# Road Department **Plans Conservation**

Starting Program to Save Soil and Rainfall Alongside State-County Highways

During a visit to Wheeler Tuesday, V. E. St. Clair of Shamrock, district superintendent of highways, announced that the State Highway department of Texas is starting a conservation program designed to directly benefit lands adjacent to state highway rights-of-way and indirectly the highways themselves.

Blanks forms for use in the program ask permission of land-owners "to work in soil and water conservation on private property adjacent to state highway rights-of-way to be done by the State Highway department of Texas." The form further enumerates that work will be for the purpose of conserving soil and moisture and to prevent as much rainfall run-off as is possible and practical by the installation of contours, terraces and such mechanical structures as may be deemed necessary by the highway department's engi-

Opening date for the fall and winter term of Wheeler schools was announced this week by Supt. J. L. Gilmore. Starting Monday, August 30, the greater portion of the first two days will be devoted to enrollment and assignment of students to their proper places

A short program consisting of musical numbers and brief talks, will be given in the auditorium-gymnasum at 9 o'clock Monday morning. Following this, general instructions concerning enrollment are to be out-

All high school students are requested to bring a library fee of 50 cents each, which pays for the school year, at the beginning of the term. There will also be a small monthly laboratory fee in connection with the typewriting course in commercial



# Notice! Delinquent Taxpayers Installment Payment Plan

Under a recent law Wheeler county delinquent taxpayers may take advantage of an installment plan of payment to discharge their obligations. First payment of such delinquent taxes can be made only

BETWEEN AUGUST 21 AND SEPTEMBER 1, 1937

Sec. 3 of the statute reads: "All payments received by the assessor-collector of taxes under provisions of this Act shall be due and payable within 20 months from the date of July 1, 1937, such payments being due and payable in 10 equal installments, provided that the first payment of such partial payments shall be made before Sept. 1, 1937.

Sec. 4: If after paying one or more installments, if the delinquent taxpayer pays no further installment or installments for a period of 4 months, all of the remaining installments of said delinquent taxes shall become due and payable, and it will thereupon become the duty of the county attorney or other qualified official to institute suit for collection thereof.

Sec. 5: The assessor-collector of taxes shall accept partial payments made by a taxpayer in any sum, provided, however, that no payment shall be less than \$1.00, and that no partial payment account will be opened for delinquent taxes which total less than \$10.00.

Several other provisions are included in the law, a copy of which may be seen in the tax assessor-collector's office at the court house.




