly meetings to discuss routine matters in addition to aiding individual farmers and committeemen. Dates on which the latter may consult with the group fall on May 19, June 23, July 21, and August 18.

### Trench Silos Prove Worth in Panhandle

Farmers in the grain sorghum belt are reporting to their county agricultural agents that the feed they put down last fall in trench silos became more valuable with the passing months and that their cattle couldn't have done without it.

A 200 ton trench silo filled in September of 1935 was opened during March by Ben J. Teague of the Rivercamp community in Childress county. Approximately 100 farmers gathered at the Teague farm to see the silage which had been stored for 18 months.

In October, 1935, I. S. McMillin, ranchman of Stonewall county, stored 150 tons of red top cane in a trench silo. He opened it in February of 1937 to feed out to 50 heifers which were calving. McMillin says that the heifers immediately began to do better, gave more milk, and that the calf crop is his best in years.

Here's How to Make Enduring Whitewash

Almost five years ago a hollow tile plastered barn at the Georgia Experiment Station was whitewashed with a mixture made up in one of the laboratories there. This whitewash, which looks almost new at the present time, was made as follows:  
 50 pounds common lime  
 10 pounds salt  
 2 pounds alum  
 1 bar laundry soap  
 10 gallons water

To make the whitewash, chip the soap into small thin pieces and dissolve it in about two quarts of hot water; then make up the mixture to ten gallons with either warm or cold water. Next add the lime, salt, and alum, and stir until the salt and alum are dissolved. Allow this mixture to stand in a wooden barrel or tub for 24 to 36 hours before using it. Then add enough water to make a thin creamy mixture and apply with a whitewash brush or spray pump. This mixture may be used on wood, brick, or plastered walls, just as any other whitewash is used.

The secret of success with this whitewash is to allow it to stand at least 24 hours before using. If handled in this way it gives a white glossy surface which sticks well and will endure a long time.—H. P. Stuckey, Director, Georgia Experiment Station.

In most cases, the silage is being used to feed out steers or calves or to winter cows. The comment of Fred Bourland, Matador ranchman, "My trench silo will make me more profit than my cotton crop," seems to be the sentiment of most of those who experimented with trench silos during the past year.

Silage from his trench silo resulted in an increase of two quarts of milk per day per cow, according to S. O. Montgomery, dairyman of Ranger, Eastland county. Montgomery also found that his feed cost went down, as he was able to decrease his grain ration.

### 1937 No Year For Big Cotton Crop

An authoritative statement on 1937 cotton prospects is the following by C. A. Cobb, director Southern Division of the AAA, from which we reprint these paragraphs:  
 "Summarizing the cotton situation, the consensus is that there will be an increase of 10 to 12 per cent in planted cotton acreage in this year over last. This would mean between 33.2 million and 33.8 million harvested acres as compared with 30 million harvested acres last year. Should the average yield be no more than that during the past few years (192 pounds per acre) the production would be between 13.5 and 13.8 million bales, say 13.4 million. With favorable conditions it would of course be greater.

"Outlook for the world crop of American cotton on August 1, 1937, is approximately 40 million bales, which is excessive, added to indicated production it would give a world supply of American cotton for 1937-'38 of around 19.4 million bales, or the same as last season.

"A larger American crop than 12.5 million bales, a large foreign crop than 16.5 million bales, or a lower rate of industrial activity than the December, 1936, rate, or a combination of these would undoubtedly result in a very unsatisfactory price this fall. A domestic crop of 14.0 million bales, even with an average industrial activity as high as it has been, could result in prices of 10 cents or less.

"Small farmers, those who produce 10 or 15 bales a year (and that is above average), feel that the \$600 or \$800 of gross income they obtain from their crop, with cotton at 12 cents a pound, is becoming increasingly inadequate as living costs continue to rise.

"Thus, in planning their program for 1937, cotton farmers have the experience of four years to go on."

### Club Women Are Improving Yards

Yard improvement work is being carried on by many Northwest Texas and Panhandle home demonstration club members, county home demonstration agents in that section report.

To prevent her garden and lawn from washing, Mrs. H. H. Gregg of the Spring Creek club in Hutchinson county used native rock to build 90 feet of terraces which will hold the soil in place and improve the appearance of the yard. Bermuda and blue grass seed have been planted, and Mrs. Gregg has seeded 43 varieties of flowers. The only cash expenditure for the rock terraces was for 2½ sacks of cement.

### HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adopting a new Section to be known as Section 51d, which shall provide that the Legislature shall have the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient for assistance to destitute children and for the payment of same not to exceed Eight Dollars (\$8) for one child or Twelve Dollars (\$12) for the children of any one family per month; further providing that the Legislature may impose such restrictions and regulations as to it may seem expedient; providing that the amount to be expended out of State funds in any one year for such assistance shall never exceed the sum of One Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000); and providing that the Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for assistance to destitute children; providing for an election on the question of adoption or rejection of such amendment and making an appropriation therefor; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof, and prescribing the form of ballot.

### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a Section to be known as Section 51d, which shall read as follows:  
 "Section 51d. Subject to the limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions, and regulations as may be provided by law, the Legislature shall have the power to provide for assistance to destitute children under the age of fourteen (14) years; such assistance shall not exceed Eight Dollars (\$8) per month for one child nor more than Twelve Dollars (\$12) per month for such children of any one family; provided that the amount to be expended for such assistance out of State funds shall never exceed the sum of One Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000) per year. The Legislature may impose residential restrictions and such other restrictions, limitations, and regulations as to it may seem expedient. The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States such financial assistance to destitute children as that Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions herein above provided."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Monday in August, 1937, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:  
 "FOR the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for assistance to destitute children under the age of fourteen (14) years not to exceed Eight Dollars (\$8) per month for one child nor more than Twelve Dollars (\$12) per month for such children of any one family, and providing for acceptance from the Government of the United States of American financial assistance for such payment."  
 Those voters opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:  
 "AGAINST the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for assistance to destitute children under the age of fourteen (14) years not to exceed Eight Dollars (\$8) per month for one child nor more than Twelve Dollars (\$12) per month for such children of any one family, and providing for acceptance from the Government of the United States of American financial assistance for such payment."  
 If it appears from the returns of said election that majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.  
 Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of said publication and election.

A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Article III, Section 52, of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 52d; providing that the Legislature may authorize by law, after a majority vote of the resident qualified electors owning taxable property therein, the adoption of a plan for the construction of paved roads and bridges or both in Harris County and in road districts therein; providing for the levy of a tax to pay for such construction; providing for the necessary proclamation; and appropriating funds to defray the expenses of the proclamation, publication, and election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Section 52, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto another section to be known as Section 52d, which shall read as follows:

"Section 52d: Upon the vote of majority of the resident qualified electors owning rendered taxable property therein so authorizing, a county or road district may collect an annual tax for a period not exceeding five (5) years to create a fund for constructing lasting and permanent roads and bridges or both. No contract involving the expenditure of any of such fund shall be valid unless, when it is made, money shall be on hand in such fund.

"At such election, the Commissioners' Court shall submit for adoption a road plan and designate the amount of special tax to be levied; the number of years said tax is to be levied; the location, description, and character of the roads and bridges; and the estimated cost thereof. The funds raised by such taxes shall not be used for purposes other than those specified in the plan submitted to the voters. Elections may be held from time to time to extend or discontinue said plan or to increase or diminish said tax. The Legislature shall enact laws prescribing the procedure hereunder.

"The provision of this section shall apply only to Harris County and road districts therein."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State on the fourth Monday in August, 1937, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendment to the Constitution providing that Harris County and any road district therein may upon a vote of the people therein adopt a road plan and levy taxes for road and bridge construction in lieu of the issuance of bonds"; those voters opposing said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the amendment to the Constitution providing that Harris County and any road district therein may upon a vote of the people therein adopt a road plan and levy taxes for road and bridge construction in lieu of the issuance of bonds."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appointed out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.
